The CIA docs disclosed to Hoch came today.

In 1240-1005 has an odd formulation. It may or may not be significant, depending on interpretation: "George (deMohrenschildt) was apparently associated with Lee Harvey Oswald prior to the assassination, although detail is not available in OS files." Why "although?" Why not something like "however," or "but?" The use of although can suggest the author expected that such detail would or should be in the OS files.

In 1327-1042A, first graf, quite illegible, there is reference to the head of a training camp on the other side of Lake Pontchartrain as "El Mexicano." I do not recall having heard this before. I do not recall any anti-Castro leader who was known as "El Mexicano." I note this because both Orest Pena and Sylvia Odio referred to seeing a person identified or misidentified as Oswald with a Mexican and because Dean Andrews said that when Oswald visited his office he was with a Mexican.

However, there is hardly a less trustworthy source than Bringuier.
