On November 25, 1963, GEORGE WILLIAM PEKAR, 37 Benton Street, Fairfield, Connecticut, telephone number 366-2140, advised as follows:

He has been employed as a commercial artist for the past eleven or twelve years by the Rosner - Lewis Agency, an advertising agency at 2440 Reservoir Avenue, Trumbull, Connecticut. Also located in the same building at the Reservoir Avenue address are the International Electronics Company, Limited, the International Electronics Company of Puerto Rico, and the American Merchandising Corporation. All of these corporations are owned by LOU LEWIS whose true name is LOUIS ISLOWITZ. LEWIS formerly lived in Newtown, Connecticut but now lives at 2440 Reservoir Avenue, Trumbull, Connecticut.

LEWIS is a very secretive person and is reputed to frequent nightclubs. His brother, LEO LEWIS, also known as LEO ISLOWITZ, is reported to have operated a nightclub in Miami, Florida at one time.

LEWIS formed the International Electronics Company, Limited and the International Electronics Company of Puerto Rico several months ago. About two months ago International Electronics Company, Limited, hired seven or eight workers to set up a pilot assembly line for the production of electronic control switches, intending to mass produce these units at the Jarardo, Puerto Rico plant of International Electronics of Puerto Rico. The workers were laid off after a short time when International Electronics Company, Limited was unable to get parts. The basic unit of these switches was purchased from Hunt Electronics, Dallas, Texas. Some representatives of an electronics company in Texas have visited at the Trumbull plant of International Electronics Company, Limited, but PEKAR had no information on what company they represented.

About two or three weeks ago LEWIS went to Dallas, Texas but PEKAR had no information on his contacts or activities there, or if he had made any other trips to that city.

Approximately three weeks ago after LEWIS returned from his trip to Dallas, Texas, PEKAR overheard Mrs. MARY SHEARER (phonetic), LEWIS' secretary, speaking to someone and mentioning the Carousel, Vegas, and RUBY.

PEKAR could not recall hearing LEWIS say anything about the Carousel, Vegas or RUBY.

About two weeks ago while at work, PEKAR saw through the front window of the plant a woman who resembled the picture of Mrs. LEE HARVEY OSWALD that appeared in the November 24, 1963 issue of the Bridgeport Sunday Post, a local paper published weekly at Bridgeport, Connecticut. The woman was standing outside the plant and seemed hesitant to enter the building. A car with New York license plates was in the parking lot and PEKAR concluded that the woman came to the plant in that car.

As PEKAR was walking through the office to go downstairs he saw a stocky woman who resembled the photograph of the mother of LEE HARVEY OSWALD which appeared in the above issue of the Bridgeport Sunday Post. The stocky woman had a baby in her arms and had just arrived on the second floor of the plant when PEKAR saw her. The woman who resembled OSWALD's mother looked around and then went to Mrs. SHEARER at her desk.

PEKAR went downstairs and saw nothing more of either women. PEKAR thought nothing more of the two women until after he saw the pictures of OSWALD's wife and mother in the Bridgeport Post for November 24, 1963. When after looking at the picture for some time he concluded that the two women he had seen at the Trumbull plant were possibly identical with the wife and mother of OSWALD.

PEKAR was unable to furnish any description of the woman whom he feels resembles OSWALD's wife, other than that she appeared to be similar to the picture and had light brown hair. He said the woman who resembled OSWALD's mother appeared to be in her late 40's, with light brown hair, heavy build and a big head.

PEKAR furnished the following description of LEWIS:

At no time has PEKAR ever heard any information of a plot to assassinate the President of the United States or anything against the best interest of the United States Government discussed at his place of employment.

At the time the radio broadcasted the news of President KENNEDY's assassination, PEKAR noticed nothing unusual in the shop.

PEKAR explained that LEWIS' secretary, Mrs. MARY SHEARER (phonetic) lives in Monroe, Connecticut; is separated from her husband; and is a very close friend of LEWIS. The only other employee in the office, Mrs. BOBBY ADAM, Monroe, Connecticut, who is the typist and file clerk, is also very friendly with Mrs. SCHEARER and LEWIS.

The only other two people in the plant who might have seen the two women are RUDY PIRHALA (phonetic), another commercial artist who works with PEKAR, and TOM FITZPATRICK, an accountant employed by LEWIS, who has an office on the second floor.

JIM BATES, 401 East Birdsong Drive, stated he has worked as a driver for the Safeway-Yellow Cab Company in Longview, Texas, for the past twelve years.

BATES stated he recalls two fares from the Holiday Inn in Longview, Texas, to Whatley Road in Gregg County, Texas, on November 22, 1963, about 9:00 a.m. He stated both men were white males and one indicated he was from Alabama and the other from Georgia.

BATES stated that during the trip of about seven miles, he and the two men talked about President KENNEDY's visit to Dallas on that date. He stated all of them indicated they were worried that some embarrassing incident might befall the President as had befallen U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations, Mr. STEVENSON, during October, 1963.

He stated he did not make the statement that President KENNEDY would not leave Dallas alive, but as the President's visit to Dallas was a matter of concern to him, he probably mentioned to both men that he hoped nothing happened to President KENNEDY during the visit to Texas.

JAMES ROBERT REED, 1220 Austin Street, Colorado City, Texas, upon being advised that he did not have to make a statement, any statement he did make could be used against him in a court of law, and of his right to obtain an attorney, declined to furnish a signed statement but orally furnished the following information:

J. REED advised he had no connection with anything concerning the President's assassination. He stated he did not know who shot the President and that he is not related to the man. He stated he was in town all through the day of November 22, 1963. He advised he has been to Ft. Worth, Texas only one time and does not recall ever having been in Dallas, Texas.

REED advised he was a paratrooper in the U. S. Army in 1942 until 1945 and received an Honorable Discharge from this service. He advised he is presently drawing a pension for 100 percent disability for an accident that happened after discharge from the service.

REED further advised he was sober on November 22, 1963 and that it has been several years since he has taken a drink. He stated he has never been in any trouble other than the usual traffic tickets.

REED stated his exact words voiced in the Wagon Wheel Cafe were, "I respect the man who killed KENNEDY more than I do KENNEDY." REED advised if the circumstances were to happen today that he would repeat the remark in good faith.

The following investigation was conducted by SA

AT SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS

On November 22, 1963 an unidentified man telephonically furnished information to the San Antonio Office of the FBI that a man by the name of GEORGE (LNU), who formerly operated the Three Deuces located at Water and South Streets, San Antonio, had made statements to the effect that someone should shoot the president. The unknown male appeared to be under the influence of intoxicants.

Mr. COBB advised that RUSSO is a cook employed by him and RUSSO came to work at approximately 3:40 p.m. on that day and was at the Red Ox Inn until approximately 10:10 p.m. the same date.

Mrs. ETHEL RUSSO, 405 Goliad, was interviewed at the Black Cat Bar at 108 South Alamo and she advised that on the morning of November 22, 1963, Her husband drove her to work at about 10:10 a.m. She stated that around noon time when she heard the sad news regarding the assassination of President KENNEDY she telephoned her husband at home who was asleep and told him about the tragedy. Mrs. RUSSO stated that her husband ~~thought~~ that she had heard a rumor and should not believe such things, but she finally convinced him that it had happened. She stated that she recalled this conversation because of the fact that her husband was sleeping and at first he was quite upset that she had awakened him.

B. APPROX

She said that at approximately 3:00 p.m., her husband came to the Black Cat Cafe as was his usual practice and had two or three beers prior to going to work.

Mrs. RUSSO does not know anyone by the name of GEORGE and could furnish no information whatsoever regarding the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY other than what she has heard on the radio and TV and read in the newspaper.

FRANK RUSSO, who resides at 405 Goliad, San Antonio, telephone CA 5-1853, who formerly operated the Three Deuces Bar at 400 Water Street, was interviewed at his residence. At the outset of the interview, SA B. E. DEFFENBAUGH, JR. explained to RUSSO that he did not have to make any statement and any statement he did make could be used against him in a court of law and that he could discuss this matter with an attorney prior to making any statement.

RUSSO was questioned regarding any knowledge he had relative to the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY.

RUSSO stated that he ^{owned} ~~weend~~ a 1958 green and ivory Ford and formerly operated the Three Deuces Bar at 400 Water Street, San Antonio, Texas. At the present time, he is employed as a cook at the Red Ox Inn, 10 Winding Way, San Antonio, Texas, telephone OX 4-2031. He stated that he works from 4:00 to 10:00 each day.

RUSSO stated that he has not left San Antonio, Texas, for a number of years.

On the morning of November 22, 1963, as was his usual practice, he drove his wife, ETHEL RUSSO, to Frenchy's Black Cat Bar at 108 South Alamo where she works each day. After driving her to work at about 9:30 or 10⁰⁰a.m., he returned to his home.

He stated as was his usual custom, he left his home about 2:00 or 2:30 and went to the Black Car Bar where he consumed one or two beers and then proceeded as usual to his place of employment arriving at approximately 3:45 or 4:00 at the Red Ox Inn, 10 Winding Way, San Antonio, Texas.

RUSSO stated that he had no knowledge of the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY other than what he read in the newspaper and heard on TV and radio. He stated that he knows of no one by the name of GEORGE. He further advised that he was at home by himself from the time he returned home after taking his wife to work and until the time he went to the bar as stated above prior to going to work at the Red Ox Inn.

AT TAMPA, FLORIDA:

At 6:40 p.m., November 22, 1963, Mr. ROLAND F. GRYBEK, 5001 Neptune Way, telephoned the Tampa Office and advised he and his wife own an apartment house at 114 Plant Avenue. He said a tenant at this address, a Yellow Cab driver named ENRICO AARON de DUSSELDORF, also known as "SCOTT", had made recent statements to the effect he was aware of a plan to assassinate President KENNEDY as well as Vice President LYNDON B. JOHNSON. DUSSELDORF was said to have stated this plot originally was to have been carried out in Tampa on the President's visit to Tampa, November 18, 1963, but due to a fluke, was not accomplished.

GRYBEK characterized DUSSELDORF as a loud mouth type individual who appears to have a very vocal opinion on every situation. He said DUSSELDORF uses the title Viscount, claiming to be a member of the nobility in El Salvador and currently exiled in the United States.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent's FRED LIGARDE and HOWARD K. RUTHERFORD:

COLEMAN HILL, Manager of the apartment building at 114 Plant Avenue, advised on November 22, 1963, DUSSELDORF is a Salvadoran National who has lived in the apartment building about fourteen to sixteen months, although the first six months he was living with a girl tenant and was not himself officially a tenant of the building. The girl is his present wife, MARY. HILL said DUSSELDORF is better known by the surname "SCOTT" and he goes by the nickname "RICO". HILL says he has no reason to think "SCOTT" has any connection with or knowledge of the assassination of President KENNEDY. HILL said he was told by DIANE (Mrs. ROLAND) GRYBEK, that "SCOTT" told her that afternoon after the shooting, he had knowledge it was supposed to take place in Tampa the preceding Monday, and that Vice President JOHNSON was supposed to be killed also; however, HILL said he believes "SCOTT" was just shooting his mouth off as he has a habit of "talking off the top of his head" about things he actually knows nothing about.

Mr. RAYMOND E. HARRELL was interviewed at his place of employment, the Don Cameron Lumber Company, 711 South Ewing, Dallas, Texas. At first he could not recall HENRY EDWARD SCOTT, and after some discussion he recalled that he and his wife had been staying at the Red Wood Lodge, Laredo, Texas, approximately four or five years ago while fishing at Falcon Lake.

During this visit, which lasted approximately one week and was in May of that year, HARRELL and his wife were driven to Mexico by a taxi driver, whom HARRELL recalled was named HENRY EDWARD SCOTT. The purpose of the trip was to purchase a Chihuahua dog, and SCOTT had informed the HARRELLS that he knew a woman in Mexico who had these dogs for sale.

HARRELL did not make the purchase but recalled SCOTT had taken his name, address and telephone number informing HARRELL that should he later locate a Chihuahua that he thought would be suitable, he would contact HARRELL in Dallas by telephone. HARRELL never heard from him again.

HARRELL stated that he has resided in Dallas all of his life; that his father, JACK HARRELL, was a member of the Dallas Police Department for a fifteen-year period. HARRELL and his wife presently reside at 3225 Rockcliff Drive, Dallas, Texas, and HARRELL is an employee of the lumber company where interviewed.

Mrs. DIANE GRYBEK, 5001 Neptune Way, Tampa, Florida,
furnished the following information:

HENRY EDWARD SCOTT has resided in the apartment building at 114 Plant Avenue, Tampa, which is owned by Mrs. GRYBEK and her husband, ROLAND, about one year. She understands he is a citizen of El Salvador and a few months ago he commenced calling himself ENRICO AARON de DUSSELDORF. He has always gone by the nickname "RICO". He at first received all his mail in the name of SCOTT. When at first mail started coming in in the name of DUSSELDORF, it was returned to the post office by Mrs. GRYBEK because she did not know anyone by that name. After two or three such pieces of mail had come in this way she connected the name ENRICO with "RICO" SCOTT and asked him if it could be for him. He said it was. She does not know much about SCOTT. He told her that his father or step-father owns a home on Bayshore Boulevard, and at one time he told her he was going to move there, but never did. When he first told her about the house on Bayshore Boulevard he gave her the address and she drove by there to look at it, just out of curiosity. She found there was no such address. Later SCOTT's wife told her SCOTT had given her the wrong house number, and she gave a different one. Mrs. GRYBEK never bothered to check the latter address. SCOTT also told her at one time that his step-father and mother are in Cuba.

SCOTT has claimed to have an interest in Central American Revolutionary activities but she does not know of any specific activities or contacts of his in this connection. It is her feeling that he talks too much to be a real revolutionary, but at the same time she feels it is possible he could really be involved and his discretion is simply outweighed by his need to brag. She does not know the identity of his associates except that all are Latins who speak Spanish. One is another taxi driver who lives on Platt Street, somewhere fairly near the residence of SCOTT. He is in his 20's and calls himself a "bount" and calls SCOTT "viscount". They used to send letters back and forth to each other addressed with these titles, bearing wax seals, etc., which she thought rather juvenile. She and other tenants of the apartment building were amused by these antics.

On the afternoon of November 22, 1963, following the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY, Mrs. GRYBEK was at the apartment building and encountered SCOTT sitting on the front porch. He told her he had left work at 2 P.M. that day because of the killing. She asked him, somewhat facetiously, if he knew who was responsible. His answer was: "Maybe I do and maybe I don't." They continued to discuss the assassination and the fact that President KENNEDY had been in Tampa only the preceding Monday. SCOTT then said the shooting was originally planned to take place in Tampa, but did not because there were too many opportunities. She asked what he meant by that. He said it would have been so easy to shoot the President as he drove along Tampa streets, there were so many opportunities that it would have been unsporting to do it. He went on to explain his point by his analogy: He said if he wanted a woman and there were 14 naked women standing in front of him, he would not take any of them. Mrs. GRYBEK said this explanation sounded absurd to her. She said SCOTT also said the plan was to kill Vice-President JOHNSON at the same time and that the shooting of Texas Governor JOHN CONNALLY was a mistake, the assassin having taken him for Vice-President JOHNSON.

Mrs. GRYBEK said the latter point also seemed illogical to her in view of SCOTT's earlier statement the shooting was originally planned for Tampa, because Vice-President JOHNSON was not in Tampa. She said it was her feeling SCOTT was thinking in terms of revolutions in Latin-American countries where they are accomplished by simply getting rid of the top one or two men. She told him that if both KENNEDY and JOHNSON had been killed it would only mean that the Speaker of the House, JOHN McCORMICK would succeed to the Presidency. She said SCOTT had nothing to say to this and she concluded he had not thought the matter through to that point..

Mrs. GRYBEK said her contact with SCOTT has not been sufficient to enable her to judge his veracity. She said he may be better known to her husband, ROLAND GRYBEK, or to the manager of the apartment building, COLEMAN HILL. In this connection, however, she added she does not believe he and HILL get along together too well. She recalled that one time SCOTT saw HILL talking to SCOTT's wife and he became intensely jealous, as a result of which she believes HILL has avoided contact as much as possible with Mr. and Mrs. SCOTT.

SCOTT's wife was named MARY MARTIN and is from Tallahassee, Florida. She was living in the apartment building at 114 Plant St.

before she met SCOTT, and Mrs. GRYBEK believes they met when MARY happened to ride in SCOTT's cab one time. Mrs. SCOTT has a job, but Mrs. GRYBEK does not know what type of work she does or who her employer is.

Mrs. GRYBEK said another of her tenants was present during her conversation with SCOTT. He is an elderly man who lives on the second floor whose name she does not know. He did not participate in the conversation but sat on the porch the entire time and probably heard it all.

HENRY EDWARD SCOTT, 114 Plant Avenue, Tampa, Florida, was advised at the outset of this interview he was not required to make a statement, that he had the right to consult an attorney before making any statement and that any statement he did make could be used against him in a court of law. He was also apprised of the identity of the interviewing agents as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

SCOTT said during the afternoon of November 22, 1963, he was conversing with DIANE GRYBEK, owner of the apartment building at 114 Plant Avenue where he lives, concerning the assassination shortly after noon that date of President JOHN F. KENNEDY. He told her he did not believe the man OSWALD whom the Dallas police then had in custody was the person responsible for the killing. He also told her that anybody wanting to kill the President could easily have done so in Tampa on Monday of this week when the President's motorcade was driving along Grand Central Avenue, Tampa. SCOTT denied categorically that he had stated to Mrs. GRYBEK he knew of a plot to kill President KENNEDY and Vice President JOHNSON. He also denied that he has knowledge of any such plot. SCOTT said he has no information bearing on the shooting; his reason for doubting that OSWALD is the guilty party is that news reports have given only circumstantial evidence against him and SCOTT knows the police and FBI have so many scientific methods of detection that he feels they would have developed more concrete evidence of guilt if OSWALD was really the killer. As an example, he said they could have determined the contents of OSWALD's stomach to verify whether he was the person who ate the fried chicken, etc., remains of which were said to have been found at the scene of the shooting. SCOTT said his only reason for saying the killing could have been accomplished in Tampa was that the number of people lining Grand Central Avenue when the President's motorcade passed there on Monday would have permitted an assassin a close range and easy shot at the President.

For identification SCOTT presented Florida chauffeur's license #64293, issued January 4, 1962, in the name of HENRY EDWARD SCOTT, born August 5, 1936. His address at time of issuance was 115 S. Newport, Tampa. He also presented social security card in the same name showing account number as 457-62-6960, and a Veterans Administration claim card in the name HENRY E. SCOTT showing he had served in the U.S. Air Force under AF

He also presented his social security card in the name HENRY EDWARD SCOTT, account number 457-62-6960. The social security card was in a plexiglass container, in the back of which was a slip of paper with the following handwritten thereon:

SCOTT said his true name is HENRY EDWARD SCOTT and he was born August 5, 1936, in San Salvador, El Salvador. His father, HUGH ANDREW SCOTT, an American citizen, was vice president of the British-American Sugar Company. His mother's maiden name was DUSSELDORF and she was of German origin. She died when he was four years old. Some of her family still reside in East Germany but he has no contact with them. He did try to contact some of them in 1954 or 1955 but was not successful. When his father retired from his job with the sugar company he and SCOTT's stepmother came to Tampa and bought a home. His father at one time owned three homes in Tampa, two on Davis Island and one on Bayshore Boulevard. He still owns the latter house, 1115 Bayshore Boulevard, and presumably receives rentals from it at the present time. The handling of the rental is done by Mr. SIMS of the Davis & Cooper Realty Firm. His father and stepmother now live in Costa Rica and his father has gone back to work. He is with the Tabacalera Costaricense in San Jose, probably in the capacity of vice president.

SCOTT said he enlisted in the air force in 1954 at Tampa while drunk. He was discharged at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas and lived for several months following his discharge in Laredo, Texas. He did not get along well with his father and stepmother but went willingly when they came to Laredo to pick him up and take him back to San Salvador. This was sometime until the fall of 1958. He stayed there then until October of 1960 when he got word that a coup d'etat was imminent. He said he was never in any trouble in El Salvador but just did not want to be there when the shooting started, so he left and came to Tampa, traveling in his own car. He has lived in Tampa since then. He has

worked for the Yellow Cab Company as a driver almost two years. He claimed he has never held any other job. He did not work the first several months he was in Tampa, and he did not work while he was living in Laredo, Texas.

When asked the identity of RAYMOND E. HARRELL, whose name was on the slip of paper in his wallet, SCOTT at first said he could not remember any such person. When the full name and address was read to him, he said he then recalled this was a man who contacted him while he was in Laredo, Texas, and who was interested in buying some Mexican chihuahau dogs. SCOTT said the name on the back of the paper was a man in Mexico who was supposed to have some for sale. SCOTT was a go-between in the transaction but he does not recall anything ever came of it. SCOTT said he has served as a "contact man" in some revolutionary activities also, in that he arranged contact with a seller of guns on behalf of some Anti-Castro Cubans. He said the guns were shipped from Houston and New Orleans to Guatemala, El Salvador, and Costa Rica about six months ago. He said the revolutionary organization involved was the Second Front of Escambray but he declined to name any individuals. He claimed he did not know the name of the individual Cubans and he refused to give the name of the seller.

SCOTT said he was a student at Brewster High School in Tampa in 1953 and for a time he studied electronics at a now defunct technical college, which was closed by the Government for non-payment of taxes or some such reason.

He said he hopes some day to return to El Salvador to live. He plans also to change his name legally to DUSSELDORF, the family name of his mother. He wants to do this because he and his father do not get along and he does not like to continue using his father's name. In Tampa he has used the name ENRICO AARON DE DUSSELDORF as well as his true name.

On November 30, 1963 the Little Rock Division advised that JAMES E. SHOCK, Route 4, Box 675, Little Rock, Arkansas, advised he was formerly associated with PEARL SIMONS, 1421 Godwin, Houston, who is a self-admitted member of the John Birch Society. He advised from her general conversation he was of the opinion she felt the only way America could be saved, was if President KENNEDY would be killed.

SHOCK advised SIMONS discussed with him the fact she had been offered a permanent position with "Special Section" of John Birch Society at Houston. SHOCK states he received impression "Special Section" was to take whatever physical action necessary to protect American liberties.

The following investigation was conducted by SAS WILLIAM J. SCHMIDT and JOHN THOMAS KESLER on November 30, 1963:

AT HOUSTON, TEXAS

PEARL SIMONS, 1521 Godwin, denied making statements attributed to her. She advised she is not aware of any "Special Section" of the John Birch Society and asked if leaders of the John Birch Society had been interviewed. SIMONS requested she be allowed to tape record the interview, at which point the interview was terminated.

SIMONS was very belligerent during the interview and on termination of the interview, requested she be advised who furnished her name to the FBI. SIMONS' request was denied, whereupon she stated it was probably a man she had filed on previously.

Records of the Houston Police Department reflect a complaint was filed on September 19, 1962, by PEARL SIMONS, white female, 32, 1521 Godwin, Houston, against suspects

JAMES SHOCK and E. C. TURNER, for investigation of homicide resulting from obscene statements with a threat to kill made to SIMONS over the telephone, after she had called SHOCK's telephone number.

Records of the Houston Police Department also reflect that JAMES E. SHOCK has FBI #4398569, and was arrested on February 23, 1963 by the Houston Police Department on a pick-up issued by the Police Department, Angleton, Texas, for Disturbing the Peace. SHOCK was released to the Sheriff's Office at Angleton on February 23, 1963.
