Add Ferrie complaint, after Regis Kennedy-Marcello report

_. What the FBI elected not to trouble the Warren Commission with its agents had no reluctance in sharing with Ferrie as some kind of fine joke, the full appreciation of which requires a special kind of sense of humor. In an unpublished telegram, ^{(of February 24, 1967,} to Time magazine from its New Orleans ^{reporter,} ~~"stringer",~~ ~~David Snyder, who is also a reporter for a local newspaper, dated~~ ^{the States Item} ~~February 24, 1967,~~ the beginning and the appropriate part of which are appended as Exhibit , Snyder makes clear that Ferrie was with an FBI agent, in attendance upon Federal District Court in New Orleans, at the time the President was assassinated. On information and belief, Plaintiff adds that, when Ferrie was questioned ^{by the press and others,} about his whereabouts on certain occasions and at specified times, he referred his questioners to the local FBI and to one agent in particular, Ernest Wall, Jr., such was the friendliness of the relationship between the alleged investigators and the alleged subject of the alleged investigation. In recounting to Time what Ferrie had told him of Ferrie's visit to the New Orleans FBI office, where he apparently was quite welcome, the ^{Monday} prior to Snyder's telegram, Snyder reported,

Ferrie had been down to the FBI office Monday, he said, to talk to the agents. One of the agents told him, 'I know where you were the day Kennedy was assassinated. You were cooling your heels with me in Federal District Court.' This is mentioned in an earlier file. Ferrie said the FBI boys were chuckling about the Garrison investigation.

Whether or not "this is mentioned in an earlier file", it is not in any Warren Commission file not withheld by order of Defendant Department of Justice and is not subject to withholding under any law or regulation. It is not encompassed by any reason given Plaintiff by Defendants. *Now should it be suppressed.*
