PETER MC LAUGHLIN, 160 Magnolia Avenue, Jersey City, Nep Jersey, by letter dated December 27, 1963, to the Attorney Genermint the United States, Washington, D. C., asked if LEE OSTMALD was a red-haired man. He indicated he was in Mexico from Nctober 3, 1962, until Nov6mber 3, 1962, at vhich time he met a young American who told tim ha had been in the United States Narines. He also noted this man had a barracks bag full of books.

Mr. MC LAUGIILIN was coatactod on January 21, 1964; at the above eddr6ss and he sizied he sent the letter since he had never read in the remspaper regarding the color of OSWALD's hair but did read he had been in Mexico during the above period of time in 1962. When advised that OSWALD's hair was not red in color, he stated it was definitely not OSWALD Whom he had met but recalled the name given by this individual as JNHN OTIO BRIDGE. He stated he had met BRIDGs in Mexico City in October, 1962, and had been told by him he had been in the United States Marines. He noted BRIDiE had a Boston accent and was very interested in reading.

MC LAUGMLIN volunteered he was fifiymnine yaars of age; was born in a small town twelve miles fron Glasgow, Scotland; cams to the United States in 1927 after attending school until fourteen years of age and working in a steel mill in Scotland; was in tho U. S. Army Air Force from 1942 to 1945 as a radio operator; has had different jobs in various parts of the linited States, in particular in the Transit Bureau of Philadelphia, the Scioco Golf Club, Columbus, Ohio; and at the pressint is employed as a kitchen helper at the Harvard Club; 27 West 44th street, New York, Nem York.

SPAS THEODORE RAIKIN, 47 Irving Avenue, Englewood Cliffs, llow Jersey, vacation adiress GV Hotel, Manasquan, New Jersey, advised he was eiaployed as \& Case Morker, Travelers Aid, New York City, in 1962, and recalled he was . told to meet the "SS Maasdan" of the Holland fanerican Line when it docked at Hoboken, New Jersey, on June 13, 1962, in order to assist LES OSMflD and his family wiso were arriving frow Russia.

Mr. RAIKIIN stated he tried to contact OSWAND throurh the Inmigration and Waturalization Service at ther: pier, but since OSWADD was a citizeu of the United States, he was cleared before the ship docked. He had OSFALD paged but tinere was no response witir the result he went to the Customs Inspectioi location where the luggage was assembled iń alphainetical order and wited alongside OSWALD's luggage.

Mr. RAIKIH declared he met OSWALD, his wife and child when they came for the lugcage and was with then for nearlj one hour attenpting to get bus transportation for thew to the Port Authority Teriinal. New York City.

He recalled OSWALD did not have enough money to get to Fort Worth, Texas, to contact his mother or brother. He also recalled OSWALD was met at the Port futhority Terminal by Case Horker Mr. F. PIERRE, wio would have taken OSWALD to the Hew York City Welfare Department.

Mr. RAIKIN advised that while he was witin OSWALD during tine above period of time, OSFALD was very reticent to do any talking, but he did state he had been a guard at tine kiaerican knbassy in Moscow, Kussia, and had been kidnapped by coumunist agents. Mr. RAIRIN could not recall any further stateinents by OSWALD coucerning this situation and he did not ask OSWALD any questions since he did not believe what OSWALD was telling him.


[^0]SPGS THBCDORZ RAIXIII advised OSWALD told him he was With the United States Harine Guard at the United States Embassy, Hoscon, USSR, and on further recollection, Mr. RfIKII recalls OSWADD hay have said he deserted fron the Marinoumether than that he was kidnapped by comunist agents. However, due to the lapse of tine and the fact he handled 80 many other cases for Travelers hid, he would not want to completely vouch for an accurate recollection of statenents made by OSWALD. He stated the reason he did not go into detail With OSWALD regarding the statenents he made was because he did not believe then to be true and felt that OSFHLD made up the story.to cover up the fact he had defected to the USSR which was known to Lir. RAIKIN.

Mr. RAIKIN noted OSWALD was very "close nouthed" and securing any information from hin was very difficult.

Lir. RAIKIN stated he furnished this information in his report to Travelers Aid at the time and did not know if Mr. F. PIERRI added anything further to the report on OSFALD.

Mr. RAIKIN declared he had searched his memory regarcing this situation and could not recall any further statements or incidents which could be added to what he has already furnished.

THE STRANGE DEATH OF JOHNF.KENNEDY

For many years there has beenanawareness of the need for thorough investigation and housecleaning regarding security risks in the Department of State. One of the key individuals responsible for permitting Lee Harvey Oswald to return to the United States from the U.S.S.R. was known to be mecurity risk and had been reported as such by the late Scott Mcheod five yeare earlier, although the fact that he was a seçurity risk had beenknown* for sixteen years.

On October 31, 1959, Lee Harvey. Oswald appeared at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow, at which time he turned over his U.S. passport, and submitted the following statement:
"I Lee Harvey Oswald do hereby request that my present citizenship in the Uaited States of America, be revoked.
"I have entered the Soviet Union for the express purpose of applying for citizenship in the Soviet Union, through the means of naturalization.
"My request for citizenship is now pending before the Suprerre Soviet of the U.S.S.R.
"I take these steps for political reasons. My request for the revoking of my American citizenship is made only after the longest and most serious considerations.
"I affirm that my allegiance is to the Union: of Soviet Socialist Republics.
(signed) Lee H. Oswald"
In a report to the Department of State made on November 2, 1959 from the U. S. Embassy in Moscow by Richard Snyder and approved by Edward L. Freers, Charge d'Affairs, these facts were made known. The report and copies were sent to the Bureau of Security and Consular Affairs, Office of State Department Security, Central Intelligence Agency and other interested government departments. It showed that Oswald's mafner was "aggressive, arrogant and , uncooperative, " and that he stated he had been a radar operator in the U.S. Marines and had already told Soviet officials that be intended to give them all the information he possessed. This would have included some very confiden-
tial data learned in the service. The report stated Oswald is "presently residing in nontourist status at the Metropole Hotel in Mos. cow."

In a report written on April 7, 1964 for the Warren Commission; John A. McVicar, now Principal Officer in the U.S. Consulate in Bolivia, and formerly assigned as SecretaryCounselor at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. pointed out: "Russian visas are given to tour ists at $\$ 30.00$ per day for individual tours or the applicant must join a group. A regular visa is issued only after checking with Moscow and usually takes several months. "(Oswald had obtained a visa at Helsinki immediately.) Mr. McVicar also stated that Helsinki was a port of entry of the type the Russians themselves would have chosen for Oswald: Oswald entered. the Soviet Union at Vyborg on October 16, 1959. using U.S. passport 1733242 and had obtained a Soviet Visa ${ }^{*} 4173339$ within less than forty-eight hours. In Moscow Oswald lived in the Hotel Berlin and the Hotel Metropole.

On October 21, 1959, Oswald was admitted to the Botkin Hospital in Moscow for an alleged attempted suicide. He had a small superficial type cut on his left forearm, which required

 a portion of this time was NiAh sasubjatrid division of the hospital.
It is a well establi 5 fot circles that the Soviet's make a practice of having a psychiatric study and interrogation made of defectors and candidates for intelligence training to belp eliminate the possibility of their being double agents. Oswald's whereabouts became a mystery shortlyafter his hospital sojourajes shown in a dispatch from R. E. Snyder. U.S. Embassy, Moscow, to the State Department. Washington, D. C. dated March 28, 1960, Which reads: "The Embassy has had no contact with Oswald since his departure from the Metropole Hotel in Moscow in November 1959 and bas no clue as to his present whereabouts."

If the U.S. Embassy in Moscow considered Oswald as a U.S.citizen rather than a definite defector, they could eanily have asked the Soviet Foreign Office an to his whereabouts, since the Embassy does keep track of U.S. citizens while they are in the Soviet Union.

Under late of March 28, 1960 the Department of Stateriwnethington, D. C. sent a dispatch to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow as follows:
"An appropriate notice has been placed in the look-out card section of the Passport Office in the event that Mr. Oswald should apply for documentation at a post outside the Soviet Union."

After the assassination of President Kennedy, an investigation of the "look-out card" and what happened to it brought this reply from the State Dept. to the Warren Commission; "Miss Bernice Waterman prepared a 'refusal' sheet and an Operations Memorandum which show that she authorized the preparation of a lookout card; however, investigations, to date, fail to reveal any other indication or evidence that a lookout card was ever prepared, modified, or removed. -- it appears that someone in the Files or Clearance Section missed the 'Refusal' prepared on March 25, 1960, and failed to follow standard operating. procedures to prepare a lookout card or that the 'Refusal,' after it left the Foreign Operations Division, was misplaced or misguided in transit--"

Another explanation made by the State Department through Abraham Chayes, Legal Adviser, stated: "A'lookout card'was probably prepared on Oswald on the ground that he might have expatriated himself, but this cannot be determined with certainty and no such card is now in the 'lookout file'. A memorandum dated Mar. 28, 1960 from the Department to the Embassy in Moscow states that a card was prepared, and the customary forms dated Mar. 25, 1960 were completed directing the preparation of a card. The usual notation on such forms indicating filing of a 'lookout card' was not made, however, nor was a notation placed on the slip that the card was withdrawn, also a usual practice."

Immediately after Oswald's arrest for the Kennedyagsassination, Abba Schwartz, head of the Burfau of Security and Consular Affairs. reportedly removed Oswald's file, and it has never been returned, a reliable source states.

Oswald eventually turned upin Minsk, Russia, where be allegedly worked in the experimental eection of a radio factory, doing aseembly work.

During the month of March 1961 Oswald met a Russian girl named Marina Nikolaevena Prusakova. By April 20, 1961 they had appliedfor permission to marry. According to statements given the Warren Commission by Marina, she was dating other men during the month of March 1961; and Oswald was a patient in Clinical Hospital If at Minsk. Hc. was admitted at 10 A. M. on March 30, 1961, had a nasaloperation and anearinfection taken care of, and was discharged from the hospital April 11, 1961. This would have allowed but : very short time for a courtship between th. niece of an important Soviet official and a nonSoviet citizen.

They were married on April 30, 1961. Marina, whose parents were deceased, had been living for the previous four years with her mother's brother, Le. Col. Mya Vasilevich Prusakov of the K. G. B. (Soviet Intelligence) who reportedly was in charge of security for the Soviet lumber industries in the area. She lived with her aunt and uncle, who were childless, in Apartment 20 at 39 Kalinin St. Minsk After her marriage, she and Oswald lived at Apartment 4 at 20 Kalinin St. . Minsk. (In some documents their address is listed as House 4, Apt. 24, Kalinin St. . Minak.) :

By some coincidence Oswald had alrcady been a neighbor of Col. Prusakov before he met Marina. On Page 605 of Vol. XVIII of: the Warren Commission Reports, Marina des: cribes his apartment (in which they lived after their marriage)as follows: "He had a small! darling one room apartment with a balcony, a bathroom, gas, kitchen, and a separate en; trance, quite enough for two, especially: if: they were young."

Marina continued to work as an assistant in the pharmacy of the Clinical Hospital at* Minsk, according to Soviet records supplied to the Warren Commission. According to Oswald's diary, he was very popular with Marina's uncle, Col. Prusakov, who used to give him vodka to drink free. Oswald referred to Col. Prusakov as "my father -inLew."

According to the State Department report to the Warren Commission, Exhibit \#950, the Moscow Embassy had no knowledge of the : address, activities or any other information! about Oswald in the U.S.S.R. from the time he left the Hotel Metropole in Moscow in November, 1959, until they received a letter from him postmarked Minsk, U. S. S, R. . datell February 1961. In this letter Oswald stated

he desired to return to the United Stater. He closed the letter with the following paragraph, "I hope that in recalling the responsibility I have to America that you remember yours, in doing everything you can to help me since I am an Amprican citizen."

On May 25, 490 Hetre-U. S. Embassy in Moscow received a nother letter from Oswald which stated: "I am asking notonly for the right to return to the United States but for full guarantees that I shall not, under any circumstances, be persecuted for any act pertaining to this case. "---"I would not leave here without my wife so arrangements would have to be made for her to leave at the same time I do. "--"So with this extra complication I suggest you do some checking up before advising me further."

On July 8, 1961 Oswald appeared at the U.'S. Embassy in Moscow where he was interviewed and filled out a questionnaire form. He applied for a visa for his wife, Marina, a few days later.

On July 11, 1961 a three-page Foreign Service Dispatch, 129, was sent by diplomatic air pouch from the U.S. Embassy in Moscow to the Department of State in Washington, D. C. regarding the Oswald case. It was signed by Boris H. Klosson, Counsellor for Political Affairs. The subject of the dispatch was "Citizenship and Passpqrts - Lee Harvey Oswald." It contained statements and comments by Mr. Klosson. This three-page dispatch paved the way for Oswald to return to the United States where he attempted to take the life of Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, and succeeded in taking the life of President John F. Kennedy.

On Page 2, Paragraph 3 of Dispatch $\$ 29$ is stated: "Oswald was married on April $30,1961$. to Marina Nikolaevna Pusakova, a dental technician." It is important to note that in thie vital communication the name of Oswald's wife is not spelled correctly, nor is her occupation listed correctly. Klosson, who signed the dispatch on behalf of the Ambas sador, allowed her name to be spelled "Pusakova" instead of "Prusakova" and her occupation to be listed as "dental technician" instead of "asaistant pharmacist."

Klossonclosed the long dispateh with the following: "Twenty months of the realities of life in the Soviet Union have clearly had a maturing effect on Oswald. He stated frankly that he had learned a hard lesson the hard way and that he had been completely relieved of his illusions
acquired a new understanding and appreciation of the United States and the meaning of frec-dom---" The report showed Oswald as baving earned only ninety rubles per month and having saved two hundred rubles for part of his return fare. This was also incorrect, as' $\mathrm{O}_{\mathrm{s}}$ wald made much more than this and Oswald had lost none of his arrogance.

Since officials in the U.S. Embassy in Moscow were aware that the Soviets conduct training schools for agents and assassins to murder statesmen in the Free World, Klosson's utter disregard for the truth and iailure to verify facts concerning Oswald is especially sinister. Who is Boris Klosson?

Boris Hanson Klosson was born in Buffalo, N. Y. on January 21, 1919, the son of Michael M. Klosson and the former Miss Kenena Hanson. He received a BS Degree from Hamilton College in 1940 and a MA Degree from Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacyin 1941. He had studied for one year (1938-9) at the Institut Universitaire de Hautes Internationales, Geneva, Switzerland. On May 3, 1947 he married Miss Harriet F. Cheston. From 1942-3 he was an ". analyst for a U.S. Aircraft Company and then: went into the U.S. Army, became a lieutenant and was assigned to the O.S.S.

In the O.S.S. he worked for and came under: the influence of Gerold T. Robinson who was O.S.S. Chief of the U.S.S.R. Division of Research and Analysis. Robinson was under investigation by U.S. intelligence agencies because of his pro-Soviet activities. He was a Director of the American-Russian Institute, 56 West 45 Street, New York, N. Y. (along with Avraham Yarmolinsky, father of Adam). This organization was cited as communist by the Attorney General of the United States. "The Se nate I nternal Security Sub-committee stated it was closely liaked with the Institute of Paci-: fic Relations. In 1946, in filling out a federal employment application, Klosson gave as a personal reference his friend, tutor and associate, Prof. Gerold T. Robinson.

Louise Morley, identified communist, who has taken the Fifth Amendment over forty times, is also known 25 Mildred Vidor and Mildred Linton. She was long suspected of being engaged in espionage activities on behalf of the Soviet. Union. In 1943 she had made a trip out of the country under suspicious circumstances. Upon her return it was learned she had on her person a very confidential address book of contacts. among whom Boris Klosson was listed. Durin

O.S.S., he was rcported asbeing responsible for the leaking oullo unauthorized persons of eccret and confidential information to the detriment of the Unlted Stater.

Klosson came into the State Department in 1945 and impediately was assigned with the Division of ResearchonU.S.S.R. and Eastern Europe, doing highly confidential work. He was promoted many times and worked bis way up to become Chief of the Research (Intelligence) Division for U. S. S. R. On July 26, 1959 he became First Secretary of the U.S. Embassy in Moscow and at the time of the report referred to was Counsellor for Political Affairs.

Klosson is now Counsellor and Consul at the U. S. Embassy in Kingston, Jamaica, having been assigned to this post October 14, 1962. Klosson, who speaks fluent Russian, had been reported by the F.B.I. in an investigation which showed derogatory information concerning his background. In 1956 the late Scott McLeod had reviewed his file and "Klosson" is one of the names on his list of 847 security risks in the State Department.

For conclusive evidence that Oswald was not rehabilitated or "relieved of his illusions about the Soviet Union"as security risk Klosson would have us believe, we submit the following letter, written by Oswald to the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D.C. less than two weeks before he murdered President Kennedy. It is dated November 9, 1963, and states:
"This is to inform you of recent events since my meetings with comrade Kostin in the Embas sy of the Soviet Union, Mexico City, Mexico. (Kostin is a high official in the K. G.B.)
"I was unable to remain in Mexico indefinitely because of my mexican visa restrictions which was for 15 days only. 1 could not take a chance on requesting a new visa unless I used my real name, so I returned to the United States.
"I had not planned to contact the Soviet embassy in Mexico so they were unprepared, had 1 been able to reach the Soviet Embes sy in Havana as planned, the embassy there would have had time to complete our business.
"Of course the Soviet embassy was not at fault, they were, as I say unprepared, the Cuban consulate wis guilty of a gross breach of regulations, I amglad he has since been replaced.
"The Federal Bureau of Investigation is not now interested in my activities in the progres 's ive organization ' Faix Play For Cuba Committee!, of which I was secretary in New Orleans (state Louisiana) since I no longer reside in

He stated he could ukase arrangebents for her to appear at the Camden Resident Agency to be interviewed by FBI agents, and that he would be willing to do so in order to clarify information which he had previously furnished during interview at the Camden Resident Agency.

On 11/8/65, twas interviewed at the Camden Resident Agency She advised she is also known as and the tripper and entertainer who has worked in various night clubs and "strip joints" in Atlanta, Ga., Miami, Fla. Atlantic City, NJ, Philadelphia, Pa., Baltimore, Md. New Orleans, La., and Tampa, Fla. She stated she has worked as stripper for the last two and one-half years and also stated that since she left home at the age of 16 she has worked as a hostess, entertainer, Bunny girl, supervisor for magazine sale crew, strip tease artist, singer and cocktail waitress.

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Observation of this individual and the description of work which she claimed she has performed indicated strongly that she was primarily a prostitute who has utilized these other descriptions of jobs as a cover up for her activity as a prostitute.

She stated she had left home at we age of 16 auragono to Atlanta, Ga, and subsequently traveled around the country $6>0$ doing various jobs as previously described.
refused to identify any member of her family, her current residence, or her personal history other than the nature of her previous employements. Then questioned as to ifesho had over worked in Dallas, Tex., or the in the vicinity of the Carousel Night Club in that city, she immediately became very petulant and refused to furnish any $3>0$ information concerning possible activity on her part in that city. She became very upset at at this time and imediately accused him of having furnished confidential information to the FBI.

During intervien appeared to be very emotionally unstable and extremely difficult to interview. She becane extremely petulant, as previously noted, when questioned concerning any knowledge she might have of activity in Dallas, Tex., and refused to state if she had ever been in that city. She denied knowledge in any manner of any of the circumstances surrounding the death of President KENNEDY and denied that she had ever stated that she knew JACK RUBY or LEE HARVEY OSTALD.

## Observation of

 during interview indicated that although she dia not appear to be mentally incompetent in any fashion, she did appear to be a very b>C. unstable individual. It does not appear that she has any information concerning the assassination of President KENNEDYS70 and that any information she had allegedly furnished to gid that she was merely utilizing this as a come on for any individual who had expressed an interest in her alleged knowledge of this mssassination.In view of the results of this interview, it is not felt this information should be disseminated since it. . is obrious, based on interview of this individual, that she does not have any knowledge concerning the assassination of President KENNEDY and refuses to discuss any allegations she had previousiy made concerning this incident.

It $1 s$ recommended that no additional investigation be conducted in this matter in view of the obvious unstable nature of the individual involved.
