THOMAS GWALTNEY advised he resides at 1203 A Apple Street, Dallas, Texas, and is a student at the Dallas Theological Seminary, 3909 Swiss Street, Dallas, Texas. He stated he is 28 years of age and was born in Peoria, Illinois, is married and is in his fourth year of studies at the seminary. He advised he is a graduate of John Brown University and upon completing this year of studies will be eligible to take over a pastorate or teach in one of the seminaries.

GWALTNEY stated he never heard of **LEE HARVEY OSWALD** or **JACK RUBY** until reading of them in the newspapers and hearing of them on television. He has never seen either man to his knowledge.

GWALTNEY stated that he does not know any man employed in the Dallas Produce Market, Dallas, Texas, to his knowledge although quite conceivably may have met someone so employed and not known it. Regarding a possible individual described as a Latin American type, age approximately 40 who may be so employed, he stated that he cannot identify this individual and may certainly have met a similar person, however, does not know it to his knowledge. He stated he associates with other students at the seminary as well as teaches Bible in the Garland Bible School. In view of this it is quite possible he may have met any number of individuals.

The following investigation was conducted by SA JOHN L. QUIGLEY, at New Orleans on December 2, 1963:

Lieutenant FRANCIS L. ~~MARTELLO~~^{LA}, Platoon Commander, First District, New Orleans Police Department, informed that on August 10, 1963, he interviewed ~~LEE HARVEY OSWALD~~ at the First District Police Department after his arrest in New Orleans for distributing Fair Play for Cuba Committee literature.

During interrogation of OSWALD, Lt. MARTELLO stated he obtained from OSWALD's wallet, a piece of paper which contained handwriting and handprinting in Russian and English. One of the items appearing on this piece of paper in English was the notation: ~~"MA PAA"~~^{LA → No Loc.}, followed by the numbers "33853."

Mr. ~~PARHAM~~^{LA} RAYMOND, Supervisor, Pan American Airways System (PAA), 709 Common Street, advised that the initials "MA PAA" meant nothing to him. Further, that the initials "MA" did not designate any Pan American flights. He could not suggest what these initials stood for.

Mr. RAYMOND further advised that the number "33853", which could possibly be a telephone number, was not the number for the New Orleans Office of PAA.

A review was made of the directory of all district sales offices for PAA, for the US, Europe, Pacific, and Latin America, which included the telephone numbers for the various sales offices, as well as the home telephone number of the ranking official of each office. There was no such number as 33853 recorded.

Major PRESLEY ~~L~~ TROSCLAIR, JR., Commanding Officer, Intelligence Unit, New Orleans Police Department, advised that he had on November 29, 1963, indicated that it was his recollection that LEE HARVEY OSWALD had telephonically contacted him and requested a parade permit. He said that he informed OSWALD that he should consult his attorney with reference to obtaining such a permit.

Major TROSCLAIR stated that it was now his recollection that this telephone call from OSWALD did not relate to the obtaining of a parade permit, but concerned the obtaining of a permit to picket. It was his recollection that he had discussed this matter with Captain WILFRED A. GRUSICH, SR., Deputy Commander, Traffic Division, New Orleans Police Department, where such permits are issued and GRUSICH had some months ago told him that OSWALD had obtained a permit to picket.

TROSCLAIR stated he thought possibly he may have made a memorandum of the telephone call with OSWALD, but he was not certain, adding that he had not as yet been able to locate any such memorandum.

I observed three publications ^{Dallas Texas} which were obtained from DENNIS HYMAN ~~OFSTEIN~~, 6015 Bryan Parkway, which OFSTEIN claimed to have received from LEE HARVEY OSWALD when he knew OSWALD as a fellow employee working at Jagers-Chiles-Stovall, Inc., 522 Browder.

The first of these, which OFSTEIN translated as "Soviet White Russia", can be more accurately translated as "Sovietskaya Belorussia". The other two are correctly translated as "The Agitator" and "The Crocodile". These are Russian publications in the Russian language. Publication

The text of an undated letter written in the Russian language which had been left at the PAINK residence and subsequently turned over to the FBI Office in Dallas through the U. S. Secret Service at Dallas, was translated into the English language by SA DOGUSLAV. This English translation is as follows:

- "1. This is the key to the mail box which is located in the main post office in the city on Ervay Street. This is the same street where the drug store, in which you always waited, is located. You will find the mail box in the post office which is located 4 blocks from the drug store on that street. I paid for the box last month so don't worry about it.
- "2. Send the information as to what has happened to me to the Embassy and include newspaper clippings (should there be anything about me in the newspapers). I believe that the Embassy will come quickly to your assistance on learning everything.
- "3. I paid the house rent on the 2nd so don't worry about it.
- "4. Recently I also paid for water and gas.
- "5. The money from work will possibly be coming. The money will be sent to our post office box. Go to the bank and cash the check.
- "6. You can either throw out or give my clothing etc. away. Do not keep these. However, I prefer that you hold on to my personal papers (military, civil etc.).
- "7. Certain of my documents are in the small blue valise.
- "8. The address book can be found on my table in the study should you need same.
- "9. We have friends here. The Red Cross also will help you. (Red Cross in English)

FRITZ, Homicide and Robbery Bureau, Dallas Police Department, advised that the original photograph of LEE HARVEY OSWALD holding a gun and papers and wearing a sidearm was found during the search of property of LEE HARVEY OSWALD that was located in a box in the garage of Mrs. RUTH PAINE, 2515 West Fifth Street, Irving, Texas, search being made by Homicide and Robbery Detectives, Dallas Police Department, *Texas* G. F. ROSE; H. M. MOORE, R. S. STOVALL and J. P. ADAMCIK. The search was conducted November 23, 1963, under search warrant from JOE B. BROWN, Justice of Peace, Dallas, Texas.

Captain FRITZ stated that an enlargement of the above photograph had previously been furnished to the FBI and Secret Service.

Captain FRITZ furnished the following evidence which was a part of the evidence previously obtained in the above mentioned search:

1. Personal photographs numbered on the back 1 through 47 and bearing initials J.P.A. (Detective J. P. ADAMCIK) November 23, 1963. Captain FRITZ noted that photograph number 47 is the original photo depicting OSWALD holding the gun and papers and wearing a sidearm. Photo number 46 also depicts OSWALD with rifle, sidearm and papers.
2. Two magazine ads of *Texas* Klein's Sporting Goods, 227 West Washington Street, Chicago 6, Illinois, bearing initials of G.F.R. (Detective G. F. ROSE) and initials R.S.S. (Detective R. S. STOVALL) dated November 23, 1963.
3. Seven pages handwritten in pencil (some pages bearing handwriting on both sides) setting forth qualifications, apparently of LEE HARVEY OSWALD. Each page bears initials of H.M.M. (Detective H. M. MOORE), J.P.A. (Detective J. P. ADAMCIK, R.S.S. (Detective R. S. STOVALL),

 FRITZ DIETER ~~JAEGER~~, 1316 Bell Place, Fort Worth, Texas, was interviewed at the Shady Oaks County Club where he has been employed since July 30, 1963, in the kitchen, Texas

JAEGER came to the United States on July 13, 1963, from Cologne, Germany.

MJ/HKS His purpose in coming to the United States Fort Worth, Texas was to visit an aunt and uncle, R. R. CRUMP, 1316 Belle Place. He does not stay with his relatives but in a room nearby at the corner of Camp Bowie and Clover Lane. JAEGER said he liked it here in Fort Worth and recently applied for a resident visa with Immigration and Naturalization Service, Dallas, Texas.

JAEGER was in the German Merchant Marine from approximately 1960 to 1963. After getting out of the Merchant Marine, he then worked in Cologne, Germany, at the Opra Restaurant as a kitchen butcher until he came to the United States in July, 1963.

While JAEGER was in the German Merchant Marine, his ship docked in many Russian ports including Leningrad, Russia. He said that he had been to Leningrad two or three different times. To the best of his recollection, while in Leningrad during 1961, he and his shipmates visited the Inter Club. This club is known as the International Club and is set up by Russia only for foreigners. No Russian nationals were allowed at the club except for the workers. JAEGER described the club as an information center for the Russians. It consisted of a large room which has microphones throughout the club to overhear any conversations throughout the building. The drinks are free and there are Russians there to entertain, and elicit any information from foreigners by eavesdropping and questioning.

JAEGER said that on this visit to Leningrad and while at the Inter Club, he went to a cinema with someone he believed was OSWALD and identical with LEE HARVEY OSWALD. JAEGER said he was

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brought together with this OSWALD because OSWALD and JAEGER were in a group speaking English. During the cinema, JAEGER sat alongside OSWALD and asked him many questions about the film which was in English, and JAEGER did not understand everything that was said.

JAEGER said he did not talk to OSWALD very much, and OSWALD never talked much with him because of microphones placed around the building. JAEGER said he did not ask if OSWALD was there as a foreigner or a Russian. JAEGER said that he did not have to ask OSWALD this because in his own mind he knew that OSWALD was a communist and working there. Further, OSWALD did not leave the Inter Club when it closed at midnight to him and his shipmates. JAEGER admitted that the possibility existed that OSWALD could have been a tourist and could have had a different type pass from what he had.

JAEGER said the ^{Texas} Secret Service in Dallas, Texas, exhibited him a photograph of a woman which he identified as being known to him, JAEGER, as LOBUJIX~~PARREKA~~ (phonetic) and which woman he had ^{Texas} seen in the Inter Club as an entertainer. JAEGER said he saw her talk to other people. JAEGER said that he cannot remember whether he ever talked to her, danced with her or that he saw her more than once during his visits to the Inter Club. He said this woman could have handed him a magazine, but JAEGER was not specific in any contacts with this woman whom he identified for the Secret Service.

With regard to any conversations JAEGER had with OSWALD, he said that OSWALD only asked him if he ever docked on the Gulf Coast of the United States. Before JAEGER answered, OSWALD said he knew the Gulf Coast very well.

JAEGER said that the first time that he knew that OSWALD was an American was approximately a week ago when he was accused of the assassination of former President JOHN F. KENNEDY. He related that the Secret Service had shown him a picture of a marine in a uniform, allegedly OSWALD, and he has seen LEE HARVEY OSWALD's picture on television. With regard to identifying OSWALD,

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JAEGER said that he cannot say for sure that the OSWALD he met in the Inter Club is the same as LEE HARVEY OSWALD, but he is 90% sure.

JAEGER mentioned that he might have OSWALD's name in a book which he has in Cologne, Germany. He stated it was his practice to write names of people that he met at the Inter Club in this book, and he has written to Cologne for the book and will supply it to the Secret Service when he receives it.

JAEGER stated that he has been to Dallas, Texas, only to talk with the Secret Service and the other time to the Immigration and Naturalization Service Office for a resident visa.

Texas *FRITZ DIETER JAEGER was re-interviewed at the Shady Oaks Country Club, where he is employed as a Cook. He advised that on Saturday, night, November 30, 1963, he visited the High top Club, a tavern on the Jacksboro Highway. JAEGER was driving a 1956 Ford, Victoria, which he is buying from WOLFGANG H. SCHMITZ, a Chef at the Club. JAEGER admitted taking a copy of a signed statement which he had previously given the Secret Service when interviewed by them. He said that he did not read, or understand, English well and wanted someone to help him read it. Further, it was not his intention to divulge any information in discussing the statement with ~~RONNIE (LAST NAME UNKNOWN)~~ *TEXAS*, owner or manager of the ~~Hightop Club~~ *Texas*, but to determine if he had done the right thing because RONNIE was his friend. He stated that he had furnished all the information he knows about OSWALD when previously interviewed and he again reiterated that he is ninety per cent sure that it was OSWALD and his wife that he saw in the Inter Club in Leningrad, Russia, when he visited the Club while in the German Merchant Marine. JAEGER again denied knowing RUBY. He says he had talked about this at the Hightop Club, but he was misquoted or misunderstood by the people there.

JAEGER indicated that he had talked to CHRISTINE GRAVES, a waitress at the Cattlemen's Restaurant in Fort Worth. It was his impression that she was going to Cologne, Germany, where she is from, and it was she who had called him asking if he had any information she could carry to his folks there in the way of greetings. JAEGER stated that he and Miss GRAVES only discussed things of common interest, namely the fact that they were both born in Cologne, Germany.

JAEGER was requested to refrain from making statements concerning LEE HARVEY OSWALD and JACK RUBY, and to furnish such information as he may have to the appropriate authorities. JAEGER agreed to furnish any additional information coming to his attention, or any recollections that he may have of his possible contacts with OSWALD to the FBI.

He stated to the best of his recollection, he does not recall seeing LEE HARVEY OSWALD at his place of business during the first few months of 1963. He advised that his men who work at night have not mentioned seeing OSWALD at the Austin Inn at any time. He advised that the night men would have mentioned such a fact if they had seen OSWALD.

FREDERICK B. MYERS, Post Office Box 1126, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, telephonically furnished the following information to Night Clerk J. LEROY TONEY at 8:50 PM, November 26, 1963:

Mr. MYERS stated that he had been talking to "CHARLIE" of Charlie's Place, 620 Carondelet Street, New Orleans, and that Charlie said that he believed he saw LEE OSWALD come into his place with a girl who works at a stationary shop at 600 Baronne Street, New Orleans. Mr. MYERS did not know the name of the girl.

CHARLIE VILLAS, owner and operator of Charlie's Restaurant and Bar, also known as Charlie's Place, 640 Carondelet Street, advised SA LESTER G. DAVIS on December 2, 1963 that he recalls mentioning that he had believed he had seen LEE OSWALD come into his place with a girl. Mr. VILLAS stated that he had made this statement shortly after the assassination of President KENNEDY and before he had read very much concerning LEE OSWALD. He continued that the person he had in mind was a man older than OSWALD was at the time of the assassination of President KENNEDY and that the incidents he had in mind occurred three years ago. He continued that this man would meet a girl who worked in an office supply store on Baronne Street at the bar. He did not know the name of either person or where the man lived or worked. He continued that he has since seen photographs of OSWALD in the newspaper and on television and has read about OSWALD's age and background and now realizes that the man he had in mind was much older than OSWALD.

A photograph of LEE HARVEY OSWALD was exhibited to Mr. VILLAS and he advised definitely that the man he had in mind was not OSWALD, adding that it could not have been, since OSWALD did not live here three years ago.

Mr. E. L. ~~CARTER~~, JR., Credit Manager ^{Fort Worth Texas} Montgomery Wards, Fort Worth, Texas, residence 1912 Martel stated that his records reflect LEE OSWALD purchased a television set from his company on September 22, 1962. At the time of the purchase, he listed his address as 2703 Mercedes, Fort Worth, Texas. Sometime later, he changed his address to Post Office Box 2915, Dallas, Texas. At the time of the purchase, he bought it on credit, and as he had no previous credit record with Montgomery Wards, and was unable to furnish any credit references, a co-signer on his credit purchase was required. His brother, ROBERT L. OSWALD, signed the note guaranteeing payment. ROBERT OSWALD listed his residence as 7313 Davenport, Fort Worth, Texas.

On his application, LEE OSWALD listed his age as 22, married, wife's name, MARINA, one dependent. He stated he had been employed for four months as a Welder at the Leslie Welding Company, on White Settlement Road, in Fort Worth, where he made \$250 per month. Prior to his employment with Leslie, he stated he had been in the U. S. Marine Corps for four years and was assigned to the base at El Toro Base, California.

→ **RAYMOND FRANKLIN ~~KRYSTINIK~~**, Research Engineer, Bell Helicopter Research Laboratory, 3006 Avenue E East, stated that he had been employed by Bell Helicopter since 1960 and presently resides at 2121 Greenway, Arlington, Texas. He stated that he had been born August 31, 1932, at Caldwell, Texas, and graduated from Texas A & M University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in aeronautical engineering in June, 1960. He gave the following information:

Since 1960 at Bell Helicopter, **KRYSTINIK** has worked in the same office with **MICHAEL PAINE**, also a research engineer. In addition to working together, **KRYSTINIK** stated he and **PAINE** are good friends. He stated that in conversation with **PAINE**, he heard that **PAINE**'s estranged wife has taken into her home a Russian girl, the wife of a man named **LEE OSWALD**.

Approximately one month ago, exact date now unrecalled to **KRYSTINIK** other than it was the day after **ADLAI STEVENSON**, Ambassador to the United Nations, spoke in Dallas, **KRYSTINIK** and his wife accompanied **MICHAEL PAINE** to Southern Methodist University in Dallas, where they attended a meeting of the American Civil Liberties Union in one of the campus buildings, the name of which is unknown to **KRYSTINIK**. This meeting began at approximately 8:00 p.m., and there were approximately forty people present. **KRYSTINIK** cannot remember exactly the name of the presiding officer but believes the individual presiding was a man named **PEMBERTON**. When **KRYSTINIK** and his wife and **PAINE** entered the room, they sat down next to an individual whom **PAINE** introduced as **LEE OSWALD**. **KRYSTINIK** said that **OSWALD** was dressed in a beige colored windbreaker type jacket and did not wear a necktie. **KRYSTINIK** stated that this was the same man whom he has seen during the last two days on television who was accused of the assassination of President **JOHN F. KENNEDY**.

The meeting lasted approximately two hours and most of the time was taken up by the showing of a documentary film which portrayed a " smear " campaign reportedly waged against a political candidate in a recent election in the Pacific Northwest. **KRYSTINIK** does not recall the name of

this candidate nor the exact office he was seeking. The theme of the film was that the political candidate's wife was an ex-Communist and this fact was used against him personally by political opponents, and this resulted in his being defeated for the office he was seeking. After the film, there was a question and answer period, and the presiding officer made reference to the fact that Ambassador STEVENSON had been struck on the head by a sign poster at a meeting in Dallas the day before. LEE OSWALD jumped to his feet and interjected himself into the discussion by stating that General EDWIN WALKER was responsible for the trouble at the STEVENSON meeting and stated emphatically that General WALKER was both anti-Semitic and anti-Catholic.

KRYSTINIK, a member of the Roman Catholic faith, followed OSWALD from the room when the meeting adjourned at approximately 10:00 p.m. and began questioning him in general about the anti-Catholic allegation against General WALKER. The discussion between them became rather heated, and OSWALD told KRYSTINIK that KRYSTINIK was a "petty capitalist." This apparently arose because OSWALD had learned that KRYSTINIK had a home wood-working workshop where he manufactures birdhouses and occasionally employs three men in the manufacture of these birdhouses. OSWALD told KRYSTINIK that he was exploiting his workers. KRYSTINIK asked OSWALD about his political belief, and OSWALD stated that he was a "Marxist." KRYSTINIK then asked, "Does that mean you are a Communist?" OSWALD then said, "All right, if you want to call me that, that is what I am, I am a Communist."

KRYSTINIK then asked what OSWALD thought of the administration of President KENNEDY, and OSWALD said, "They are doing a good job as far as civil rights are concerned."

Shortly after this statement, KRYSTINIK and his wife, CHARLOTTE EMILY, left the campus of Southern Methodist University and drove to the downtown business district of Dallas. KRYSTINIK stated that he and his wife have been married ten years and that neither of them drink alcohol or smoke and they had never during their married lives been to a nightclub. He stated, however, that night he and his wife went to the Carnousel Night Club in Dallas to see the floor show and at that time he saw an individual, apparently the club manager, whom he saw later on television identified as JACK RUBY, the man who shot LEE OSWALD. KRYSTINIK and his wife had no

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conversation with REBY or any other club employee while in the club. KRYSTINIK said that he did not see LEE OSWALD in the club, and as far as he knew, OSWALD had stayed behind in the vicinity of the campus of Southern Methodist University after the meeting adjourned.

KRYSTINIK said that he is not a member of the American Civil Liberties Union, and this is the first meeting he has ever attended. He stated that MICHAEL PAINE might possibly be a member of this group and might be able to identify other individuals who attended the meeting.

After the meeting, KRYSTINIK discussed LEE OSWALD on several occasions with PAINE, and in all conversations expressed to PAINE his strong dislike for OSWALD. PAINE told KRYSTINIK that OSWALD was generally considered by his associates to be obnoxious and that nine out of ten people would dislike him personally. KRYSTINIK said that PAINE comes from a Quaker background in Pennsylvania, presently attends a Unitarian Church, and KRYSTINIK received the definite impression that PAINE felt sorry for OSWALD and was trying to convert him.

During one of these conversations, PAINE told KRYSTINIK that things might be looking up for LEE OSWALD because he had been able to get a job at the Texas School Book Depository in Dallas, and it looked like he might be able to contribute to the support of his wife.

On November 22, 1963, the day of the Presidential assassination, KRYSTINIK and PAINE were in the office of the Bell Helicopter Company laboratory when they heard the news that the President had been shot. There was some discussion about the exact location of where the shooting had occurred, so they looked it up on the Dallas city map. PAINE said with surprise, "That is right next to the Texas School Book Depository building." KRYSTINIK then said, "Well, isn't that where LEE OSWALD works?" PAINE said, "Yes, but he does not even own a gun."

Later on in another broadcast, KRYSTINIK and PAINE heard that OSWALD had been arrested after shooting a Dallas police officer.

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KRYSTINIK said he had not had any further discussion with PAINK for the past day or so other than the fact that he told PAINK that PAINK could bring his estranged wife to live at the KRYSTINIK residence in the event she received any threats of violence.

He had no address for TURNER but stated that she had telephone number LA 6-5009. He added that she was presently out of town, location unknown, but was scheduled to return in the next few days.

Mr. JEFFERIES was shown a photograph of LEE HARVEY OSWALD and could not identify him as being identical with the OSWALD who made the above reservation. He added that the OSWALD making the reservation was not a regular customer of the Chalet and could not recall his description. He further stated that he is acquainted with JACK RUBY and that RUBY was not in the party of the above reservation.

Mr. JEFFERIES made a complete check of his reservation book from November 1 to November 22 and this was the only OSWALD listed and there were no listings under the known aliases of LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

This individual identified himself as O. H. LEE and stated he resided directly across the street in a rooming house owned by A. C. JOHNSON. LEE further stated he had just moved to Dallas from San Antonio, Texas, and was inquiring regarding automobile liability insurance. BRAND inquired of LEE what type of car he owned, to which LEE replied he did not own a car, but intended to buy one in the near future. For this reason, BRAND was unable to quote any exact insurance rates, but suggested LEE return after purchasing a car.

BRAND also was of the opinion the only identification he saw of LEE's was a Texas drivers license, but did not notice if the initials were O. H., but believed the last name was LEE on this drivers license.

BRAND concluded by saying he did not immediately recognize LEE HARVEY OSWALD's photograph in the Dallas newspapers, or on television, until after reading OSWALD had in the past used the name LEE, at which time he did recognize OSWALD's photograph as being the individual who contacted him regarding insurance under the name of O. H. LEE.

DIEBOLD, Tax Administrator, Bureau of Treasury, City Of New Orleans, Room 1W09, City Hall, Loyola Avenue, advised that all permits for parades are under his personal jurisdiction and he has been personally issuing such permits since 1955. In addition, he has issued over the same period of time, mayoralty permits, meaning permits issued to individuals and/or groups for the distribution of handbills and/or literature in the city.

With regards to the issuing of parade permits, he advised his records would only reflect those permits which were actually issued, but he would have no record of those permits which were denied. He said that he issued the permits after they were approved by the Superintendent of Police and the Mayor's Office in New Orleans. He commented further that frequently persons came to his office to secure applications for parade permits, however, such applications could also be secured from the Traffic Division of the New Orleans Police Department.

A photograph of LEE HARVEY OSWALD was shown to Mr. DIEBOLD, which was taken August 9, 1963 by New Orleans Police Department, their number 112 723. He said that he had never seen this individual in his office at all.

Mr. DIEBOLD reviewed his ledger reflecting the issuing of permits for the distribution of handbills and literature, which covered a period of from January 2, 1962 to date. It failed to reflect the issuing of a permit to anyone by the name of LEE HARVEY OSWALD, A. J. HIDEELL, ALEX or ALEK JAMES HIDEELL or O. H. LEE. He further stated that there was nothing in his records which would indicate that any permit to distribute handbills had been issued to any organization or individual having political affiliations with Cuba or any other foreign country.

Mr. DIEBOLD also reviewed approved parade permits as far back as 1961 and could locate none that had been issued to any person with the above names or any organization or individual having political affiliations with Cuba or any other foreign country.

Sergeant ~~GEORGE R. DE DUAL~~^{LA}, SR., advised he is Assistant to Captain ~~WILFRED A. GRUSICH~~, SR., Deputy Commander Traffic Division, New Orleans, Louisiana Police Department. Sergeant DE DUAL stated in the absence of Captain GRUSICH he has the authority to approve parade permits.

As best he can remember sometime prior to April of 1962 three individuals came into the Traffic Division and informed him that they were interested in staging a parade on the streets of the City of New Orleans for the purpose of raising funds which funds would be sent to Cubans in Cuba to fight FIDEL CASTRO and his Regime. Two of these individuals who he can only describe as being of Spanish extraction, dark, and who spoke very little English were merely present, the third person in the group was an American who spoke good English. When it was determined the purpose of the parade DE DUAL stated he consulted with Captain GRUSICH and it was decided that this group would be stalled and not authorized a permit since what they wanted to do would be controversial in nature. He remembered that he helped these individuals fill out part of the parade application but at this time the individuals did not have the information with respect to the time of the parade or the route. He recalled that they wanted to have a band included in the parade which was to go into the commercial area of New Orleans. Since the having of a band in a parade in the commercial district is not permitted and would technically prevent an issuing of a permit DE DUAL said that he told the individuals that a permit could not be issued to them. It was his recollection that these individuals returned to see him on two or three different occasions thereafter still endeavoring to secure the parade permit but which was continually denied to them. After this the group never came back.

DE DUAL could not remember what happened to the partially completed parade application but it was his thought that the individuals had taken it with them. He said that he had checked the approved and disapproved parade permits as far back as 1960 and could not identify any of these permits with the one that he had in mind.

LEE HARVEY OSWALD, DE DUAL said that he mentioned to Captain GRUSICH that he thought possibly this person could have been the same individual who had sought the parade permit as related above.

DE DUAL was shown a photograph of LEE HARVEY OSWALD taken August 9, 1963 by New Orleans Police Department Number 112 723. After studying this photograph he said that he was not in a position to say that the American that he had referred to was OSWALD although it was his thought that he generally looked similar to OSWALD. He added, however, since it has been publicized that OSWALD was not in the U. S. at this time, it obviously could not have been him.

He said he told him there had been three people in his office, who claimed to be representing some Cuban exiles who wanted to secure a parade permit so that funds could be raised and sent to Cuba to fight the Castro Regime. He stated he did not tell Major TROSCLAIR that a parade permit had been issued, on the contrary that it was not going to be approved. He stated further that he did not tell TROSCLAIR that LEE HARVEY OSWALD had been issued a permit to picket in New Orleans. He advised that any action taken against any group of citizens enjoining them in any manner would have to clear through his office. He advised that he himself has no authority to enjoin anyone, that the action would have to be initiated through the City Council, who in turn would either authorize or refuse such restraining action. He advised that he could recall no instance whatsoever of his office having become involved with any of the various Cuban groups active in New Orleans. On March 28, 1963, a gross bill of \$3.27 was mailed to L. H. OSWALD at 214 West Neeley Street, reflecting service from March 4, 1963 to March 20, 1963 when the water meter had been read. This bill bore a notice that the discount date extended to April 9, 1963 and payment before that time would be \$2.97.

Mrs. DILLARD stated that the \$2.97 which went through their bookkeeping system on April 4, 1963, would indicate that it was probably paid that day. She did state, however, that bills actually paid late in the afternoon of one day would be run through the bookkeeping department on the following day. Mrs. DILLARD stated there was no method whereby they could definitely ascertain whether or not this \$2.97 had been paid late in the afternoon of April 3, 1963 or paid on April 4, 1963.

The next bill mailed by the Water Department to L. H. OSWALD, 214 West Neeley Street, was in the amount of \$4.00 net. This bill was not paid by OSWALD. Service continued until May 20, 1963, when service was disconnected and at that time an additional \$2.51 bill had accumulated for service, making a total of \$6.51. The file reflected Mrs. OSWALD, the mother, had requested the Red Cross to assist her in obtaining a hardship discharge for her son, LEE OSWALD. She submitted affidavits from her doctor and also two affidavits from people who said they had known her from four to eight months. The first person who furnished the affidavit was Mrs. MARGUERITE CHILDS, 3240 Sondra Drive, Fort Worth, who had known her four months, and was listed as an employee of the Continental Oil Company, telephone EDison 6-4061.
