Enclosed for your office and Resident Agency, Laredo, are copies of FM-11 Forms received from Legat, Mexico City, dealing with entries at Nuevo Laredo 9-26 and departures therefrom 10-3-63. Also enclosed is copy Legat, Mexico City, letter 2-20-64... Copies of the FM-11 Forms will be furnished to the Commission. Answers to the following questions dealing with the FM-11 records are to be included in LMM being prepared by your office.

The forms covering entrics show that 106 people entered Nuevo Laredo 9-26-63 instead of the 90 which you previously reported as a complete list. Add in LHM the 16 additional people on FM-11, and determine why only 90 individuals were previously reported to you by Mexicans as entering on 9-26-63. Note the lines at various points on enclosures. For example, before entries 368 and 400 on the FM-11 recording entrance of persons holding FM-5 permits. Who drew these lines and what is significance of them? How can we tell from FM-11 that the records relate to entrances on 9-26 and departures on 10-3-63 as it appears in most instances in column 16 that the entries there relate to date and place of issuance of tourist permit rather than date of arrival and departure. Obtain interpretation of various entries in column 16.

Re entry concerning Oswald's arrival and departure why do entries in column Id show date 9-16-63 when Oswald in fact obtained his tourist permit at New Orleans 9-17-63 as the permit Tolson Fra 1:28 Belmost . shows. Did clerks making these entries both misread Oswald's tourist card or did Solalinde, in entering 9-16-63 date, consult with previous entry concerning his arrival? How do we know that Solalinde made the entry on FM-11 concerning Oswald's departure? As apparent that names on FM-11 are arranged thereon in alphabetical order by date, why was Oswald's name on departure list not in alphabetical order and why does it appear as "Harvey Oswald Lee," when tourist card shows name as "Lee, Harvey Oswald?"

Obtain interpretation of the single-letter entries in columns 4 and 7 and the "if.cc." entries in column 13. Endeavor to match enclosures with records at Nuevo Laredo and note any discrepancies. If there are none, so state. Determine when the entries are made on the FM-11. Is this done on daily basis or at end of 15-day period? Bureau notes that the FM-11 form is a record of those individuals entering and leaving Mexico who travel on FM-5 and FM-3 tourist permits. Are there any other records relating to arrivals or departures of individuals traveling on other documents?

Legat, Mexico City, 2-20-64 letter states the information on FM-11 is taken almost entirely from tourist card. From what source in addition to tourist permit is the information obtained that appears on FM-11?

Your 12-4-63 report states that FM-8 tourist permits are valid for six months and that FM-5 permits are valid for 15 days. Is this correct? Note Oswald had FM-8 which was valid for 15 days.

NOTE: Commission inquired re highly inadequate Mexican immigration records and SA is in process of trying to unravel them. In order to do complete job, we will have to resolve questions herein which relat to FM-11 records.

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

#### ОФОРМЛЕНИЕ ПРАЗДНИЧНЫХ БЛЮД

Каждой хозяйке хочется, чтобы ее праздничный стол выглядел нарядно. Сервировка стола во многом зависит от умения и вкуса хозяйки.

Самое лучшее украшение стола — умело приготовленные кушанья. Постарайтесь сделать их не только вкусными, но и привлекательными на вид. Начнем с такой распространенной закуски, как сельдь. Очищенную и нарезанную селедку укладывают на селедочницу или тарелку так, чтобы она нмела вид целой рыбы. К голове селедки можно приделать «усики» из зеленого или ренчатого лука, а вокруг разложить ломтики вареного картофеля, свеклы, огурцов.

Хорошие украшения для многих кушаний получаются из еливочного масла. Проще всего сделать из него «гвоздички». Для этого возьмите
не очень твердый брикет масла и, придерживая левой рукой его нижнюю
часть, завернутую в бумагу, ножом, который вы держите в правой руке,
поскребите 12—15 раз верх брикета по направлению к себе. На ноже
образуется веерообразная масса. Снимите ее с ножа и соедините концы
винзу. Края готовой «гвоздички» слегка посыпьте красным перцем.

При помощи чайной ложки, которую время от времени следует опускать в горячую волу, можно сделать из масла «ромашку» или «розочку». Придайте маслу форму уссченного конусв, затем начните делать «лепестки»: вдавите ложку в середину конуса и, наклонив ее от центра к себе, рывком выпьте из масла. Овальная поверхность ложки придает маслу форму лепестка. Чтобы получить «розочку», в промежутках между лепестками первого ряда, но чуть ниже, делайте второй и трегий ряды. Цветами из масла хорошо украсить икру, паштет и другие купанья.

Для украшения винегрета подходят вырезанные из вареной моркови или свеклы звездочки, кружочки и красиво уложенные ломтики овощей. 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



The Director has requested further analysis of the operations of SA Heary M. Wade while Wade was serving in the Eureau's Special Intelligence Service (SIS) in Educador. The requested information is set forth herein.

SA Wade entered on duty on December 4, 1939, and resigned September 1, 1943, to enter the Armed Forces. On June 1, 1942, he was placed on leave without pay after completing five weeks of Sisterining. He left New Orleans, Louisiana, on August 3, 1942, and Arrived in Chito, Ecuador, on August 16, 1942. He was in an underdover capacity as an employee of Transradio Press Service Incorporated, 521 Fifth Avenue, New York City. He was assigned Sist Number 345 and used the ode name "James" in signing communications. Within Ecuador, he was referred to as Confidential Informant Number 6. He left Ecuador 5/2/43.

As an undercover man, Wade was not directly associated with the Legal Attache's Office in Quito but did submit his vouchers and reports through that office. He was also given a post office box in New York City through which he could communicate directly with the Eureau. While in training he received Spanish lessons, a course in coding and secret inks, and definite instructions regarding proparation of his expense vouchers.

Nade submitted vouchers twice monthly through the Legal Attache who reviewed and forwarded them to Eureau. They were then checked and approved and a check was transmitted to the SIS Office in New York City for Wade's account. The monetary unit in Ecuador is a sucre which was, during Wade's tenure, 7.3 cents or \$7.30 per hundred.

File review shows Wade operated under a system of controls requiring him to furnish complete data identifying informants used and payments hade. It was policy to insist that receipts be obtained whenever possible. In the few instances where informants refuged to sign acceipts, Buccau was furnished all other data and record was still adde of payment and informant who received same.

Wade handled a total of 11 informants. One was never paid. Two others accepted no money and one of these was taken to dinner on four occasions at total cost of \$27.08 with each expenditure identified and fully described in Wade's vouchers. The other was given a radio which cost \$43.80 and this item was clearly described in Wade's voucher and supported by the radio dealer's receipt.

Wade's vouchers clearly identified each expenditure as to informant paid and amount. Wade paid a total of \$1438.21 to his other eight informants and furnished full data on each payment in his vouchers. He separately provided summary data on all informants he was using, amounts being paid, and evaluation of services.

Regarding receipts, five of the eight paid informants were the most productive and these five received a total of \$1284.94 in 52 separate payments. Each of these payments was supported by a receipt from the informant and we have these in file.

Of the three remaining informants, two were paid only once by Wade and each received 100 sucres (\$7.30) but gave no receipts. The third received four payments from Wade, totaling \$182.50, and gave no receipts. However, the payments to all three of these informants were fully identified in vouchers submitted by Wade. There is attached a listing of Bureau fends spent by Wade on informants.

Wade, on July 6, 1942, received an advance from the Bureau of \$1075.00. This was for subsistence and travel in connection with his assignment and also provided him some money for operations. His passage from New Orleans to Guayanuil, Ecuador, cost over \$500. Wade was required to make full restitution of this advance and repaid \$402.47 immediately after arriving in Ecuador. The balance was repaid in three installments during June, 1943, after his return to this country. Wade also received per diem at \$7.00 per day until February 1, 1943, when this was discontinued.

Copies of Wade's vouchers and receipts received from informants have been prepared and are available for delivery to the Commission if such action is desired.

OBSERVATIONS: Our records show that Wade was operating under a control system and adhered to it by advising the Bureau of payments made and informants being paid, supported by receipts in nearly


every instance. Nevertheless, the emergency wartime conditions prevalent at the time did not permit the tight supervision of SIS informant operations which we now have. SIS men were necessarily developing and paying informants on the spot without prior Bureau approval, reporting such payments after they were made. We can say from records that if Wade did use and pay any other informants, contrary to instructions given him, they were not paid from Eureau funds and the transactions were never reported to the Bureau.

ACTION:

For information. There is, of course, no further proof available that payments were actually made to the informants listed by Wade in his vouchers, particularly those from whom receipts were not obtained. It is conceivable that even the receipts could have been forged and represent fictitious payments. However, we have absolutely no basis for questioning the honesty of Wade in his handling of these SIS informants.

Our attached memorandum, 2/3/64, details the Special Intelligence Service (SIS) operations of former SA Henry Made, particularly his handling of informants. With regard to the \$1,075 advance received by Wade before going to Ecuador, the Director has asked whether there was an accounting for this money. The Director also asked to see the copies of Wade's vouchers and of receipts received from informants by Wade. This is to provide the requested information.

With regard to the \$1,075 advance to Wade on 7/6/42 before he left for Ecuador, this money was completely accounted for by Wade and was paid back to the Bureau in four installments. Wade's voucher for July, 1942, listed his expenditure for passage from New Orleans to Ecuador. Accordingly, when this voucher was paid, on 9/4/42, \$402.47 was withheld to be deducted from his advance account. The balance of \$672.53 was paid? back to the Bureau by Wade in three installments during June, 1943, after his return to this country. Two installments, totaling \$587.48, represented money which would have been paid to Wade for vouchers submitted by him covering his legitimate expenditures during the last month he was in Ecuador and included \$307.55 for his air travel from Quito to Washington. Instead, this money was credited to the advance fund of Wade. The remaini \$85.05 was repaid to the Bureau on June 4, 1943, by deducting this amount from money due Wade on an expense voucher for the period 5/15-31/43 after he was back in the United States. Therefore, the total amount advanced to Wade was completely accounted for and repaid to the Bureau in the form of deductions by the Bureau from money due him on his vouchers which itemized expenditures in detail. A copy of the Bureau's ledger sheet on Wade's advance account is attached.

Copies of the vouchers submitted by Wade while in Ecuador and the receipts he received from informants there are attached. In a few instances, we even have receipts from sub-informants who assisted Wadels informants but were not paid directly by Wade. As mentioned earlier, Wade had SIS #345 and, within Ecuador; was referred to as Confidential Informant #6. He also used the code name "James." REC- 38

Due to the bulk of this material, other receipts received from Wade for office supplies, Spanish lessons, typewriter repairs, et cetera, are not included.

If this data is furnished to the President's Commission, it may become public information. In such an event, the informants who signed the receipts may be questioned by their government in Ecuador, as Wade was in Ecuador on a clandestine basis. It is also possible, although we have not checked, that some of these informants were turned over to CIA when the FBI left Ecuador.

Honorable J. Lee Rankin, General Counsel of the President's Commission on the assassination of President Rennedy, called and stated these matters in regard to tirs. Marina Cawald and James Herbert Martin, et cetera, are developing very rapidly and the Eureau has been very good about getting reports to the Commission. He stated the thing he wanted to ask me about seemed to be goinething he felt he ought to take up with me directly. Be stated the problem is that Marina Cawald is now living at the Ford's and presumably the Commission is going to want her back one of these days and he, Rankin, presumed I knew about the Nixon matter, too, because I had written them about it. Mr. Hankin stated he would hate to have her just run out on us, which is always a possibility, particularly down in Dallas, and he was wondering about a stake out on her which would watch her and see who is visiting her for a while. Mr. Eankin stated he lated to recommend it or urge it in view of the expense involved. I asked him how long he would anticipate it remaining on, and Mr. Bankin stated he thought it would be according to my judgment.

I told Mr. Bankin that we plan to interview her today, that we had wanted to do so last week but the lawyer for Hobert Oswald was up here in Washington and asked us before he left Dallas if we would postpone any interview with Airs. Marina Cawald until he got back from the hearing up here in Washington as she was exhausted. I stated I would surmise that he would be back there this morning as I thought Robert Oswald linished up with the Commission last Friday. I stated we will want to interview Nobert, too, as we are interested in the Nixon angle that developed and also

that we planned to conduct the interview of her today if she is available and also of Robert Cawald II he is available. Mr. Bankin stated they asked Robert Oswald why he did not tell them about it and he said he felt the Commission would probably know about that, but in all his answers were generally very good.

I stated the thing in the Nixon matter which does not exactly ring sound with me is knowing the background of Leo Harvey opwald and his makeup temperamentally, et ectera, how the wife would be able to lock him in a bathroom all day without his kicking the door down because he gave evidence of having a violent temper. Mr. Rankin connented also that he had beat her up on occasion. I Stated that is the only angle of that story which did not seem to hold water. I stated she never mentioned it to us at any time nor did Robert Oswall mention it to us and that is why we wanted to quostion her again because we have not talked to her since she appeared before the Commission and, of course, Robert Oswald was here in Washington. I stated it is a fact that Richard Rizon was in Dallas nometime in 1963, and Mr. Rankin stated it was November 21st, the day before the assassination. I stated Mixon was invited to receive some award and had to cancel out and he not down to Dallas just the day before the assassination and the question is, was it at that particular time, as inrs. Oswald's story purports, that she locked Lee Oswald in the bathroom. I stated that did not make sense to me.

I stated we can, of course, stake out the place where Marina Oswald is now living and find out who is going in and out to see her at this new place, but my question is, approximately how long does her. Mankin anticipate waiting. Mr. Hankin stated he would leave that to my judgment. I stated I would think if we can interview her today, if the new lawyer allows us to do so and we have no objection if he wants to be present even, and also Hobert Oswald, that as soon as we finish those two interviews and get the facts and unless there are some other angles, that particular angle will then be pretty well bottled up and we could get the information to the Commission certainly by the middle of this week. Mr. Rankin stated that would be very helpful as they have hartin coming voluntarily before the Commission on Thursday so if he could get that information before that, it would be helpful. I stated we can do that and in the meantime we can put the surveillance on Marina Cawald.

Mr. Hankin continued that in Martin's letter he says he has sold various interests such as TV rights to Tex-Italia Film (phonetic) and her memoirs to a magazine of Hamburg, Germany, and he has sold the picture rights, et cetera. Mr. Fankin stated that while working on this, he would like me to keep an eye on this thing to see whether it looks at all like this possibly with any idea of trying to get rid of Martin and Thorns. I stated that was within the realm of possibility. Iar. Bankin stated it looks like Marina Oswald was pretty quick to do that, but on the other hand, Robert Oswald, from the reports, is pretty straight laced and Mr. Rankin thought if she did not want to get rid of them, he would not have tolerated this. Mr. Pankin stated he thought maybe she got in with Cawald over in Russia that way and maybe other things have happened over here, as tir. Eankin stated it looks like from our reports it is possible something went on before they came up to Washington although the Secret Service did not think there was any opportunity, but he was certainly looking at her any chance he had. I stated there was plenty of opportunity here in Wachington, as according to the Secret Service, Martin and she stayed up to view television until the early hours in the morning and the Secret Service man was in the corridor, so what went on in the room nobody knows. I stated my reaction to this business about locking Lee Cswald in the bathroom is that there is something fishy here because she just would not be able to do this because he had beat her up on occasion, was nacty to her, had a bad disposition, and could have gotten out by breaking the window or kicking the door down and she would have been perfectly helplass and, further, she left out what he did then, as I don't think he would have taken it calmly. I stated it is a fact Nixon was there the day before the assausination and it will be a consational story because he is a former Vice President and very anticommunist and Ceneral Walker is anticommunist and then the President of the United states was there. I stated it is such a thing that you could enlarge on it and have some sensational stories, just like the story of Dorothy Kilgallen about the FBI furnishing assistance to Ruby, that upon reading the article, you could see it does not support the headline, but you have down there in Dallas these "bleeding hearts" and "sobsisters" like Killgallen, who will blow everything up as much as they can. I commented I had also wondered where Life Magazine got that photograph of Lee Oswald with the guns, but I understand they got it from the Dallas Police Department. I stated my first knowledge of it was when my attention was called to it by the Hearst people who had an
