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Sergeant SOUTHERIAND advised that he was unable to locate any reference identifiable with the name of JOEY JOWIFCZ.

Mrs. BERDIE SUE BELCHER, Clerk, Merchants Retail Credit Association, 2112 Jackson, advised that she could local no reference identifiable with BILLY RAY HENSON or the name JOEY JOWIFCZ.

## AT IRVING, TEXAS

Mrs. LEE L (FARIEY, 223 West 7th Street) advised the she and her husband have known BILLY RAY HENSON for approximat two years since her husband met HENSON during the time that they were living in Ennis, Texas and her husband operated a milk route for the Borden Company. Mrs. FARLEY said that HEN asked to work for Mr. FARLEY on the milk route and although HENSON's family lived in Ennis at the corner of Hall and Clay Streets, he did not get along very well with his family and he spent approximately two months with them before he admitted that he was "AWOL" from the U. S. Army. Mrs. FARLEY advised. that she spent a great deal of time talking to HENSON and. convinced him that he should return voluntarily to the Army. He hitch-hiked a ride to Fort Hood, Texas and then was taken? to Fort Knox, Kentucky. Mrs. FARLEY advised that HENSON was very emotionally unstable person who when told to do something which he did not agree with, would generally tell that person "I'll kill you!" She said that when he was told to go back to the Army, he became so mad that he torehis Army uniform apart right in front of the entire family. She said that at one time while he was staying with them at Ennis, Texas before he returned to the Army, her neighbors told her that he was reading comic books and got mad for some reason or another, cursed loudly, and crawled into a large dog house and stayed

Mrs. FARIEY advised that HENSON came to visit them at Irving, Texas approximately three or four days before the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY, and on the day of the assassination he was watching a television speech of President KENNEDY with the FARIEY family. They turned the television set off and later heard that the President had been

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assassinated, and then spent much of the day watching the television accounts of the assassination.

Mrs. FARIEY said that Mr. PARIEY got HENSON a job at the Frank Holister Electroplating Company in Dallas, Texas and he was to go to work for this company the following Monday after the President was killed, but since he did not have any identification to furnish the company, Mr. and Mrs. FARIEY told him that he would have to go back to his mother's house in Ennis, Texas and get proper identification. He told them that he had lost his Army discharge, Social Security Card, and tore up his Sclective Service registration card. When he was told to go back to Ennis, he screamed: "I'll kill you!" Mrs. FARIEY said that they did not pay any attention to this threat since he made it so often and didn't mean it. She said on one occasion, he threatened to kill her if she walked across a line in the driveway. She said she walked right past him and he did nothing but break down and cry.

Mrs. FARIEY said that she and Mr. FARIEY finally decided after he refused to get his identification for this job, that he should not stay with the FARIEY family any longer, since he frightened the children, and on one occasion when he wasn't allowed to play with them had threatened to kill them, also, however, the children got quite used to these threats and payed little attention to him afterwards.

On the Sunday afternoon when he was told to go back to Irving, Texas, he made such a commotion in the front yard that Mrs. FARLEY had the Irving City Police Department pick him up at about 5:00 P.M. and take him to the Continental Trailways Bus Station. She said they did not arrest him but did this as a courtesy. At about 6:30 P.M. that same day, she called HENSON's nother at Ennis, Texas and was told by Mrs. HENSON that BILLY RAY had just arrived on the bus from Dallas. Mrs. FARLEY said that she and her husband and family have not seen BILLY RAY HENSON cince this time.

During the time that the FARLEYS knew BILLY RAY HENSON, he would often make up stories and actually seemed to believe

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them himself. She said that he often talks big and claimed that while he was in the U. S. Army, he turned a .50 caliber machine gun on fellow troops at target practice and killed all of them. She said that the FARIEY family, of course, thought that this was ridiculous since he would have been sent to an Army prison if such a thing occurred.

Mrs. FARLEY said that it appears to her and her husband that the HENSON family which is composed of five or six children, has at least one other child who is emotionally unstable. Mrs. FAPLEY advised that she believes that this is TINYXHENSON, age 22, who weighs approximately 350 lbs. BUDDYXHENSON, age approximately 30, is in the U. S. Army, overseas in Germany; KENNETH HEUSON is in the 11th grade; BECKY HENSON is approximately age 15. They appear to be normal, intelligent children.

Mrs. FARIEY said that BILLY RAY HENSON never said at any time that he ever knew LEE HARVEY OSWALD or JACK RUBY and he did not discuss them in any detail during the news of the assacsination and the later killing of OSWALD by RUBY.

Information Agency (USIA) has furnished Bureau with letter dated at Havana, Cuba, 11-27-63 addressed to Voice of America and signed by one Miguel Galban Lopez. Letter alleges that assassination of President by 'Oswald'was undertaken at the direction of a Cuban agent, one Pedro Charles, who gave Oswald \$7,000 for this mission. The FBI Laboratory has examined letter in question and has concluded that typewriting thereon is identical with typewriting which appeared in two previous letters received by the Bureau which contained similar allegations. (See memorandum Wannall to Sullivan, 12-11-63, same caption.) As noted in prior memorandum of 12-11-63 it seems clear this matter represents an attempted hoax possibly perpetrated by some anti-Castro group or individual seeking to attach blame to the Castro regime in connection with the President's death. State Department and the Central Intelligence Agency as rell as Secret Service have previously been advised of these letters. Bureau files contain no reference identifiable with Higuel Galban Lopez. The matter of searching of Postal Money Orders as well as Western Union

Money Orders was discussed in detail today with Mr. J. Lee Rankin of the Presi-

The matter of searching of Postal Money Orders as well as Western Union Money Orders was discussed in detail today with Mr. J. Lee Rankin of the President's Commission. Information previously set forth in letterhead memorandum form showing Mr. Rankin that it would be necessary to check between four and five million money orders on a daily basis at the Washington headquarters of the U. S. Post Office Department was discussed with him and Mr. Rankin indicated that for the time being no further check on Postal Money Orders would be necessary.

In connection with Western Union Money Orders, Mr. Rankin was advised that a check had been made by our Dallas Office of Western Union Money Orders and that the same type of check was being made by our New Orleans Office for a six-month period, this being the length of time money orders are kept in the various area offices of Western Union. Mr. Rankin was advised that to search Western Union records which are maintained at Minneapolis, Minnesota, for outgoing Western Union Money Orders from Dallas alone for a period of three years would require the time of tenpersons at a cost of \$2.50 per hour for approximately one month. Mr. Rankin was advised that these records are filed under the city of origin of the money order; then chronologically under the date they were sent; and then alphabetically under the name of the payee. Mr. Rankin was advised that without this data a search for a money order would have to cover the entire Western Union system on a day-to-day basis and that Western Union was unable to furnish an accurate estimate of the numbers of hours such a search would require.

Mr. Rankin was also advised that in view of the manner in which the records are handled, a check at Minneapolis for the cities in which Oswald lived would only be a half-way check in that any money orders sent to him from anywhere else in the city would not be picked up on such a check as was described above.

Mr. Rankin advised that in view of the foregoing, no further check should be made at this time but that the Commission would appreciate receiving the results of the six-month check that had been initiated. He was assured this information would appear in report form in the near future.

Mr. Rankin was advised this matter would be looked into and he would be subsequently advised. Supervisor E. T. Turner in the Domestic Intelligence Division was contacted and is handling this check.

ACTION: When information is received as to the possibility of making the above check requested by Mr. Rankin, he will be advised.
