I enclose a file of documents concerning Lee Oswald which we thought might possibly by of some interest in connection with the investigation of Oswald. These documents are all communications from him to the Embassy while he was in the USSR, letters to him from the Imbassy, and memoranda prepared by consular officers concerning his case. These papers had not previously been forwarded to the Department although, as you know, the Fiebsay transmitted a number of dispatches and cables regarding Oswald when his case was active.

The enclosed documents are for your retontion and disposition as you see fit, since I cannot see what further use we would have for them here.

From the beginning of this whole sod affair we have been very cautious in our comments to the press concerning Osmald although we have consistently been under great pressure from the correspondents to release the details of the case to them. As we have stated in Embtel 1758, our comments have been confined to the bare facts of the dates of Gauald's appearance at the Embassy and his return to the United States.

As a sidelight, I might mention that when I saw

at the airport Saturday night
when we saw Mikoyan off, he referred to Oswald and said that he
seemed to be an unstable character. On his own initiative,

mentioned that Oswald had been in the Soviet Union,
had married a Soviet girl and a child had been born in the Soviet
Union of this marriage.
