Dear Mr. Wegmann:

This is in response to your letter of January 4, 1968, in which you requested us to furnish you with background material on William Turner.

Mr. Turner entered on duty in the Federal Bureau of Investigation on February 5, 1951, as a Special Agent. He was dismissed on July 19, 1961. He appealed to the Civil Service Commission, which sustained the dismissal on August 17, 1962. He then filed a civil action seeking reinstatement. On May 20, 1963, the United States District Court for the District of Columbia granted the Government's motion for summary judgment in this case, and this was affirmed by the Circuit Court of Appeals on April 2, 1964. The United States Supreme Court, on November 9, 1964, denied Mr. Turner's petition for a writ of certiorari.

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The record of these court proceedings is open to the public. If you desire any additional information, you may wish to contact the Civil Service Commission, 1900 E Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.



Enclosed herewith is a copy of a letter recently received from Mr. Edward F. Wegmann, one of the attorneys for Mr. Clay L. Shaw. Mr. Wegmann requests us to furnish him with any available information we may have on Mr. William Turner, the author of the recent Remperts magazine article which is strongly critical of the FBI's role in the investigation of the assassination of the late President Kennedy.

As Mr. Wegmann notes, and as is suggested by the Ramparts article, it is quite possible that Mr. Turner may be a witness at Mr. Shaw's forthcoming trial. What Mr. Turner will testify to can only be surmised, but it is possible that he will be used in an attempt to discredit the assassination investigation conducted by the FRI and other governmental agencies.

We would appreciate it if you could inform us as to what information, if any, we can furnish to Mr. Wegmann.

No doubt your attention has been called to the article in Ramparts magazine by William Turner, a former member of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, as well as the Bill of Information filed by Jim Garrison against Edgar Eugene Bradley of Hollywood, California. The Bill of Information filed against Mr. Bradley charges him with having conspired with others to murder John F. Kennedy. It is presently anticipated and expected that the Shaw case will be tried before Judge Haggerty on or about February 13, 1968. We are presently preparing for trial, either on that date or another date during the latter part of February. We anticipate that the State will attempt to use William Turner as one of their witnesses. Such being the case, it will be greatly appreciated if you will furnish me with as much background material on Turner as is available for distribution. We know that he was an FBI Agent at one time. Did he resign from the Service or was he discharged for cause? Was he at any time a member of the White House Secret Service detail. 
You have requested our consideration of the attached letter of asks why the Zapruder film of the assassination of President Kennedy has not been released to the public.

A print of the Zapruder film is available for investigation at the National Archives. The film may not be published or copied, however, because Life Magazine owns a copyright on the film. A print of the film was acquired by the Government pursuant to P.L. 88-202 to preserve for historical purposes the evidence which had been before the Warren Commission. However, no purpose was seen in taking and paying for the copyright since the availability of the print in the National Archives serves the interest of the Government and the public in a complete investigation of the assassination.

Dear Sir;

Today while watching the Mike Douglas show I was very enraged by the story of a Dr. Thompson. His story about the death of President Kennedy and about how some of the Warren's Report is an outrage.

Dr. Thompson said that there were more assassins than the one that was caught. He said that he could prove this with a film that was bought by "Life" Magazine just after it was taken. He said that the film that was studied by an expert for the Warren Commission was a copy of a copy and that the original film showed very clearly that there was another bullet, besides the one that was found, that this bullet came from another direct in entirely.

My question, Mr. Fulbright, is why if such evidence as this does exist can "Life" Magazine keep it, and why didn't the Warren Commission acquire this evidence? Why did the highest court in the country have to use a copy of a copy?

Dr. Thompson said that he has been trying for a year to get these pictures published. Why won't "Life" Magazine publish these pictures? They wouldn't even let him show an artist version of these. They said that they would sue him if he did.

Dr. Thompson asked interested persons to write the editor of "Life" but I can't see where this would do any good. Mr. Fulbright the reason I wrote this letter to you is because you are a man of great importance in Washington, and when you speak people, even the president, listen. Thank you for taking your valuable time to read this. I will be waiting for your answer.

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
