Mark Lane Aligns Self With Garrison

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Mark Lane, outspoken critic of the Warren Commission and author of the best-seller "Rush to Judgment," has identified himself with Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's investigation into the assassination of President Kennedy. Lane said he had been shown "substantive evidence" which convinced him "completely and more convinced than ever" that Garrison holds the key to the assassination mystery. Lane said he had been working with the New Orleans district attorney "for some weeks," and a document he had been shown did not rely on the testimony of any witness. He refused to go into further details. Lane also declined to let newspapermen get a close look at two documents he presented as memo-

ria. Lane said the two documents proved a Saturday Evening Post article by James Phelan "will not hold up at all." Phelan's article, "Rush to Judgment in New Orleans," questioned the Russo testimony and Sciambra's methods of securing it. Russo was the main witness against defendant Clay L. Shaw during a preliminary hearing.
