Robert Morris, D-Ill. senator for the Senate, labeled Wednesday Chief Justice Earl Warren's leading the commission investigating President John F. Kennedy's assassination "a constitutional monstrosity."

Warren should resign from the commission which was appointed by President John F. Kennedy, Morris said in a press conference at the Press Club of Fort Worth in the Blossington Hotel.

He said Warren actually is slipping into the hands of Jack Ruby, who killed Kennedy, to name Lee Harvey Oswald.

Warren's defense will claim he was never got a fair hearing, Morris said in a statement. Morris' lawyers will use Warren's position as an expert witness as an argument against getting a fair hearing before the Supreme Court.

The defense will push for a hearing before the court of law, even if an effort to get such a hearing court conviction is possible.

"You will see Warren will precede the other eight members," he added.

Morris, former University of Chicago president, is an attorney and former counsel for the Senate internal security subcommittee. He is seeking nomination in the Republican primary May 2.

The senator also blamed Dallas Mayor Earl Warren for killing Kennedy in the city. He said Warren's administration against Dallas National Guards and National Guardsmen's attack, he says, killed Kennedy.

He added Warren's apology for the City of Dallas before that up the nation and that would, in killing the president, made Dallas look a target.

Morris said President John F. Kennedy's but himself in the scale of the United States, he immediately embracing the progress of the late president.

He said he was disappointed in the speech because Kennedy did not acknowledge more than individual responsibility and the religious and spiritual heritage of our society.

"Our Constitution is very old. It knows no racial or ethnic barriers," Morris said in his remarks.

Morris named Joseph P. Kennedy, as of now, the former United States ambassador. The candidate said he expected to be in Fort Worth every 10 days until the primary.

He said he is considering Fort Worth for his state headquarters or a more modest installation in Dallas.
