

Unsearched New Orleans Records Identified In Ticklers Disclosed to Mark Allen
Clay Shaw was the prime figure in the Garrison investigation and is specifically included in Weisberg's request. The existence of a number of Clay Shaw ticklers is disclosed in records provided to Mark Allen. In one of the disclosures to Allen there were two different folders each identified as on the jurors in the trial. Under date of February 5, 1985, Weisberg provided copies of these and of search slips disclosed to Allen to the appeals office, to which he also reported that, contrary to the FBI's attestations, ticklers are not "routinely destroyed" and that "No related New Orleans records have been disclosed to me and nothing of this sort is reflected in the disclosed Clay Shaw search records...These records also indicate that the FBIHQ Garrison watch was located in Room 818 of the building at 9th and D Sts., NW."

Bearing on defendants intentions, there has been no reply to this letter and documentation. This again indicates that the discovery was not seriously intended and that virtually all the extensive information Weisberg ~~has~~ provided and continued to provide throughout this litigation was entirely ignored by the defendants.

New Orleans was the Office of Origin on Garrison and Shaw, both within the requests. There was no search of the records of "the Garrison watch" and the FBI did not need discovery from Weisberg to be aware of its existence and the ~~relevance~~ relevance of its records. Likewise, no discovery from Weisberg would have enabled the FBI to prove that it had complied when it knew very well that it hadn't.
