Miss Cogar stated that she has never discussed the assassination of President Kennedy with her brother. She advised that she never did any work on the Oswald case and did not go to Dallas, Texas, and never told anyone she did.

She pointed out that her brother is seriously deaf and attended a special school because of this. She noted that he has had trouble obtaining and holding a job because of this deafness. She noted he was married in January, 1964, and now lives in an apartment with his wife in Clarksburg, West Virginia. She has never visited this apartment.

She stated as far as she knows her brother has never been to Texas. She stated that she has seen a .22 caliber rifle owned by her brother. She advised when she saw this rifle it did not have a telescopic sight.

She said her brother has no interest in Russia as far as she knows.

She was advised by Mr. Voelker not to discuss the interview with her brother or anyone else.

RECOMMENDATION:

By teletype dated June 12, 1964, Pittsburgh was instructed to reinterview Mrs. Yeager who allegedly heard Dana Cogar make statements indicating he had information about the Oswald case. Pittsburgh was also given instructions regarding the interview of Dana Cogar. When this investigation is reported by Pittsburgh, it will be disseminated to the President's Commission and since it contains this information about Cogar's sister, at that time the Commission will be advised of the interview with Lettie Jane Cogar.

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

The "Deutsche Nationalzeitung und Soldatenzeitung" (German National Newspaper and Soldiers' Newspaper) is a weekly newspaper published in the German language at Munich, Germany. The November 29, 1963, edition of this newspaper carried on its front page an article entitled, "Der merkwuerdige Fall Oswald" (The Strange Case of Oswald). No author for this article was shown. The article may be translated as follows:

"The murderer of Kennedy made an attempt on U. S. General Walker's life early in the summer when General Walker was sitting in his study. The bullet missed Walker's head only by inches. Oswald was seized. The following investigation, as it was reported, was stopped through the influence of the U. S. Attorney General, Robert Kennedy. If Oswald had been investigated, he eventually would have been imprisoned for many years, and so he would not have been in a position to commit the murder of Robert Kennedy's brother, John F. Kennedy."

Also on the front page of the November 29, 1963, issue there appeared as the main article what purported to be a transcript of two telephonic interviews 24 hours apart with General Edwin A. Walker. The text of this article was in question-and-answer form, and the newspaper reporter was referred to therein as Hasso Thorsten of the "Deutsche National Zeitung." The report of the interviews, which extended to page four of the issue, contained no reference to the attempt on Walker's life.

[Redacted] PSI, San Antonio Division,
Reynosa, Tamaulipas, Mexico, furnished the following information
to SA HAROLD H. CROSSETT on 6/16/64:

He located ERNESTO LIMA JUAREZ, a masonry contractor
in Reynosa. LIMA advised he was in Mexico City where he
stayed in Room 8, Hotel Del Comercio, for a few days in the
latter part of September, 1963, and possibly the first day
or two in October, 1963. He was in Mexico City on business
and was accompanied by FRANCISCO MORALES whom he was attempting
to aid in securing employment.

While at the hotel he noticed an American whom he
later recognized from news media photographs as LEE HARVEY
OSWALD. He did not associate with OSWALD, and as far as he
knows, MORALES did not associate with OSWALD. He pointed out
that at that time he had no reason to pay any particular attention
to OSWALD.

He also saw four Cubans at the hotel and saw OSWALD associating with these Cubans on one or two occasions, but these meetings appeared to be social in nature. He did not associate with the Cubans and did not learn their names or addresses; however, MORALES had some drinks with them on one or two occasions and might possibly have their names or other information pertaining to them. LIMA heard, probably from MORALES, that one of the Cubans was from the State of Florida, U.S.A. He described this individual as a white male, 55 to 56 years of age, 5 ft. 8 in. in height, slender build, fair complexion, and grey hair.

LIMA further advised that GABRIEL CONTRERAS V., a retired railroad man who resides at Primera de Mayo Number 1, Ciudad Camargo, Chihuahua, Mexico, was also staying at the Hotel Del Comercio and may have some information pertaining to the Cubans. CONTRERAS probably also saw OSWALD at the hotel.

Source continued, stating he had located a sister of FRANCISCO MORALES who advised that her brother went from Mexico City to Victoria, Tamaulipas, Mexico, in search of employment and from there, to Monterrey, Nuevo Leon, Mexico, where he is currently believed to be located. She had no address for him but expects to hear from him in the near future, at which time she will obtain an address where he can be located for interview.

The Bureau is requested to forward two copies of this airtel to Legat, Mexico, in order that GABRIEL CONTRERAS V., Primera de Mayo Number 1, Ciudad Camargo, Chihuahua, Mexico, may be interviewed and further, if not already done, efforts be made to identify the four Cubans seen at the Hotel Del Comercio by ERNESTO LIMA JUAREZ.

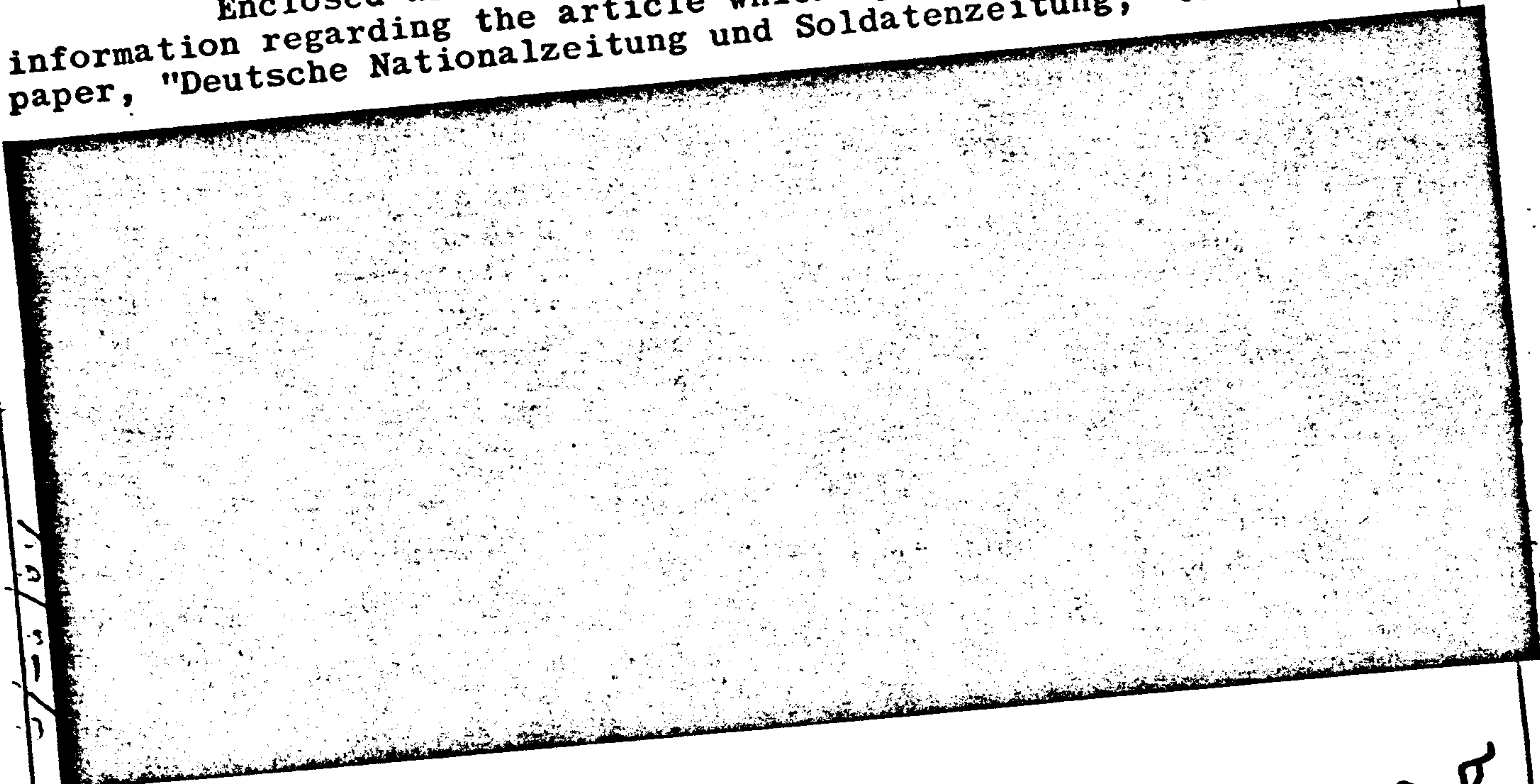

Kennedy's Death Did Not Come As A Surprise

Major Changes in the Offing

The United Nations Policies are Sinking Policies

Germany Will Play a Decisive Role

An exclusive interview of "National Zeitung" with U. S. General Walker.

After the first few days of world-wide shock over the Dallas crime, those who are left behind will have to take stock of the Kennedy policies and make allowances for the changes which are inevitable.

The Kennedy policies have been America's policies: rich in fiascos and altogether sterile in successes, unless, of course, one chooses to call a success the withdrawal of Russian rockets from Cuba in exchange for a deterioration of the military position in Europe.

It is not our aim to join the choir of opportunists. Instead, we want to give our readers an insight into the bare truth of the Kennedy policies which ran counter to the interests of our country - or of the world, as Kennedy wanted to have it.

The "National Zeitung" is the first newspaper in the world to be furnished with a firsthand report from the spokesman of the conservative opposition in the U. S. A., General Walker.

NZ: Hello, General Walker. It looks as though you are the man most in demand in America now.

Walker: Who ... Who is speaking? Are you calling from Louisiana or Dallas?

NZ: This is Hasso Thorsten of the Deutsche National Zeitung *. I am calling from Germany.

Walker: This is impossible How did you find out? I left Dallas ten hours ago. Nobody knows

NZ: General, you are staying at the Hotel Captain Shreve in Shreveport, Louisiana. Your room number is 701.

Walker: (laughing) Thorsten, tonight, at 10 o'clock, I am appearing on television, on "Meet the Press."

NZ: I give you my word that there are no television cameras hidden in your room, General. You can talk to your friends in your pajamas.

Walker: You are the first, Thorsten, I mean it but I must make sure. Give me your telephone number.

NZ: (furnishes the direct telephone connections with Munich and Hamburg)

Walker: (laughing) Okay! Let's have it.

NZ: The news of Kennedy's death had hardly jolted the world, when the usual choir started to yell that the slayer is an ultrarightist..

Walker: Nonsense. The murderer is a Marxist, a well-known communist, one of the countless leftists who has infiltrated our country.

NZ: Unexpected? A bolt from the blue sky?

*Translator's Note: It is noted that the newspaper is interchangeably referred to as "National Zeitung" and "Deutsche National Zeitung." It is described as a "soldiers' newspaper" and the contents of this issue (the interview with General Walker, an appeal to help the German-speaking population of South Tyrol, an article about Dr. Goebbels, a violent anticommunist in practically all items, etc.) would appear to indicate a publication of the extreme right. Curiously enough, the masthead of the newspaper is shown only partially, as though two-thirds has been cut off. Possibly it is a tacit reference to the present partition of Germany.

Walker: No. Kennedy's death did not come as a surprise, as is being claimed. Enough fuel had accumulated. It was only through the constant spreading of false reports that it had remained hidden.

NZ: The assassin is said to belong to a pro-Castro organization, isn't that so?

Walker: Right! A trained Marxist.

NZ: I am not unsympathetic, General, but this story of a U. S. President coming out of the left and assassinated by the left appears, to a middle-of-the-road man like myself, to have a quite macabre twist.

Walker: Kennedy's death did not come as a surprise.

NZ: Are you going to say this on "Meet the Press" tonight, General? Let us have, first of all, if you please, the official position you will take.

Walker: I repeat, you are the first to hear it. The President's tragic death urgently and forcibly brings home the point that the dangerous circumstances by which we are surrounded cannot be underestimated. Mr. Kennedy's death is not the great surprise which is now being depicted. The sympathy I experience for the Kennedy family is not less than the sympathy I experience for the million families who have given one or more victims to the cause of the struggle of freedom against communism. I grieve over the losses they have suffered. The sacrifice of this member of the Kennedy family is but one of the many sacrifices which are being made by everybody for freedom. During these very sad hours, our guide rule must be the absolute need for strong unity, avoiding the divisive effect of reciprocal accusations which can only bring about more differences. We must stand together more than ever in our national devotion to freedom and human dignity.

NZ: Dear General Walker, I thank you for these words. I thank you personally, regardless of their newsworthiness.

Walker: It's all right. Have you heard the Voice of America?

NZ: The Voice of America! That is quite a resounding name. Yes, of course, Why?

Walker: I would like to find out for sure whether it has been spreading the false rumor of an attack on Europe by the extreme right.

NZ: I will call you as soon as I learn something positive.

Walker: I shall be staying here until midnight. Tomorrow you can reach me at the Lakeside number in Dallas.

NZ: Okay. And now let's have some details, General. Will there be a change in American policies,, domestic policies or foreign policies?

Walker: The changes will be there and they will be anything but trifling even though they won't be readily recognizable. The strength of the nation cannot be underestimated.

NZ: This has nothing to do, of course, with the fact that American "pinks" and their "rose red" comrades throughout the world claim that no changes will take place.

Walker: The strength of the nation cannot be underestimated under any circumstances. It is live and real and will break through all unnatural barriers and attempts to confine it.

NZ: What does the United Nations say?

Walker: Since the signing of the United Nations Charter there have been 23 wars. The miscalculations of the warring groups which operate there in futherance of the various "isms" from which they derive support and comfort have finally found fruition and a compelling "expose" in yesterday's tragedy.

NZ: What's to come from it?

Walker: As far as the new President is concerned, even Kennedy would expect from him that his tragic sacrifice should not be in vain....

NZ: Do you mean he should learn from past mistakes and spin the wheel in the opposite direction?

Walker: Yes. We must pursue a stronger national policy and demand the same from the rest of the free world. This is the first commandment for the security of all.

NZ: A clear national policy.

Walker: That will lead to honest partnerships and dependable security arrangements.

NZ: Would a national American policy find you in the forefront?

Walker: I have always been and continue to be in the forefront.

NZ: What is your next goal?

Walker: We must evaluate what is happening now and come up, as soon as possible, with a clear domestic political line.

NZ: What about Senator Barry Goldwater?

Walker: He is the recognized leader of the conservative movement. He has not yet allowed his supporters to present him as a candidate and I have not yet made any statements about him myself. We expect him to show himself steadfast to the principles of freedom.

NZ: The principles of freedom in the sense or "nonsense" of the United Nations?

Walker: As the true nature of the organization becomes better known, the tide of opposition against the United Nations will grow. It is only a deceptive propaganda which gives this instrument of conquest, created with a specific goal in mind and burdened by an overwhelming communist majority, an appearance of friendliness to mankind. All we need is an inner recovery, a sobering up and a realization of our own strength as well as a good shove to get the United Nations back on the side of the free world.

NZ: This is a courageous evaluation, General, and I wish it would be made in Germany.

Walker: (laughing) I have many friends in Germany, as you know. Wait a second ... hold the line... I just received word that ...

NZ: I am holding the line.

Walker: We have been talking about this Marxist assassin... this Oswald... Lee Oswald... I have just learned that John Abt from New York has offered to defend him in court.

NZ: John...? Would you mind to spell it?

Walker: Attorney John A-B-T. From New York.

NZ: This cannot be true. I had to make sure. Is it John Abt?

Walker: Right? Mr. Abt is an American Jew who defends all big communist cases.

NZ: I will give our readers a short biography of Mr. Abt, General.

Walker: This is extremely interesting.

NZ: How come you have one of them in your own "Promised Land."

Walker: (laughing) We'll keep in close touch, Thorsten. Give my regards to my German friends, especially Dr. Frey. One of the results will be that Germany and America will be able to become true partners. The relations between our two countries will develop on the basis of a real friendship among the people instead of being the result of a "propaganda" friendship.

NZ: Thank you, General Walker.

Walker: Many mistakes have been made in the past. Let us be careful so that we avoid them in the present for the sake of the future. A strong, united and great Germany will be a dependable factor of security for peace, liberty in Europe and throughout the world.

Twenty-four hours after this conversation, General Walker called NZ from Dallas and imparted the following

Walker: I have received your second call with the information you promised. Many thanks. It is to be expected that a new wave of artfully mystifying and carefully planned lies will sweep the world, especially after the assassination of Marxist Lee Oswald while he was on his way to a hearing under heavy police escort.

NZ: According to the reports which we have received thus far, the slayer is still alive. He was shot in the belly.

Walker: He is dead!

NZ: At the right time... isn't that so?

Walker: Mark my words. The second slayer is one Rubinstein who, among other things, is a gangster from Chicago and has a record of several convictions on charges of disturbing the peace and illegal possession of arms. He runs a strip-tease bar and a "speakeasy."

NZ: What was his motive?

Walker: It is fantastic! He claims he wanted to avenge Kennedy's death.

NZ: An "honor" assassin! The right man at the right place!

Walker: Rubinstein got him as they were coming out of the station.

NZ: Like clockwork!

Walker: There are too many extraneous and uncontrollable factors in America.

(Translation of a short item appearing on page one, column 2).

The Remarkable Oswald Case

Oswald, Kennedy's slayer, is said to have carried out, in the early summer of last year, an attempt on U. S. General Walker's life by taking a shot at him while the general was in his own work studio. The shot passed over General Walker's head by a very scant margin. Oswald was arrested, but his prosecution, according to certain statements, was stopped at the request of U. S. Attorney General Robert Kennedy. If that had not been the case, Oswald would be in jail serving a long sentence and above all, he would not have had a chance to assassinate Robert's brother, John F. Kennedy.

Enclosed for your information are two copies of a communication dated May 22, 1964, at Washington, D. C., and a copy of the "Deutsche Nationalzeitung und Soldatenzeitung," a Munich, Germany, newspaper of November 29, 1963; and two copies of translations of two pertinent articles appearing on pages one and four of the above enclosed newspaper.

Your attention is called to the fact that one of the articles, entitled "The Strange Case of Oswald," reportedly written by an editor of the newspaper, alleges that Lee Harvey Oswald had made an attempt on the life of General Edwin A. Walker. As you will note, the date of the appearance of this article was prior to December 8, 1963, the date on which Marina Oswald first advised Agents of this Bureau that Oswald had tried to kill General Walker. Page two of the enclosed communication dated May 22, 1964, at Washington, D. C., sets forth information indicating that the source of the allegation in the above article was General Walker in a transatlantic telephone interview with a West German journalist, Helmut Herbert Muench, following the assassination of President Kennedy.

In addition, the article also alleges that Oswald had been seized for the attempt on General Walker's life and that Attorney General Robert Kennedy had stopped the investigation. According to Muench, these latter allegations were inserted by the editor on his own initiative.

In connection with these matters, you are referred to your letter of May 8, 1964, which requested investigation regarding an allegation in the May 17, 1964, issue of the "National Enquirer" that a high official of the Department of Justice had requested the Dallas, Texas, Police Department not to arrest Oswald for the attempted shooting of General Walker. It would appear that my letters of May 8 and 14, 1964, that indicated the "National Enquirer" allegation could not be substantiated, would be pertinent to the allegation in the above article in the November 29, 1963, issue of "Deutsche Nationalzeitung und Soldatenzeitung."

The second article being called to your attention in the above newspaper reportedly records two transatlantic telephone interviews between General Walker and Muench.

This completes our inquiry in the matter.

Existence of the article regarding Oswald shooting Walker in the "Deutsche Nationalzeitung und Soldatenzeitung" (DNZSZ) issue of 11/29/63 was called to our attention by Frank Capell, publisher of a weekly newspaper "The Herald of Freedom," Staten Island, New York, and Bonn was asked through available sources to verify the existence of the article and then to determine the sources and circumstances of its preparation and to obtain copies of the article for the President's Commission. [REDACTED] was able to identify the writer of a second and longer article in the DNZSZ, 11/29/63, which was an account of transatlantic telephone interviews with General Walker following the assassination of President Kennedy. German writer, Helmut Herbert Muench, when located and interviewed ██████████ advised that General Walker had told him in one of the trans-Atlantic telephone calls that he, Walker, believed Oswald was the man who had made an attempt on his life. Muench told ██████████ he had furnished this information from Walker to Dr. Frey, editor of the DNZSZ, who had then written the shorter article on Oswald's shooting at Walker and had embellished that story by reference to the Attorney General intervening to stop the investigation at that time. 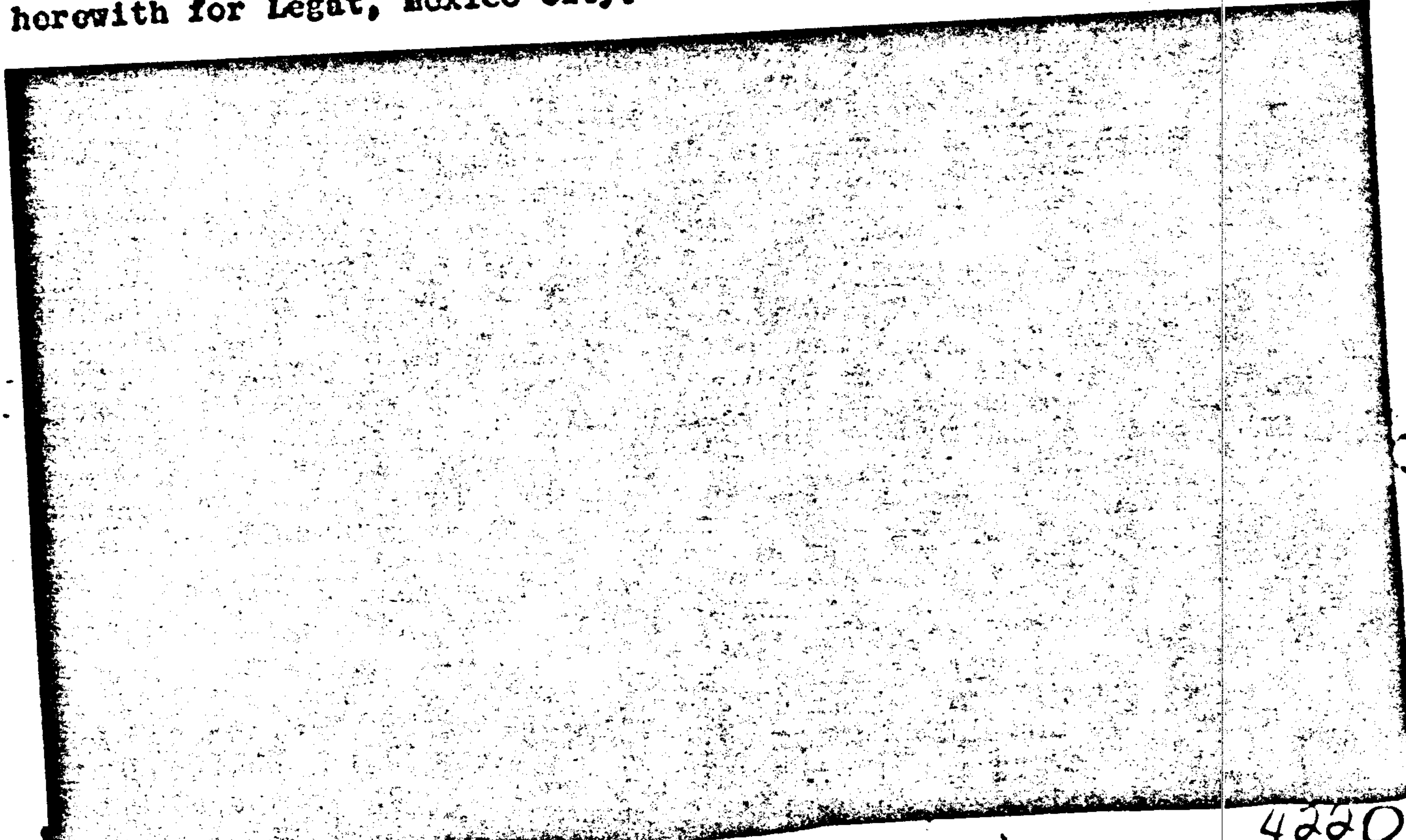

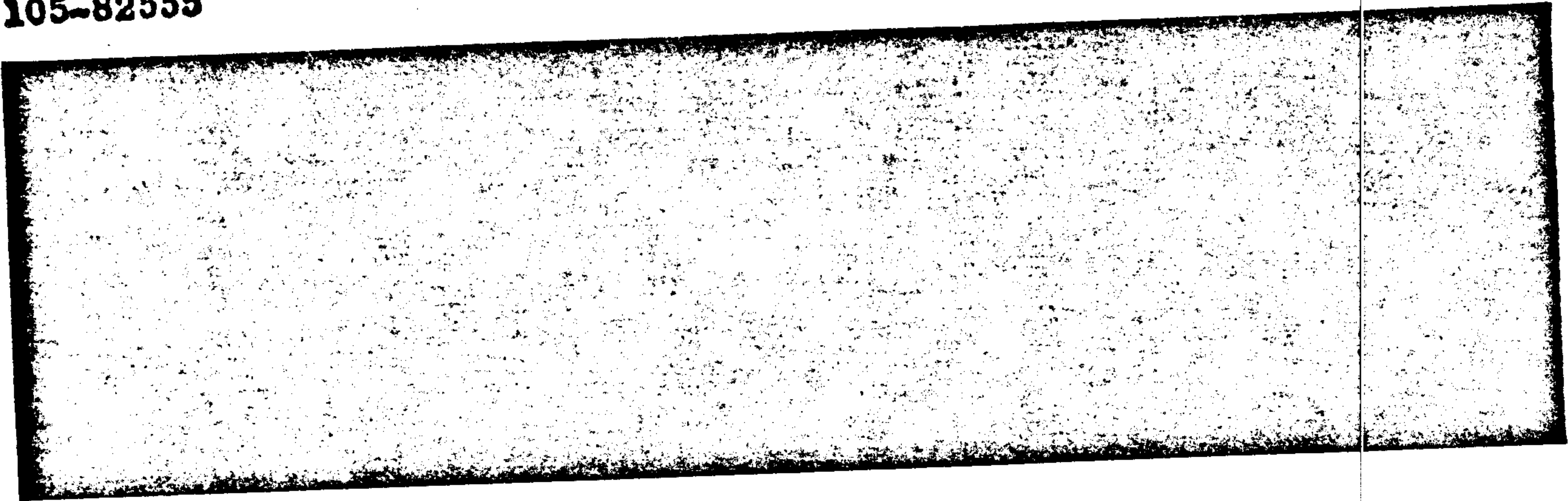

One Contreras V., whose address was furnished to PSI by Lima Juarez, also stayed at hotel during period Oswald was there and the source believes Contreras V. saw Oswald. This is first instance in which we have located guest at hotel who identified subject there and, in view of reference to Cubans at hotel with whom Oswald may have associated, it is necessary to press this aspect.

At 1:15 p.m. this date, a woman identifying herself as MRS. HELEN MARKHAM, 328 1/2 E. 9th Street, Dallas, Texas, telephone WH3-0246, telephonically advised that she was an eye-witness to the shooting of Dallas police officer J. D. TIPPIT and subsequently identified LEE HARVEY OSWALD as the killer.

She stated that about 11 a.m. this date, MRS. MARGUERITE OSWALD, mother of captioned individual, accompanied by two men claiming to be reporters from Philadelphia, came to her residence and stated they desired to talk with her. In order to get rid of them, she told them to come back later the same day.

MRS. MARKHAM advised that she was frightened and that she did not desire to talk with MRS. OSWALD and the two reporters since she regarded MRS. OSWALD as a "mean appearing person."

MRS. MARKHAM was advised that if she were frightened, she should immediately telephone the Dallas PD and advise them of the situation and of her being frightened and concerned about the pending return of MRS. OSWALD and the two men.

This Division has received a letter from ERNEST J. MESSNER, an attorney-at-law, Hibbing, Minnesota, stating that an unnamed friend of his, residing in Hibbing and knowing that he, Mr. MESSNER, was a former Agent of the FBI, had informed him that he had watched the TV program "The Making of a President" on Sunday, June 14, 1964. Mr. MESSNER's friend said that in one of the scenes about midway through the program he saw a person, apparently in a crowd, who could have been LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

No efforts have been made by this office to obtain a tape of this program and the Bureau is requested, if it sees fit to do so, to have the film reviewed at New York. Mr. MESSNER's source, due to the vagueness of the information, will not be interviewed UACB. It is felt that if a person closely resembling OSWALD had been in the TV show, numerous reports of it would have already been made.
