The TV announcer was observed interviewing an unknown French reporter immediately after the shooting and this French reporter claimed that he was standing directly next to RUBY at the time RUBY bolted through newsmen and cameramen and shot OSWALD.

At about 1:01 PN, Mr. BARKER, in contact with his correspondent at Parkland Hospital, advised he had just learned that OSWALD had been shot in the left side of the abdomen just below the heart and had suffered severe abdominal injury and was at the time receiving heart massage in an effort to keep him alive. It was also being reported he was being given blood transfusions.

At the time the shooting first occurred, it was reported that the man who shot OSWALD had posed as a Secret Service Agent to gain entrance. This was later determined to be an erroneous report.

Mr. BARKER advised that newsreel film and video tape from the closed circuit TV would be made available to the FBI immediately upon processing.

At about 2:00 PM, Mr. BARKER furnished SAs LKE and BARRETT a roll of video tape depicting the shooting and a roll of 16 millimeter newsreel film taken by GEORGE ROBERT PHENIX, a KRLD, news cameraman. This film was taken directly to love Field where It was given to Braniff Air Lines Pilot ROBERT R. ROSS, who resides at 1806 Glenbrook, Irving, Texas. Captain ROSS stated he would personally deliver this package to FBI Agents at National Airport, Washington, D. C.. Captain ROSS was the pilot for Braniff Flight No. 110 which was scheduled to leave Dallas at 3:15 PM and arrive at Washington, D. C. at about 8:00 PM.

He stated that at 7:30 PM, Hovember 24, 1963, this funeral home received a telephone call from MIKE HOWARD, U. S. Secret Service, to the effect that the family of LEE HARVEY OSWALD desired the Miller Funeral Home to handle services for OSWALD.

Mr. MILLER advised that attendants for the funeral home proceeded to Parkland Hospital in Dallas, Texas, where at approximately 9:30 PM, November 24, 1963, they picked up the remains of LEE HARVEY OSWALD and returned to Fort Worth, Texas, at approximately 10:30 PM.

Mr. MILLER advised further that the body of OSVALD was embalmed by an employee of that funeral home, PAUL J. (GROODY, a licensed embalmer in the State of Texas.

Mr. MILLER advised that the preparation of the body of OSWALD was under his supervision.

He continued by stating that the embalming of LEE HARVEY OSWALD was started at approximately 11:00 PM on November 24, 1963, and was completed at about 1:00 AM, November 25, 1963.

Mr. MILLER stated that an abdominal and cranial autopsy was performed on the body of OSWALD at Parkland Hospital in Dallas. He said that the embalming of LEE HARVEY OSWALD was done by sectional or, as is known in the funeral business, as gix-point embalming, in which the head, arms, legs, and abdomen were embalmed individually. This type of embalming was done in view of the abdominal and cranial autopsy performed.

Mr. MILLER advised that in talking to MIKE HOWARD of the U.S. Secret Service, Mr. HOWARD advised on the telephone on initial contact that LEE HARVEY OSWALD's brother, ROBERT'OSWALD, had \$800 in a Denton, Texas, banksavings account which was to pay for the funeral. They desired that no more than this amount be spent for a casket, concrete vault, burial suit, cemetery lot and a \$25.00 casket spray.

Mr. MILLER advised that the remains of LEE HARVEY OSWALD will be placed in a 6'6" hinge cap wooden, gray doeskin casket, which casket was manufactured by the Pine Bluff Casket Company of Pine Bluff, Arkansas. He advised that the body and casket will be placed in a concrete Wilbert vault, which vault is manufactured by the Wilbert Company of Dallas, Texas.

He advised that the funeral arrangements for LEE HARVEY OSWALD are tentatively set to be held at 4:00 p.m. on November 25, 1963, in the chapel of Laurel Land Cemetery located on the Old Crowley Road in Fort Worth, Texas. A minister, name unknown, of the Lutheran Church, will officiate.

Subsequent to the above information, at 11:30 a.m., November 25, 1963, Mr. MILLER advised that he had just received information from the manager of Laurel Land Cemetery that he refused to accept for burial the remains of LEE HARVEY OSWALD. Mr. MILLER said that other arrangements will immediately have to be made by him.

At 1:30 p.m., November 25, 1963, Mr. MILLER advised that definite arrangements had now been made, and LEE HARVEY OSWALD would be buried at 4:00 p.m., November 25, 1963, at Rose Hill Burial Park, 7301 East Lancaster in Fort Worth, Texas.

Mr. MILLER advised further that graveside services only would be held at the above burial park.

At 8:45 p.m., Mr. RAY BRANTLEY, Proprietor, Ray's Hardware Store, who resides at 103 Highland, advised his records reflected that JACK RUBY purchased a Colt Cobra revolver from his establishment which is located on Singleton Blvd., in Dallas, on January 19, 1960. When he purchased the gun he gave the address of 3508 Caklawn, Dallas, Texas. The books reflected this Colt Cobra bore Serial No. 2744. The revolver had a 2" barrel and was plue in color.

It was BRANTLEY's recollection that RUBY was accompanied by a Dallas policeman at that time whose name he does not remember. It was also believed by him that a prize fighter was with them also. BRANTLEY had had no business dealings with JACK RUBY prior to that time but later, approximately one year ago, JACK RUBY came to his hardware store and requested that he clean a .38 caliber Smith and Wesson revolver. The revolver was rusty and after cleaning the revolver, BRANTLEY held the gun for two or three months before RUBY called for it. He believed that it was during 1961 that this revolver was brought into his business establishment.

but recalled that a few months ago RUBY had contacted him and requested that a gun be shipped to an individual in Las Vegas, Nevada. He made available the books of his store which reflected that on May 10, 1963, a .38 Smith and Wesson Centennial revolver with no hammer, bearing Serial No. 13810, had been shipped to L. 27 McWILLIE, 3040 Kishner Drive, Apt. 204, Las Vegas, Nevada. This gun was later returned to him inabmuch as McWILLIE did not pay for the gun. BRANTLEY stated he had sent the gun C. O. D. and that it cost him about \$7.00 to send this gun to McWILLIE who did not pay for it. He was only casually acquainted with RUBY and in fact did not recognize his picture on television on November 24, 1963. He could give no information concerning friends or relatives or background on RUBY.

BRANTLEY said that the Smith and Wesson revolver JACK RUBY had requested him to clean in 1961 was blue in color, but he could/remember exactly what model the revolver was He believed that it was probably a Chief Special with a hammer.

-Mrs. LILLIAN BRANTLEY, 103 Highland Street, co-proprietor of Ray's Hardware Store in Dallas, Texas, attested to an entry in the books of the store which show that JACK RUBY purchased a Colt Cobra revolver from Ray's Hardware Store on January 19, 1960. serial number listed was 2744 and RUBY gave the address of 3508 Caklawn. It was her recollection that RUBY came to the store with a police officer whose name she does not recall. She also said the store records show that on May 10, 1963, a .38 Smith and Wesson Centennial revolver. Serial No. 13810, had been sent to Las Vegas, Nevada. JACK/RUBY, when he called at their hardware store, said he had received a letter from a friend in Las Vegas who could not find a Smith and Wesson Centennial there. The friend, according to JACK RUBY, requested that RUBY find him one and forward it to him. The books show that this revolver had been sent to L. CHACWILLIE, 3040 Kishner Drive, Apt. 204, Las Vegas, Nevada. Mrs. BRANTLEY had marked "Void" over this entry in the books because the C. O. D. package sent to McWILLIE had been returned. The cost to Ray's $A \oplus A$ Hardware Store was about \$7.00 and it was her recollection that it was sold to some other person. She knew RUBY by sight but stated she did not know anything about his background.

PINKSTON on November 24, 1963, that deer season officially opened in the State of Texas on Saturday, November 16, 1963, and literally thousands of Texans went deer hunting over the weekend of November 16-17, 1963, and many of these hunters still had their high-powered deer rifles in their automobiles during the week beginning November 18, 1963, and a number of these rifles were being returned to their owners by persons who had borrowed them for a weekend of hunting or were being turned over to others who wanted to borrow them for hunting on the following weekend.

RALPH LECN YATES, 13564 Brookgreen, Dallas, Texas, voluntarily appeared at the Dallas FBI Office, accompanied by his uncle, Mr. J. O. SMITH, 13770 Sprucewood, Dallas, Texas, and furnished the following information:

YATES stated that he is employed as a refrigeration service-man for the Texas Butcher Supply Company, Dallas, Texas, and in connection with this employment was driving a pickup truck on R. L. Thornton Expressway at approximately 10:30 AM, on either November 20 or 21, 1963. He stated he noticed a man hitchhiking at approximately the Beckley Street entrance to the R. L. Thornton Expressway, and he had stopped and picket up this man.

YATES said after seeing photographs and television pictures of LEE HARVEY OSWALD, he is of the opinion that this man was identical with OSWALD.

He continued that when the man walked up to get into the pickup truck, he was carrying a package wrapped in brown wrapping paper about 4 feet to 4½ feet long. He said he told this man he could put the package in the back of the truck, but the man said that the package contained curtain rods and he would carry it with him in the cab of the truck.

YATES stated as they drove along, the man had asked him if he knew a certain party, whose name YATES cannot recall now, and he had indicated to this man he did not. He said the man then asked if he had ever been to the Carousel Club and YATES had replied that he had serviced refrigerators in the past in a number of clubs and that possibly he had been to this one, but he did not recall.

YATES said that he had said to the man that there was going to be a lot of excitement in Dallas soon, referring to the President's visit, and the man had asked YATES what he meant. He said he replied that the President was coming to Dallas, but that he personally felt that the President should not come in view of the ADLAT'STEVENSON incident which had occurred previously.

YATES stated the man then asked YATES if he thought a person could assassinate the President. YATES replied that he guessed such a thing could be possible. The man then asked YATES if it could be done from the top of a building or out of a window, high up, and YATES said he guessed this was possible if one had a good rifle with a scope and was a good shot.


YATES advised about this time the man pulled out a picture which shwed a man with a rifle and asked YATES if he thought the President could be killed with a gun like that one. YATES said he was driving and did not look at the picture but indicated to the man that he guessed so.

YATES said that the man then asked if he knew the President's route for the parade in Dallas and YATES replied that he did not know the route but that it had been in the paper. He said the man then said that he had misunderstood him and that actually he had asked YATES if he thought that the President would change his route. YATES said he replied that he doubted it unless they might for safety reasons.

He said as they approached downtown Dallas, the man indicated that he was going on Houston Street and that although he was going to Irving, he told the man he would drive off the expressway and to Houston Street and let him out there, then would go back to the expressway. YATES said he went off the Expressway on Commerce Street, turned off of Commerce on Houston, drove north on Houston and let the man off on the corner of Elm and Houston Streets.

He said he saw the man cross Elm Street, but does not know where he went from there. He said that as the man got out of the truck, he recalled him saying something about the Triple Underpass, but cannot recall exactly what was said.

YATES stated that he had mentioned this incident to another employee at the Texas Butcher Supply Company, one DEMPSEY JONES, prior to the time that the President was assassinated.

YATES stated that the man be thought was identical with LEE HARVEY OSWALD whom he had picked up was a white male, approximately 5'9" tall, slender, with dark eyebrows and hair. He could furnish no additional identifying data.

YATES stated he is married and has five children and that he would appreciate not receiving any type publicity from the fact he was furnishing this information.

DEMPSET JONES, Route 4, Box 376, Dallas, Texas, telephone number Diamond 8-1051, has been employed by the Texas Butchers Supply Company (TBSC) at 2038 Commerce Street in Dallas, Texas, for pine and one-half years. He said he has known RALPH LEON YATES as a fellow employee for a little over a year. He said YATES is a big talker who always talks about a lot of feolishness.

JONES recalled that he and YATES were working in the shop on the second floor of the TBSC about 11:00 % or 11:30 a.m., one morning, and YATES had returned from a call earlier that he had made at Irving and Oak Cliff before returning to TBSC.

JONES said YATES told him he had picked up a boy in Oak Cliff and taken this boy to Houston and Elm in Dallas. YATES said this boy had a package not described at that time, but after the death of the President, YATES described the package as a "long package" and then on telling the facts over again, YATES said this man told him it was some window shades he was carrying for the company he (the man) had made. JONES said that YATES told him on the first date that the man discussed the fact with him that one could be in a building and shoot the President as he, the President, passed by.

He said YATES did not discuss this man the day before the President was shot in any great detail, but after the President was shot, YATES told him he believed the man he had in the pickup was the man who shot and killed the President, and he was going to call it in and tell them what he knew about it.

JONES was unable to describe what agency YATES was talking about. He said he recalled that YATES mentioned calling "them" on November 26, 1963. He said no other person was present when YATES discussed these matters with him in the shop. He described YATES as a white male, in his 20s, about 5'4", 160 pounds, stocky build, hair brown, eyes believed gray, and is employed as a refrigerator mechanic with the TBSC.

Mr. GILPIN said he located a record dated Movember 21, 1963, Shop Bill No. 8760, Invoice No. 36919, dated November 21, 1963, billed November 23, 1963, to the Arlington_Food Stores, Post Office Box 91, Arlington, Texas, telephone number AN 2-0597. This bill was in the amount of \$12.00 which would indicate it was a two hour service call. He said he recalled that he gave the order to RALPH YATES about 10:30 a.m., at the TBSC office, and he told YATES at the time he would call him at the time he was at the Park-It Market to find out what the trouble was they were having. He said that he recalled he made a telephone call around noon to YATES and determined that the compressor at the Park-It Market was out of oil and not burned up so YATES replaced the oil and should have returned to TBSC about 12:30 or:1:00 p.m. He said YATES was rechecking the time of the call on November 27, 1963, and that he, GILPIN, had discussed the matter with SAMXOWENS, his partner, who recalled that YATES had called in from Irving, Texas, sometime after 11:30 a.m., on the morning of November 21, 1963. He said that he knew of no reason that YATES might have had for being in Oak Cliff on that morning. He had no other information which would further establish the time that YATES made the service call.

Army Intelligence, he thought the individual might have been signaling someone by merely letting the other telephone ring, without having it answered.
