Dear Mr. Harold H. Berg:

This is in reply to your letter of July 6, 1975, received in this office on July 9, 1975, in which you make requests concerning the release of the President's Commission on the Assassination of President John F. Kennedy under the Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C. 552) as detailed.

Your original request was for copies of all records released since the last FOIA request filed by you on July 1, 1975. If you will supply me with a date and a copy of your previous request, I will forward to you a copy of the information, we will be pleased to furnish them.

In the FOIA (Freedom of Information Act) requests for records can, among other things:

- (1) The withholding from release of Commission Document 702. This document which referred to the "Wise Men," both of which can be found in the FBI's Special Agent's Report of the Department of Defense (see Exhibit 12) (see also Exhibit 13), and of the FBI's Special Agent's Report of the Department of Defense (see Exhibit 14) (see also Exhibit 15). A copy of each had been furnished to you previously.
- (2) The withheld portion of the letter from J. Edgar Hoover to you dated July 10, 1975, concerning your request. This letter was also your Letter for Commission Document 935 and was not released in its entirety (see Exhibit 20, dated to the Department of Defense on July 10, 1975, in your file). We will furnish to you a copy of the withheld portion of the withheld document. (See also the letter involved in (1) herein at reference to the "Wise Men" and related exhibits). It was during the course of the investigation of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy that the "Wise Men" were involved in the investigation of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963, of which you can be informed.

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available to you. We do not retain the letter of May 22, 1973, from J. Edgar Hoover to J. Lee Eggers on the basis of the declassification of the enclosure (FOIA) by the Department of Justice letter of August 11, 1975, which found no injury in the public interest in releasing the one page of the letter to you.

- (3) Declassification of a letter of July 7, 1973, relating to Mexican Immigration Department records, 46 enclosures of which had been forwarded with it. We do not have records that show the reasons why documents were classified or declassified. Fortunately the classified documents relating to investigation of Oswald's trip to Mexico were classified because relations with a foreign country were involved. We released this document when we could do so in covering the file for Oswald's Mexican trip.
- (4) Declassification of a letter of J. Lee Eggers to the FBI Director of April 26, 1973. This letter was withheld because it pertained to the handling of the Oswald files. It was withheld because it involved the investigation of the death of Lee Harvey Oswald and the question of foreign relations with Mexico. In among the records the Department of Justice requested us to continue to withhold by its letter of April 19, 1973 (item 3 above). It was declassified and released by a letter of January 24, 1975, from the Department of Justice in response to our letter of July 31, 1974. We have been unable to identify the dossier that this letter came under here.
- (5) Declassification to the withholding and releasing of the FBI memo dated (1973) in connection with Testimony (Commission Document 105). To withhold a little of part of the portion of Commission Document 105 (the FBI memo dated (1973) in connection with the testimony of James W. Angleton before the House Select Committee on Small Business) and the FBI memo dated (1973) in connection with the letter of James W. Angleton before the House Select Committee on Small Business of CD 105 with the deletion of the deleted part of the first page of CD 105 and the last page of CD 105 (1) (5).
- (6) The letter October 27, 1973, dealing with Oswald's hospitalization. As stated in our letter of June 17, 1975, the page relating to Oswald's hospitalization on October 27, 1973, is from the Oswald-Harley Chronology in the Commissioner's records. It was previously withheld from release because it contained information from a document withheld from us.

- (i) Delete it in the Cole-McAfee report on Oswald's foreign activities. The deleted material is dated to you under S.W.C. 502 (b) (5).
- (ii) CIA records or reports relating to the Puccio told the CIA. No document of this kind have been found in the records of the Commission.
- (iii) Nonpublic records of any kind still withheld. These records consist of the following:
- (a) Letter of Griffin to Helms, March 6, 1964.
  - (b) Memorandum of Chapman to Helms, Dickeler, Ball and Bell, March 8, 1964.
  - (c) Memorandum of Colcord to Helms, March 12, 1964.
  - (d) Memorandum of Helms to Colcord, March 12, 1964.
  - (e) Memorandum of Helms to Colcord, April 17, 1964.
  - (f) Memorandum of July 23, 1964 (no names given).
  - (g) Memorandum of Helms to Helms, August 22, 1964.
  - (h) Telegram from Helms to Colcord of August 22, 1964.
  - (i) Perhaps page 3 of the original version of the section of the Commission's final report dealing with the meeting between Helms and Puccio.

FB& (j) Page 1 of Co-Armed Personnel list.

(k) Copy of letter of CO 452.

(l) (m) Copy of letter of CO 452 dated August 25, 1964, to the Commission, which states that the Commission has been furnished the majority of the information. He regrets that a few items relating to Helms' liaison with Puccio were inadvertently omitted in our previous letter to you.

With thanks for your attention, and I hope to have the following documents:

(n) Copy of "Final Johnson (J-1) Intelligence Brief (CIA)" of July 14, 1967, which was forwarded to you. This document

of which is referred to in the note are denied to you under 5 U.S.C. 552 (b) (5).

- (2) Letter of The as Re: Khrushchev, Deputy Director for Plans, CIA, to Robert W. Bahrer, Ambassador of the United States, on October 2, 1967. This letter is denied to you under 5 U.S.C. 552 (b) (1).
- (3) Letter of May 1, 1975, of Robert F. York, FOI Coordinator, CIA, to James E. Woods, which can be made available to you.
- (4) Note of Marion H. Johnson (NHS) to Charles P. Dexter (CIA) July 20, 1974, and letter of John D. Morrison, Jr., Acting General Counsel, CIA, to James P. Woods, October 1, 1974, which can be made available to you.
- (10) Declassification of certain records on or about July 13, 1975:

The classification actions taken by the Department of Justice in 1974 and from 1975 up until July 13, 1975, are described below. These actions were taken upon a researcher in order to prevent disclosure of information which he had with him, on letters of the Department of Justice dated July 10 and August 10, 1974, and July 27, 1975, and July 13, 1975, as well as letters received from him dated August 5, 1974, October 9, 1974, and January 9 and March 2, 1975, are denied to you under 5 U.S.C. 552 (e) (6).

The specific records to which you refer in this request apparently are the following:

- (a) Pages 23-35 of Commodity Document 651 relating to Iran. These pages were withheld from research in 1965 and 1970 at the request of the Department of Justice in its letter dated July 24, 1970. They were declassified by the letter of January 26, 1975, of the Department ~~the~~ listed in item 4 above.
- (b) Letter of J. Paul Nitze, dated April 17, 1971, to the FBI in which he informed the FBI that it was research by the FBI in 1967-68 version of the records because of the relevance of the letter to the investigation of Gerald R. Ford's trip and his question on their relationship. The Department of Justice has no records to be withheld other than those referred to in the letter to the FBI of April 17, 1971 (item 2 above).

(c) A transcript of an oral interview of the Captain of the ship May 22, 1975. A transcript was prepared by a Department of Defense intelligence officer from the report of others for that interview and classified on the basis of the classification of the information. A copy of U.S.C. 552 (b) (1) to which you will be furnished on October 12, 1975, will provide a review of the transcript and the reply of the Department of Defense to you under 5 U.S.C. 552 (b) (1).

(d) The undated Collier-Gleason memorandum on Oswald's foreign activities. Most of this memorandum was declassified by the National Archives on the basis of published information. A letter of Charles E. Savage (CIA) to James B. Edwards relating to declassification of a portion of the memorandum is copied to you under 5 U.S.C. 552 (b) (1).

We furnish a copy of the regulations at 5 U.S.C. 552 (b) which include those cited in this letter. If you have any questions we are furnishing you, please let us know.

We would request to you separately concerning the security classification level indicated to you in this letter.

We would recall the demands to you in this letter to the Deputy Director of the United States, National Security and Defense Service, Washington, D.C. Details of security classified documents, which includes parts of the undated memorandum to the Collier-Gleason memorandum on Oswald's foreign activities, may be found in the Information Classification Review Guide available, National Defense Information Commission, DOD 2030.2.
