By letter dated April 30, 1964, the President's Commission pointed out that in connection with the statements of Mr. and Mrs. PLOYD G. DAVIS and others who claim to have observed LEE HARVEY OSWALD in the Sports Dome Gun Range, there appear references to a large man with a black beard. The President's Commission requested the results of investigation conducted to determine whether or not the man with the black beard was associated in any way with LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

On March 15, 1964, FLOYD DAVIS of the Sports Dome Gun Range, 8000 West Davis, Dallas, Texas, advised that he had sighted on that day or the previous day the bearded man who he had previously reported had in some way been associated with an individual believed by DAVIS to be OSWALD at the Sports Dome Gun Range. Mr. DAVIS stated that the bearded man was driving a 1961 or 1962 red and white Chevrolet Impala, bearing Texas License Number PW 2958.



#### LEE HARVEY OSWALD

The sources utilized in this memorandum have furnished reliable information in the past.

On April 23, 1964, MARK LANE, New York City Attorney, was the main speaker at a meeting held at the Student Union Building on The University of Texas campus, Austin, Texas, at 7:30 p.m. In addition to MARK LANE, MURRAY KEMPTON, a "New Republic" editor who was at The University of Texas as a visiting fellow, as well as FRED M, COHEN, Associate Professor of Law at The University of Texas School of Law, participated in a panel discussion and question-and-answer period for approximately two hours subsequent to LANE's approximately two-hour speech at the beginning of the meeting.

Concerning MARK LANE, the following is noted:

The "New York Herald Tribune" newspaper dated January 15, 1964, page 7, column 1, contained an article entitled "Oswald's Mother Hires Lane."
This article stated that on January 14, 1964, Mrs. Marguerite C. Oswald, mother of the accused assassin Lee Harvey Oswald, announced she had hired Mark Lane to represent her slain son before the Warren Commission investigating the murder of President John F. Kennedy. According to this article, Mrs. Oswald stated she had been in contact with Lane during his stay in Fort Worth, Texas, the previous week end. It also pointed out that Lane had accepted the case, although Mrs. Oswald stated she had no funds with which to pay him.

MA. 1. 1364

On June 10, 1963, a confidential source advised that at a meeting of the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAHUAC) (see appendix), held May 28, 1963, at 74 Fifth Avenue, New York City, Mark Lane was elected to the position of Vice-Chairman of the organization.

During LANE's discussion he stated that LEE HARVEY OSWALD was innocent of the murders of President JOHN F.
KENNEDY and Dallas policeman J. D. TIPPIT. LANE also stated that two or three other persons in a conspiracy shot President KENNEDY from a railway overpass as the limousine was driving away from the Texas Book Depository Building in Dallas, Texas.

LANE stated that the Parkland Hospital doctors first stated that the wound in front of President KENNEDY's throat came from the bullet's entry, but subsequently changed their story at the insistence of the Secret Service.

LANE was critical of the FBI, the Dallas Police Department, the Secret Service, the Warren Commission, which he described as a "Star Chamber" violating American principles and suppressing the truth to protect America's image.

LANE likewise criticized the American press for .. what he called "conditioning" the American public as to LEE HARVEY OSWALD's guilt and also failing to print the defense story. LANE likewise criticized Dallas District Attorney HENRY M. WADE for his activities during the days following the President's assassination when the television cameras of the nation were focused on Dallas, Texas. LANE stated that District Attorney WADE's action and statements prejudiced OSWALD's rights under the law.

LANE likewise stated that the City of Dallas had a far-right political atmosphere which was conducive to the murder of President KENNEDY and stated he knew of no other state in the United States where guns were so easy to buy and obtain.

#### LEE HARVEY OSWALD

At the time LANE was discussing the City of Dallas he was hissed by a large number of the approximately 350 students who were in attendance at the meeting.

At the conclusion of LANE's remarks, which lasted approximately two hours, Associate Professor FRED COHEN of The University of Texas Law School, called LANE's defense "eloquent."

MURRAY KEMPTON, a "New Republic" editor, also criticized the conduct of Dallas District Attorney HENRY WADE, but stated he could not agree with LANE that such people as the members of the Warren Commission or Governor John B. Connally would be a part of a conspiracy to keep the truth from the American people and also stated that he doubted LANE's version of the assassination.

Associate Professor COHEN did state that despite the bungling by the Dallas Police they did stumble on the right man when they captured OSWALD. COHEN also stated that he did not think that the FBI could silence the Parkland Hospital doctors and other men of good faith.

At one point during LANE's remarks, after he had been talking for approximately one and one-half hours, The University of Texas newspaper amusement editor on the "Daily Texan," HAYDEN FREEMAN, attempted to call a time limit on MARK LANE's speech, but was shouted down by the other students present.

#### APPENDIX

NEW YORK COUNCIL TO ABOLISH
THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES
COMMITTEE

On March 9, 1961, a source advised that the New York Council To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAUAC), 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York, was formed at a meeting held in New York City on November 17, 1960. This organization was founded principally through the efforts of FRANK WILKINSON, Field Representative of the National Committee To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

A second source advised on September 17, 1952, that FRANK WILKINSON was a Communist Party member as of September, 1952.

A third source furnished on September 14,1961, a copy of resolutions of the New York Council To Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAHUAC) which were adopted by the NYCAHUAC. One such resolution affirmed the intention to continue to work for the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) and to continue its efforts to broaden the participation in this fight. Another resolution accepted as a modus vivendi the suggestion of the Field Representative of the "National Committed to Abolish the HUAC" (NCAHUAC) namely that local abolition committees may identify and co-ordinate their efforts as closely as they desire with NCAHUAC, still maintaining their autonomy for as flexible and independent a program as possible.

Various sources have advised during March, 1962, that Communist Party (CP) members in the New York City area have been solicited to support activities of the NYCAHUAC during attendance at CP club meetings.

On May 6, 1963, the first source advised that the NYCAHUAC continues to function from its office at 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York.

#### LEE HARVEY OSWALD

Lee Harvey Oswald, traveling as H. O. Lee, is believed to have departed from Mexico City at 8:30 AM, October 2, 1963, on bus number 332 of the Transportes del Norte line, which arrived at Monterrey, Mexico, at 9:15 PM on the same date. At Monterrey, Oswald and passengers for Laredo transferred to bus number 373.

Manifest of bus number 332 shows the passenger in seat number 4, second window seat on the driver's side, was occupied by one Margaret A. Wolff, whose destination was listed as Laredo.

Records of the Passport Office, U. S. Department of State, Washington, D. C., reflect a passport application dated May 6, 1963, for a Margaret Wolff. She was born December 22, 1899, at Berlin, Germany, and resided at 1176 3/4 South Norton Avenue, Los Angeles 19, California. Her approximate date of departure was May, 1963. She intended to visit Germany to see her mother. Passport number D113012 was issued on May 10, 1963. She was a widow.

on May 7, 1964, Mrs. Margaret Clara Wolff, who resides at 1176 3/4 South Norton Avenue, Los Angeles, advised that she was born December 22, 1899, at Berlin, Germany. She and her husband, Frederick Wolff, who is now deceased, entered the United States for permanent residence in 1945. In May, 1963, she applied for and was issued U. S. Passport Dll3012 for travel to Germany. She departed the United States in the latter part of May, 1963, and traveled by air transportation to Berlin, Germany, where she visited her mother. She returned to the United States by Pan-American Airlines during the last week in October, 1963. She stated that she flew direct from Germany to London, England, and then non stop to Los Angeles. She stated that she has never been in Mexico and specifically stated that she was not a passenger on a bus traveling through Mexico in October, 1963.

SUBJECT: THE PRESIDENT'S COMMISSION

This morning the staif members of the President's Commission raised a question as to what information was contained in the Bureau's headquarters file on Oswald prior to the assassination, the purpose being to establish the extent of the Bureau's knowledge of Oswald prior to 11/22/63.

I checked the Bureau file over the weekend and it contains the investigative reports, together with newspaper clippings, communications to and from the field, et cetera, all of which pertinent information has already been furnished to the Commission. However, the file does reflect the identity of some of our confidential informants and makes mention of the Security Index program and the communist index and such matters that should not go on record outside of the Bureau.

In the discussion of this matter with Mr. Willens and Mr. Stern of the Commission staff, I pointed out that we, of course, --have no reservations concerning furnishing the contents of the file to the Commission for the purpose stated, but I doubted that the 1 Commission would want on record items of the confidential nature men- i tioned above. They stated that this same problem had been encountered with CIA and had been overcome by having the information paraphrased in such a form that it would not reveal these confidential items. It was suggested that we prepare a letter to the Commission, setting forth the individual items in the file up to the assassination, with a brief description as to each, and thereafter, in my presence, Mr. Stern and I go through the file, checking the items against the list, so that the Commission will be assured that the list we prepare will represent the contents of the file.

I have instructed that such a list be prepared, in the form of a letter to the Commission, and if the Director agrees we will go ahead and follow this procedure with the Commission, as it was suggested by them and appears perfectly satisfactory to them.
