

Garrison Says Oswald Didn't Fire at JFK

NEW YORK (UPI)—New York Dist. Atty. James Garrison claimed today Lee Harvey Oswald never did fire a shot at President Kennedy on Nov. 22, 1963, but was just a scapegoat for a paramilitary group "solely responsible" for the president's assassination.

Garrison said in an interview with Playboy magazine that Kennedy was killed by "a pro-Castro guerrilla team of at least 100 men," all of them former employees of the Central Intelligence Agency.

Garrison said the men, whom he described as "anti-Castro adventurers and members of the paramilitary right," turned against Kennedy because the president "was working toward reconciliation with the U.S. and Castro's Cuba."

Harvey Oswald, Garrison said, but fired no shots at the president.

The controversial district attorney also claims that he and the CIA know the identity of the real assassins.

Asked specifically if the persons he has under suspicion will be arrested, Garrison said: "All I can say is that this is an ongoing case and there will be arrests."
