

Lee Harvey Oswald

Although Oswald's means of transportation from Special Services office, 42 Franklin Street, to his hotel at 8th Avenue and 43rd Street, on June 13, 1962, and his return trip to 42 Franklin Street on the following day are unknown, it is to be noted that if he, his wife, and their four month infant child took a taxicab, the approximate fare each way would have been \$1.50. This estimate was furnished on April 10, 1964, by Max Weiss, heretofore mentioned. As indicated above, the Western Union office where Oswald received his \$200 is within walking distance from the Special Services office and in all probability, no transportation expenses were incurred in connection with this travel.

It appears from the Welfare file that Oswald left the Western Union office and proceeded to the West Side Air Terminal to obtain his airplane tickets. Since there is no information available regarding his means of transportation, it can only be assumed that if he travelled via taxi, the fare would have been \$1.50, according to Mr. Weiss.

The West Side Air Terminal is located at 10th Avenue and 42nd Street, and is within walking distance to the Times Square Hotel, 8th Avenue and 43rd Street, and in all probability Oswald incurred no expense in connection with this travel.

On April 9, 1964, Ethel Zilliken, Chief Ticket Agent, Delta Airlines, West Side Air Terminal, advised an SA of the FBI that their files reflect that on June 14, 1962, Oswald purchased two tickets totalling \$183.04 or \$91.52 for each ticket. She stated that there is no charge for an infant. She commented that Oswald's flight number was 821, and was scheduled to land at Love Field, Dallas, Texas.

On April 9, 1964, John Huber, Jr., Manager, Times Square Motor Hotel, 8th Avenue and 43rd Street, New York City, advised an SA of the FBI that their files reflect that L. Oswald registered at their hotel on June 13, 1962.

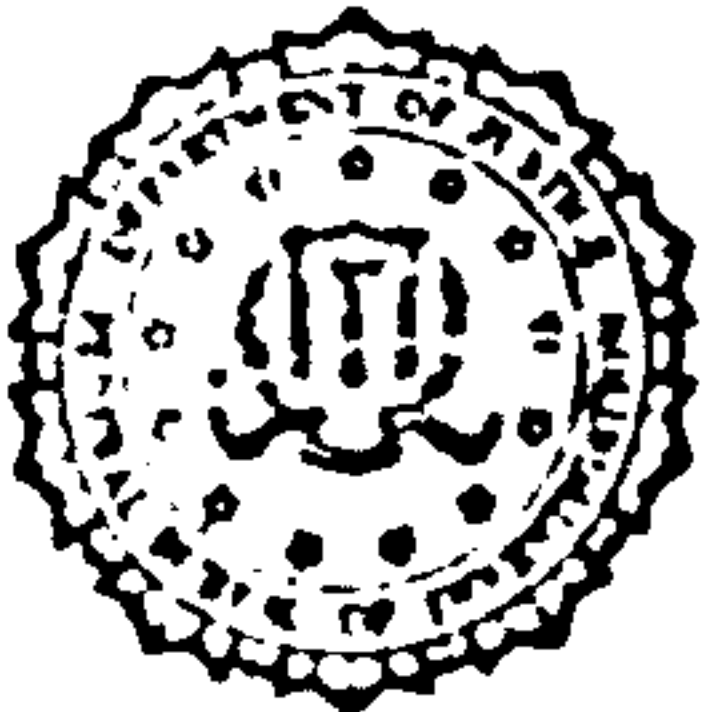

and checked out on June 14, 1962. He stated that Oswald's bill, totalling \$15.21, included \$10 for the room, \$.50 tax and \$4.71 for telephone calls. He stated that the telephone toll cards are destroyed after six months and the only information available regarding these calls is that one long distance call amounting to \$2.31 was placed on June 13, 1962, and one long distance call amounting to \$2.20 and one local call amounting to \$.20, were placed on June 14, 1962.

On April 10, 1964, Edward L. Braune, Security Supervisor, New York City Telephone Company, advised that their records pertaining to the period June, 1962, have been destroyed and there is no information available concerning these records.

The Welfare file indicates that Oswald left his hotel on June 14, 1962 and proceeded to the East Side Airlines (ESAL), First Avenue and 38th Street, New York City, via taxi. In connection with this taxi transportation, Mr. Weiss, previously mentioned, estimated that this fare would have been approximately \$.85. The file revealed that Oswald and his family apparently travelled from ESAL to Idlewild Airport via Carey bus.

On April 10, 1964, inquiry at Carey Transportation Company, ESAL, First Avenue and 38th Street, New York City, disclosed that the fare from ESAL to Idlewild Airport in June, 1962 would have been \$1.75 -per person with no charge for infants.

On April 8, 1964, James M. Josoff, Public Relations Director, Travellers Aid Society, 204 East 39th Street, New York, advised a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (SA of the FBI) that his records indicate that Oswald and his family were met at the pier in Hoboken, New Jersey, on June 13, 1962, by a representative from their office and transported to the Port Authority Terminal at 41st Street and 8th Avenue, New York City. He stated that this transportation was via Travellers company limousine and was free of charge. He stated their limousine service only operates between the Port Authority terminals and the piers and that is the reason why Oswald was not taken directly to the office of the New York City Department of Welfare. He advised that the record further indicates that their representative accompanied Oswald and his family from the Port Authority Terminal to the office of Special Services, New York City, and that they travelled via taxicab. He commented that inasmuch as Oswald's file does not contain a request for reimbursement for this taxi fare, he would assume that Oswald paid for the fare.

Mr. Josoff remarked that it would appear from the record that Oswald and his family stayed at the Times Square Motor Hotel, 8th Avenue and 43rd Street, New York City. He also remarked that since Oswald did have some money in his possession, any meals consumed during the period that he was in the company of the Travellers representative, Oswald would have paid for himself.

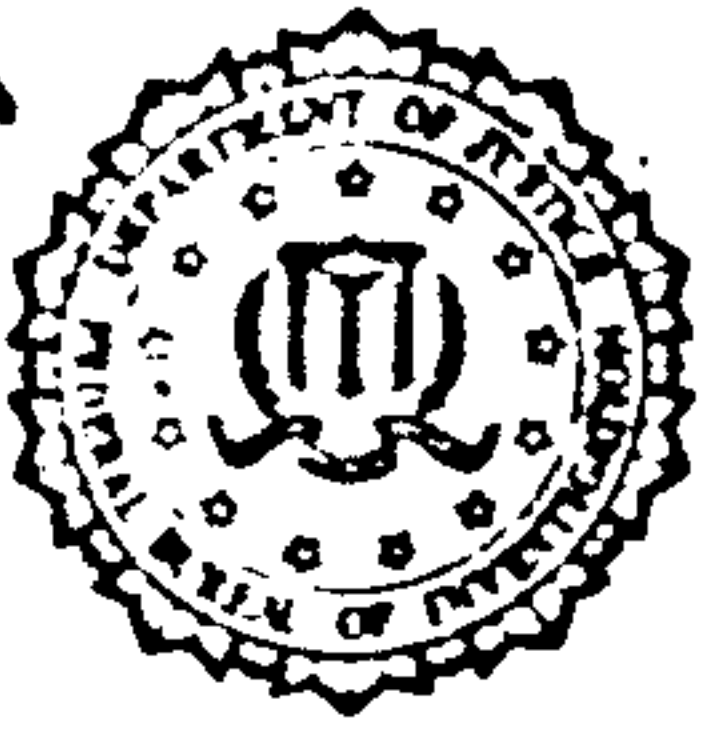

By letter dated April 3, 1964, the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY requested further additional investigation for the purpose of obtaining additional information concerning the expenditures of LEE HARVEY OSWALD during the period July, 1962 to October 3, 1963.

The President's Commission letter specifically requested information concerning the monthly rental charges for certain residences at Fort Worth and Dallas, Texas, as well as information concerning the utility payments at such residences.

On April 13, 1964, CHESTER ALLEN RIGGS, JR., 250 Carroll, Fort Worth, Texas, furnished the following information:

LEE OSWALD rented one side of a duplex at 2703 Mercedes Street, from about July, 1962 to October, 1962. RIGGS does not have old rental records to reflect exact date of occupancy. OSWALD paid \$59.50 a month for this duplex and always paid his rent in cash.

All the utilities at this address were in the name of RIGGS. OSWALD paid the water, gas and electric bills, in addition to his rental of \$59.50. The utility bills came to RIGGS and he, or one of his employees, would take them to OSWALD. Sometimes OSWALD would pay RIGGS, or one of his men, in cash for the utilities but, in most instances, OSWALD paid the utility bills direct to the companies in Fort Worth. RIGGS stated OSWALD did not have a telephone in this duplex.

The utilities averaged approximately \$12.00 a month for gas, water and electricity. RIGGS does not have any of the old records to reflect the exact figures on the utilities. He rented some similar-type apartments with utilities and he always charged

an extra \$12.00 a month to cover these bills. He had kept a record of the utilities on similar-type duplexes and they would average about \$12.00 per month.

On April 8, 1964, Mrs. ~~NANNIE M.~~ TOBIAS, 602 Elsbeth Street, Apartment 7, Dallas, Texas, furnished the following information:

LEE HARVEY OSWALD was required to make utility payments for electricity only during the time he resided at 604 Elsbeth Street, Apartment No. 2, Dallas, Texas, between November 3, 1962, and March 3, 1963. All other utility payments were included in the rental amount of \$68.00 per month.

Mrs. TOBIAS stated that electricity was furnished at this address by the Dallas Power and Light Company, Dallas, Texas.

On April 9, 1964, Mrs. ~~PAT~~ DOUGLAS, Personnel Section, Dallas Power and Light Company, 1506 Commerce Street, Dallas, Texas, advised that the records of this company reflect that Account No. 700-1-2780-2 indicates that this account number was assigned to LEE H. OSWALD, 604 Elsbeth Street, Apartment 2, Dallas, Texas. She furnished the following summary of transactions in this account:

Mrs. DOUGLAS advised that the records of the Dallas Power and Light Company disclose that no deposit was ever placed with this firm by LEE H. OSWALD.

The following investigation has previously been reported as set forth on pages 106, 109, 110 and 112, in the report of Special Agent ROBERT P. GEMBERLING, dated December 10, 1963, at Dallas, Texas. A summary of expenditures made by LEE HARVEY OSWALD for rent and utilities while residing at 214 West Neely Street, Dallas, Texas, as previously reported, is set forth as follows:

On April 8, 1964, JOE R. MC REE, Secretary, Young Men's Christian Association, 605 North Ervay, Dallas, Texas, advised that LEE HARVEY OSWALD paid a total of \$9.00 for room rent at the YMCA in Dallas for the period October 15, 1962 through October 19, 1962. OSWALD's room rent for this period was \$2.25 per day. MC REE advised OSWALD paid \$2.25 for a room he rented on October 3, 1963. He advised payment for all of the above was made in cash on a daily basis. MC REE said he had previously furnished information regarding OSWALD's room rental payments to an Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and had made Photostats of the receipts for October 15, 1962 - October 19, 1962, and sent them to the President's Commission staff in Dallas.

RE LEE HARVEY OSWALD

On April 9, 1964, H. G. WRIGGE, Assistant Postmaster, General Post Office, 400 North Ervay, Dallas, Texas, telephone number RI 9-3365, furnished the following information:

On October 9, 1962, LEE H. OSWALD rented Post Office Box 2915, General Post Office, 400 North Ervay, Dallas, Texas. On October 9, 1962, OSWALD paid three months' box rent of \$4.50. On December 24, 1962, OSWALD paid three months' box rent of \$4.50. On March 22, 1963, OSWALD paid three months' box rent of \$4.50.

On May 14, 1963, OSWALD gave up the Post Office Box and no refund was made, since the Post Office works on a quarterly basis, and less than three months were left on the box rental.

The application for the rental of Post Office Box 2915, Dallas, Texas, has previously been obtained and the handwriting appearing thereon identified as that of LEE HARVEY OSWALD, as set forth on pages 326-327, of the report of Special Agent ROBERT P. GEMBERLING, dated December 10, 1963, at Dallas, Texas. This Post Office Box Rental Application is identified as Federal Bureau of Investigation Laboratory Exhibit No. D-17, Q-34.

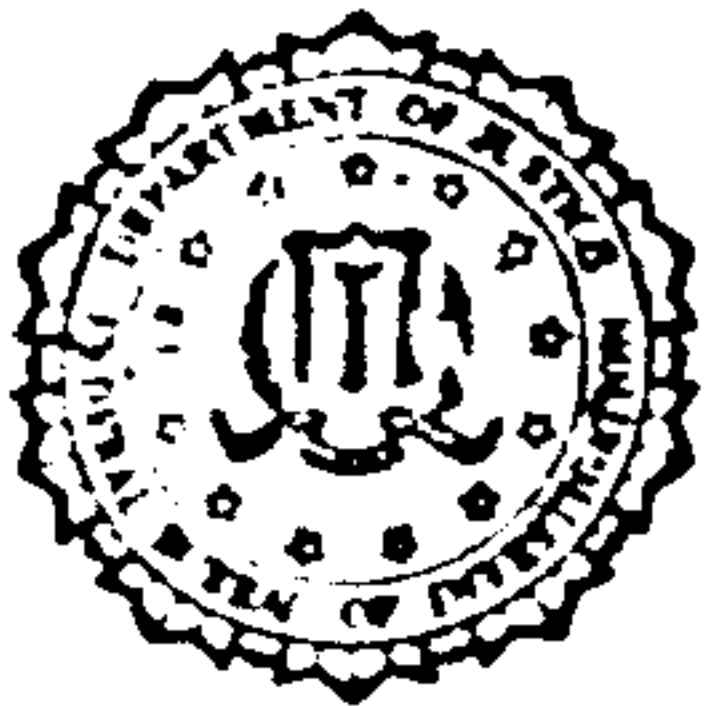

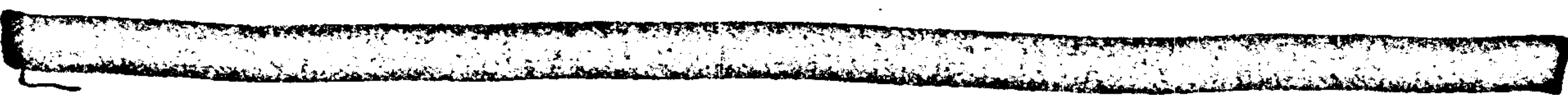

As a matter of record, the President's Commission returned to the Laboratory on 3/17/64, the FBI items set forth on the attached sheet (No. 1). In addition, Mr. Arnold Specter, a member of the Commission's staff, furnished the described materials on the attached sheets (Nos. 2 and 3). These materials are Commission Exhibits, some of which were not furnished the Commission by the Bureau, such as painted charts showing wounds, working papers associated with Naval Medical School Autopsy Report A63-272, schematic drawing from Armed Forces Institute of Pathology, and so forth. Mr. Specter stated that they were being furnished to the Bureau for reproduction. The delivery of the FBI items to the Commission has previously been appropriately confirmed by letter to the Commission.

On 3/18/64, Mr. Melvin Eisenberg, a member of the Commission's staff, telephonically advised that the reproduction of the Commission Exhibits (referred to above) was in reality a continuing request for photographs of Commission Exhibits as set forth in the attached copy of a letter dated 2/24/64, from the Commission. Mr. Eisenberg also added that the Commission would like to have the Laboratory maintain these Commission Exhibits with the other FBI items which have been made Commission Exhibits.

As noted above, much of this material has never before been in the custody of the Bureau. We have, of course, on a continuing basis been delivering to the Commission literally hundreds of items of evidence recovered by the Bureau in connection with our investigation of the assassination, the investigation of Lee Harvey Oswald and the murder of Officer J. D. Tippit and returning them to our custody when the Commission has finished with them. This involves not only the physical delivery of the evidence, but also a large amount of administrative detail necessary for the proper maintenance of material of this type which must be

maintained in keeping with our policy concerning evidence. This, of course, has been an expected part of our job concerning this case. Now, however, the Commission has asked us to take custody of a number of items of evidence which have come into its possession from various other sources, with the attendant responsibility of maintaining them as evidence. It is to be noted also that just the photography request of the current material alone, which is being handled by the Laboratory and the Photographic Unit of the Administrative Division will amount to well over 100 photographs. Since the Commission has expected us to take custody and to photograph all of the material in this instance, it will undoubtedly extend its request to any additional evidence that may come into its possession in the future. While the present volume of non-FBI items is not great, acceptance of the present items will establish the precedent.

RECOMMENDATION:

While this is not our primary function, rather than be accused of failure to cooperate, it would be preferable for us to handle this evidence for the Commission. Recently, we have asked the Commission to reconsider several of its requests which have appeared to be unnecessary and Mr. Rankin has gone along with us. For the record, then, we should comply with this request unless it becomes too burdensome. If it does become too burdensome, we can, of course, reconsider at that time.

Mr. Rosen's memorandum, 4/14/64, reported information furnished by Lee Rankin indicating that representatives of the Secret Service had said that Secret Service would have had Oswald under surveillance on 11/22/63 if they had been furnished information concerning him. As approved by the Director in Mr. Rosen's memorandum 4/15/64, Liaison supervisor Bartlett discussed this with Secret Service Chief Rowley today, 4/17/64, and Rowley was shocked and indignant. He said that only four Secret Service employees have appeared before the Commission to date, these all being men who were in the Presidential motorcade in Dallas and whose testimony was limited to description of the events surrounding the assassination. Rowley said that at no time was any question raised by the Commission concerning a possible surveillance nor was there any comment ever concerning this made by his men. He said that the only persons who could speak for Secret Service in this regard were himself and Special Agent in Charge Robert I. Bouck of the Protective Research Section. Bouck is to appear before the Commission on 4/23/64 for the first time and Rowley said he will thoroughly brief him in advance. Rowley stated flatly, in addition, that there would be no such statement made by Secret Service because there was no information indicating the possibility of physical violence on the part of Oswald and he would not, therefore, have been placed under surveillance. He further stated that had the Secret Service checked the building they would have taken no action concerning Oswald inasmuch as he was employed in the building.

Rankin also indicated to Malley that Secret Service had been asked what requests had been made of the FBI in writing for the type of information Secret Service desired to assist in protection of the President. Mr. Rowley said he had received no such request from the Commission. He added that to the best of his knowledge Secret Service has made no request of this type of FBI or any other agency because they have been interested in specific information relating to threats against the President and FBI and other agencies have been furnishing this type of data for many years. Nevertheless, to satisfy ourselves we have conducted an exhaustive search of our

Murphy gave SAC, Dallas, a letter advising that in 1/64 Chief Curry, Dallas Police Department, showed Murphy a memorandum on police department stationery from Lieutenant Jack Revill to either Captain Gannaway or Curry. The memorandum was approximately 3 or 4 brief paragraphs. Murphy stated there was no information in it that Oswald had in any way represented that Oswald had any dangerous tendencies or that he was in any way considered capable of assassinating the President. Murphy's letter is en route to the Bureau and we will examine it upon arrival; however, there is no clear indication this is the same memorandum the police department showed the Commission.

Investigation concerning subjects disclosed no connection between them and President Kennedy's assassination, and this memorandum recommends investigation concerning the subjects be closed.

At the time of President Kennedy's assassination, Marina Oswald, widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, resided at the Paine residence (at that time subjects were separated, but following assassination reconciliation was made and they are now residing together), and the President's Commission requested a full-scale background intelligence type report of subjects to include background data concerning their education, employment, relatives, associates, travel, and financial data.

This investigation disclosed that Michael Paine served in the U. S. Army and received honorable discharge. His military service record contains statement that on the date of his induction he refused to take oath of allegiance. His father and step-mother, who reside in Los Angeles, are on the Security Index of the Los Angeles Office because of their activities in the Johnson-Forest Group, an offshoot of the Socialist Workers Party. Michael has not associated with his father since he was four years of age, and their contact with one another has been extremely limited. Michael's grandfather, an 89-year-old retired minister, was subject of a previous investigation which disclosed his attendance, sponsorship, and financial contributions to numerous communist-front organizations. Reports concerning Michael's father, step-mother, and grandfather have been furnished to the Commission.

Ruth Paine is a Quaker and she has associated with persons active in attempting to promote improved relations between East and West. Her brother, Carl Dudley Hyde, was subject of a 1953 Conscientious Objector investigation. Her sister, Sylvia Hoke, was subject of a SGE investigation in 1956-1957, predicated on information that a phone call had been made to her residence from telephone listed to known CP member and that Sylvia Hoke's mother, Carol Hyde, had admitted to neighbors she was a communist. That investigation developed no substantial subversive information concerning Hoke and disclosed that Hoke's mother-in-law was associated in the publishing business with the CP member from whose residence telephone call was made to Hoke. Sylvia's mother, Carol Hyde, was characterized by persons interviewed as suffering from a mental disorder. Reports concerning Carl Dudley Hyde and Sylvia Hoke have also been furnished to the Commission.

Ruth Paine is employed as a housewife, and in interviews with her she has stated that her friendship with Marina Oswald was based on her desire to assist Marina and at same time afford Ruth Paine an opportunity to learn Russian language. No information has been developed to disprove this contention. Michael Paine is employed as an engineer, with a "Confidential" clearance at Bell Helicopter Company, Fort Worth, Texas, a key facility. The U. S. Army is the responsible security agency, and Navy and Air Force are interested agencies. Copies of our reports concerning subjects have been disseminated to those agencies as well as to Secret Service. Both subject^s have been interviewed on numerous occasions since the assassination and both have been cooperative. Michael Paine is the beneficiary of trust funds in excess of \$300,000 established by his relatives.

RECOMMENDATION:

Since our investigation has disclosed no subversive activities on the part of subjects, it is recommended that these cases be closed. Subjects do not warrant inclusion on the Security Index.

Attached for approval is letter to Rankin advising that our investigation has been completed and results furnished to the Commission.

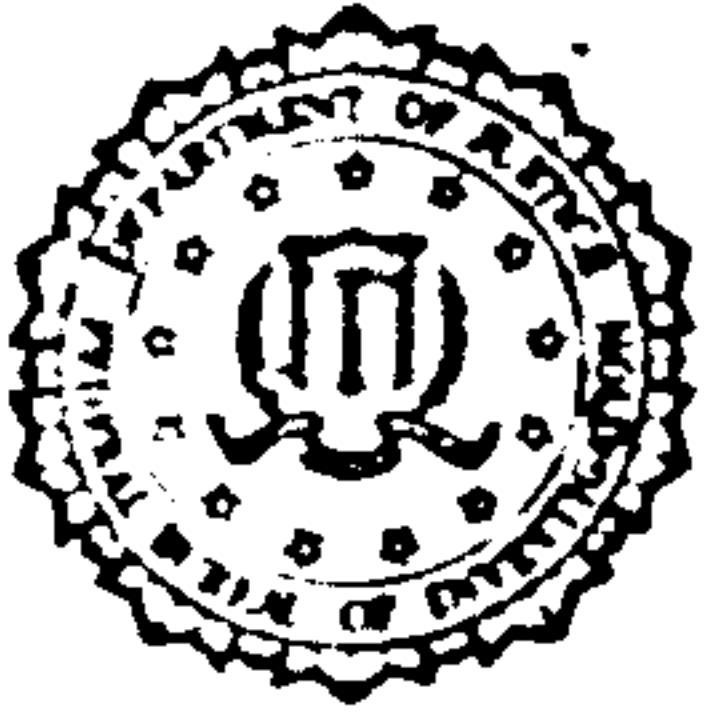

The following investigation was conducted in an effort to identify the visible laundry mark "30 030" in the collar of the gray cotton jacket of LEE HARVEY OSWALD which has been designated K-42, and in an effort to identify the visible dry cleaner tag "B9738" stapled inside this jacket:

All cleaners and laundries in the Dallas, Irving and Fort Worth, Texas, areas listed in the respective current telephone directories were contacted without identifying the laundry or cleaning establishment which had placed such laundry mark and/or dry cleaning tag in this jacket.

On April 1, 1964, / Captain A. C. JONES, Forgery Bureau, Dallas Police Department, Dallas, Texas, advised that there is no control file for visible laundry and dry cleaning marks in the Dallas area.

On April 2, 1964, / Mrs. GLADYS JOHNSON, landlady at 1026 North Beckley, Dallas, Texas, where OSWALD was residing immediately prior to the assassination, advised that she could not identify the laundry or cleaners used by LEE HARVEY OSWALD when he resided at her rooming house.

On April 6, 1964, BUELL WESLEY FRAZIER, an employee at the Texas School Book Depository Building, Dallas, Texas, with whom OSWALD rode to and from Irving Texas, on several occasions, advised he did not know of any laundry or dry cleaners used by LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

The following information was obtained from certain of the individuals contacted pertaining to the laundry mark and dry cleaner tag:

Re: LEE HARVEY OSWALD

On April 6, 1964, Mrs. WALTER SMITH, clerk, Swiss Cleaners, 200 West 6th Street, Irving, Texas, advised she formerly worked at Swiss Cleaners Number 2, 223 West 6th Street, Irving, Texas, which cleaners was closed on about December 1, 1963, and believes an individual using the name OSWALD did some business at this cleaning establishment. She was unable to recall any description of the individual and was unable to identify LEE HARVEY OSWALD as the individual using the name OSWALD.

On April 6, 1964, Mr. JOHN L. VOGEL, 210 West Irving Boulevard, Irving, Texas, made available the receipt books for October 1, 1963, through November 22, 1963, for Swiss Cleaners Number 2, formerly operating at 223 West 6th Street, Irving. A review of the receipt books failed to reflect anyone listed therein by the name of OSWALD.

On April 7, 1964, Mr. HARRY YOUNG, City Manager, Dallas Tailor and Laundry Supply, 502 Second Avenue, Dallas, Texas, advised he has been in the laundry supply business for over twenty years.

Upon viewing a photograph of the gray cotton jacket, K-42, he stated, in his opinion, the laundry mark in the collar of the jacket would be "030" and not "30 030". He feels the first "30" at best is a partial printing which did not take and the last "030" is the actual number.

Mr. YOUNG stated that the "030" was printed by a National Laundry Marking Machine, in view of the spacing, which is wider than the normal laundry marking machine. The National Machine is spaced slightly larger, since it uses an inked pad rather than a ribbon as do other machines. The extra spacing on the National Machine is necessary to keep the print from blotting when applied to clothing.

Mr. YOUNG stated the dry cleaning tag "B9738" was made by a Tag-O-Lectric Machine.

Re: LEE HARVEY OSWALD

In his opinion, the only way to identify the laundry mark and dry cleaning mark with a particular laundry or dry cleaning establishment would be to match the machine to the printing or characteristics peculiar to a particular machine. The machines are not widely used in the Dallas area and are used for the purpose of eliminating the use of the customer's name.

Mr. YOUNG also pointed out that the "030" could possibly have been printed by a Tag-O-Lectric Machine, as it can be employed to mark directly on the clothing.

On April 8, 1964, HARRY L. KRISS, President, Southern Cleaners and Laundry Supply Company, Inc., 150 Glass Street, Dallas, Texas, advised he has been in the laundry supply business in the Dallas area for thirty years.

Upon viewing a photograph of the gray cotton jacket, K-42, Mr. KRISS stated the laundry mark on the collar could have been made by a National Machine. The dry cleaning tag in the jacket, he stated, was no doubt made by a Tag-O-Lectric Machine. He advised that neither machine is widely used in the Dallas area, to his knowledge. He does recall selling a Tag-O-Lectric Machine to the BAKER brothers who operated the Irving Cleaners in Irving, Texas, several years ago.

He stated he would have no way of determining how many cleaners in the area did have Tag-O-Lectric Machines and knew of no way to obtain a list of such cleaners.

On April 8, 1964, Mrs. EDITH HANCOCK, Lasco Supply Company, Irving Boulevard, Dallas, Texas, advised that the Lasco Company deals in cleaner supplies but does not handle any type of marking machinery.

On April 8, 1964, RUTH SCOTT, Irving Cleaners, 116 South Jefferson, Irving, Texas, advised that the Tag-O-Lectric Laundry and Dry Cleaning Marking Machine has not been used for over four years. She stated this establishment now uses a hand-marking system which is faster and more efficient.

Re: LEE HARVEY OSWALD

Upon viewing the photograph of the gray cotton jacket, K-42, she advised that the laundry and dry cleaning marks are not familiar to her.

On April 8, 1964, Mrs. V. R. FORD, Ford's Cleaners, 2815 Carpenter Road, Irving, Texas, advised she has been in the cleaning business for thirty-six years in the Irving, Texas, area.

Upon viewing a photograph of the gray cotton jacket, K-42, she advised that no one in the laundry and cleaning business in the Irving area used marking equipment like the one used on the jacket.

On April 9, 1964, JIM WYATT, Assistant General Manager, Blue Ribbon Laundry and Dry Cleaning Service, 3826 Cedar Springs, Dallas, Texas, advised that his firm uses a Tag-O-Electric-type marking machine; however, no letters are used in their coding system, only numbers.

On April 10, 1964, HYMAN ZELAZNY, Executive Vice President, Dallas Tailor and Laundry Supply, 502 Second Avenue, Dallas, Texas, advised that the dry cleaning tag "B5728" on the gray jacket, K-42, is without a doubt the mark of a Tag-O-Electric Marking Machine since it uses a double offset stamping device which attaches to the fiber strip in the pocket.

The only nine machines of this type in Dallas, to Mr. ZELAZNY's knowledge, are located at the White Star Laundry and the Blue Ribbon Laundry. In Fort Worth, Texas, the only such machines, to his knowledge, are located at the Martin Laundry, S. Martin Laundry, Hill's Cleaners and Launderers, and Rodriguez Laundry.

He feels the "B" prefix on the white cotton fiber strip indicates a sub-station and, therefore, a large chain-type laundry operation. He feels it quite possibly is a large chain operation in Louisiana, such as the Chalmette Laundry.

Re: LEE HARVEY OSWALD

On April 1, 1964, MARINA OSWALD advised that to the best of her recollection LEE HARVEY OSWALD had only two jackets, one a heavy jacket, blue in color, and another light jacket, gray in color. She stated she believed OSWALD possessed both of these jackets in Russia and had purchased them in the United States prior to his departure for Russia. She stated she could not recall that OSWALD ever sent either of these jackets to any laundry or cleaner anywhere. She said she could recall washing them herself. She advised that to her knowledge OSWALD possessed both of these jackets at Dallas on November 22, 1963.

None of the other items of OSWALD's clothing available contained any dry cleaner's or laundry markings that were similar or could be associated with the "30 CFC" marking and the "B9738" dry cleaner tag appearing on the K-42 jacket.
