Dear Mr. Buckley,

Re: # 1560, I have enclosed your 7/2/60 and the enclosures referred to it etc.

Once again I will file a copy with Mr. Shaw in my opinion. However, when there are documents that are referred to and are not attached or enclosed, it does seem to be an unnecessary burdening of the contacted and uncontacted agency staff.

Because of their content, which indicates there are interests of more than general interest, I submit from the very few to which I have referred,

These appear to refer to Jim Garrison and his so-called people. As such the matters are also within my C.A. 70-1222, for all New Orleans office reporters, of which Mr. Shaw has knowledge.

#104 is a routing slip that appears to refer to a classified tape. The names of those to whom the missing mount(s) went are of those whose names appear regularly pertaining to Garrison. (120-11 section 22)

The initial handwritten message is: "We'll be getting a publicity blast. Don't run at PMI unless and he has sent a 'tudder' on top of this to (unintelligible name) Mr. Horner - but that this general question was it was too dangerous to request on of tape, contact Hayes or news editor as they are doing nothing at this time. I'm not inclined to see PMI to do anything on this, I'm sure their (PMI) newspaper will feed us some details soon." On quite the last sentence, in the margin, is "TII agrees X."

Starting by a direct reference to Director Boggs appears to be a bit unusual and does suggest significance, out of the ordinary.

The continual reference to Hayes and news editor suggests a New Orleans reporter and newspaper. At that time the States-Times had a reported mast head Hayes, who was often called Hayes. At that time also he was running around with a young FBI employee. By age he could have been her father. The last time I saw him he was with her. He was extremely drunk. In his drunken state he reflected a different attitude toward Garrison, a continually antagonistic one. Both papers were strongly opposed to Garrison.

As I have informed Mr. Gandy in the past, there were what amounted to additional portions in the FBI's office. I have the notes of a reporter who was present.

Whether or not any of this is pertinent, there is no record indicated in what you have provided that refers to any such tape or to anything that could have been the subject of this recording device.

P 1004 (Section 213) refers to File 145-43-970. This file has not been provided. It also refers to the existence of an index you have not provided or referred to. An other handwritten note refers to a filing by subject matter rather than file number. Any subject files would be of particular interest and importance.

Written on at the top is "FBIADS Box 70." If this refers to other filing I ask that it be checked for compliance.

This particular record was addressed to the Civil Division and bears this stamp. It therefore is possible that the notations are by that division.

The other recording device also both initially directed to Mr. Black, indicates that he had a special role in what 1016 (Section 213) refers to as "Garrison's Political," 1019 indicates that he kept what is referred to as "your diary," which would be an important record of their "filiation." No such diary has been provided or referred to in anything you have provided. Both records refer to a "B & A Name file" and a "B & A Name case." In neither instance is what was recorded provided.

I don't know what the B & A file or case is but I do recall that there was considerable attention to Garrison's purchase of a house, the price he paid and the size of his newspaper. A source to which there was no attribution provided this information to the press.

These Garrison files and what the Department and the FBI did and did not do about them are of considerable historical importance. Like the earlier records you have provided, these refer to many records not provided or accounted for in any way. They are pertinent and I would like copies of them.
