75. KEY THEMES IN MARXIST PHILOSOPHY DR. HOWARD SELSAM

This course will develop the most attractive emphases of Marxist philosophy, centering especially around the struggle against "metaphysical" ways of thinking from the young Marx to the later Lenin. The relation of man and nature, the role of labor in making man, the concept of alienation, the individual, society and social change, the theory of knowledge and truth will all be examined.

85. POLITICAL ECONOMY I BETTY GANNETT

This session of a three-term study of Marxist political economy, will deal with the origins and nature of capitalism, the meaning of exploitation, the labor theory of value, the source of capitalist profits, and the concept of a "fair" day's work for a "fair" day's pay.

95. MARXISM AND THE WORKING CLASS WILLIAM ALBERTSON

The class struggle as the motive force for social development. What classes exist in the U.S.? Is the U. S. a "middle class" nation? How is the structure of the American working class changing? Why is the working class the most progressive class in society? Strike struggles and workers' political movements in American history. The impact of the civil rights "revolution" on the labor movement. Where is the American labor movement going?

105. AMERICAN SOCIAL CRITICS

DR. HERBERT APFHEKER
This course will analyze the thinking of: Charles A. Beard, Walter Lippmann, William A. Williams, C. Wright Mills and W. E. B. Du Bois. The development of the ideas of each of these five leading 20th century intellectual figures will be placed against their historical backgrounds; full student participation will be expected and encouraged.

115. AFRICAN HISTORY JOHN HENRIK CLARKE

This course will be a general survey of African history, with major emphasis on the rise and decline of independent empires, kingdoms and empires of the Western Sudan (West Africa). A brief synopsis of the history of other areas of Africa will be included. The latter part of the course will be devoted to a review and appraisal of the events that led to the mission of modern Africa.
