Sartre appeal

JFK assassination records appeals - Jean Paul Sartre Referrals Withholding the reasonably segregable Worksheets Harold Weisberg 00/18/79

Attached to my appeal was a copy of 105-82555-4116, a short news account of the formation of another Mark Lame committee and Hoover's note reading "Find out who Sartre is." There is another man note, a reference to a Jones to Deleach memo.

From the worksheets this is also part of Serial 4116. (Worksheet attached)
All two pages are withheld under "national security" claim. That the record
was referred to State is also indicated.

Even if the FMI turned to the State Department at to "find out who Sartre is," which I doubt, this is an FMI record and if there were any need for any referral to State there should have been some reasonably segregable information in these two pages.

(All of 4117 is withheld, also on "national security" claim. The letter is to Rankin, so again there should have been some reasonably segregable information.

Assuming even that what is withheld is not within the public domain, which I would not assume in any event.)

From their presecupation with what they regard as political matters I can understand that perhaps PHI agents may not be aware that Sartre is a public personality, even that they might regard details of his paddious private life as not publicly known, although they were well known.

But what I can't understand is how these great red-hunters could not known that MAXX Sartre's politics were also very well known, even if not th Hoover.

There appears to be no basis for either withholding under "national security" claim or for referral to State.
