Mrs. THELMA MASSARINI, Medical Records Librarian, Hotel Dieu Hospital, advised that hospital records of Mr. DEAN ANDREWS shows he was there from November 20, 1963 to November 29, 1963, and on November 23, 1963, at 6:00 PM was treated with nose drops and cough medicine. At 8:00 PM he received sedation in the form of phenobarbitol and ~~also~~ at that time Mr. ANDREWS complained of pains in the chest. At 9:00 PM he was given anti-biotics. At 10:00 PM, the chart shows he was quiet again.

On December 5, 1963, Miss BETTY ENGELBRECHT, New Orleans Retailers' Credit Bureau, Inc., advised SA RICHARD BUCARO that she was unable to locate any record identifiable with CLAY BERTRAND or BERTRAM.

On December 5, 1963, Mrs. MARCELLE MADDEN, Clerk, Bureau of Identification and Sergeant FREDERICK SOULE, Commander, Vice Squad, New Orleans Police Department, searched their records and advised SA RICHARD BUCARO that they were unable to locate any record identifiable with CLAY BERTRAND or BERTRAM.

The current telephone and city directories at New Orleans shows no listing for CLAY BERTRAND or BERTRAM.

On December 5, 1963, NO T-1 advised that he never heard of anyone by the description and name of CLAY BERTRAND or BERTRAM.

Mr. ~~ARTURO MENDEZ~~ RODRIGUEZ, 323 Marais Street, Apartment U, New Orleans, Louisiana, who is employed by the Wm. B. Reilly and Company, Inc., as an oiler, advised SA LESTER G. DAVIS on December 5, 1963, that he did not at any time accompany LEE HARVEY OSWALD to any office building in New Orleans or to the office of any attorney in New Orleans or elsewhere. He stated that he positively has never been with LEE HARVEY OSWALD away from the building in which the Wm. B. Reilly and Company, Inc., is located.

Mr. RODRIGUEZ also advised that he did not know an attorney named DEAN ANDREWS and has never been to Mr. ANDREWS' office.

DEAN ANDREWS, Attorney at Law, 628 Maison Blanche Building, New Orleans, Louisiana, advised that since he returned to his office after a serious illness on December 2, 1963, he has made a serious and conscientious effort to recall and establish as facts, the information he reported on November 25, 1963. ANDREWS stated that he realizes the serious physical condition he was in while he was confined in the hospital and has verified from his physician that he was under extremely heavy sedation for the first four days he was in the hospital, that is from November 20 to November 24, 1963. ANDREWS advised he has talked with his secretary, EVA SPRINGER and his investigator, Sergeant R. M. DAVIS, United States Army, retired, and he has determined that there are a number of variances in his independent recollection of incidents that happened and incidents recalled by his employees.

ANDREWS stated that while confined in Room 202, Hotel Dieu Hospital, it was his recollection he received a telephone call between 6:00 and 9:00 PM, November 23, 1963. His secretary, EVA SPRINGER has stated to him that ANDREWS called her Saturday, November 23, 1963 shortly after 4:00 PM and told her that he was going to represent LEE HARVEY OSWALD in Dallas. His secretary asked him who had contacted him and he said BERTRAND, using no first name or other identification. Miss SPRINGER terminated the conversation at this time by saying she would not go to Dallas with him.

ANDREWS stated he has no recollection of this telephone conversation, cannot understand why he called his secretary and is unable to account for the name BERTRAND in this conversation. He particularly pointed out that he did not mention the first name to his secretary.

ANDREWS advised that when he realized he was in error as to his recollection of the time of the call, he tried to reconstruct the events of November 23, 1963 but could not recall anyone visiting him or being in his room during the afternoon of November 23, 1963. He advised that if the call was received before 4:00 PM, November 23, 1963, it

would have had to have been received after the lunch meal as he seems to recall that his tray was near him when he received the call.

Mr. ANDREWS stated that Sergeant R. M. DAVIS has told him that DAVIS visited him, DEAN ANDREWS, on the afternoon of November 23, 1963 from approximately noon to 3:30 PM or 4:00 PM. During this period DAVIS told ANDREWS that he, ANDREWS, did not receive a call and mentioned nothing to him, DAVIS, about representing OSWALD. Sergeant DAVIS advised ANDREWS that ANDREWS was asleep and awake at various intervals during this visit and he was particularly concerned about the progress of his, ANDREWS', political campaign for a judgeship in Jefferson Parish, during his visit.

ANDREWS advised that he talked to his secretary, who told him the only name he mentioned on November 23, 1963 was BERTRAND. ANDREWS advised that his investigator, Sergeant DAVIS, recalls that on Sunday, November 24, 1963, ANDREWS asked him about CLAY BERTRAND and told him that CLAY BERTRAND had contacted him to represent OSWALD. ANDREWS asked DAVIS if he recalled BERTRAND, which he did not, but ANDREWS indicated that he knew this individual well. ANDREWS advised that he does not recall this conversation with Sergeant DAVIS and could not recall where he had picked up the name CLAY BERTRAND.

ANDREWS advised that the first independent recollection he has in the hospital was in the evening of November 23, 1963, when he recalls watching a TV program reflecting the life of LEE HARVEY OSWALD in New Orleans, Louisiana. He recalls this program and recalls OSWALD as an individual that had contacted him previously for legal advice.

ANDREWS advised that each Sunday, it is his habit to take his son to the New Orleans Athletics Club where he joins with SAM "MONK" ZELDEN, and his boy in a game of handball. ANDREWS advised that on the morning of November 24,

1963, he recalls calling ZELDEN and asking him to help defend OSWALD. He advised he knew where to call ZELDEN but states that the details of the conversation with ZELDEN, which formerly seemed so clear, are now very hazy and have only been refreshed by his conversation with ZELDEN.

ANDREWS advised that he has been told by Sergeant DAVIS that on November 24, 1963, he called a TV station and told the TV station he wanted to issue a statement and on November 25, 1963, a TV reporter came to the hospital, but he was too ill to see him. ANDREWS advised that he has no recollection of calling the TV station and states that if he did such a thing he was "obviously out of his mind" as he is well aware that he did not have a firm commitment to represent OSWALD. Furthermore, he is a candidate for position of judge in Jefferson Parish and such an announcement on the eve of election, which will be held December 7, 1963, would be equivalent to abandoning the election.

ANDREWS stated that on November 25, 1963, when he furnished information to both the FBI and the Secret Service, that he had been contacted by CLAY BERTRAND, he was positive he knew this individual and positive that he had his name in his records in his office. He advised that after a careful and extensive search of his files he has been unable to locate the name CLAY BERTRAND or anything similar to it in any of his files. ANDREWS stated with regard to the alleged telephone call that he thought he received, it is now obvious to him that the basic details which he would have immediately determined, are not present in the conversation. That is, what authority did BERTRAND have to commit OSWALD as a client, who referred BERTRAND to him, who would handle the finances for the defense, when would he personally see BERTRAND, how could he get in touch with BERTRAND and further that he could locate no notes of this call in his hospital room.

ANDREWS advised that he never calls his secretary, EVA SPRINGER, at home and the fact that he called her is a very unusual incident.

ANDREWS advised that his physician has confirmed to him that he was a very sick man and under extremely heavy sedation and in fact, told him that he was not physically able to use the telephone.

ANDREWS advised that he recalls on November 25, 1963, discussing OSWALD and his possible ability to have actually fired the shots from a bolt action rifle and he recalls claiming to Sergeant DAVIS that OSWALD did not have the ability or "guts" to have actually fired these shots in 3½ seconds as related by a newsman.

ANDREWS advised that based on the discrepancy between his memory and facts as related to him by his employees and further, the fact that he cannot identify CLAY BERTRAND, he can reach only one conclusion, that is, that the call received by him while in Hotel Dieu Hospital under sedation, was a figment of his imagination.

Sergeant R. M. DAVIS, United States Army, retired, employed by Attorney at Law DEAN ANDREWS, Room 628 Maison Blanche Building, advised that his employer was positive that a person named CLAY BERTRAND had called him on the telephone and asked him to represent LEE HARVEY OSWALD in Dallas, Texas prior to December 3, 1963. He advised that he and ANDREWS have spent hours looking through files and discussing with each other and with ANDREWS' secretary, EVA SPRINGER, the various aspects of the call received from CLAY BERTRAND and he has no doubt that ANDREWS is now convinced that the call he received at the hospital was a dream.

DAVIS advised that he was at the hospital most of the afternoon of November 23, 1963, leaving sometime between 3:30 PM and 4:00 PM and ANDREWS did not receive a call during this time. The first occasion that ANDREWS mentioned CLAY BERTRAND to him was on Sunday, November 24, 1963. DAVIS was under the impression at this time that BERTRAND was well known to ANDREWS.

On the afternoon of November 23, 1963, ANDREWS was periodically asleep and awake, but did not want him, DAVIS, to leave and this is the reason why he remained all afternoon. The chief topic of discussion during this visit was the progress of ANDREWS' political campaign for election as a judge in Jefferson Parish.

On November 25, 1963, Sergeant DAVIS stated that when he visited DEAN ANDREWS, he was very much upset over a news item that ANDREWS had received over the TV set in his room at Hotel Dieu Hospital that OSWALD had fired three shots at the President of the United States from a bolt action rifle within three seconds. ANDREWS insisted that this could not be done and wanted to call the FBI and the Secret Service and furnish these agencies with his opinion. Sergeant DAVIS advised he talked ANDREWS out of this action and left the hospital.

Sergeant DAVIS advised that he has extensively searched ANDREWS' office for information which would identify

CLAY BERTRAND and has been unsuccessful in locating any record.

Sergeant DAVIS advised that he recalls in June, 1963, exact date unrecalled, ANDREWS discussed with him the procedure to amend or correct an undesirable discharge from the Marine Corps.

DAVIS advised that he cannot positively state that LEE HARVEY OSWALD was ever in ANDREWS' office, but after viewing numerous photographs of OSWALD on various TV programs, can state that he is vaguely familiar and may have visited ANDREWS' office. In addition, he can recall ANDREWS mentioning to him on various occasions that an individual named OSWALD had been to ANDREWS' office.

EVA SPRINGER, secretary to Attorney at Law DEAN ANDREWS, Room 628 Maison Blanche Building, advised that her employer DEAN ANDREWS, never calls her at home. She stated that on November 23, 1963, he called her at approximately 4:00 PM and told her that he was representing LEE HARVEY OSWALD in Dallas, Texas. She recalled that her only comment was that she was not going to Dallas with him and she wanted nothing to do with the case and asked ANDREWS who had hired him. She advised that ANDREWS told her it was BERTRAND, no first name given. She advised that this name did not mean anything to her and the conversation was terminated. She can fix the time as being approximately 4:00 PM as she had just returned from the grocery store doing her grocery shopping for the weekend. Her last contact with ANDREWS was on Monday, November 25, 1963, about noon time, when ANDREWS called her and asked her to locate any records in the office on CLAY BERTRAND. She advised that since November 25, 1963, she has been searching ANDREWS' office for a record of CLAY BERTRAND and has been unable to locate this name. She advised that CLAY BERTRAND is not known to her.

EVA SPRINGER advised she does not recall LEE HARVEY OSWALD as a client of DEAN ANDREWS and has no record of him at the office. She recalls ANDREWS speaking to her briefly about someone being interested in changing a discharge from the Marine Corps but is unable to associate this conversation with any recollection of OSWALD. She states she leaves the office usually at 5:00 PM and never recalled OSWALD coming to the office.

Investigation has determined that on August 16, 1963, LEE HARVEY OSWALD and CHARLES HALL STEELE, JR., were handing out FPCC handbills in front of the International Trade Mart, New Orleans, and that a third individual may have been handing out handbills with them.

Mr. L. WRIGHT, owner of the New Orleans Printing Company, 811 Camp Street, was recontacted at which time he stated that the two men who had come into his shop several months ago and were highly incensed by OSWALD's passing out literature in front of the International Trade Mart might not have been RAFAEL (LNU) and ROBERTO MARTINEZ MARTINEZ. He said from his recollection he thought the above two men were the men who had come into his shop but he said he sees so many Cubans and Spanish speaking men who are referred to him by the Ozanam Inn, 829 Camp Street, because they cannot speak English, he cannot keep them straight in his mind and he said he may have made a mistake. He said he could suggest no other possibilities as to the identity of the two men who had come into his shop and told him about OSWALD passing out literature in front of the International Trade Mart.

Father ANTHONY, Ozanam Inn, 829 Camp Street, advised on December 5, 1963 that he knew a Cuban mulatto named RAFAEL HUGO FROMETA who came from New York, he thought, and who was a longshoreman and seaman. He said FROMETA was the RAFAEL referred to by Mr. L. BRIGHT of the New Orleans Printing Company because he said he had discussed this matter with BRIGHT. Father ANTHONY said FROMETA always stayed at the Ozanam Inn when he was in New Orleans and said that his records indicated that FROMETA left on May 26, 1963 after saying he was to sail on a ship to Japan. FROMETA returned to New Orleans on October 16, 1963 and on the 16th and 17th of October stayed at the Ozanam Inn. Father ANTHONY said FROMETA had indicated to him that he had a job on some ship in Mobile, Alabama. Father ANTHONY said he had no idea where FROMETA could be at the present time, but said in view of the fact that FROMETA stays at the Ozanam Inn when he is in town, he would not have seen OSWALD at the International Trade Mart as the record shows FROMETA was not at the Ozanam Inn during the time OSWALD was passing out literature at the Trade Mart.

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The following investigation was conducted by SA DONALD C. STEINMEYER and RICHARDE. LOGAN at New Orleans on December 5, 1963:

Photographs taken of LEE HARVEY OSWALD and CHARLES H. STEELE, JR. passing out handbills in front of International Trade Mart, New Orleans, on August 16, 1963 were shown to the *Louisiana* following persons in an effort to identify an unknown third person who also appeared to have handbills in his hand. It is noted that at the time STEELE was interviewed he advised that an unknown third party was also passing out handbills.

ORESTES PENA, Owner, Habana Bar, 117 Decatur, said the unidentified male with an X over his head on the photograph showing OSWALD passing out handbills at the International Trade Mart was unknown to him but looked a little like a Cuban who was frequently at the Boom Boom Room at 6235 Claiborne and who is possibly a boy friend of the piano player at the Boom Boom Room.

The following persons associated with the Boom Boom Room, 6235 Claiborne, advised that no one they knew, nor any of the patrons at the Boom Boom Room, including the boy friend of the piano player was identical with the unidentified male with the X over his head in the photograph showing OSWALD passing out handbills at the International Trade Mart:

JESSE R. CORE, III, Public Relations Director, Jesse R. Core Public Relations, International Trade Mart, 124 Camp Street, residence - 3022 St. Charles Avenue, was recontacted and advised that, relative to the activity of LEE HARVEY OSWALD, at the International Trade Mart, on August 16, 1963, he stated that he was not aware of the name of the individual passing out handbills on this occasion until after November 22, 1963, when the picture of OSWALD was displayed widely through television and newspaper coverage, at which time he recognized the individual who passed out handbills at the International Trade Mart as identical with OSWALD.

He stated that he was aware of one other individual who assisted OSWALD in passing out handbills on this occasion but added that he did not know the name of this person, who he described as a white male, age approximately 20-21, height 6', weight 185-190, brown hair, suntanned complexion. He stated that he did not recall seeing a third person passing out handbills on this occasion, but added that possibly a third person was present on this occasion, although he had not seen him.

CORE stated, for information, that if an effort was being made to further identify persons represented in photographs taken on August 16, 1963, by a photographer of television station WDSU, that possibly a friend of his named (FNU) DANENHOWER who worked in the Rental Office of the International Trade Mart in Room M-14, might possibly be able to recognize additional persons depicted in these photographs.

ORESTES PENA, Owner, Habana Bar, 117 Decatur Street, advised that LEE HARVEY OSWALD and another man either Mexican or Cuban, came into his bar sometime during the Summer of 1963. He said he could not remember the month or day OSWALD and the other man came into the bar. He said he recalled the incident because OSWALD had ordered a lemonade from the bar tender and the bartender asked PENA what to do about it. PENA said he told the bartender to give OSWALD a glass of water with a little sugar and lemon juice in it and to charge him 25 cents. PENA said the man who was very well dressed, had ordered a Tequila and was charged 50 cents. This man thought 50 cents was too much to pay for a Tequila and requested to see the owner of the bar. PENA told his bartender the price of 50 cents was alright and not to pay any more attention to the man. PENA said he never talked to either OSWALD or the man OSWALD was with. PENA said to his knowledge neither OSWALD or the other man ever came back to the bar although he stated his bartender had told him that he would remember the man with OSWALD should he ever return to the bar.

Mr. HERNANDEZ advised that on August 9, 1963, he left his home to see a complainant in the business district of New Orleans and as he was passing the International Trade Mart he noticed an individual whom he learned later was LEE HARVEY OSWALD distributing hand bills and was wearing a placard around his waist on which was written "Viva Fidel". He said he was unable to read the hand bills because they were printed in the English language but he got the idea that they had something to do with communism and were no doubt pro Castro. Louisiana HERNANDEZ said he became quite angry and went to a clothing store operated by his friend CARLOS BRINGUIER and told him of this. HERNANDEZ said that BRINGUIER is able to read English and he wanted BRINGUIER to see one of these pamphlets. While in the store he encountered another friend of his MIGUEL CRUZ and the three of them left the store to return to the spot where OSWALD was passing out pamphlets. At this point HERNANDEZ and his friends took some of the pamphlets and tore them in shreds. Subsequently a struggle ensued between OSWALD and these three men. HERNANDEZ said that by this time many persons had gathered on the street and were encouraging the three men to kill OSWALD. At this point the New Orleans police arrived and four men were taken into custody and the crowd disbursed.

HERNANDEZ stated that he had never seen OSWALD prior to this time nor had he ever heard of him. He last saw OSWALD at the time all four were charged for creating a disturbance by New Orleans police. HERNANDEZ stated that inasmuch as he could not speak English, he had no intelligible conversation with OSWALD.

Mrs. BILLIOT stated that she has a phone but that the number is unpublished and she cannot remember it because "she don't keep those kind of things in her head." She informed that she has no knowledge whatsoever regarding LEE HARVEY OSWALD or any relatives he might have had in New Orleans. She stated the name MURRET and the addresses 757 and 807 French Street were totally unfamiliar to her. Mrs. BILLIOT also advised she had absolutely no knowledge of OSWALD's killer, JACK RUBY. She further informed that neither she nor any of her family ever travel up to New Orleans, as they have no business, friends, or relatives in the New Orleans area. She stated that the first contact that she had with the names OSWALD and RUBY was when she heard them mentioned during newscasts of the week end November 22 through 25, 1963.

Mr. DAVID CHARLES MIEHER, JR., 5236 Suffolk Circle, was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agents and voluntarily furnished the following information.

New Orleans, Louisiana

He is employed as a news editor for Radio Station WJDX and Television Station WLBT, Jackson, Mississippi. The manager for these stations is Mr. FRED L. BEARD. Mr. MIEHER was advised that information had been received that he had been present on one occasion in March, 1963, at which time Mr. BEARD reportedly made a statement referring to the KENNEDYS to the effect that "We are living under a dictatorship and they are nothing but an Irish Mafia and if they are re-elected, the only way to get them out of office would be to kill them."

MIEHER said he did not recall hearing this statement in March, 1963, or at any other time. He said that BEARD has been very critical of the KENNEDY administration and the KENNEDYS in general, and especially so since the crisis at the University of Mississippi in September, 1962, involving the admission of JAMES R. MEREDITH to the University.

MIEHER said that he has heard BEARD on several occasions make comments to the effect that it looked like the only way to get rid of the KENNEDYS would be to kill them as they were apparently going to be re-elected. MIEHER said he could not recall specifically when these remarks were made and does not know if anyone else was present at the time that the remarks were made. MIEHER said he felt that such remarks must also have been made by BEARD within hearing of other station employees as BEARD's opposition to the KENNEDY administration was well known. MIEHER said he had never heard BEARD say he was going to kill any of the KENNEDYS or anyone else. MIEHER said that any comments similar to those above are considered by MIEHER to be BEARD's way of expressing BEARD's belief that the KENNEDYS would continue to be re-elected if they ran for office. MIEHER said that BEARD was out of the city of Jackson and had left Jackson some time between November 8 and 12, 1963, on a trip to Australia by airline with some other people. Mr. DAVID CHARLES MIEHER, JR., 5236 Suffolk Circle, was requested to advise if in his opinion FRED L. BEARD, Manager of Radio Station WJDX and Television Station WLBT, would be a party to any act of physical violence towards the President of the United States or other Government officials.

MIEHER said that since he was employed by BEARD as a news editor he would not like to antagonize him as BEARD had given him a job when he was unable to obtain work elsewhere. MIEHER is able to move about only through the use of a wheelchair, both at work and at home, and his wife is also physically handicapped. MIEHER said, however, he would furnish his opinion.

He said that BEARD on occasion made comments which showed his dislike for the KENNEDY administration as well as for the members of the KENNEDY family in public office. As an illustration MIEHER said that BEARD returned to Jackson on the afternoon of December 3, 1963, from a trip to Australia and upon seeing MIEHER after BEARD's arrival at the station commented to MIEHER that MIEHER had not done a good job while he, BEARD, had been gone. MIEHER said that BEARD had left Jackson some time between November 8 through November 12, 1963, and returned as mentioned above. MIEHER said he at first thought this remark was from criticism of his work and he asked BEARD how he had done a bad job. MIEHER said that BEARD replied, "You didn't get BOBBY." MIEHER said that BEARD did not say the name "BOBBY KENNEDY" and he, MIEHER, did not ask BEARD which BOBBY he was talking about. MIEHER said that due to the recent death of President KENNEDY, he assumed that BEARD was referring to BOBBY KENNEDY. MIEHER said he did not take this remark as being made seriously as it was obvious to him that he, MIEHER, had nothing to do with the death of President KENNEDY. MIEHER said he related the above to illustrate the type of remark made by BEARD on occasion.

MIEHER said he had never known BEARD to do anything physically violent or to have threatened anyone with physical violence. He said that BEARD was a smart man and that if BEARD should decide to kill anyone it was his, MIEHER's.

MIEHER said that he did not intend for this to imply that he felt as though BEARD would do this but the above was the only way he knew to answer a question of this kind. MIEHER said he did not believe BEARD had anything to do with the recent slaying of President KENNEDY.

FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The April 6, 1960 edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contained a full-page advertisement captioned "What Is Really Happening in Cuba", placed by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). This advertisement announced the formation of the FPCC in New York City and declared the FPCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press.

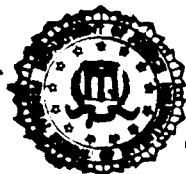
"The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1961, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on January 10, 1961, Dr. Charles A. Santos-Buch identified himself and Robert Taber as organizers of the FPCC. He also testified he and Taber obtained funds from the Cuban Government which were applied toward the cost of the aforementioned advertisement.

On May 16, 1963, a source advised that during the first two years of the FPCC's existence there was a struggle between Communist Party (CP) and Socialist Workers Party (SWP) elements to exert their power within the FPCC and thereby influence FPCC policy. However, during the past year this source observed there has been a successful effort by FPCC leadership to minimize the role of these and other organizations in the FPCC so that today their influence is negligible.

On May 20, 1963, a second source advised that the National Headquarters of the FPCC is located in Room 329 at 799 Broadway, New York City. According to this source, the position of National Office Director was created in the Fall of 1962 and was filled by Vincent "Ted" Lee, who now formulates FPCC policy. This source observed Lee has followed a course of entertaining and accepting the cooperation of many other organizations including the CP and the SWP when he has felt it would be to his personal benefit as well as the FPCC's. However, Lee has indicated to this source he has no intention of permitting FPCC policy to be determined by any other organization. Lee feels the FPCC should advocate resumption of diplomatic relations between Cuba and the United States and support the right of Cubans to manage their revolution without interference from other nations, but not support the Cuban revolution per se.

The CP and the SWP have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

DOWD on 12/6/63 he was in Minneapolis, Minnesota, December 2, 1963, and read an article in "St. Paul Pioneer Press" of December 2, 1963 relative to a barber named JOHN ABBOTT being interviewed in Sparta, Wisconsin by the FBI about fact OSWALD reportedly was in his barbershop in March or April, 1963. SCARCELLO states he recalls that early in April, he observed a young man on Rock Island train #16 from Kansas City to Minneapolis, who he believes to have been OSWALD. He states this man asked him how he could get a train for Sparta, Wisconsin out of Minneapolis. He said this man told him he had never been to Sparta and did not know anyone there and was just going there for a few days. SCARCELLO said he could add nothing else to this incident.

SCARCELLO, who boarded train at Des Moines, states this man was on train and would have boarded same at Kansas City.
