Dear Mr. Buckley.

Reur # 2546, I have received your 7/29/80 and the records referred to it in.

Once again I will file a copy with Mr. Shea as my appeal. However, when there are records that are referred to and are not attached or explained, it does seem to be an unnecessary burdening of the overworked and understaffed appeals staff.

Because of their content, which indicates these are matters of more than casual interest, I select from the many the few to which I here refer.

These appear to refer to Jim Carrison and his so-called probe. As such the natters are also within my C.A. 78-0322, for FMI New Orleans office records, of which Mr. Shea has knowledge.

#1064 is a routing slip that appears to refer to a clandestine tape. The names of those to whom the missing record(s) went are of those whose names appear regularly pertaining to Garrison. (129-11 Section 22)

The initial handwritten message is: "We'll be getting a publicity blast. Deskman at FEL Edgrs said he had sent a 'tickler' on top of this to (underscored twice).

Mr. Hoover - but that his personal reaction was it was too dangerous to request of of
tape, contact Hays or news editor so they are doing nothing at this time. I'm not inclined to req. FEL to do anything on this, I'm sure their (FEL) grapevine will feed us
some details soon." Opposite the last sentence, in the marking, is 'I agree K."

Routing by a deak man to Director Hooger appears to be a bit unusual and does suggest significance, out of the ordinary.

The combined reference to Mays and news editor suggests a New Orleans reporter and newspaper. At that time the Statos-Item had a reported named Hoke May, who was often called Mays. At that time also he was running around with a woman FBI employeem. By age he could have been her father. The last time I new him he was with her. He was extraordinarily drunk. In his drunked state he reflected a different attitude toward Carrison, a decidedly antegonistic one. Both papers were strongly opposed to Carrison.

As I have informed Mr. Shee in the past, there were withat amounted to anti-Garrison parties in the FBL's office. I have the notes of a reporter who was present.

Whather or not any of this is pertinent, there is no record included in what you have provided that refers to any such tape or to anything that could have been the subject of this recuting allp.

# 1004 (Section 213) refers to File 145-12-979. This file has not been provided. It also refers to the existence of an index you have not provided or referred to. Another handwritten note refers to a filing by subject matter rather than file number. Any subject files would be of particular interest and importance.

Written on at the top is "7145303 Box 70." If this refers to other filing I ask that it be checked for compliance.

This particular record was addressed to the Civil Division and bears its stamp. It therefore is possible that the notations are by that division.

Two other routing slips, also both initially directed to Mr. Block, indicate that he had a special role in what 1016 (Section 21B) refers to as "Garrison's Follies." 1019 indicates that he kept what is referred to as "your diary," which would be an important recorn of those "follies." No such diary has been provided or referred to in anything you have provided. Both records refer to a "B & A Homes case." In neither is instance is shat was pured provided.

I don't know what the B & A file or case is but I do recall that there was considerable attention to Carrison's purchase of a home, the price he pifed and the size of his mortgage. A source to which there was no attribution provided this information to the pross.

1019 indicates where the original was directed.

Those Carrison Follies and what the Department and the FBI did and did not do about them are of considerable historical importance. Idke the earlier records you have provided, these refer to many records not provided or accounted for in any way. They are pertinent and I would like copies of them.
