Captain PAUL BARGER advised he has been unable to identify the source of his original information, which he furnished to a Special Agent of the Dallas Office of the FBI on a date not recalled, concerning a conversation which took place between telephone number CR 5-5211, Arlington, Texas, and telephone number BL 3-1628, Irving, Texas, on November 23, 1963. He said he had located his notes, which were at his home at the time of this interview. He determined there was nothing on the notes to indicate the exact time he had received the information.

He stated he had contacted a person he believed to have furnished the information to him, but determined this person had not done so.

He said he would continue his attempt to locate and identify the original source of the information in his notes.

Captain PAUL BARGER advised he is a member of the Irving, Texas, Police Department and he stated he had no objection to the use of his name in connection with information he furnished SA ROBERT C. LISH, on November 26, 1963, at Irving, Texas.

He said he had made extensive inquiry in an effort to identify the name of the individual who furnished him with the information concerning a telephone conversation which took place on November 23, 1963, between telephone numbers CR 5-5211, Arlington, Texas, and BL 3-1628, Irving, Texas. He said he had been unable to identify this individual, but he was certain the information was furnished to him between Friday night, November 22, 1963, and Monday, November 25, 1963. He said he had an unusually large amount of work assignments during that period and these assignments kept him from recalling the time of day that this information was received.

Captain BARGER said a request was made of him to attempt to obtain a list of telephone tickets, or other helpful information, from his contacts with the Southwestern States Telephone Company at Irving, Texas, which would assist in the investigation of the case concerning the assassination of President KENNEDY, on November 22, 1963. He said he felt sure the information he furnished SA LISH had come from some telephone company sources, but he was still unable to identify the individual who related it to him; and he was unable to recall whether it was related in person, or by a telephone call.

He furnished his personal, original notes concerning this information for any use they may serve, and he identified same by placing his initials thereon and the date, January 17, 1964.

Mrs. RUTH HYDE PAINE, 2515 West Fifth Street, Irving, Texas, advised she was at home on November 23, 1963, except for a short period when she went out shopping. Her husband, MICHAEL PAINE, was at their residence, 2515 West Fifth Street, Irving, Texas, all day on November 23, 1963, except for the period between 3 P.M. and dark. During this period, MICHAEL PAINE, had been picked up by the Dallas Police Department and taken to the Dallas Police Department for questioning and then returned. She does not know if he could have stopped at his place of employment in Arlington, Texas, during this period.

Mrs. PAINE stated that she had one telephone conversation with her husband on November 23, 1963, which was a phone call by herself to her husband, at which time she inquired as to the time he would return to their residence. Mrs. PAINE denied having a telephone conversation with her husband at his place of employment.

Mrs. PAINE denied that her husband had ever commented to her that he felt sure LEE HARVEY OSWALD had killed the President, but did not feel OSWALD was responsible and "we both know who's responsible". Mrs. PAINE was asked concerning the following quotation, "Oswald wouldn't have any reason to do it, but when you get right down to it, the only guilty person is that bastard himself". Mrs. PAINE stated that she could not recall her husband using those exact words in conversation with her, but the meaning of the words would be "compatible" with his feelings on November 23, 1963.

Mrs. PAINE advised that her husband, MICHAEL PAINE, was one of a few employees at Bell Helicopter who had a key to their research laboratory, in Arlington, Texas, and could

enter this laboratory at any time he desired, at which location phone number, CR 5-5211, is located.

Mrs. PAINE stated that her husband had never discussed with her the fact that he had been previously questioned by the FBI concerning a specific telephone conversation.

On November 23, 1963, she recalled that definitely there were no other women or ladies in her home, except MARINA OSWALD, who did not speak English.

She advised that on the 23rd of November, a group of officers made a search of her home and while the search was being made, she made a brief visit to shop for groceries.

Mrs. PAINE stated that on November 22, 1963, at about 1 P.M., her husband telephoned her from his place of business and advised her that President KENNEDY had just been shot. At the time, LEE HARVEY OSWALD'S connection was not known to her and no mention was made of OSWALD in this conversation. Mrs. PAINE said that on November 22, 1963, following an announcement on the radio that LEE HARVEY OSWALD had been arrested by the Dallas, Police Department, MICHAEL PAINE left his place of employment and came to their residence in Irving, Texas, and arrived shortly after the Dallas police came to their residence.

MICHAEL RALPH PAINE, 2515 West 5th Street, Irving, Texas, denied ever having made a statement that he felt sure LEE HARVEY OSWALD had killed the President, although he does not feel OSWALD was responsible, and further stated that "We both know who is responsible". PAINE stated he never made a statement of this type at any place at any time or under any circumstances.

PAINE was asked if he ever made a statement to the effect that "OSWALD wouldn't have any reason to do it, but when you get right down to it, the only guilty person is that Bastard himself -". PAINE stated that he has stated on numerous occasions to many persons that OSWALD wouldn't have any reason to do it, namely, to kill the President; however, the last part of the statement definitely does not sound like his (PAINE's) statement. PAINE stated that he did sincerely believe that OSWALD had assassinated the President in view of so much strong and convincing circumstantial evidence, and he did feel that he (OSWALD) was alone responsible and did not have any collaborators in the assassination of the President. PAINE said OSWALD had never mentioned President KENNEDY in his presence or to his (PAINE's) wife at any time to his knowledge.

Mr. PAINE said subsequent to the shooting of President KENNEDY on November 22, 1963, he and his wife received many telephone calls, crank letters and visits from people both at their home and his office with regard to all sorts of "crank" remarks concerning their knowledge of and association with LEE OSWALD and his wife, MARINA. He also advised that if he felt these people who telephonically contacted him or contacted them in person were reliable people, he would talk to them; if not, he ignored their entreaties, letters or conversations.

Mr. PAINE stated upon reflection, with regard to the second statement at the outset of this interview, that he felt the sentiment expressed was compatible with his belief after the death of President KENNEDY.

At 3:50 PM, 1-21-64, I telephonically contacted ASAC Clark, Dallas, with regard to Dallas airtel 1-18 in this case which enclosed amended pages to be inserted in the 1-7-64 Dallas report.

I advised ASAC Clark that while the Bureau had intended including these amended pages in the 1-7 report and changing the date of the report to 1-17, we had decided not to do so. Instead, it was desired that Dallas include the information contained in the amended pages in the next report to be submitted by Dallas in this case. I told Clark that we would disregard the airtel entirely and that Dallas in including the material in the next report would, of course, have to change some page numbers and see that the information fitted properly in the new report. I told him that the Dallas report of 1-7 would remain as is.

ASAC Clark advised that Dallas would handle as requested and stated that the next report would be submitted by Dallas on either 1-22 or 1-23-64 and would include the material submitted with the 1-18 airtel.

I also mentioned to ASAC Clark that we had received the three metal boxes of correspondence obtain from Mrs. Ruth Paine. I asked in this connection if Dallas had during the interviews with Mrs. Oswald gone carefully into the relationship between the Oswalds and the Paines and he said this had been done.

Synopsis:

NELSON DELGADO advised 12/13/63, that OSWALD excellent in Spanish. DELGADO did report his knowledge that OSWALD was receiving Russian newspapers to superior. Unable to recall names of two Negro Marines who went to Tijuana with them, but one might have been called WATTS. Both Negroes worked with Motor Pool at Santa Ana, Cal., Base. Persons who could corroborate DELGADO's statement set out.

S/P 4 NELSON DELGADO, Battery D, 4th Missile Battalion, 71st Artillery, Holmdel Site, Holmdel, New Jersey, advised that he recalled some additional facts.

DELGADO stated he was assigned to Quonset Hut Number 34 from the time he arrived at the Marine Base at Santa Ana, California, until he requested transfer to another hut in June, 1959.

DELGADO recalled he became friendly with OSWALD in December, 1958, when both were assigned to the same radar section and the same shift. At that time, DELGADO declared, he was very young, having only recently left school, and was somewhat of a "loner," as OSWALD was, with the result they became friendly. DELGADO stated he felt a little out of place because of his Puerto Rican background but found that OSWALD and he got along very well.

DELGADO advised that in January, 1959, OSWALD had been having some trouble in the Quonset Hut to which he had originally been assigned and had asked for a transfer. DELGADO was not sure but he thought it was because of his, DELGADO's, friendship that OSWALD was assigned to Hut Number 34. However the hut did have three empty bunks at the time.

According to DELGADO, there were a total of six Marines in the hut during the time that he spent in it, one of whom was a Private First Class (PFC) WALD. In January, 1960, WALD was transferred to Atsuki, Japan, with the First Marine Air Control Squadron. However, WALD did not get along with OSWALD, but he would know of the OSWALD and DELGADO friendship.

OSWALD attempted to teach DELGADO certain phrases of Russian, which language OSWALD spoke fluently, but the best DELGADO could do was learn "Da" and "Nyet." DELGADO stated he never heard OSWALD called "Oswaldovitch," but he was called by many of the Marines on the base "Comrade" and he heard RICHARD CALL refer to him as "Commissar." It was DELGADO's opinion that these names were said in a joking manner because apparently most of the Marines knew of OSWALD's interest in Socialism.

DELGADO said there were two Negro Marines in Hut Number 34 who were assigned to other duties who should know of his friendship with OSWALD, but he could not recall their names. He recalled one other Marine was also assigned to the Hut for a short period, but he did not know his name and did not believe he would have known OSWALD.

It was DELGADO's opinion that Sergeant W. FUNK would not know OSWALD well because he was only assigned to the base about four to six weeks prior to OSWALD leaving the area. FUNK was transferred to the Santa Ana Marine Base from Japan and most of the troops under him did not have much respect for him. He had a high pitched voice and did not know how to dress like a good Marine or operate a platoon well. Sergeant FUNK caught OSWALD "fooling around" in ranks on one occasion and reported him. OSWALD was made to walk around the field with full field pack and Sergeant FUNK put him through a Close Order Drill. Thereafter, OSWALD had nothing good to say about FUNK and at one time seriously thought of reporting the incident to the Inspector General, but he did not do so.

CORPORAL BOTELHO

Colonel JAMES BOTTEHO was assigned to the Santa Ana Marine Base at approximately the same time that DELGADO was, but was not in the same hut with OSWALD. He did work on the same shift with OSWALD and DELGADO. BOTTEHO did not associate with OSWALD and had little to do with him. DELGADO did recall on one occasion BOTTEHO had a "big" argument with OSWALD over Socialism and OSWALD left in disgust.

DELGADO advised that speaking generally as far as PFC RUSSELL and BOTTEHO were concerned, they did not have much in common with OSWALD because they were interested in sports and girls and these things hardly interested OSWALD.

Sergeant CALL was assigned to the same platoon but was not assigned in the same Quonset area as the subject. However, CALL and OSWALD did get along and on one occasion OSWALD discussed his book "Das Capital" with CALL. Further, CALL and OSWALD had in common the fact they both enjoyed classical music.

PFC H. RUSSELL, JR. was assigned to the Santa Ana Base about four to eight weeks prior to OSWALD leaving the base. He lived in the same Quonset Hut area, but not in Hut

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Number 34 and was not on the same work shift with OSWALD. One of the things that was unusual about OSWALD, DELGADO noted, since RUSSELL was from New Orleans and so was OSWALD, there should have been some conversation about this fact. However, there never was any interest shown in each other.

Another Marine, a PFC OSBORNE, was assigned to the same platoon during OSWALD's time and came from Texas. According to DELGADO, OSBORNE would discuss Texas with anyone at any time. Although OSWALD said that he came from Texas, he was not friendly with OSBORNE.

DELGADO could not recall the names of the two Negro Marines who went to Tijuana, Mexico, with himself and OSWALD. However, both were assigned to the Motor Pool while at the Santa Ana Base and he believes that one of them might have been a PFC WATTS. He did recall one of these Marines made another trip later to Tijuana, Mexico, along with PFC RUSSELL but without OSWALD. ROUSSEL

DELGADO advised it was common knowledge among the Marines at the base that he, DELGADO, spoke Spanish and it was also fairly well known he was on record as saying he could teach Spanish to anyone really interested in learning Spanish in a short time. Therefore, many Marines were always asking him to give them certain phrases in Spanish, but OSWALD was one who asked him to teach him the language completely.

DELGADO stated shortly after he started to help OSWALD with Spanish it became apparent he was a good student. OSWALD secured a Spanish dictionary and studied all the time. DELGADO recalled they started to write Spanish phrases on note paper while working in "the silent" area. It was his opinion several hours each day were devoted to OSWALD's Spanish lessons so that in a short time he was able to speak and understand Spanish excellently. DELGADO noted he was not able to teach OSWALD to write Spanish because he himself was not able to write the language very well.

When the conversation got around to OSWALD wanting to help the Cubans and other South Americans, DELGADO remembered using this as a method to make sure he understood the language. DELGADO pointed out that if he were ever going

to go to Cuba, he should know Spanish because he would not be able to get along in that country without it.

DELGADO never heard the subject speak or see him read a German paper or magazine. However, OSWALD used phrases that sounded like "Yiddish" to him. DELGADO later learned that these were German phrases and it was from this that he thought OSWALD spoke and understood German.

DELGADO stated his close relationship with OSWALD during this period was due to the fact that not only did he, DELGADO, feel that CASTRO was the right thing for Cuba, but also TRUJILLO must be removed from the Dominican Republic. These feelings were shared by both and therefore during one of these discussions, most of it by short phrases on the scratch papers in the Radar Section, DELGADO wrote down he himself would write to the Cuban Embassy, Washington, D.C., if he felt as sincerely as OSWALD about helping. Since the United States was supporting CASTRO at this time, DELGADO thought that this was the best thing to do.

He was surprised about four or five days later when OSWALD told him he had received a letter from the Cuban Consulate in Los Angeles, and from then on OSWALD received a letter or some sort of correspondence about once a week. It was not until several weeks later that DELGADO saw some of these letters. He had asked OSWALD for the loan of a tie and OSWALD told him it was in his locker. DELGADO recalled when he went to get the tie, he noticed the letters from the Cuban Consulate together with Russian newspapers and other mimeographed material which he assumed came from the Cuban Consulate. OSWALD was then going to Los Angeles about every two weeks and after one of these visits told DELGADO he had been at the Cuban Consulate. It was from this statement that DELGADO assumed that these weekly trips were to visit the Cuban Consulate in Los Angeles.

DELGADO advised he never thought OSWALD was a threat to the security of the United States nor did he think he was violating any security regulations of the United States Marine Corps. As a matter of fact he did report OSWALD was receiving a Russian language newspaper to Lieutenant DE PADRO, but he did not know what came of this. He noted DE PADRO is now residing in Coral Gables, Florida.

DELGADO declared any Marine assigned to the Santa Ana Base from December, 1958, to about June, 1959, should be able to verify the fact he and OSWALD were friendly. In addition, Sergeant LUSK, the Sergeant Major of the company, made the remark when he was disciplining DELGADO, that he was getting to be just like OSWALD who always did everything backwards.

PFC DAVID MURRAY was assigned to the same section with DELGADO and OSWALD and knew them both. DELGADO started to teach MURRAY Spanish while both were still in school at Biloxi, Mississippi, and he continued to teach him Spanish while they were at the Santa Ana Base. He believed MURRAY should know that DELGADO taught OSWALD Spanish although he never heard MURRAY and OSWALD speak this language to each other.

Lieutenant Colonel TOGDAHL was the Commanding Officer of the Base at the time both OSWALD and DELGADO were stationed at Santa Ana. TOGDAHL was the kind of commanding officer who liked to know each Marine by his first name. DELGADO felt he should know of the association between himself and OSWALD.

DELGADO advised that on one or more occasions he and OSWALD discussed extradition treaties and DELGADO mentioned if he ever did anything wrong he would go to Argentina because he thought they would not extradite anyone. However, OSWALD said he should remember the two men who had recently defected to Russia. They had gone to Mexico, then to Cuba and on to Russia, according to OSWALD, and he would go the same way. At the time the newspapers did have the stories about this incident.

Toward the end of May, 1959, during their discussions they started to talk about the Dominican Republic. DELGADO stated he really felt something should be done to remove TRUJILLO. OSWALD must have thought he meant he wanted to do something personally and made some suggestions that both of them go to Cuba, become officers in CASTRO's army, and then go to the Dominican Republic and help bring freedom to this area. About this time because the newspapers were publishing stories about the shooting of one of CASTRO's corporals by CASTRO's men, DELGADO became disillusioned about CASTRO. It

also became apparent to DELGADO that OSWALD was talking more and more as though he intended to do some of the things he talked about. Therefore, the situation started to get "uncomfortable" for him with OSWALD and he asked Sergeant FUNK for a transfer to another Barracks.

This is to advise that the results of the examination in the FBI Laboratory of the bullet recovered from the home of General Edwin A. Walker were furnished to the Dallas Police Department but the information furnished by Marina Oswald implicating Lee Harvey Oswald with the attempted killing of Walker was not disseminated by the FBI to either the Dallas Police Department or General Walker.

The information furnished by Marina Oswald to Agents of the Dallas Office on 12-3-63, was to the effect that Lee Harvey Oswald admitted to her that he had tried to kill General Walker by shooting him with a rifle on 4-10-63. This prior similar act was considered to be of considerable significance in connection with our over-all investigation into the assassination of President Kennedy. The information was incorporated into the FBI report which was disseminated to the President and the President's Commission. In view of the confidential nature of our investigation concerning the President's assassination and since the attempted shooting had no current bearing on Walker's safety as Oswald was already dead, the information was not disseminated to Walker or the Dallas Police Department.

Immediately following the attempted shooting of Walker in April, 1963, the Dallas Office discussed the case with the Dallas Police Department and volunteered to forward the bullet to the FBI Laboratory for examination, but no request for such examination was ever made. During the course of our investigation into the assassination of President Kennedy, and prior to the interview of Mrs. Oswald on 12-3-63, when she indicated her husband may have been responsible for the attempted shooting of Walker, the possibility was considered that Oswald may have fired at Walker since the attempted murder took place in Dallas with the use of a rifle. The Dallas Office, therefore, during the weekend of 11-30-63, requested the Dallas Police Department to make available the bullet found in the Walker home in order that it could be examined in the FBI Laboratory. This was done, and on 12-2-63, the bullet was forwarded to the FBI Laboratory where it was examined.

and the results were promptly furnished to the Dallas Police Department as well as the President's Commission. This examination revealed that while the bullet was distorted and mutilated it did have the general characteristics of bullets fired from the rifle used by Oswald in the assassination of President Kennedy. It was not possible to definitely determine whether or not the bullet recovered in Walker's home was fired from Oswald's rifle.

ADDENDUM, 1/9/64, AHB:csh:

We have considered whether we should now advise Walker and the Dallas Police of our information developed concerning Oswald's attempt to kill Walker. Oswald, of course, is dead and no longer poses any threat to Walker. We have told Walker's attorney that we will inform Walker of any threat to his safety coming to our attention and that the results of our investigation of Oswald have been furnished to the President's Commission.

We have reported the results of our Laboratory examination of the Walker bullet to the Dallas Police Department, and the police are aware of Mrs. Oswald's story that her husband attempted to kill Walker, as this has been widely publicized.

We think our position is best if we stick to the fact that we have furnished all information we developed to the President's Commission. In the event the Director concurs, this is the position we will continue to take.

The letter was turned over to the Dallas Office by the Secret Service on 12-20-63, and the Bureau was advised of the translation of this letter by airtel dated 12-20-63 in captioned matter.

The English translation of this letter done by SA ANATOLE A. BOGUSLAV is as follows:

"Dear Marina:

"I would like to know as to where you decided to live. Perhaps we will see each other in New York, Washington or Philadelphia."

"It seems that the article will not appear in the Look magazine. People there decided that

Pursuant to Bureau instructions and referenced tel, this envelope and letter are being forwarded to the Laboratory for appropriate examination.

It will be noted the penciled writing on the envelope "Letter in Russian" was not written by RUTH PAINE, but rather by someone at the Secret Service Office in Dallas.

An examination of the Dallas file in captioned matter reflects the only known pieces of correspondence between Mrs. RUTH PAINE and MARINA OSWALD in addition to enclosed letter, were the letters referred to by the Bureau in referenced tel, namely, the PAINE letters to MARINA OSWALD dated 5-16, 7-21, 7-14 and 8-24-63, all of which were written in the Russian language, and photos of which are in the possession of the Dallas Office. These letters are among other materials and evidence previously personally taken by SA WARREN C. de BRUEYS from Dallas to the Bureau, and which are being maintained by the Laboratory at this time.

The English-translation of the PAINE letter to MARINA OSWALD on 5-16-63 and the translation of enclosed letter will appear in the next report written by the Dallas Office.

The attached memorandum was prepared in response to the Director's instructions: "Give to Rankin summary on Mark Lane, N. Y. lawyer who has been retained by Mrs. Oswald to represent Oswald before Warren Commission. H"

Lane's name is included in the Reserve Index of the New York Office. From 1953 to 1961 he was a member of, held positions in, attended functions of, or otherwise associated with the National Lawyers Guild, cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) as a communist front.

Lane has spoken at affairs of Burning Issues, a youth organization now affiliated with Advance, a similar organization which follows the line of the national Communist Party (CP) leadership. Burning Issues was also active in backing Lane's political campaign for congress, in which he was unsuccessful.

His public utterances have praised Cuba and condemned the United States. He has also been active in organizations whose aims are the abolition of the HCUA and many of his speeches have urged such abolition.

He received CP support in 1962 in his effort to become elected to congress. In November, 1961, Lane and Benjamin J. Davis CP National Secretary, were principal speakers at a meeting at Columbia University protesting the school's ban against campus speaking engagements by communists. He was arrested and convicted as a "Freedom Rider" in Jackson, Mississippi, on June 8, 1961, and on April 2, 1962, he was fined \$415 in New York City as a "scofflaw" for having ignored numerous traffic tickets he had received. Summary

News broadcasts on January 15, 1964, stated that Mark Lane, New York attorney, has been retained by Lee Harvey Oswald's mother to represent Oswald before the committee appointed by President Lyndon B. Johnson to investigate the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

The "Daily Worker" for May 27, 1953, stated that the National Lawyers Guild (NLG) held an election of officers on May 20, 1953, and that Mark Lane was elected an ex officio member of the Board of Directors of the NLG.

The "Daily Worker" was an east coast communist newspaper which is no longer being published.

In June, 1953, a source whose reliability was unknown but who was in a position to furnish such information advised that Lane's name appeared on the membership list of the New York Chapter of the NLG and that he was a subscriber to the "Lawyers Guild Review," the official publication of the NLG. On May 17, 1961, Lane spoke at a membership meeting of the organization, according to another source.

A report of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) has described the NLG as the foremost legal bulwark of the Communist Party (CP).

A source has also advised that Lane participated in a debate at a forum sponsored by Burning Issues on September 12, 1961.

During March and April, 1962, Burning Issues circulated petitions and otherwise endeavored to have Mark Lane drafted as a candidate for Congress. According to a source on October 12, 1962, Lane was the principal speaker at a forum on mobilization for youth which was held by Burning Issues.

Confidential sources have advised that Advance, an Organization of Progressive Youth, was founded in New York City, February 13 and 14, 1960, and that its declaration of principles followed the line of the national CP leadership. In January, 1963, the name of the organization was changed to Advance and Burning Issues Youth Organizations, since Burning Issues, a separate youth organization, had affiliated with Advance.

A source reported that Mark Lane was the principal speaker at the annual ceremonies of the Emma Lazarus Federation of Jewish Women's Clubs (ELF) at the Statue of Liberty on July 25, 1961.

The ELF is recognized by the Communist Party, USA, as an important progressive organization of women. It grew out of the Jewish Peoples Fraternal Order of the International Workers Order (IWO), both of which have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Lane spoke at a meeting of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) on October 21, 1962, in New York City, according to several sources. He strongly supported Cuba and condemned United States policy with regard to Cuba.

The ECLC has been described by the ECUA as operating as a communist front.

Several sources reported that Lane was one of the main speakers at a meeting sponsored by the Chicago Committee to Defend the Bill of Rights (CCDBR) in Chicago, Illinois, on October 21, 1962, and he called for the abolition of the ECUA.

A source has reported that the CCDBR was organized in Chicago, Illinois, on October 26, 1960, through the efforts and with the encouragement of CP officials, one of whom became the executive secretary of the CCDBR. Its avowed purpose is to seek the abolition of the ECUA.

It was also reported that Mark Lane was a speaker at rallies held on April 21, 1961, and December 6, 1961, sponsored by the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAHUAC).

"The Militant" for December 12, 1961, carried an article concerning the rally on December 6, 1961, and stated that Lane said his first official action during the coming session of the New York State Legislature would be to introduce a resolution to persuade Congress to abolish the HCUA.

"The Militant" is a weekly newspaper of the Socialist Workers Party which has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Lane was reported by several sources to have attended numerous meetings of the NYCAUAAAC between October, 1962, and January, 1963. At a number of them he made speeches in which he strongly urged the abolition of the HCUA. The NYCAUAAAC is an affiliate of the National Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee and both were founded principally by an individual who was a CP member in 1952. Various sources have advised that CP members in the New York City area have been solicited on various occasions to support the NYCAUAAAC. Three sources have reported that during the Spring of 1962 discussions were held at various closed CP club and committee meetings concerning the support of Mark Lane as a candidate for Congress.

Several sources have also advised that Isidore Gibby Needleman was in frequent touch with Lane and was interested in assisting him in his political campaign in 1960 to become elected to the New York State Legislature.

According to several sources Needleman, an attorney, was formerly employed by Amtorg Trading Corporation, the registered Russian trade agency in the United States. He has also represented current and former CP members in court and before various Congressional committees. He has had custody of CP funds and has described himself as a strict adherent of Marxist-Leninist doctrines. He has also acted as a Soviet espionage agent.

It was reported that a rally was held November 6, 1961, at the McMillan Theater, Columbia University, New York City, to protest the ban by the University against the

appearance of several previously scheduled communist speakers. According to the source, Benjamin J. Davis, National Secretary of the CP, and Mark Lane were principal speakers at the rally.

"The New York Times" for June 9, 1961, late city edition, on page 31 carried an article concerning the arrest and conviction of Mark Lane on June 8, 1961, at Jackson, Mississippi, as a member of one of two groups of "Freedom Riders" who had been apprehended in that city.

The same newspaper in its edition for April 3, 1962, carried an article on page 4 concerning Mark Lane's having been fined \$415 on April 2, 1962, in New York City as a "scofflaw," for ignoring numerous traffic tickets.

Mark Lane's defense brief for Lee Harvey Oswald appeared on pages 5, 8 and 9 of the December 19, 1963, issue of the "National Guardian," which has been cited by the LCRA as having manifested itself as a virtual official propaganda arm of Soviet Russia.

During an applicant investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in connection with the possible employment of an individual by an agency of the Federal Government, it was determined that the Office of the District Attorney, Queens County, New York, had conducted an investigation of Mark Lane in 1962 for alleged

Reference is made to your inquiry concerning the status of our investigation of Lloyd John Wilson, the 18-year-old youth who on December 19, 1963, at Chicago, Illinois, alleged that during the last week of August, 1963, or the first day or two in September, 1963, he met Lee Harvey Oswald at a wrestling match at the Cow Palace in San Francisco, on which occasion he gave Oswald \$1,000 to assassinate the President.

In response to your request, there is enclosed one copy each of reports concerning Wilson dated December 27, 1963, at Seattle, Washington, January 7, 1964, at Chicago, Illinois, and January 18, 1964, at San Francisco, California. There is also enclosed a copy of a memorandum dated December 26, 1963, prepared at El Paso, Texas.

Lloyd John Wilson first came to our attention as the result of an anonymous telephone call to our San Francisco Office on September 9, 1963, as set forth in the enclosed San Francisco report. The allegation concerning Wilson's threatening letter to President John F. Kennedy was furnished to the United States Secret Service, San Francisco, California, on September 9, 1963. Subsequently, we received a name check request from the United States Air Force and all information in our possession concerning Wilson as of December 4, 1963, was furnished to the Air Force on that date.

While Wilson alleged that he met Oswald during a wrestling match held at the San Francisco Cow Palace during the last week of August or the first two days of September, 1963, inquiry in San Francisco has revealed that the only wrestling matches at the Cow Palace during August and September, 1963, were held on August 10, and September 14, 1963. On August 10, 1963, Oswald was in the custody of the New Orleans Police Department and on that date he was interviewed in New Orleans at his request by Agents of this Bureau.

While we are unable to definitely place Oswald on September 14, 1963, our investigation of his activities in the New Orleans area has established that he filed claims with the New Orleans Division of Employment Security on September 3, 10 and 17, 1963. In addition, we have learned that books of the New Orleans Public Library were charged against Oswald's library card on September 9, 1963. Our inquiry has further shown that Oswald was seen in New Orleans by his landlord, Mr. Jesse James Garner, on September 16, 1963. Oswald obtained his Mexican tourist card in New Orleans on September 17, 1963. No information has been developed in our investigation of Oswald to indicate that he left the New Orleans area between late April, 1963, and late September, 1963, except for one overnight trip with his wife to the Jesuit House of Studies at Mobile, Alabama. From our findings concerning the schedule of wrestling matches at the Cow Palace at San Francisco during August and September, 1963, it would not have been possible for Wilson to have met with Oswald on the date he alleged.

On January 3, 1964, the local charge filed against Wilson at Chicago, Illinois, was dismissed in favor of Federal charges filed by the United States Secret Service, and on January 3, 1964, Wilson was held by United States Commissioner C. S. Bentley Pike in default of \$25,000 bond. We have been advised that in a report of the Psychiatric Institute of the Municipal Court of Chicago, Wilson was diagnosed as "delusional, hostile, and potentially homicidal." In addition, Wilson was diagnosed as possessing a "paranoid condition, maybe true paranoid."

On January 17, 1964, Wilson appeared in United States District Court, Chicago, Illinois, before Judge Abraham L. Marovitz, on which occasion Judge Marovitz ordered Wilson to be hospitalized at the United

States Medical Center, Springfield, Missouri, for a period of fifteen days or as much additional time thereafter as necessary to complete a psychiatric examination. We are following the disposition of the case involving Wilson in Chicago, and you will be advised in this regard.
