On November 25, 1963, the contents of a blue suitcase taken from 2515 West Fifth Street, Irving, Texas, was reviewed. The suitcase was obtained by a search warrant issued by Judge JOE B. BROWN of Dallas County on November 23, 1963, property of LEE HARVEY OSWALD of 2515 West Fifth Street, Irving, Texas, and was seized as evidence in an investigation of murder. Officers seizing this property were J. F. ROSE, H. M. MOORE, R. S. STOVALL and J. P. ADAMCIT. This suitcase contained approximately 175 yellow circulars approximately 4"x6" with black printing which read as follows: "Hands Off Cuba! Join the Fair Play For Cuba Committee." Also, approximately 125 applications approximately 2"x3", which read as follows: "Fair Play for Cuba Committee, New Orleans Chapter, Name _____, Signature _____, Issued _____, Chapter President _____." Also contained in the suitcase were approximately 200 circulars which read as follows, "To the Fair Play For Cuba Committee, New Orleans, -- I wish to join the committee. Enclosed is my initial fee of \$1.00 and dues are \$1 a month. -- I cannot participate as an active member of the Committee. I wish to become a subscriber to mailings. Enclosed find \$5 for one year. -- I would like to have a more active part in stating the cause of FPCC. Enclosed is my contribution. -- Name _____, Address _____, City _____, Zone _____, State _____."

Also contained in this suitcase were three pamphlets, "The Crime Against Cuba, by Corliss Lamont, Basic Pamphlets -14". A carbon copy of a receipt from the "Second Municipal Court, A No. 21902, City of New Orleans, Louisiana, August 12, 1963", received from LEE H. OSWALD, the sum of \$10 (illegible), 10 days being the fine imposed by the court as shown by the docket under date of August 12, 1963, for Ill OC #1702, Edwin A. Babylor, Judge", and one copy of "The Worker, Volume XXVIII, New Orleans, 187, 10/20/63", a 12-page newspaper, one copy of "The Militant, Volume 27, No. 35 Monday, 10/7/63, 8 page newspaper."

Also contained in this suitcase were four 3"x5" cards which read as follows:

This suitcase also contained an envelope bearing the return address of JOHN CONNALLY For Governor, State Headquarters, Fort Worth, Texas. The letter was postmarked February 23, 1962, at 4:30 PM, Fort Worth 2, Texas, bearing four 4¢ stamps, addressed personally to "Mr. LEE H. OSWALD, USMCR 1653230, Kalenina St., 4-24 Minst, USSR." Inside this envelope was a letter under the letterhead of the JOHN CONNALLY for Governor, State Headquarters, Fort Worth, Texas, dated February 23, 1962, addressed to "Mr. LEE H. OSWALD, USMCR, 1653230, Kalenina St. 4-24, Minsk, USSR," which read as follows:

"Dear Mr. Oswald:

"Your letter of January 30 has just been called to my attention.

"As I am no longer connected with the Navy, I have referred your letter to the office of the Secretary of the Navy in Washington, D. C.

This suitcase also contained Dallas County Birth Certificate #19133 for AUDREY MARINA RACHEL OSWALD which showed birth on October 20, 1963, at Parkland Memorial Hospital, Dallas, Texas. Name of father, LEE H. OSWALD, maiden name of mother, MARINA NICHOLALOVA PAROSKOVA, Obstetrician, W. M. MIDGETT, Medical Doctor, MAURINE LAMM, Acting Registrar, J. W. BASS, Director of Public Health.

This suitcase also contained numerous postcards of scenes in Russia and letters written in the Russian language, which correspondence was photographed on November 25, 1963.

CARLOS BRINGUIER, Casa Roca, 107 Decatur Street, displayed the copy of the booklet which bore the name at the top, Basic Pamphlets (14) "The Crime Against Cuba" by CORLISS LAMONT. This pamphlet was printed by Basic Pamphlets, Box 42, Cathedral Street, New York 25, New York.

BRINGUIER made available a copy of the application to the FPCC, New Orleans, Louisiana, which reads as follows:

Confidential Informant NO T-5 furnished the following on November 27, 1963:

He is acquainted with CARLOS BRINGUIER, Cuban Student Directorate, New Orleans, and was aware of the arrest of BRINGUIER and two other Cubans along with LEE HARVEY OSWALD on August 9, 1963, when OSWALD passed out Fair Play for Cuba (FPCC) handbills on Canal Street. Approximately a week later (August 16, 1963), he was seated in Thompson's Restaurant when the Representative of Puerto Rico, who has his office in the International Trade Mart, showed him an FPCC handbill, telling him these handbills were being passed out in front of the International Trade Mart. NO T-5 notified the police, but the police arrived too late, and the persons passing out the handbills had gone.

In order to obtain information regarding the FPCC to turn over to authorities, he drove to the address listed on the handbill for OSWALD and located the residence 4907 Magazine Street. In order to locate the actual apartment of OSWALD, he had to make inquiry at 4907 Magazine Street and learned the apartment location of 4905 Magazine. As he started to enter the yard, OSWALD stood some distance from him and said, "Don't hit me. If you're coming as a friend, come in." OSWALD had been sitting on his front porch and was talking in another language to someone inside. He told OSWALD he had picked up a leaflet at the International Trade Mart, that he was a Cuban who had been in the country for a long time, and was interested in learning about the FPCC. NO T-5 told OSWALD that he knew about the Cubans being arrested with OSWALD, and that he did not think it was right that those persons should have been freed when OSWALD was held.

OSWALD informed him that the Cubans in the United States were all criminals and sarcastically said, "We have fine laws here." He said that FIDEL CASTRO was not a dictator, and that if the United States would invade Cuba, he would fight with CASTRO against the United States. He stated further that the press in the United States is against them (not identifying "them"), that they were in the minority today but one day would be the majority, and then all of the press would be with them. OSWALD claimed to be a student of languages at Tulane University and to be the delegate for the FPCC in New Orleans.

NO T-5 informed him that he was interested in the organization but would like to read some literature before deciding. NO T-5 was given by OSWALD a booklet on Cuba and a blank application to join the FPCC in New Orleans. These are in the possession of CARLOS BRINGUIER.

OSWALD, in speaking about Latin American countries, said there was one government that should be gotten rid of, and that was the Government of Somoza.

NO T-5, on conclusion of his talk with OSWALD, informed Lieutenant FRANCIS MARTELLO, First District, New Orleans Police Department, regarding his contact with OSWALD and told him he would be willing to fill out the application and report any information obtained to MARTELLO in an effort to do away with the FPCC in New Orleans. He said he received no encouragement from MARTELLO and took no further action.

NO T-5 had no further contact with OSWALD and does not know of anyone named HIDEELL, JACK LEON RUBY, or JACK RUBENSTEIN, and knows nothing further about any FPCC in New Orleans.

NO T-5 advised that when he went to see OSWALD he drove his 1958 red and white Chevrolet sedan and parked it in front of 4907 Magazine Street.

Tampa T1 advised November 22, 1963, that LILLIAN MC FARLAND, Secretary of the Tampa Bay Chapter of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC-TP), and HAROLD WILSON, a member of FPCC-TP, were at the home of MANUEL and CRISTINA AMOR, 8407 39th Street, Tampa, on the afternoon of November 22, 1963, when news of the President's assassination was received on television. MANUEL and CRISTINA AMOR were formerly Chairman and Secretary, respectively, of FPCC-TP, and monthly meetings of that organization are held in their home. Tampa T1 said all four of the above persons appeared shocked at the news of the assassination and CRISTINA AMOR, whom he knows to be extremely nervous and excitable by nature, went all to pieces at the news.

On November 22, 1963, Tampa T2 advised that a JOHN SIDER (phonetic) was in contact with MANUEL AMOR. SIDER identified himself as a representative of "Time" magazine and said that "Time" magazine in Miami had said something to the effect that OSWALD had been attached to the FPCC in Tampa. SIDER wanted to know if this were true. AMOR stated that he did not know what SIDER was talking about. SIDER again mentioned LEE OSWALD and said he had been connected with the FPCC in New Orleans and wanted to know if OSWALD had ever been attached to the Tampa group. AMOR again stated that he did not know. SIDER then asked if Mrs. AMOR was there, to which Mr. AMOR replied she was sleeping. SIDER then asked AMOR if he was still affiliated with the FPCC, and AMOR said no.

On November 23, 1963, Tampa T2 advised that CRISTINA AMOR was in contact with LILLIAN MC FARLAND, at which time she was heard to state that she thought they should make a statement to the press. LILLIAN stated that she had made a statement to the press that the "St. Petersburg Times" had called her at 12:00 last night. CRISTINA stated that they had been contacted by someone who had talked to MANUEL, but MANUEL had thought it was only a prank. LILLIAN then said that the reporter asked her if she knew OSWALD, and she told them that she did not recognize him from the picture, and that she had never heard of him before. CRISTINA then told LILLIAN that she had drafted a letter for release to the press and wanted LILLIAN's opinion on this letter. This letter stated, in effect, that the FPCC does not condone such dastardly acts as the assassination of the President. It outlines what the FPCC is and what it stands for,

and that the FPCC resents implications by the press that the FPCC is responsible or connected with the assassination. This letter also stated that those people responsible for the President's death are sick people, just like the sick people who serve as CIA Agents in Cuba.

LILLIAN then informed CRISTINA that the reporter who called her the previous evening was named SIDER. LILLIAN stated that SIDER asked her for names of other members and she mentioned MARVIN BROWN, currently President of the FPCC-TP, but could not give other names because she did not have the list. CRISTINA then said she was very sorry over the death of President KENNEDY; that it was a very horrible thing; and LILLIAN indicates that everyone is very sorry.

Material in possession of the Homicide Detail, Police Department, Dallas, Texas, that was voluntarily furnished by MRS. RUTH PAINE and MRS. LEE HARVEY OSWALD, 2515 West 5th Street, Irving, Texas, on November 22, 1963, which came from their residence, contained among other items the following:

Booklet "FIDEL CASTRO DENOUNCES BUREAUCRACY AND SECTARIANISM - Speech Of March 26, 1962," printed May, 1962, Pioneer Publishers, 116 University Place, New York 3, New York. On back page appeared rubber stamp impression "FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COM., 799 Broadway, New York 3, New York."

Three-ring blue notebook cover, containing among other things, the following:

Several yellow one-page leaflets containing printed matter "HANDS OFF CUBA! JOIN THE FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE, NEW ORLEANS CHARTER MEMBER BRANCH, FREE LITERATURE, LECTURES, LOCATION: (space) EVERYONE WELCOME!" One of the leaflets following the word "LOCATION:" had rubber stamp impression "L. H. OSWALD, 4907 Magazine, New Orleans, La."

Seventeen tyewritten pages with interlined handwritten additions, the first page of which began "Part 1, The Collective," which stated among other things that lives of Russian workers were governed by the "collective," the smallest unit of authority in any given factory. It stated sectional and shop cells form a highly organized and well supported political organization, and the shop committees are in turn governed by the shop and section party chiefs who are directed by the factory or plant party secretary. It said the party secretary is responsible for political indoctrination of the workers, the discipline of members of the Communist Party working at the plant and general conduct and appearance of all members. mentioned MINSK Radio and Television Plant as being a major producer of electronic parts and stated "I worked 23 months at this plant." The writer of that treatise further stated on page four that he had worked in the experimental shop of that plant, where 58 workers, including the "Party Shop Secretary, who is a communist worker assigned into the shop by the factory Party Secretary." Part 2 of that treatise entitled "The Experimental Shop," which heading was on page six, contained among other things, a reference to "our shop head, STEPHEN TARASAVICH VELCHOK." Page 8, among other things, stated "The life of the 'KOLLECTIVE' or rather inter-life, since it often touches on more than just the work, is the most reflective side of the complex working of the Communist Party of the USSR."

Thirty-two typewritten pages containing hand-printed interlineations containing no heading, which appeared to be a treatise on Russia. Some of the pages had attached thereto small photographs of public Russian buildings.

Manila envelopes containing the following:

Approximately 18 pamphlets entitled "THE CRIME AGAINST CUBA," by CORLISS LAMONT. About one inch stack of yellow leaflets entitled "HANDS OFF CUBA! JOIN THE FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE, NEW ORLEANS CHARTER MEMBER BRANCH (space following word 'location:' left blank.)"

Stack about one inch high of application forms addressed to the FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE, NEW ORLEANS, LA., which provided place for an applicant to furnish name and address and whether applicant enclosed \$1.00 initiation fee and \$1.00 a month dues; place for designation that applicant desired to become a subscriber to mailings only, enclosing \$5.00 a year; and a third place for indication whether the applicant would like to have a more active part in supporting the cause of that organization.

Letter dated April 26, 1963, addressed to L. H. OSWALD, P.O. Box 4915, Dallas, Texas, from MRS. V. HALSTEAD, Pioneer Publishers, 116 University Place, New York 3, New York, which furnished OSWALD the words of the "INTERNATIONALE," which consisted of three paragraphs, including the chorus. The letter stated it was being furnished at the addressee's request.

Booklet "THE SOCIALIST WORKERS PARTY - WHAT IT IS, WHAT IT STANDS FOR," by JOSEPH HANSEN, published by Pioneer Publishers, 116 University Place, New York 3, New York, May, 1958. Page one identified JOSEPH HANSEN as a candidate of the Socialist Workers Party for U. S. Senator in New York State, in 1946, a former editor of "THE MILITANT" and then editor of the theoretical Marxist magazine "INTERNATIONALE SOCIALIST REVIEW," published at 116 University Place, New York, New York.

Pamphlet consisting of reprint of an article "CUBA - A DISSENTING REPORT," from September 12, 1960 issue of "THE NEW REPUBLIC." This pamphlet contains rubber stamp impression "FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COM., 799 Broadway, New York 3, New York."

Three blank forms to be used in requesting introductory four month subscription for \$1.00 to "THE MILITANT," address of which was shown as 116 University Place, New York 3, New York.

Pamphlet "THE ROAD TO SOCIALISM" by BLAS ROCA, national leader of the Integrated Revolutionary Organization (ORI), reprinted from "Cuba", November, 1961. Pamphlet reflected it was issued by the FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE. Pamphlet "THE REVOLUTION MUST BE A SCHOOL OF UNFETTERED THOUGHT - FIDEL CASTRO - SPEECH AT UNIVERSITY OF HAVANA." It was printed by Pioneer Publishers, 116 University Place, New York 3, April, 1962. The inside cover stated this translation of FIDEL CASTRO's speech originally appeared in the April 2, 1962 issue of "THE MILITANT."

Pamphlet "THE MC CARRAN ACT AND THE RIGHT TO TRAVEL," issued by the GUS HALL-BENJAMIN DAVIS DEFENSE COMMITTEE, 22 East 17th Street, Room 1225, New York 3, New York.

Pamphlet "IDEOLOGY AND REVOLUTION" by JEAN-PAUL SARTRE, issued by FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE, 799 Broadway, New York 3, New York.

Pamphlet "CUBAN COUNTER-REVOLUTIONAIRES IN THE UNITED STATES," by V. T. LEE, past president, Tampa Bay Chapter, FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE. This pamphlet further identified as an abridged version of a lecture delivered at a forum of the New York Chapter of the FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE on March 12, 1962, and reflected it was issued by that organization of 799 Broadway, New York.

Page three of that pamphlet identified it as "Theses on the American Revolution - adopted by the 12th National Convention of the Socialist Workers Party."

Pamphlet "CONTINENTAL CONGRESS OF SOLIDARITY WITH CUBA - COMPLETE RESOLUTIONS, BRAZIL, March 28-31, 1963," issued by FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE, 799 Broadway, New York, New York.

Pamphlet "SPEECH AT THE UNITED NATIONS" by FIDEL CASTRO, General Assembly Session, September 26, 1960, issued by FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE, 799 Broadway, New York.

Material in possession of the Dallas Police Department which had been seized by search warrant by that department on November 22, 1963, from 1026 North Beckley Street, Dallas, Texas, where LEE HARVEY OSWALD was residing, was reviewed and the following pertinent items relative to OSWALD's possible connection with subversive organizations were noted:

Letter by FARRELL DOBBS written on a letterhead of the Socialist Workers Party, 116 University Place, New York 3, New York, and addressed to Mr. LEE H. OSWALD, Box 2915, Dallas, Texas. This letter reflected that JAMES P. CANNON was the National Chairman and FARRELL DOBBS was the National Secretary. This letter replied to OSWALD's request for membership in the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). DOBBS advised OSWALD in this letter that there must be a minimum of five members before a branch of the SWP can be formed and added that it is not the practice to take individual members where no branch yet exists. DOBBS also mentioned that there are no branches as yet in Texas. The letter suggests that OSWALD signed subscribers to the Militant and promoted the sale of socialist literature. A characterization of the Militant is set forth on the Appendix pages of this report. This letter is dated November 5, 1962.

A letter on plain paper dated December 9, 1962, written by BOB CHESTER with the address set forth in the upper right-hand corner as "116 University Place, New York 3, New York", and directed to LEE H. OSWALD, Box 2915, Dallas, Texas. This letter acknowledges receipt of OSWALD's letter as well as his reproductions. The letter states that OSWALD is apparently skilled at blow-ups, reversals and reproduction work generally. Mentioned in the letter was the fact that "We have access to a small offset shop here in New York." However, it was mentioned in the letter that in connection with long-term work that OSWALD's skills may be used. The writer inquired as to the size of OSWALD's camera and concludes by stating that if OSWALD has any questions he should feel free to contact BOB CHESTER.

A letter written on the letterhead of the Communist Party, U. S. A., 23 West 26th Street, New York 10, New York, and addressed to LEE H. OSWALD, July 31, 1963, Post Office Box 30061, New Orleans, Louisiana. This letter acknowledged receipt of OSWALD's letter to the Worker, a characterization of which is set forth in the appendix section hereof. The letter states "It's good to know that movements in support of fair play for Cuba has developed in New Orleans as well as other cities. We do not have any organizational ties with the Committee, and yet there is much material that we issue from time to time that is important for anybody who is concerned about developments in Cuba." The letter concludes by stating that the writer was sending some literature to OSWALD under separate cover and is signed "ARNOLD JOHNSON, Director, Information and Lecture Bureau."

A letter from ARNOLD JOHNSON, dated September 19, 1963, and directed to LEE H. OSWALD, New Orleans, Louisiana, which sets out that his letter of August 28 to ELIZABETH G. FLYNN was turned over to him for reply. It was also mentioned that OSWALD's letter of September 1 indicated OSWALD was moving to Baltimore and suggested that OSWALD get in touch "with us" here when OSWALD moves. Reference in this letter is made to a point OSWALD made about his residence in the Soviet Union and the letter continues by stating that as an American citizen in this country he, OSWALD, has a right to participate in any organization he wants. It was stated that there are some organizations, including "Fair Play" which are of a very broad character and suggests that it is desirable for some people to remain in the background "in underground." It is suggested the matter be discussed at a later date.

A letter by JAMES J. TORMEY on a letterhead of the "GUS HALL - BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, Defense Committee, Room 1225, 22 E. 17th Street, New York 3, New York, which also reflects ELIZABETH CORLEY FLYNN as Chairman and JAMES J. TORMEY, Executive Secretary, characterizations of which are set forth in the appendix hereof. This letter is directed to "Mr. LEE H. OSWALD, Box 2915, Dallas, Texas."

The letter acknowledges receipt of samples of photographic work submitted by OSWALD and transmits appreciation for OSWALD's offer to perform "this type of work" as his contribution to the activities of that organization. The letter states the material is being placed on file for ready reference when need arises. The letter is dated December 13, 1962.

A characterization of the GMS HALL - BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, Defense Committee, is set forth in the appendix pages hereof.

A letter written by ~~LOUIS~~ ERIN STOCK, General Manager of the Worker, written on the letterhead of The Worker, 23 W. 26th Street, New York 11, New York, dated December 19, 1962, and directed to "LEE H OSWALD, P O Box 2915 Dallas Texas". The letter states that OSWALD's kind offer is most welcome and said that from time to time "We shall call on you." It was mentioned that the poster like blow ups are most useful at news stands and other public places to call the attention of newspaper readers that the 'Worker' is available. The letter is dated December 19, 1962.

A letter written by V. F. LEE, National Director, Fair Play for Cuba written on the letterhead of that organization with address at 290 Broadway, New York, New York, dated May 29, 1963, and directed to LEE H. OSWALD, 4907 L/C Magazine Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, is quoted below:

"Dear Friends:

"Thank you for your prompt reply. Enclosed are your card and receipt, along with our thanks and welcome.

"Your interest in helping to form an FPCC Chapter in New Orleans is gratefully received. I shall try to give you some basic information now so that you may have a better picture of what this entails.

"For one thing, I am enclosing a copy of our Constitution and By-laws for all Chapters and Student Councils. You will note that there is considerable autonomy for an organization our size. We try and let all Chapters operate according to the local requirements. Naturally, there are minimal regulations which must be met.

"All Chapters can receive literature in bulk at a discounted rate and resell at the retail price and use the proceeds for further Chapter activities. Credit is extended and payment is not required with the order. We do expect payment within a reasonable period so that we may continue our end of the operation.

"It would be hard to conceive of a chapter with as few members as seem to exist in the New Orleans area. I have just gone through our files and find that Louisiana seems somewhat restricted for Fair Play activities. However, with what is there perhaps you could build a larger group if a few people would undertake the disciplined responsibility of concrete organizational work.

"We certainly are not at all adverse to a very small Chapter but certainly would expect that there would be at least twice the amount needed to conduct a legal executive board for the Chapter. Should this be reasonable we could readily issue a charter for a New Orleans Chapter of FPCC. In fact, we would be very, very pleased to see this take place and would like to do everything possible to assist in bringing it about. We feel that the south-east is a very difficult area to work because of our lack of contacts. Our only southeastern Chapter

right now is that in Tampa, Florida which I originally organized before coming up to work in the National Office.

"I for one am convinced of the possibility of such an enterprise but know from experience that it is quite a problem and requires some sacrifice on the part of those involved.

"You must realize that you will come under tremendous pressures with any attempt to do FPCC work in that area and that you will not be able to operate in the manner which is conventional here in the north-east. Even most of our big city Chapters have been forced to abandon the idea of operating an office in public. The national office here in New York is the only one in the country today and the New York City Chapter uses our office too so it is the only Chapter with an office. Most Chapters have discovered that it is easier to operate semi-privately out of a home and maintain a P. O. Box for all mailings and public notices. (A P.O. Box is a must for any Chapter in the organization to guarantee the continued contact with the national even if an individual should move or drop out.) We do have a serious and often violent opposition and this procedure helps prevent many unnecessary incidents which frighten away prospective supporters. I definitely would not recommend an office, at least not one that will be easily identifiable to the lunatic fringe in your community. Certainly, I would not recommend that you engage in one at the very beginning but wait and see how you can operate in the community through several public experiences.

"We will be able to give you some assistance from here, but not much. It is up to the local Chapters to handle their own affairs. You should have at least access to a mimeo machine to prepare public material if you are going to operate. A good typewriter is essential and above all people that will carry out the million and one mechanical functions necessary to make it a going operation.

"Note: when you contact people by mail we recommend that only first class be used and that no full name go on the return address on the outside of the envelope. You will notice how we work our's here on the national level. Many people will respond better with this type of protection against nutty neighbors and over curious postmen. These may sound like small things to you, but I can assure you that we have gone through this a thousand and more times the length and breadth of the country and have learned a great deal over the last three years through some bitter experience.

"Naturally, I would like to communicate with you a great deal more concerning yourself so that we can get to know you and possibly be of some assistance to you as we get more information..

"We hope to hear from you very soon in this regard and are looking forward to a good working relationship for the future. Please feel free to discuss this matter quite thoroughly with me.

OSWALD, 4907 1/2 Magazine Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, on the letterhead of that organization. This letter acknowledges receipt of notice of change of address and advises OSWALD that there is being enclosed a renewal form and a copy of FPCC current literature catalog for him to catch up with and states that they hope to hear from him soon so that they may have his name amongst those who continue to support the efforts of the Committee.

An invoice of the Jones Printery Company catalog and Commercial Printers, New Orleans 12, Louisiana, whose address is 422 Girod Street. This invoice is directed to Mr. OSBORNE. The billing is for 1000 Cuban Fair Play circulars, \$9.60, dropped down, 3 per cent sales tax, \$.29, total: \$9.89, deposited \$4.00, balance: \$5.89. It appears a paid in full stamp dated June 4, 1963, was placed thereon.

V. REVOLUTIONARY-TYPE STATEMENTS AND
READING MATERIALS REFLECTING
SUBJECT'S MARXIST LEANINGS

The following information which was obtained by SA JOHN T. REYNOLDS on November 27, 1963, from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) file, New Orleans, Louisiana, from EUGENE URBAN, Immigration Inspector, was classified as "CONFIDENTIAL":

1. Memorandum dated January 16, 1962, to Assistant District Director for Investigations, Washington, D. C., from SAMUEL M. REICHMAN, Investigator, Washington, D. C., regarding LEE HARVEY OSWALD, Visa Petitioner for wife, MARINA N. OSWALD. It was stated that OSWALD attempted to renounce United States citizenship, but that investigation determined that he did not expatriate himself and remains a United States citizen. That OSWALD appeared at Embassy in Moscow on October 31, 1959, to renounce his citizenship, stating he applied for Soviet citizenship following entry into U.S.S.R. from Helsinki on October 15, 1959. Action was contemplated for two years, gave reason as "I am a Marxist". OSWALD's attitude reported as arrogant, aggressive. Stated that he informed Soviet officials he would make known to them information concerning his work as radar operator while in U. S. Marine Corps.

2. Report of investigation by INS, Dallas, Texas, dated January 25, 1962. R. L. OSWALD, brother of LEE HARVEY OSWALD, stated to his knowledge his brother was never a member of Communist Party. He did not know if he had studied the works of Marx, Lenin, Stalin, or other Communist propaganda.

3. Memorandum dated January 26, 1962, from District Director, San Antonio, Texas, to Officer in Charge, Dallas, Texas, regarding Visa petition filed by LEE HARVEY OSWALD in behalf of MARINA N. OSWALD. It stated that it had been determined that the beneficiary is not ineligible to receive a visa.

 RAYMOND FRANKLIN KRYSTINIK, Research Engineer, Bell Helicopter Research Laboratory, 3006 Avenue E East, stated that he had been employed by Bell Helicopter since 1960 and presently resides at 2121 Greenway, Arlington, Texas. He stated that he had been born August 31, 1932, at Caldwell, Texas, and graduated from Texas A & M University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in aeronautical engineering in June, 1960. He gave the following information:

Since 1960 at Bell Helicopter, KRYSTINIK has worked in the same office with MICHAEL PAINE, also a research engineer. In addition to working together, KRYSTINIK stated he and PAINE are good friends. He stated that in conversation with PAINE, he heard that PAINE's estranged wife has taken into her home a Russian girl, the wife of a man named LEE OSWALD.

Approximately one month ago, exact date now unrecalled to KRYSTINIK other than it was the day after ADLAI STEVENSON, Ambassador to the United Nations, spoke in Dallas, KRYSTINIK and his wife accompanied MICHAEL PAINE to Southern Methodist University in Dallas, where they attended a meeting of the American Civil Liberties Union in one of the campus buildings, the name of which is unknown to KRYSTINIK. This meeting began at approximately 8:00 p.m., and there were approximately forty people present. KRYSTINIK cannot remember exactly the name of the presiding officer but believes the individual presiding was a man named PEMBERTON. When KRYSTINIK and his wife and PAINE entered the room, they sat down next to an individual whom PAINE introduced as LEE OSWALD. KRYSTINIK said that OSWALD was dressed in a beige colored windbreaker type jacket and did not wear a necktie. KRYSTINIK stated that this was the same man whom he has seen during the last two days on television who was accused of the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY.

The meeting lasted approximately two hours and most of the time was taken up by the showing of a documentary film which portrayed a "smear" campaign reportedly waged against a political candidate in a recent election in the Pacific Northwest. KRYSTINIK does not recall the name of

this candidate nor the exact office he was seeking. The theme of the film was that the political candidate's wife was an ex-Communist and this fact was used against him personally by political opponents, and this resulted in his being defeated for the office he was seeking. After the film, there was a question and answer period, and the presiding officer made reference to the fact that Ambassador STEVENSON had been struck on the head by a sign poster at a meeting in Dallas the day before. LEE OSWALD jumped to his feet and interjected himself into the discussion by stating that General EDWIN WALKER was responsible for the trouble at the STEVENSON meeting and stated emphatically that General WALKER was both anti-Semitic and anti-Catholic.

KRYSTINIK, a member of the Roman Catholic faith, followed OSWALD from the room when the meeting adjourned at approximately 10:00 p.m. and began questioning him in general about the anti-Catholic allegation against General WALKER. The discussion between them became rather heated, and OSWALD told KRYSTINIK that KRYSTINIK was a "petty capitalist." This apparently arose because OSWALD had learned that KRYSTINIK had a home wood-working workshop where he manufactures birdhouses and occasionally employs three men in the manufacture of these birdhouses. OSWALD told KRYSTINIK that he was exploiting his workers. KRYSTINIK asked OSWALD about his political belief, and OSWALD stated that he was a "Marxist." KRYSTINIK then asked, "Does that mean you are a Communist?" OSWALD then said, "All right, if you want to call me that, that is what I am, I am a Communist."

KRYSTINIK then asked what OSWALD thought of the administration of President KENNEDY, and OSWALD said, "They are doing a good job as far as civil rights are concerned."

Shortly after this statement, KRYSTINIK and his wife, CHARLOTTE EMILY, left the campus of Southern Methodist University and drove to the downtown business district of Dallas. KRYSTINIK stated that he and his wife have been married ten years and that neither of them drink alcohol or smoke and they had never during their married lives been to a nightclub. He stated, however, that night he and his wife went to the Carousel Night Club in Dallas to see the floor show and at that time he saw an individual, apparently the club manager, whom he saw later on television identified as JACK RUBY, the man who shot LEE OSWALD. KRYSTINIK and his wife had no

conversation with RUBY or any other club employee while in the club. KRYSTINIK said that he did not see LEE OSWALD in the club, and as far as he knew, OSWALD had stayed behind in the vicinity of the campus of Southern Methodist University after the meeting adjourned.

KRYSTINIK said that he is not a member of the American Civil Liberties Union, and this is the first meeting he has ever attended. He stated that MICHAEL PAINE might possibly be a member of this group and might be able to identify other individuals who attended the meeting.

After the meeting, KRYSTINIK discussed LEE OSWALD on several occasions with PAINE, and in all conversations expressed to PAINE his strong dislike for OSWALD. PAINE told KRYSTINIK that OSWALD was generally considered by his associates to be obnoxious and that nine out of ten people would dislike him personally. KRYSTINIK said that PAINE comes from a Quaker background in Pennsylvania, presently attends a Unitarian Church, and KRYSTINIK received the definite impression that PAINE felt sorry for OSWALD and was trying to convert him.

During one of these conversations, PAINE told KRYSTINIK that things might be looking up for LEE OSWALD because he had been able to get a job at the Texas School Book Depository in Dallas, and it looked like he might be able to contribute to the support of his wife.

On November 22, 1963, the day of the Presidential assassination, KRYSTINIK and PAINE were in the office of the Bell Helicopter Company laboratory when they heard the news that the President had been shot. There was some discussion about the exact location of where the shooting had occurred, so they looked it up on the Dallas city map. PAINE said with surprise, "That is right next to the Texas School Book Depository building." KRYSTINIK then said, "Well, isn't that where LEE OSWALD works?" PAINE said, "Yes, but he does not even own a gun."

Later on in another broadcast, KRYSTINIK and PAINE heard that OSWALD had been arrested after shooting a Dallas police officer.

KRYSTINIK said he had not had any further discussion with PAINE for the past day or so other than the fact that he told PAINE that PAINE could bring his estranged wife to live at the KRYSTINIK residence in the event she received any threats of violence.

GUS HALL - BENJAMIN J. DAVIS
DEFENSE COMMITTEE

A source advised on March 27, 1963, that GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, United States of America, (CP, USA) stated on March 26, 1962, that the Party will form a new committee known as the GUS HALL - BENJAMIN-J. DAVIS, Defense Committee, (H-DDC). The purpose of this committee is to raise \$100,000 for the cause of HALL and DAVIS.

GUS HALL
BENJAMIN J. DAVIS

HALL and DAVIS were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Washington, D. C., on March 15, 1963, charging them with violation of Section 786(h) and 794, Title 50, U. S. Code, in that they, as General Secretary and National Secretary, Communist Party, USA, respectively and as groups of its National Board, wilfully and unlawfully failed to register for and on behalf of the Communist Party, USA, with the Attorney General.

A second source furnished information on February 12, 1963, that the H-DDC had received a total of \$41,799.18 in contributions for defense as of February 12, 1963.

THE MILITANT

A source advised on April 29, 1955, that "The Militant" is staffed, controlled and published as a weekly newspaper of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP).

SOCIALIST WORKERS PARTY

The Socialist Workers Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN

A source reported on May 7, 1962, that ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN is National Chairman of the Communist Party, USA.

JAMES TORMEY

A source advised on February 11, 1963, that as of February, 1962, JAMES TORMEY was the labor organizer of the New York District of the Communist Party.

LOUIS WEINSTOCK

A source advised on December 13, 1959, that on December 13, 1959, LOUIS WEINSTOCK elected to the National Committee of the Communist Party, USA, at its 17th National Convention held December 10 - 13, 1959.

Masthead of The Worker dated October 18, 1963, lists LOUIS WEINSTOCK as its business manager.

APPENDIX

PUBLISHER'S NEW PRESS, INCORPORATED

It was announced in "The Worker", October 7, 1951, Section 1, page 3, that Publisher's New Press, Inc., 35 E. 12th Street, New York City, was assuming from Freedom of the Press, Inc. publication of the newspaper "Daily Worker" and its Sunday edition "The Worker".

"DAILY WORKER"

The "Daily Worker" was an east coast communist newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1958.

"THE WORKER"

"The Worker" is an east coast communist newspaper.

NEW CENTURY PUBLISHERS

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", revised and published, December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains, concerning New Century Publishers, as follows:

"An official Communist Party publishing house, which has published the works of William Z. Foster and Eugene Dennis, Communist Party chairman and executive secretary, respectively, as well as the theoretical magazine of the party known as Political Affairs and the Constitution of the Communist Party, U.S.A."

CORLISS LAMONT

On September 28, 1963, LOUIS F. BUDENZ testified before the United States Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee that EARL BROWDER, as head of the Communist Party (CP) in the United States, had referred to CORLISS LAMONT as one of the "four prides" of the CP because CORLISS LAMONT was ready to cooperate with any Communist front or any Communist case. BROWDER made this reference at a National Committee meeting of the CP in the early 1940's. BUDENZ also recalled that LAMONT was a member of the CP when he, BUDENZ, was a member.

"Rights", self-identified as a publication of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC), April, May, 1962 issue, reveals CORLISS LAMONT is Vice-Chairman of the ECLC.

FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The April 6, 1960, edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contained a full-page advertisement captioned "What Is Really Happening in Cuba," placed by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). This advertisement announced the formation of the FPCC in New York City and declared the FPCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press.

-- "The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1961, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on January 10, 1961, Dr. CHARLES A. SYNTOS-BUCH identified himself and ROBERT TABER as organizers of the FPCC. He also testified he and TABER obtained funds from the Cuban Government which were applied toward the cost of the aforementioned advertisement.

On May 16, 1963, a source advised that during the first two years of the FPCC's existence there was a struggle between Communist Party (CP) and Socialist Workers Party (SWP) elements to exert their power within the FPCC and thereby influence FPCC policy. However, during the past year this source observed there has been a successful effort by FPCC leadership to minimize the role of these and other organizations in the FPCC so that today their influence is negligible.

On May 30, 1963, a second source advised that the National Headquarters of the FPCC is located in Room 329 at 799 Broadway, New York City. According to this source, the position of National Office Director was created in the Fall of 1962 and was filled by VINCENT "Ted" LEE, who now formulates FPCC policy. This source observed LEE has followed a course of entertaining and accepting the cooperation of many other organizations including the CP and the SWP when he has felt it would be to his personal benefit as well as the FPCC's. However, LEE has indicated to this source he has no intention of permitting FPCC policy to be determined by any other organization. LEE feels the FPCC should advocate resumption of diplomatic relations between Cuba and the United States and support the right of Cubans to manage their revolution without interference from other nations, but not support the Cuban revolution per se.

The CP and the SWP have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.
