 occupations and hence said to state, any Russian will tell you he  
 can change jobs or move to another city any time he wants to, this  
 is true however he must meet certain requirements in order to receive  
 new work although he may indeed quite any job he likes. Until  
 1950 a person could not quite a job without police and state security  
 permission. It was simply mandatory to work at the job one had  
 been assigned to. Now since this law has been enforced a  
 Soviet law making punishable the holding of any workers who cannot  
 be replaced. In the event a worker does not choose to remain at  
 his place of work or choose to perform a certain job he can be tried  
 by a peoples court and sent to a work camp or ~~prison~~ for terms  
 ranging up to 3 years. Such work laws safeguard the state from  
 "sabotage" of state property, ~~work~~ as well as permission  
 from proper authority in regards to ~~work~~ living passes and  
 the "work passes" as the strict control of influx and  
 out flux of what is called "surplus of labor" which in a capitalist  
 society is not controlled and is determined by the market of  
 production and economic conditions which are all ways regulated

Therefore it is not the liberation of the individual masses but  
rather the administration of state machinery which regulates  
population and labor forces as a geographical factor and isolates  
of backflow of labor into isolated specific areas, which leads to  
unemployment in backward countries and to automation and over-  
production, both of which can be carefully controlled by the State,  
which will in turn operate all enterprises in the U.S.S.R. In such  
cases as there are of surplus of labor, the surplus is partitioned off  
by the "labor pool" system, and since there is no place for them to  
live and the extra workers' police, there is no place for them.  
"Virgin land" program is implemented, and surplus labor is  
shipped off to a promised work and work is done. It has never  
been planned and has been a spectacular failure, mostly owing to the  
lack of subsidies to the young people (for most part)  
conditions of life in a type of factory created "towns" or  
villages with improved streets in village conditions, a 1,000 miles from  
their mothers and families in the over crowded, lack of work-  
demanding cities (mostly Moscow, Leningrad, Gorky, and a few of the

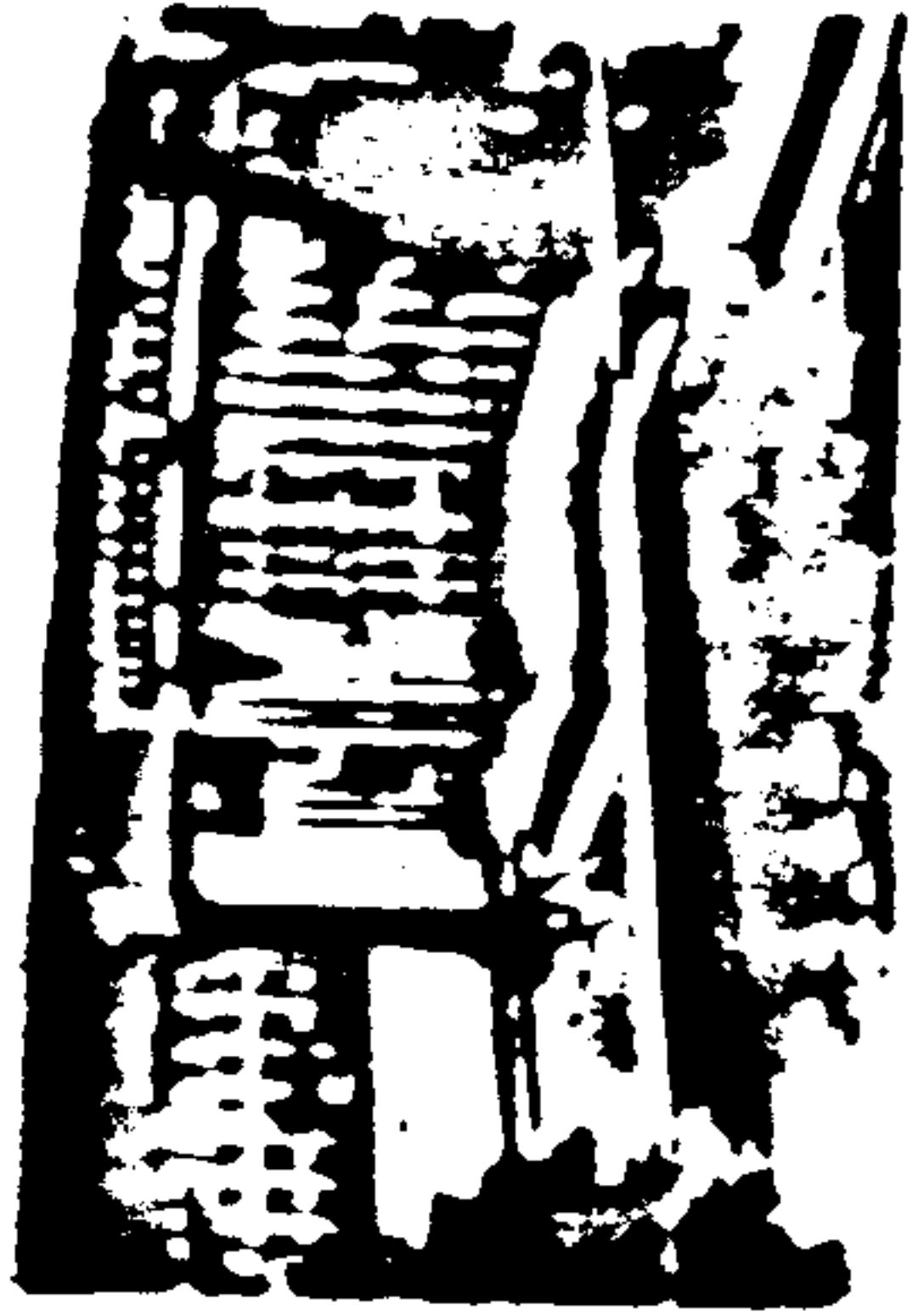
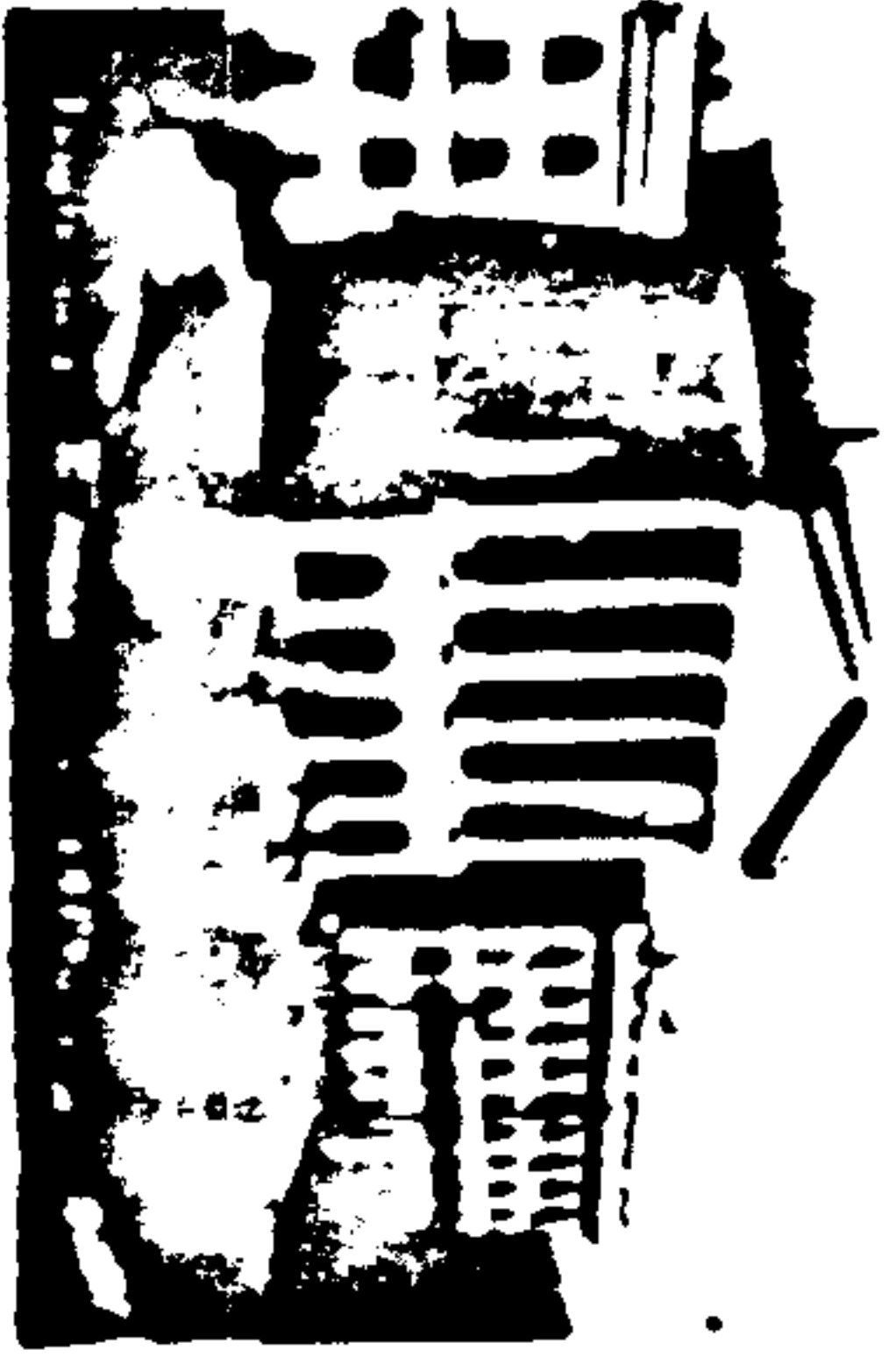
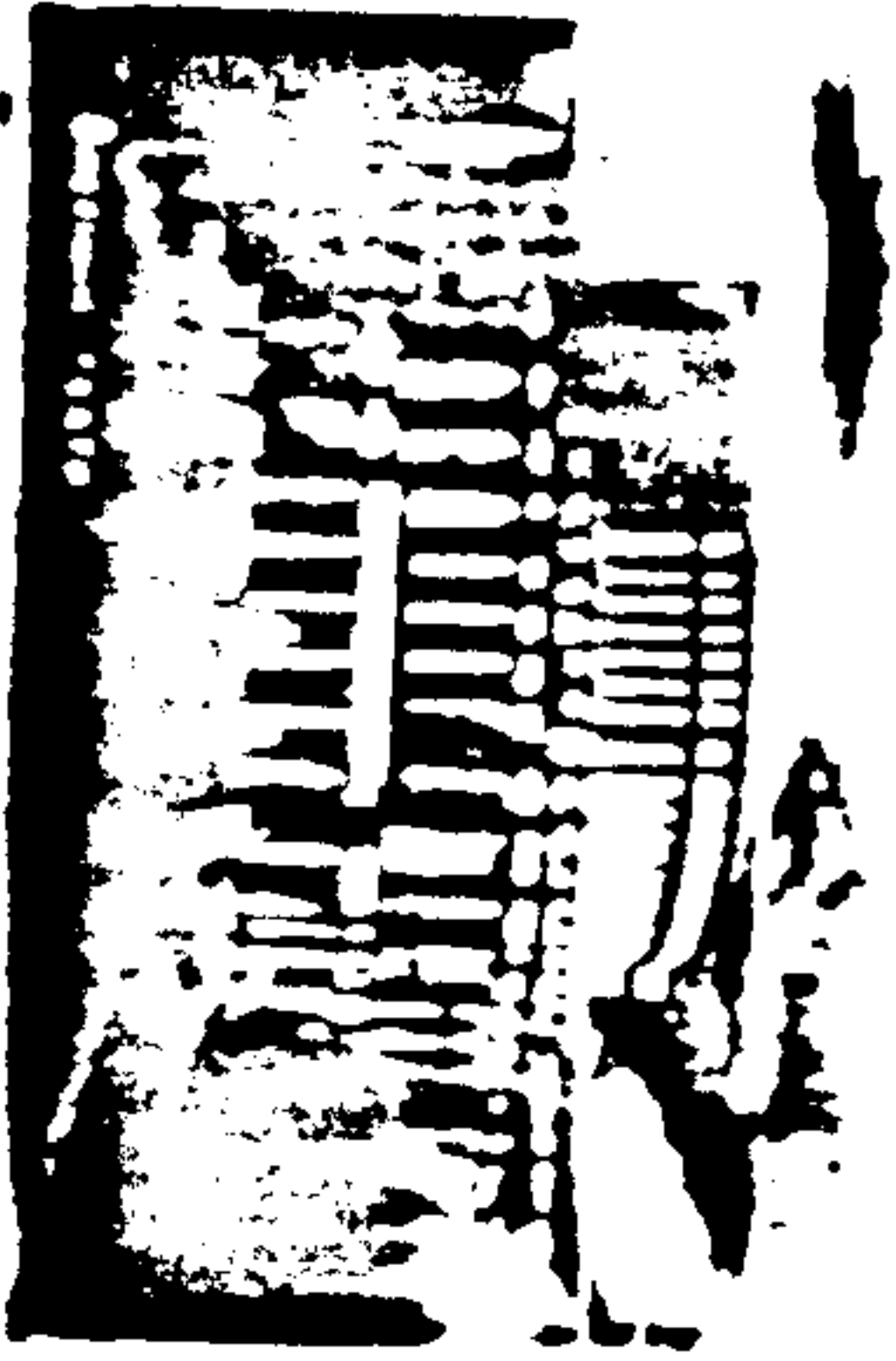
All ~~eligible~~ <sup>eligible</sup> voters (that is from the age of 16 up) are registered well before hand by "agitators", who go around to every door in their district getting names and <sup>notifying</sup> all voters of their duty to the Mother Land in voting. The case of the elections held throughout the Soviet Union on March 28, 1962 to elect the Supreme Soviet including Khrushchev. The people's government (name of ~~the government~~) and the Soviet of Nationalities. The elections came on January 24 and February 20. In elections for all voters go to the polls (usually a school) and vote. They are given a ballot which they drop into a box. On the ballot are the names of the candidates for each post. But the fact is that if the entire population used the pollling booth they could beat the system however ~~well~~ <sup>well</sup> designed and ~~how~~ <sup>how</sup> have the people afraid to ~~show~~ <sup>show</sup> their own vote for abstraction, and with a means of communication at the hands of a small number of candidates, there is a way of communication with the people and giving up support for block-buster candidates. Universal military training has been in force in the U.S.S.R. for several years. Unlike the U.S., drafting always takes place at 18 years of age. All other records for exemption with changing periods of service are from 2 years in the north to 3 years in the south. The conditions vary so much that many young
