# Big Little Questions Unanswered

**N**EW ORLEANS (UPI) — One of the biggest little unanswered questions in Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's probe of an alleged New Orleans conspiracy to assassinate President Kennedy is just one word long and remains unanswered.

The question is: why?

Here are the facts:

**R**ay L. Shaw, a Massachusettian New Orleansian of considerable culture, culture and intelligence, accused of conspiring to murder Kennedy,

**E**MERY R. RUSSO, a 25-year-old Baton Rouge, La., insurance salesman, says Shaw, whom he said he knew as "Clem Bertrand," plotted with assassin Lee Harvey Oswald and the late Dr. James W. Fierrie to kill Kennedy.

Why did Russo wait eight days — until after Ferrie died of a brain hemorrhage in his New Orleans apartment — to volunteer his story?

**W**HY DID RUSSO not report immediately after the assassination to the FBI, the Secret Service or others participating in the Warren Commission investigation of the assassination?

There is no record that he ever offered information or was questioned.

The same question goes unanswered with respect to Ray Cummings and Clyde Limbaugh, who describes himself as a singer, said he was working for Ruby and saw Ruby, and J. D. Tippit—the policeman slain by Oswald after the assassination — together in Dallas a week before the killing.

## Dr. Oswald in Telecast

**N**EW ORLEANS (AP) — Persecuted Russo, the "confidential informant" in Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's probe of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, told a television interviewer he had never heard of Lee Harvey Oswald until he was linked with the presidential assassination.

SU-TV, of New Orleans, broadcast an interview Tuesday night it made with Russo shortly after the death of David Ferrie two weeks ago. Garrison and Ferrie as a central figure in the assassination plot, according to Oswald.

Clyde Limbaugh, a 25-year-old insurance man now living in [redacted], told a three-judge panel earlier Tuesday that he heard Lee Harvey Oswald, Ray Shaw and David Ferrie plotting to assassinate President Kennedy.

He also said in the interview that "Ferrie was obviously trying to get rid of Kennedy and the idea was what he was doing to Oswald."
