However, no purpose was seen in taking and paying for the copyright since the availability of the print in the National Archives serves the interest of the Government and the public in a complete investigation of the assassination.



I am sure that your Department has been alerted to a recent television program participated in by Jim Garrison, offering his many diverse views relative to the assassination and the Warren Commission Report.

This program has generated public curiosity and we are receiving correspondence on the subject which basically reads as follows:

"After watching the District Arrorney from New Orleans on the Johnny Carson Show last night I came to the conclusion that a "Credibility Gap" does indeed exist, and that it is considerably wider than the majority of the people realize.

This country is supposed to be a Democracy-well, then let's begin to operate it like a Democracy. The people of the United States do have a right to know the truth--at all times and about all things. They have not been getting it for some time.

"Before we go ramming around the world, attempting to run other countries--let's start right here at home and build a government that will again have the respect of the people here at home. It will then follow that we will receive the respect and the trust of people of other countires. Let the elected representatives formulate our Domestic and Foreign Policies and not a bunch of bureaucrats and James Bond types like the C.I.A."

Dear Congressments

This is in response to your letter of February 6, 1968, in which you inquired as to what was being done to re-open the investigation into the death of President Kennedy in light of New Orleans District Attorney Jim Carrison's current probe.

We are aware of the discussions by Mr. Carrison of his alleged new evidence concerning the death of President Kennedy. We have no reason to believe, however, that such evidence would in any way affect the validity of the conclusions of the Warren Commission, which made a thorough inquiry and detailed analysis of the facts concerning the assassination. In these circumstances, we see no basis for a new inquiry.

With regard to your inquiry concerning the release of classified documents pertaining to the assassination, we should like to point out that the Warren Commission gathered a vast amount of material, much of it having only remote connection with the assassination. The bulk of the material that was presented before the Commission either was published in its 26-volume Hearings or is available to researchers at the National Archives. The relatively small portion that is not now available to the public consists primarily of national security intelligence or investigative reports - dealing largely with activities far removed from the assassination itself - that if disclosed might compromise confidential sources or techniques, or in some cases joopardize the lives of individuals abroad. Public availability of other information had been delayed pending completion of the prosecution of Jack Ruby, but this information has now been released.

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All of the Commission material that has not yet been released will be revised periodically until all of it has been made available to the public. None of the material is being withheld for a specific period of time, such as 75 years.

The autopay photographs and L-rays of President
Kemmedy's body were transferred to the National Archives by
his family under restrictions which the Government accepted
pursuant to the statute governing the deposit of historical
materials relating to former presidents. The agreement prevides that only official Government investigative bodies and
private experts approved by the Kermedy family can see the
material until October 29, 1971. After that date, the material
will be available for monofficial inspection by experts in
pathology or related areas of science.

I hope this information will assist you in answering your constituents inquiries.



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



The Attorney General has asked me to reply to your letter of February 5. 1968, concerning a question raised by the carren Commission which is not currently available to the public.

The Warren Commission gathered a vast amount of material, much of it having only remote connection with the assassination. The bulk of the material that was before the Commission either was published in its 26volume Hearings or is available to researchers at the National Archives. The relatively small portion which is not now available to the public consists primarily of national security intelligence or investigative reports -dealing largely with activities far removed from the assassination itself -- which if disclosed might compromise confidential sources or techniques, or in some cases jeopardize the lives of individuals abroad. Public availability of other information had been delayed pending completion of the prosecution of Jack Ruby, but this information has now been released. All of the Commission material which has not yet been released will be reviewed periodically until all of it has been made available to the public. Mr. McGinnis is mistaken in thinking that any portion of the evidence or the Report is being withheld for a specific extended period -- such as 99 years.

The photographs and X-rays taken in connection with the autopsy of President Kennedy were transferred to the National Archives by his family under restrictions



which the Government accepted pursuant to the statute governing the deposit of historical materials relating to former presidents. The autopsy pictures are available for official inspection by any government body having authority to investigate matters relating to the assassination. They will also be available, after a five-year period, for nonofficial inspection by experts in pathology or related areas of science, subject to restrictions suitable to the subject matter of these pictures.

It should be noted that the most meaningful evidence of autopsy findings consists of the expert analysis made by the doctors who performed the autopsy; the X-rays and photographs are simply a record of what the doctors saw and evaluated. Two of the doctors who performed the autopsy of the late President and testified before the Commission have examined the X-rays and photographs in the Archives and informed the press that the pictures corroborate the findings to which they had testified.

The determinations of which specific items of Commission material should be withheld as described in the preceding paragraph have been made in accordance with guidelines developed by the Executive departments and agencies which had furnished documentary materials to the Commission. Each of these departments and agencies applied the guidelines to the materials it had furnished, and the staff of the

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National Archives applied the guidelines to the materials transferred to the Archives that had originated with the Commission.

The photographs and X-rays taken in connection with the autopsy of President Kennedy were transferred to the National Archives by his family under restrictions which the Government accepted pursuant to the statute governing the deposit of historical materials relating to former presidents (44 U.S.C. 397(e), (f)). The autopsy pictures are available for official inspection by any government body having authority to investigate matters relating to the assassination. They will also be available, after a five-year period, for nonofficial inspection by experts in pathology or related areas of science, subject to restrictions suitable to the subject matter of these pictures.

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
