On April 2, 1964, I gave testimony before the President's Commission regarding latent fingerprint and latent palm print identifications effected in the captioned case.

The President's Commission furnished the Bureau a transcript of this testimony. The testimony has been reviewed and transcription errors have been corrected.

Back in 1960 the Texans wanted their man Lyndon Johnson, nominated for the presidency and expressed their displeasure when he was beaten by John F. Kennedy. They also disliked it when he accepted second place on the ticket.

Then, last Fall, there appeared a lot of publicity about Bobby Baker as Lyndon Johnson's "boy"; pictures of them together; a grand success story. Then came word of an impending investigation of Bobby Baker's affairs and how it would "blow the roof off of the Senate" and ruin a number of prominent people in Washington. One naturally thought of Lyndon Johnson in this connection. How would he be affected? Could he escape involvement? Is he in danger?

Then came the trip to Texas and the astonishing assassination of Pres. Kennedy--Pres. Johnson came back to Washington as top men in the U. S.

The Bobby Baker case came up; was "investigated" in a proceeding that makes one ashamed of our government. It has been "swept under the rug"; the roof has not been blown off the Senate. In asking oneself why was Kennedy killed? What purpose was served? Who benefited? There is only one reasonable answer. His death apparently saved certain people from ruin & disgrace.

The killing was not an impulsive act. It was carefully planned, timed and executed by an expert marksman. The Oswald man knew of the plot, supplied the gun but, as he told the police on arrest, "did not shoot the president." His arrest, and fear that he would give the plotters away, made it necessary to kill him. Does no one see the strong family resemblance between Oswald & the man who killed him, Jack Ruby?
