XIII. RULES FOR REGISTRATION OF RESERVISTS

1. A reservist should:

(a) Secure military registration at his place of residence: in a city - at a military commissariat; in a rural locality, as well as in a city which does not have military commissariat - at the military registration section of the local Council of Workers' Deputies;

(b) Carefully preserve his Draft Registration Certificate and always have it on his person.

2. Draft Registration Certificate can be surrendered on a written receipt:

(a) Upon arrival at the military unit for training - at the headquarters of the unit;

(b) On demand of a military commissariat, military registration section, court or investigative organs;

(c) In cities - to a house management for registration (at the same time as the passport is surrendered for registration) and for removal from registration. No one else has the right to take away one's Draft Registration Certificate, except organs and persons indicated above.

3. In changing of a permanent residence (or temporarily, for a period over one month and a half, and for over three months for travel on official business, study, or medical treatment) a reservist should:

(a) Upon arrival in a city or district of another military commissariat in the same city, surrender to the house management, together with passport, his Draft Registration Certificate, for completion of military registration;

(b) At departure from the city or to a territory of another military commissariat in the same city, surrender to the house management, together with passport, his Draft Registration Certificate for removal from military registration;

(c) Upon arrival at a rural locality, personally appear within three days at a village (or settlement) council, for military registration;

(d) At departure from a rural locality to another locality or territory of another village council of the same district, personally appear at a village (or settlement) council for removal from registration.

4. Upon receiving his Draft Registration Certificate at a military commissariat, after discharge from military service into reserves, or after being attached to the reserves after passing through a regular draft, the reservist must register not later than three days after his arrival at the place of residence chosen by him.

5. During temporary departures for periods of less than one month and a half, and for a period up to three months for travel on official business, for study, or medical treatment, a reservist should inform the registration organ where he is registered regarding this.

6. In changing of the surname or name, educational qualifications, party membership, position, place of work or residence, a reservist should appear in five days at the military registration organ where he is registered with his Draft Registration Certificate and documents confirming these changes.

7. On suffering injury or serious illness, disabling for work, reservist should submit a declaration to a military commissariat at the place of residence for an appointment for (physical) re-examination.

8. In all cases of summons from the military commissariat, or military registration section, reservist should appear punctually at the specified time, with his Draft Registration Certificate and passport, and in addition, a Party or Komsomol card if member or candidate of the CPSU or the Komsomol.

9. Reservist is subject to a fine up to 100 rubles for a loss of his Draft Registration Certificate by reason of carelessness (Decree of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR, of July 30, 1940).

10. For a violation of the rules of registration, reservists are subject to a fine in an administrative order up to 50 rubles. A repetition of the violation of the rules results in a correctional labor sentence up to one month or a fine up to 200 rubles, imposed by a court order (Decree of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR, of July 30, 1940).

RICHARD EDWARD KENDRICK

By letter dated February 20, 1964 Greig V. Richardson, Warden of the Federal Correctional Institution, Lompoc, California, advised Mr. Leon I. Gopadoze, U. S. Secret Service, Los Angeles, that Kendrick had written a letter to President Johnson in which Kendrick stated that he could give testimony regarding the assassination of President Kennedy. The letter was intercepted by prison authorities and was never sent to President Johnson.

Richard Edward Kendrick, Number 4119-1C, was interviewed at the Federal Correctional Institution, Lompoc, California, where he is confined and on February 22, 1964 Kendrick furnished the following information to Special Agents of the FBI:

He was born at Stockton, California on May 9, 1946. In October, 1960, while residing at 3215 Larkdale Place, San Diego, California, he joined the Nazi Party of the United States. He was recruited by one Jose Pagua who also resided on Larkdale Place in San Diego, and was about 25 years of age, and did not work except in recruiting persons for the Nazi Party. He paid a \$10.00 membership fee, and was given a membership card which was signed by Pagua, but he does not know the present whereabouts of the card. MS

In 1956 or 1957, he resided with his mother and former step-father, Captain Harold Louis Kendrick, United States Marine Corps, in a house provided for the Captain of the Guard at Camp Pendleton, California, where his step-father was stationed. While living at Camp Pendleton he would hang around the barracks and became acquainted with a Marine Corps member named Harvey Oswald, who he believes to be identical with the Oswald accused of killing the late

President John F. Kennedy, because Oswald mentioned in a conversation in 1956 or 1957, that he had a good friend in Dallas, Texas, named Jack Rubinstein. He later came in contact with Oswald at the Marine Corps Recruiting Depot at San Diego, California, in 1960, at which time he introduced Oswald to the Nazi and Communist ways of life. When it was pointed out to Kendrick that he was only 14 years of age in 1960, he stated that the actual fact that he introduced Oswald to Jose Pagua, who in turn introduced Oswald to the Nazi and Communist way of life. He continued that the aim and purpose of the Nazi Party is to overthrow the government of the United States, and that the Nazi Party and the Communist Party are working together in this regard, and that many persons belong to both organizations since both have the same goal.

Kendrick continued as follows:

There are between 130 and 140 members of the Nazi Party confined at the Federal Correctional Institution, Lompoc, California, at the present time. Kendrick holds the rank of Colonel in the Nazi Party, but a Lieutenant Colonel confined at the Federal Correctional Institution actually has more authority because he is in charge of the major project of the Nazi party at the prison, that of working on a moon and space exploration plan, and materials for the project are being obtained from the United States Government and from Oak Ridge, Tennessee. There are 60 members of the Communist Party confined at the Federal Correctional Institution. He does not wish to name any of the members of the Nazi Party or Communist Party who he knows to be confined at the prison.

He was arrested at San Diego, California, in October, 1960, on a charge of burglary, and was in custody at the Juvenile Hall, San Diego, and in the custody of the California Youth Authority until June 27, 1961, when he was released on parole. On July 16, 1961, he was picked up in Stockton, California, for hit and run driving, and his parole was revoked, and he was returned to the custody of the California Youth Authority, and remained in custody continuously until

April 21, 1963, when he was again released on parole, and went to live with his new step-father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Pastorino, 2658 West Princeton Avenue, Stockton, California. On or about May 11, 1963, he received a letter from Jose Pagua from Reno, Nevada, requesting that he come to Reno about an important matter, and stating that Tom Mc Beth, who had been a schoolmate of Kendrick at San Diego, would meet Kendrick at the bus station in Reno. He does not know how Pagua knew he was no longer in custody, or how Pagua obtained his address in Stockton. Pagua did not tell him when to come to Reno, but he assumed that Pagua wanted him to come right away, and left Stockton by Bus within 40 minutes after receiving the letter from Pagua. He left Stockton about 10:00 A.M. and arrived at Reno about 5:20 P.M. on the same day. He met Tom Mc Beth at the Bus Depot, who was driving a 1950 Ford bearing California license plates. Mc Beth drove him to Hotel Nevada in Reno, and told him to register under an alias. Kendrick registered as John Green, 32nd and 16th Avenues, Naval Aviaonics Facilities, Indianapolis, Indiana, and was given room number 6. At about 10:00 P.M. on the same date, Mc Beth came to the room, and asked if it was all right to bring Jose Pagua to the room, and upon obtaining Kendrick's permission, brought Pagua and another man who was introduced as Doctor Joseph Manele, to Kendrick's room. Pagua asked Kendrick if he needed some money, and Kendrick replied that he did, whereupon Pagua gave him \$5000.00 in \$10.00 and \$20.00 bills, which was contained in a shoe box. Pagua told Kendrick to buy two of the best rifles he could find with 12 power scopes on them, and that he would return the following night to see what Kendrick had purchased, and that if Kendrick tried to run off with the money he would not get out of Reno alive. Pagua and Doctor Manele left the room, and Mc Beth remained. Kendrick counted the money and found that it was exactly \$5000.00. Mc Beth stated he had another person to introduce to Kendrick and left and brought back a man who he introduced as Ronald Kelly Brown, age 18, who was staying in Room Number 9 at Hotel Nevada. *copy*

On the following day, Kendrick and Ronald Kelly Brown, went to a Sporting Goods Store which carried guns and was located one block North of Virginia Street on the left hand side of the street facing North, just across the street from the railroad tracks. He gave Brown some money and Brown purchased two M-1, 30 caliber semi-automatic carbines

at a cost of \$79.95 each, by showing his Selective Service card for identification. At the same time Kendrick purchased two .44 caliber Rueger Magnum single shot Hawkeye pistols, at \$124.00 each, by claiming he was 18 years of age, and getting Brown to vouch for him. They took the weapons back to his hotel room, and at about 8:00 p.m. on the same date Tom Mc Bride, Jose Pagua, and Doctor Joseph Manele came to his room, and Kendrick showed Pagua the guns, and gave him the receipts. He tried to give Pagua the money he had left, but Pagua told him to keep the money. Pagua stated he had a little job if anyone was interested; that he wanted to start a revolt in the United States by shooting the President, and that the Nazi Party could then take over the country. Kendrick asked who had been picked out for the job, and Pagua stated he had picked Harvey Oswald and Jack Rubinstein. Kendrick asked Pagua whether Oswald and Rubinstein were members of the Nazi Party, and Pagua stated that they were members. Pagua then asked Kendrick to pick out a spot where it would be easy to get close to the President while touring, either in Idaho or Washington, D.C. Pagua asked Kendrick if he would go ahead with the job of shooting the President if Oswald and Rubinstein backed out, and Kendrick asked how much he would get for the job. Pagua said that Kendrick would get an initial payment of \$15,000.00, and that after Kendrick had picked out a spot for the assassination attempt, he could write to Pagua at Room 15, Hotel Nevada, Reno, Nevada, and tell him where they should meet to discuss the plans. Pagua told Kendrick to buy a used car since it would arouse suspicion if a person as young as Kendrick paid cash for a new car.

On the following evening Kendrick and Ronald Kelly Brown went to a back room at the Palace Club in Reno and lost \$3500.00 gambling, same being a part of the money which Pagua had given Kendrick. Since Kendrick only had about \$1,200.00 left, he and Brown decided to steal a car instead of buying one, and consequently stole a 1963 Ford Station Wagon from a used car lot in Reno, and started toward Stockton, since Kendrick wanted to pick up some clothes before starting out to look for a spot to shoot the President. Near Quincy, California, they were stopped by a Sheriff because the stolen car was smoking, but he did not see the two rifles which were hidden under a mattress in the back seat, or the pistols, since one was in the

glove compartment, and the other was on the front seat under a paper sack. They explained to the Sheriff they had put the wrong kind of oil in the car, and the Sheriff said he would radio ahead to the next town in order that the police could escort them to a garage when they arrived in the town, rather than stopping them. They were afraid that the police might find the guns and the money, and therefore hid the two rifles and two pistols in a ravine in the mountains about 200 yards from the highway, and buried the money in a strong box under an old tree, at a depth of four feet, by using a shovel they found in the stolen station wagon. Kendrick knows the place where the money is buried but will not reveal the location, and he believes that Brown may have already been released from jail and obtained the money from the hiding place. They also threw away a bowling ball, some bridles, and some horse medicine which they found in the stolen station wagon.

When Kendrick and Brown arrived in Crescent Mills, California, they were stopped by the police and arrested for the theft of the stolen station wagon in which they were traveling, since the police said they had just received information requesting that they be on the lookout for a station wagon stolen in Nevada.

While in jail at Susanville, California, and later while in jail at Quincy, California, he received letters from Jose Pagua, asking how he had come to be arrested and what had happened to their plan. The jailer in each instance allowed him to read the letter from Pagua but would not allow him to keep the letter.

Kendrick stated he has not seen or heard from Oswald since 1960. When it was pointed out to Kendrick that in his written statement he had indicated he had contact with Oswald in the Sacramento Jail and in the Susanville Jail by letter, he stated that he had made a mistake and should have indicated that it was Pagua with whom he had been in contact by letter while in jail.

Kendrick stated he does not believe that Oswald actually shot the President because he had received information that Oswald met with an accident some time ago while on his way to another country, and suffered a shoulder injury which prohibited Oswald from firing a shoulder weapon larger than 22 caliber. Further that he had an idea who actually shot the President, but that he did not intend to reveal the information because he did not want to involve the party who he had in mind.

Kendrick stated he did not know the actual details in regard to the shooting of the President. When it was pointed out to Kendrick that in his written statement he had stated that Oswald was not alone in the room, and that Ruby had received \$15,000.00, and that Ruby is a member of the Nazi Party, having been introduced to the Nazi Party by Oswald, Kendrick stated he had just written those things in order to get someone to come in to talk to him.

Kendrick stated that his motive in furnishing the above information was because he felt that Ruby should get the death penalty for killing an ex-Marine, and that he would not have cared had Ruby killed anyone other than an ex-Marine. He advised that he is very fond of the Marine Corps, but does not care for any of the other branches of the military service.

Kendrick stated that he believed that the government of the United States should be overthrown by the Nazi Party, since he felt that conditions would be much better if the Nazi Party was running the government.

Kendrick stated that he would not hesitate to kill the President of the United States, or any other person, if the price was right. Further that he felt that about \$25,000.00 would be a fair price for killing a person.

Kendrick advised that he considers himself an excellent shot with either a rifle or a pistol.

The following description of Richard Edward Kendrick was obtained at the time of interview of Kendrick on February 22, 1964, and from a review of the records of the Federal Correctional Institution, Lompoc, California, on the same date.

Warden Greig V. Richardson, Federal Correctional Institution (FCI), Lompoc, California, advised Special Agents of the FBI on February 22, 1964 that the files of the FCI reflect that Richard Edward Kendrick was sentenced on July 2, 1963, in the Northern Division of California, Northern District, Sacramento, California, to serve a minority term (three years, ten months, seven days) under the Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act, for the offense of interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle. Further that Kendrick has forfeited 28 days statutory good time and has had 14 days good time withheld, and at the present time his sentence is expected to expire on July 31, 1966. He informed that Kendrick was originally confined at the Englewood Federal Correctional Institution, Englewood, Colorado, on July 13, 1963, and was transferred to the Federal Correctional Institution, Lompoc, California, on January 29, 1964.

He informed that Kendrick was in the custody of the California Youth Authority from January 19, 1961, until June 27, 1961, and again from July 17, 1961, until April 20, 1963, and that Kendrick was arrested for his present offense on May 14, 1963, and has been in custody continuously since that time.

He stated that a pre-sentence report on Kendrick prepared by Donald L. Chamlee, United States Probation Officer, Sacramento, California, on June 28, 1963, states as follows: "While in the California Youth Authority Defendant received a psychiatric evaluation and he was described as a sociopathic personality, anti-social type. Psychological evaluations in February of 1961 found a person suffering from severely retarded emotional development. Defendant never had any success in adequately relating with an adult figure. There is marked confusion in his concept of who and what he is... Does not understand how to play a masculine role. Sexual roles were found to be very confused."

He stated that while Kendrick was confined at the Englewood Federal Correctional Institution seven days good time was withheld from Kendrick on September 10, 1963, for hiding out, and seven days good time was withheld on October 25, 1963, for

making derogatory remarks to an officer and admitting escape planning. Further that on January 24, 1964, Kendrick was sentenced to a forfeiture of 28 days of statutory good time for a stabbing assault on a fellow prisoner, and the investigation revealed that the assault was premeditated and was the first of several assaults planned by Kendrick and another prisoner. Further that upon interview Kendrick stated he was sorry that the victim of the stabbing was not killed, and that he and the other prisoner had made the assault on the victim for kicks.

He informed that a Disciplinary Report prepared on Kendrick by Correctional Officer A. Richardson, Englewood Federal Correctional Institution, reflects that at 7:10 P.M. on August 4, 1963, Richardson observed Kendrick in this room slashing his wrist with a razor blade, and that Kendrick released a tourniquet which was around his upper arm just as Richardson entered the room, causing blood to gush from the wound, and that upon being questioned Kendrick stated, "Why not cut myself, life is not worth living in this place." The report of the investigating Lieutenant reflects that Kendrick was treated by the medical staff for superficial cuts on his forearm, and after a long consoling session in which Kendrick stated that he had cut himself just to see how much it would hurt, and that he had no intention of killing himself, Kendrick was sent back to his quarters. The report of the Adjustment Committee reflected that Kendrick was very depressed and admitted that he wanted to do away with himself. Further that Kendrick was referred to Doctor Wood, and no disciplinary action was recommended.

Warden Richardson stated that following careful review of Kendrick's file he is of the opinion that Kendrick is a sociopathic personality, who is emotionally unstable, and completely unreliable.

A review of referenced letterhead memorandum indicates appropriate consideration was not given to the fact that this memorandum would be disseminated to the President's Commission and Secret Service in view of the following obvious errors included therein:

Relet indicates in paragraph 3 complainant in this matter is Richard Edward Kendrick; however, paragraph 4 states interview conducted with Kindrick; Throughout letterhead memorandum various spellings such as Kindrick, Kendrick and Kenrick are utilized. It is presumed this is one and the same individual, as no information is set forth indicating otherwise.

Other misspellings such as "black" for "block," page 3, last paragraph, line 3, and "figute" for "figure," page 8, paragraph 3, line 9, are included.

Relet also fails to contain a reference and status is indicated as pending. It is presumed this status relates to the over-all investigation of captioned subject in your division rather than investigation of the complaint of Kendrick based on comments previously made in Los Angeles airtel 2/23/64.

Referenced memorandum also appears to ramble and is poorly phrased throughout. For example, page 1, paragraph 2, of referenced memorandum is not clear as to whether subject was interviewed once or twice; however, Los Angeles airtel 2/23/64 indicates only one interview. This should be clarified.

Page 2, last paragraph is rambling and disjointed, utilizing four "ands" in one sentence.

Inasmuch as Kendrick is a complainant rather than subject in this matter, it is preferable that the letterhead memorandum be captioned "Lee Harvey Oswald" rather than Richard Edward Kendrick. Also for your information and future guidance in preparing future memoranda expressly for dissemination to the President's Commission, the Bureau's property statement should be deleted.

While it is recognized that Kendrick's allegation is wild and unsupported and that Kendrick himself reportedly is mentally unstable, the President's Commission has expressed an interest in receiving all hoax-type allegations concerning this matter and communications prepared in this regard should be detailed, factual, clearly stated and prepared in such a manner that no embarrassment to the Bureau would result from public and/or official consumption of same. Documents submitted to the President's Commission may conceivably be made available to the public in the future and this should be kept in mind at all times.

In view of the above and noting re letterhead memorandum was already been disseminated to Secret Service locally, explanations should be obtained from responsible personnel and you should submit your recommendations concerning administrative action.

Immediately submit revised letterhead memorandum correcting wording and rephrasing where necessary. It is also suggested that documents be obtained from Warden, Federal Correctional Institute (FCI), Lompoc, California, and incorporated therein concerning allegations of Nazi and communist activity within FCI. Secret Service should be appropriately advised locally.

Dr. and Mrs. JOHN MC FARLAND, 7A Riversdale Road, Liverpool, England were contacted by Detective Inspector WILLIAM BESTALL of the Liverpool City Constabulary on February 12, 1964.

The MC FARLANDs viewed the photos of ALBERT OSBORNE and JOHN HOWARD BOWEN. They definitely identified the photo of OSBORNE taken October, 1963 as being identical with the man they previously described who sat next to OSWALD on the bus trip into Mexico on September 26, 27, 1963. They were not that positive in identifying the other photos, however.

Mrs. MC FARLAND stated that she remembered OSBORNE as speaking with a slight North England accent and when she questioned OSBORNE if he had ever been in England he replied in the negative, stating that his mother was English. She was led to believe by OSBORNE that he was an American citizen and had traveled in Mexico extensively as he appeared to know intimately the countryside they were passing through while on the bus trip from Nuevo Laredo to Mexico City.

Both the MC FARLANDs were specifically questioned as to whether they had any knowledge of previous trips OSWALD had made to Mexico and they replied they were under the impression OSWALD had never been to Mexico before because he appeared to be completely ignorant about the country and language.

The Hotel Cuba never came into their conversation with either OSWALD or OSBORNE. Mrs. MC FARLAND stated OSBORNE was carrying a haversack type bag containing canned food and she was under the impression he was returning to some sort of school or mission in Mexico and she believed it was at Cuernavaca.

On February 15, 1964 Detective Sergeant J. STANDISH, Grimsby Police, England, conducted investigation and interviewed relatives of ALBERT OSBORNE in the Grimsby area. The persons

interviewed were WALTER OSBORNE, who resides in an old people's home in Grimsby and is ALBERT OSBORNE's brother. The other individual interviewed was a Mrs. LILLIE FEATHERSTONE, sister to ALBERT OSBORNE who resided at Station Road, Greatcoates, Lincolnshire and is a rural district outside Grimsby. *OSBORNE*

Both WALTER OSBORNE and Mrs. FEATHERSTONE immediately identified all photos as being that of their brother, ALBERT. They stated that ALBERT was born in Grimsby and left England as a young man with a Lincolnshire Army regiment for Gibraltar and Bermuda. This was some time prior to World War I as by that time he was in Canada and studied for the ministry and served as a chaplain in the Canadian Army during the period 1914-1918. *Eng. Gibraltar*

They stated it was almost 40 years before ALBERT returned to England and that very little was actually known of his life. He corresponded infrequently with them and they have heard that he was married and had a son but have no idea of the present whereabouts of them. *Canada*

They did state however that for approximately the last five years they have used the address in corresponding with him as ALBERT OSBORNE, care of JOHN H. BOWEN, Box 308, Laredo, Texas and they continued to use that address until ALBERT suddenly appeared in Grimsby in early November 1963. According to WALTER OSBORNE, ALBERT traveled to Prestwick, Scotland in the company of a group of scientists who were going to Iceland to photograph a volcano which has emerged there from the ocean. It is not known whether he got off the plane in Prestwick before or after the expedition did the photographing in Iceland, however, he traveled over night by train from Prestwick and arrived early in the morning at Mrs. FEATHERSTONE's home. He remained there four or five days and left for London stating he was going on to Spain. *Spain*

Mrs. FEATHERSTONE then received a letter dated December 14, 1963 postmarked New York City, in which ALBERT stated he had arrived back in the United States at New York on December 5, 1963.

WALTER stated he heard from ALBERT by letter postmarked Mexico, January 8, 1963 in which ALBERT used the following return address: Emilio Corranza 4A, Texmelucan, Pue. Mexico. He said that he had destroyed the envelope so that it was not possible for Sergeant STANDISH to determine from where the letter had been sent.

Neither WALTER OSBORNE or Mrs. FEATHERSTONE were able to shed any light on the name JOHN H. BOWEN except that ALBERT had told them in the past to write to him care of that name in Laredo. They had never heard him mention BOWEN in any of his letters or in conversation with him.

Mrs. FEATHERSTONE advised, however, that she has a sister, a Mrs. ADA AMOS, who resides on Manchester Street, Gary, Indiana and it is the only other relative she has who resides in the United States. She added she does not think Mrs. AMOS and ALBERT have been in close contact over the years as Mrs. AMOS visited them in Grimsby a few years ago and at that time advised she had seen or heard very little from her brother, ALBERT, even though they were in the same country.
