Critics:

The FBI attested that it had no records identifiable as "critics" although it had been directed to search and process all records relating to the critics. An FBI tickler disclosed to "ark Allen in the form of an outline, under "3. Bureau Relations with Warren Commission," under "C. Related Bureau Actions and Activities," discloses that the FBI knew all about the critics and had files on them, from which, after the Commission's days, it prepared (7.) sex dossiers on the critics."

(I attached this to my en banc pro se petition and I added the paperclips shown to identify material.)

On 11/8/84 I located copies of FBI Dallas records I'd obtained, in my office, and I sent copies to Jim. One is a copy I'd provided the derendants much earlier. It discloses that not only in Dallas but in other field offices the FBI has files on the critics, with the information sent to Dallas, of which this represents an example. They even had informers covering the meetings of critics, as the attached report represents. Aside from the others mentioned, on whom Los Angeles FBI had files, Los Angeles knew that Dallas had a file on critic and former deputy sheriff Roger Craig.

These ticklers disclosed to Mark Allen also reveal that the FBI kept records and files on the critics and their books. (DeLoach to Tolson 9/26/66) The ticklers include separate folders on the books by the critics, for the withheld information the FBI knew all along that it had. (Rush to Judgement folder). This is Lane's first book.

Note that Los Angeles also knew that New Orleans has a 100 file on Garriaon, not provided in this litigation. I did provide the New Orleans file number for this committee that is the subject of the report, a committee of critics.

The elaborteness of the FBI's filing on critics, referred to in the second graf, is reflected by the creation of a file on a critic, 100-68973 (of course all critics are subversive!) for (LALYNN)(phonetic). This refers to a fine woman, an accountant and a widow, who was never called in this phonetic representation. She was Lillian Castellano. (89-43-8161, not disclosed in ticklers to Allen). Disclosed to me in this litigation.)


