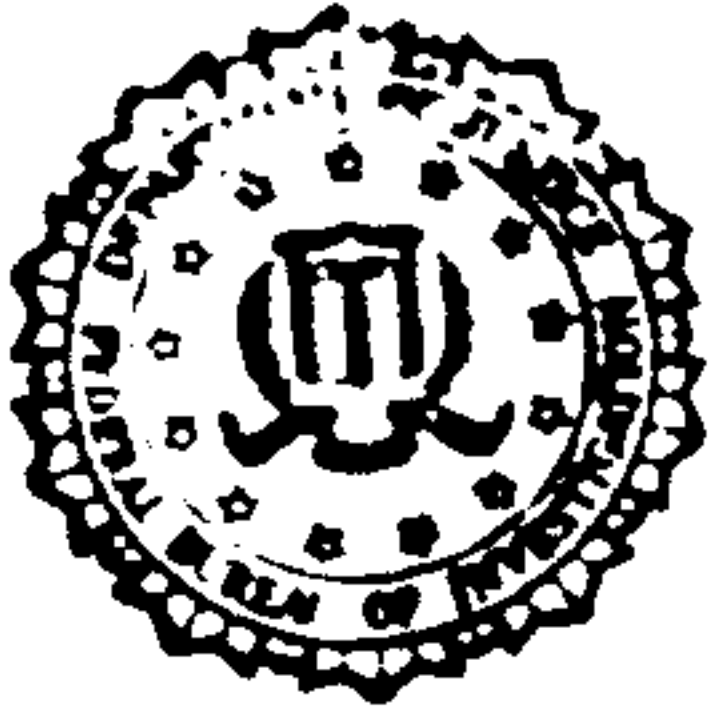

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

By letter dated June 30, 1964, the President's Commission called attention to page 269 of the report of Special Agent ROBERT P. GEMBERLING dated March 10, 1964, at Dallas, Texas, which sets forth the details of an interview with WARREN REYNOLDS, who has been the subject of a newspaper article written by BOB CONSIDINE.

The President's Commission pointed out that in this interview of REYNOLDS, he states that General EDWIN A. WALKER attempted to contact him and that in the event such contact was made, REYNOLDS would report the results of such contact to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The President's Commission letter requested that REYNOLDS be interviewed to determine whether General WALKER has been in touch with REYNOLDS and, if so, the nature of any conversations or communications between REYNOLDS and WALKER.

On July 7, 1964, WARREN A. REYNOLDS, 8707 Mosswood, Dallas, Texas, telephone Evergreen 8-1314, was telephonically contacted at his residence for the purpose of making an appointment for interview. REYNOLDS stated he was not feeling too well and suggested that he be interviewed at that time over the telephone.

REYNOLDS was asked if he had had any recent contact with General EDWIN A. WALKER. REYNOLDS informed he was contacted telephonically by General WALKER on March 2, 1964, and at that time WALKER read an article to him from some newspaper, which article had been written by BOB CONSIDINE, a reporter.

and which stated, in substance, that it was unusual that REYNOLDS had been shot because he had "fingered" OSWALD. REYNOLDS stated that actually he did not "finger" OSWALD. He stated that on January 23, 1964, he was shot in the head by a bullet from a .22 caliber rifle in the basement of the Reynolds Motor Company, 500 East Jefferson Boulevard, Dallas, Texas, where he had gone to turn out the lights at the close of business.

Following this telephone call by General WALKER, REYNOLDS stated he went to the residence of General WALKER in Dallas, Texas, and discussed the newspaper article written by BOB CONSIDINE with General WALKER. He stated he and General WALKER believed that, although the article was "fiction-like," it was nevertheless true. REYNOLDS stated both he and General WALKER believe that the shooting of REYNOLDS has some relation to the part REYNOLDS played in the apprehension of LEE HARVEY OSWALD. REYNOLDS stated they concluded this because the prime suspect picked up by the Dallas Police Department for the shooting of REYNOLDS was DARRELL WAYNE GARNER, also known as "DAGO." REYNOLDS stated that "DAGO" is the bragging type of person. He stated further that after "DAGO" was picked up by the Dallas Police Department he was released after he, "DAGO," and three other individuals had been afforded a polygraph examination by the Dallas Police Department and were judged to be telling the truth. REYNOLDS said that, since he has no enemies he knows of and since "DAGO" was released by the Dallas Police Department, he can only reason that he was shot because of the part he played in the apprehension of LEE HARVEY OSWALD. REYNOLDS stated he has no other reason other than the above for reaching this conclusion. He said it was during this March 1964, visit at General WALKER's house that General WALKER agreed with him.

REYNOLDS advised that approximately two weeks ago he telephonically contacted General EDWIN A. WALKER and requested an appointment to see WALKER, which was granted. REYNOLDS said he sought this interview with WALKER because he had been "scared" as a result of having been shot through the head after the

assassination of President KENNEDY, which shooting he states he feels is connected with the fact that he had witnessed LEE HARVEY OSWALD running with a gun from the scene of the shooting of Dallas Police Officer J. D. TIPPIT. REYNOLDS said he wanted General WALKER's advice as to what he should do.

REYNOLDS advised that on June 24, 1964, he went to the residence of General WALKER in Dallas, Texas, and discussed the above with him. He said that, following his discussions with General WALKER, General WALKER prepared a telegram addressed to the President's Commission, Washington, D. C., and sent it with his permission. He read the telegram which General WALKER sent and it is as follows:

"Testimony of WARREN REYNOLDS, victim of attempted assassination by a shot in the temple, cannot be ignored in a complete investigation. I respectfully request his appearance before your Commission.

"/s/ General EDWIN A. WALKER"

REYNOLDS stated he has only seen General WALKER on two occasions as set out above.

REYNOLDS stated that in March 1964, his daughter, TERRI, aged 9, at that time, informed him that on her way home a man stopped his automobile and offered her money to get in the car with him. REYNOLDS said his daughter ran away and volunteered that she is not the type of child that would make up a story. He said this also has made him apprehensive and feels that the troubles he has had since the assassination of President KENNEDY are in some way connected to the part he played in the apprehension of LEE HARVEY OSWALD. He said he has no actual facts to substantiate his beliefs, but has made his beliefs known to the Dallas Police Department.

REYNOLDS was advised that in the event he felt his life was in danger he should make any information of this nature available to the Dallas Police Department.

On July 7, 1964, WARREN A. REYNOLDS, 8707 Mosswood, Dallas, Texas, telephone Evergreen 8-1314, telephonically contacted the Dallas Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and spoke with a Special Agent.

REYNOLDS stated that since his interview earlier that day he had been wondering if there was some reason he should not contact General EDWIN A. WALKER. He also inquired if there was anything wrong with someone contacting General WALKER.

REYNOLDS was informed it was not the function of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to advise anyone whom they could or could not contact. He was also informed that no comment would be made as to whether there was or was not anything wrong with a person contacting General EDWIN A. WALKER.

On July 8, 1964, WARREN A. REYNOLDS, 8707 Mosswood, Dallas, Texas, telephone Evergreen 8-1314, telephonically contacted the Dallas Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and spoke with a Special Agent.

REYNOLDS stated he was calling to inquire if this office had any information that he was going to be called to appear before the President's Commission in Washington, D. C.

REYNOLDS was informed that this office had no information that he was going to be called by the President's Commission. He was also informed the President's Commission functions on its own and that this office had no information as to whom they would or would not call.

REYNOLDS then asked if it would be all right for him to make plans or if he should wait for a call from the President's Commission.

REYNOLDS was informed that, as mentioned above, this office does not know whom the President's Commission is going to call or not call, and he should use his own judgment on any future plans.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Among those interviewed by the Dallas police in connection with the assassination of President Kennedy was Joe B. Molina, at that time an employee of the Texas School Book Depository. Molina's house was searched early on the morning of November 23 by Dallas policemen and he was told to report at police headquarters in midmorning. He spent some five or six hours at the police station and before leaving signed a statement concerning his affiliation with an organization called the American GI Forum. While Molina was in the police station, Dallas police officials told the press that he was being interrogated in connection with the assassination, that he had a subversive background, and that the Dallas police had material on him in their subversive file. Other allegations were also made against him. Molina was not formally arrested or charged. According to a radio broadcast over Station KRLD on November 23, 1963, Molina may have been identified by the Justice Department as a possible subversive. The same radio news report also stated that "Molina has a long record of being connected with suspicious organizations."

Will you please investigate this incident and inform the Commission of the following:

1. Did the Justice Department or any of its agencies have a file on Molina and give the Dallas police department any information concerning any subversive activities by him?

2. Did the Dallas police department have a file on Molina and any alleged subversive activities by him?

3. What are the facts of the police search of his home and his "voluntary" detention at the police station during much of Saturday?

4. What is the nature of the American GI Forum? Is it considered a subversive organization?

5. Was there any connection between Molina's loss of his job at the Texas School Book Depository and the publicity concerning him that appeared on television and radio and in the newspapers?


6. Did Molina have difficulty in finding another job because of this adverse publicity?

7. Did the Dallas police ever make any effort to correct the allegations made against Molina and the suspicions of Molina voiced in the press?

Molina has been the subject of two previous FBI interviews--DL 89-43, Dallas, Texas, November 23, 1963, and DL 89-43, Dallas, Texas, November 30, 1963.

Your continuing cooperation with the Commission is greatly appreciated.

Being forwarded to the FBI Laboratory under separate cover, registered mail, are 12 photographs of OSWALD's diary; one photograph copy of a Communist Party letter dated July 31, 1963, addressed to OSWALD; one photograph copy of an undesirable discharge of OSWALD; one photograph copy of a vaccination certificate of OSWALD and two copies of a 35 millimeter film containing negatives of material seized by the Dallas Police Department at various locations belonging to LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

On July 9, 1964, HENRY WADE, District Attorney, Dallas, was interviewed concerning the "leak" of the diary, at which time WADE was most cooperative and advised that he would make the material available that his office had concerning the films and hard photograph copies obtained at the Recordak Company, Dallas, Texas. WADE was of the opinion that if the material was used from his office by any newspaper person, there may be some fingerprints on the material on the two rolls of 35 millimeter film.

On July 10, 1964, WADE furnished the above material mentioned as enclosures to this letter stating that he, WADE, WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER and H. H. DAVIS, JR. of his office could have possibly handled this material and that their fingerprints may be on the same. WADE requested that the material be returned to his office as soon as the FBI completes its examination.

For information of the FBI Laboratory, in making the fingerprint examination, SA's ROBERT M. BARRETT and IVAN D. LEE obtained the material from WADE without placing their latent prints on the paper or film. In obtaining fingerprint cards, it is noted that HENRY WADE is a former FBI Agent, WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER was a Lieutenant, U. S. Army, and that H. H. "SNOOKY" DAVIS, JR. served in the U. S. Navy as a pilot.

In the event any unknown latent prints are obtained from the film, Bureau requested to notify the Dallas Office, and background information will be obtained on the pertinent "Dallas Morning News" employees so the appropriate checks may be made against their fingerprints with the unknown latent prints.

The Photographic Laboratory is requested, upon receipt of the material from "Life" Magazine, to ascertain if that material was reproduced from the enclosed 35 millimeter Recordak film or possibly photographed from the hard copies of the diary which are being forwarded to the Laboratory. Bureau requested to conduct the investigation expeditiously in order that the material may be returned to HENRY WADE, District Attorney's office, Dallas, Texas.

One copy of this letter is furnished to the New York Office for information in view of the fact that office was requested to contact "Life" Magazine and obtain their copy of the diary as allegedly obtained from HUGH AYNESWORTH of "The Dallas Morning News."

ADMINISTRATIVE

It is noted that the descriptive data for JULIAN FRANCISCO HUERTA OLIVA is quite similar to the descriptive data set forth in referenced San Antonio airtel as supplied by ERNESTO LIMA JUAREZ for the Cuban from the State of Florida whom he allegedly saw at the Hotel del Comercio, Mexico City. It is believed that LIMA JUAREZ may be confused with regard to the time element in that it would appear that all of the Cubans at the Hotel del Comercio departed the hotel prior to OSWALD's arrival there.

As noted in the enclosed letterhead memorandum, GUILLERMO GARCIA LUNA, owner and manager of the Hotel

del Comercio, was unable to furnish the names of the other Cubans who stayed at the hotel because of the fact that the hotel register was not available. As has been reported to the Bureau previously, the hotel register was picked up by Mexican Government investigators shortly after the assassination of President KENNEDY and eventually disappeared. According to the best information that the Mexico City office has been able to obtain, the register ended up in the hands of President ADOLFO LÓPEZ MATEOS of Mexico and no one has been able to locate it since.

If JULIAN FRANCISCO HUERTA-OLIVA is interviewed by the Miami office and if he can furnish the names of the other Cubans staying at the Hotel del Comercio, it will be possible to make a check of Visa records here in order to fully identify the other Cubans and obtain United States addresses for them. This is mentioned in the event the Bureau deems it desirable to locate and interview all of these Cubans.

To date it has not been possible to reinterview GABRIEL CONTRERAS UVINA of Ciudad Camargo, Chihuahua, due to the fact that he has been away from his home. He is expected to return to Ciudad Camargo on 7/13/64 and he will be reinterviewed by a Bureau Agent at that time.

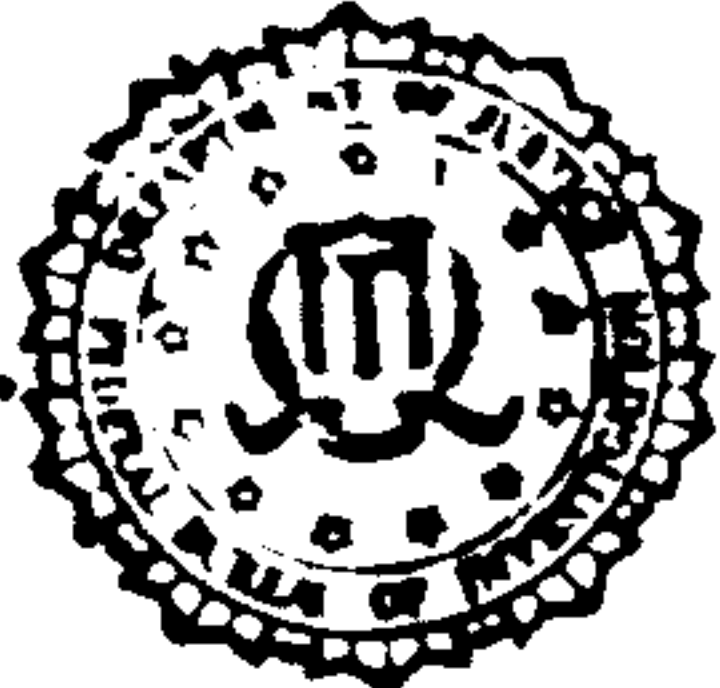

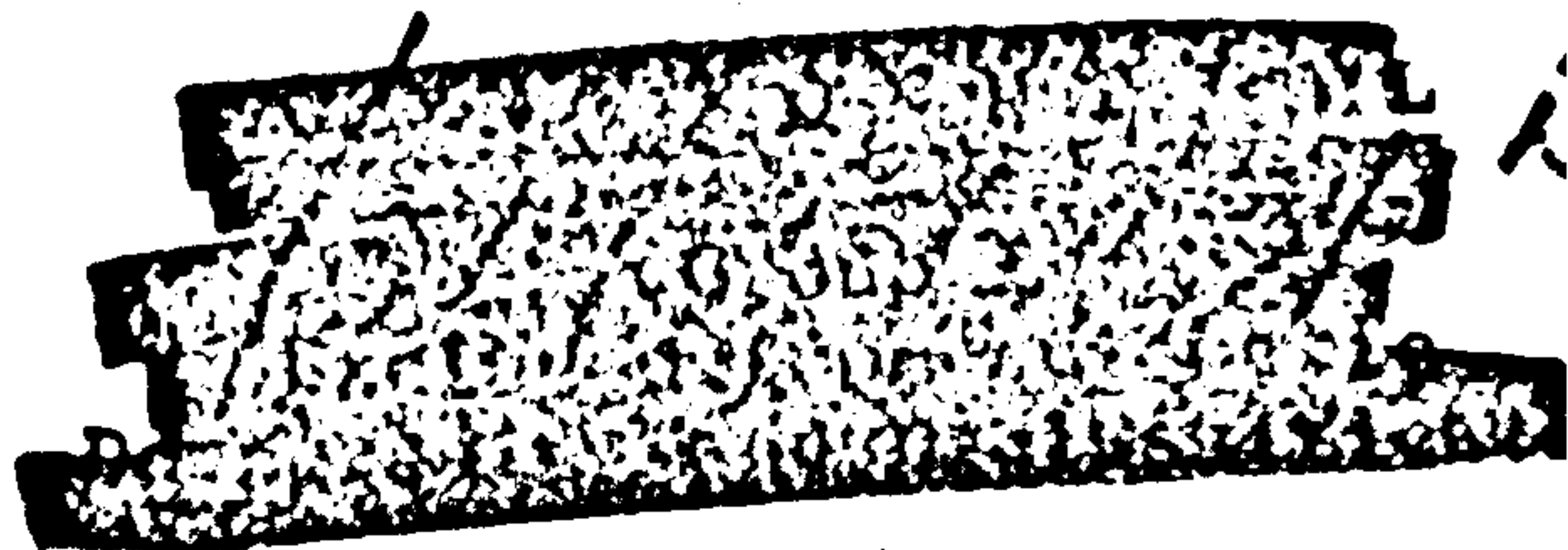
BASIS FOR INQUIRY

As has been previously reported, OSWALD was registered from September 27, 1963, through October 1, 1963, in Room No. 18 of the Hotel del Comercio, located at Calle Bernardino de Sahagun No. 19, Mexico, D. F., Mexico.

The records of the hotel reflect that ERNESTO LIMA JUAREZ, Reynosa, Tamaulipas, Mexico, was registered in Room No. 8 on September 26, 1963, and FRANCISCO MORALES, also of Reynosa, was registered in Room No. 8 from September 27, 1963, through October 1, 1963.

On interview in Reynosa on June 16, 1964, ERNESTO LIMA JUAREZ, a masonry contractor, advised he was in Mexico, D. F., Mexico, where he stayed in Room No. 8, Hotel del Comercio, for a few days in the latter part of September, 1963, and possibly the first day or two in October, 1963. He was in Mexico, D. F., on business and was accompanied by FRANCISCO MORALES, whom he was attempting to aid in securing employment.

While at the hotel, LIMA JUAREZ noticed an American, whom he later recognized from news media photographs as LEE HARVEY OSWALD. He did not associate with OSWALD, and as far as he knows, MORALES did not associate with OSWALD. He pointed out that at that time he had no reason to pay any particular attention to OSWALD.

Both GARCIA LUNA and PEREZ HERNANIEZ advised that there is no restaurant or bar in the Hotel del Comercio and no liquor is sold there. Neither is there any establishment in the vicinity of the hotel which sells liquor, although beer is served in some of the restaurants in the vicinity of the hotel.

The following information was obtained by the confidential source abroad on July 6, 1964, from the records of the Visa Section of the American Embassy in Mexico, D. F.:

An application for a United States immigration visa was made on August 20, 1963, by JULIAN FRANCISCO HUERTA-OLIVA, a Cuban citizen, born January 28, 1902, in Marinao, Havana, Cuba. The local address at the time the visa application was made was given as the Hotel del Comercio, Sahagun No. 19. He was the bearer of Cuban Passport No. 99428. An O-1 United States immigration visa was issued to him on September 20, 1963. At that time he indicated that he planned to join his wife, ROSELIA ESCALONA, 221 Alton Road, Apartment 21, Miami Beach, Florida. His visa file contained a letter from ROSA QUARANTO, owner of the New Richmond, Miami Beach, Florida, which letter guaranteed employment for HUERTA-OLIVA upon arrival in Miami Beach.

The President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy has asked this Bureau to conduct certain inquiry into the interrogation of captioned individual by the Dallas Police Department (PD) on November 23, 1963. The Commission has specifically inquired if the Department of Justice or any of its agencies had a file on Joseph Rodriguez Molina and if the Dallas PD was furnished any information concerning any subversive activities on the part of Molina.

Joseph Rodriguez Molina was never the subject of an investigation by this Bureau prior to the assassination of President Kennedy and our headquarters' files do not reveal that any information concerning him was ever furnished to the Dallas PD.

In connection with the Commission's request, we are checking the records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service at Dallas and at headquarters level. It would be appreciated if you would review the files of the Department of Justice concerning Molina in connection with the Commission's request.

For your assistance the following biographical data is furnished concerning the subject of this request. Joseph Rodriguez Molina was born June 18, 1924, in Dallas, Texas. His father, Pedro Molina, was born June 24, 1898, in Mexico City, Mexico, and his mother, Luiz R. Molina, was born December 18, 1901, in Colais, Mexico. His brothers are Frank Molina, born February 16, 1939, and Pete Molina, born December 21, 1940. His sisters are Beatrice Molina, born March 4, 1926, and Angelina Molina, born February 28, 1930. He currently resides at 4306 Brown Street, Dallas, Texas, and is employed as a bookkeeper by the Newhoff Employees' Credit Union, 2821 Alamo Street, Dallas, Texas. He was previously employed as a credit manager by the Texas School Book Depository at 411 Elm Street, Dallas, Texas.

Captioned book recently published regarding the assassination of President Kennedy and the evidence against Lee Harvey Oswald as the assassin has been reviewed.

AUTHOR:

Joachim Joesten was born in Germany in 1907 and left that country in 1933 following his education. He came to the United States in 1941 after brief stays in Scandinavian countries in the late 1930s and in 1940. He was employed for several years as an assistant editor in the foreign news department of "Newsweek" magazine and, since 1944, has been a free lance writer. Joesten was naturalized as an American citizen in 1948 and since that time has traveled widely both here and abroad on assignments for various foreign and American newspapers. He has also written several books, some of which have been reviewed by this Bureau. At a hearing for his naturalization in 1947 Joesten reportedly identified himself as a "left wing liberal."

In attempting to locate Joesten for interview regarding several articles he had written on the assassination matter, Bureau Agents contacted his wife at their home in Jamaica, New York. Mrs. Joesten stated that her husband had gone to Dallas for several days in 12/63 and that on his return he had talked in rambling fashion concerning Oswald's innocence of the assassination. She stated she felt that he was on the verge of a nervous breakdown. On the day following his return to New York from Dallas Mrs. Joesten found a note from her husband saying that he had left for Europe. Joesten was later interviewed by our Legat, Bonn, Office at the United States Consulate in Hamburg, Germany, on 3/21/64 and was indignant and highly emotional when questioned concerning facts in the assassination matter.

Captioned book has been published by Marzani and Munsell Publishers, Incorporated, in New York City. Both associates in that publishing concern, Carl Aldo Marzani and Alexander Motor Orr Munsell,

are on the Security Index. Marzani served two years in Federal prison (1949-1951) for making false statements regarding past Communist Party (CP), USA, membership. Munsell has financially supported the CP and its front groups in the past.

APPROACH:

Joesten offers no material in his book that would cause the Bureau to change its findings in the assassination matter, namely that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone in killing President Kennedy. Joesten makes extensive use of speculation and unfounded reports concerning the assassination and the investigation of Oswald. He has relied on confusing and early press reports and in his interview stated that the first press reports were factual, but that later information "leaked" or released to the press was part of a cover-up to make it appear that Oswald was guilty of assassinating President Kennedy. Joesten refers continually to statements by Mark Lane, former attorney for Marguerite Oswald, and Thomas G. Buchanan, Jr., whose book "Who Killed Kennedy?" has been reviewed by the Bureau for the President's Commission. Both Lane and Buchanan, of course, resort to distortion, speculation and disregard of facts developed in the assassination inquiry.

ATTACKS ON DIRECTOR AND FBI:

Joesten's book, in addition to being speculative concerning the assassination of President Kennedy, contains vicious and unfounded charges against the Director and the Bureau. Both the Director and the FBI are mentioned on 57 of the 158 pages and most of the references are derogatory. Joesten goes so far as to call for the removal of the Director from office and to accuse the FBI of intimidating witnesses in the assassination matter. Joesten also claims that facts are coming out which clearly implicate the FBI in an attempt to cover up the "facts" surrounding the shooting of President Kennedy and the alleged guilt of Oswald for that killing.

This scurrilous attack on both the Director and the Bureau is, of course, typical of the support given communist causes by the publishers, Marzani and Munsell.

JOESTEN'S CONCLUSIONS:

Joesten states that the assassination of President Kennedy was engineered by a conspiracy involving some officials of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), the FBI, military figures such as General Edwin A. Walker, and reactionary oil millionaires such as H. L. Hunt,

Mrs. HUERTA made available her husband's Cuban passport number 99428 reflecting he had left Rancho Boyeros Airport, Cuba, on August 19, 1963, arriving at Mexico the same date. The passport further reflected he departed Mexico and arrived at Miami, Florida on September 23, 1963. Mrs. HUERTA related that her husband had not owned any large or even small farm property in Cuba. She said that he was met at the airport in Mexico City on his arrival from Cuba by a Mr. LUIS MORENZA, a Cuban newspaper man, residing in Mexico City. She said that to her knowledge, no other person met her husband and MORENZA did so at the request of Mr. NESTOR CARBONELL, a friend of the HUERTA family who knows MORENZA and requested the latter to assist HUERTA OLIVA in getting settled in Mexico City while awaiting issuance of visa for entrance to the United States.

Mrs. HUERTA stated that on two occasions, she sent money to her husband in Mexico City. On the first occasion, the money was delivered to MORENZA by NESTOR CARBONELL shortly before HUERTA arrived in Mexico City but at a time when Mrs. HUERTA knew that he would soon be there. Mrs. HUERTA said she sent her husband another \$100 by Pan American Bank of Miami wire transfer number OW13134 transferring the \$100 to the Banco Internacional Avenida Madera, Mexico City, for her husband whose address was then listed as Sahagun Number 19, Mexico City. This money transfer was dated August 26, 1963.

Mrs. HUERTA stated she had discussed her husband's stay in Mexico City during two or three telephone calls she made to him in Mexico City and also after his arrival in Miami. She said she specifically asked him if he saw or met any other Cubans while in Mexico City, and her husband stated he did not. She recalled he did tell her there was one Negro staying at the hotel Del Comercio where her husband stayed who claimed he was a Cuban; her husband said he was certain by this person's speech and manner that he was not a Cuban and was possibly a Puerto Rican.

Mrs. HUERTA exhibited a photograph taken with a Polaroid type camera showing her husband and four other individuals seated at a table apparently in a cafe serving

beer since beer bottles were observed on the table. Mrs. HUERTA said the four individuals in the photograph, in addition to her husband, were all Mexicans whom her husband had met while staying at the hotel Del Comercio. It was noted that the rear of the photograph had four signatures which appeared to be FRANCISCO MORALES SOTO, ERNESTO L. JUAREZ, MANUEL (last name not legible, possibly SANTOS), & G. CONTRERAS U. A note below the signatures indicated that two individuals were missing from the photograph; the names of these two appear to be MARTIN P. (last name not legible except for the beginning letter "P"), and FERNANDO VALENZUELA.

The photograph was contained in a folder and on the inner cover of the folder opposite the polaroid photograph was written in Spanish, "My friend JULIAN, may this be a remembrance of your stay in the Mexican capital from your friends GABRIEL CONTRERAS, MANUEL, (possibly SOTO), PANCHO MORALES, ERNESTO L. JUAREZ. The date was shown as 9/20/63.

The New Haven Office, at Norwalk, Conn. is requested to re-interview HUERTA OLIVA in accordance with referenced Bureau airtel with specific emphasis on whether he was correct when he stated in previous interview that he saw no other Cubans during the period of his stay in Mexico City.

It is to be noted that records of the hotel where he stayed bear him out on this point. It is further noted that his own passport and records of the hotel show that he left Mexico City before OSWALD had arrived there.

The Miami Office has requested Mrs. HUERTA, Miami Beach, to send the photograph of her husband and his four Mexican friends to the HUERTA OLIVA in Norwalk, Conn., so that he may identify the other men to an interviewing agent.

The article claims to set forth information indicating that Oswald was an agent of the United States Government, possibly the FBI or the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). The article offers no information of a factual nature that would substantiate its allegation. In fact, the article is a rehash of material taken from various unreliable sources, such as Mark Lane and Thomas G. Buchanan whose claims of a conspiracy and the innocence of Oswald have been found without proof. U

Among the "evidence" advanced by "The Worker" article is a statement by Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, Lee Harvey Oswald's mother, to the effect that Special Agent (SA) James P. Hosty, Jr., of the Dallas Office, had a long conversation with Oswald in Hosty's car during the time in October and November, 1963, when Oswald and his wife were residing at the residence of Mrs. Ruth Paine in Irving, Texas. This claim, of course, is false and SA Hosty has provided an affidavit for the President's Commission indicating that he had never contacted or spoken with Oswald. In addition, the article states that Marina Oswald was and apparently still is the FBI's "most valuable witness." The article alleges that in confirming every detail of the FBI's "solution" of the assassination matter Marina was "overeager to do so and to lay the crime exclusively on her husband." With FBI encouragement, according to the article, funds began to pour on Marina from many still undisclosed sources. U

The article also refers to stories in the "Philadelphia Inquirer" of 12/8/63 and the "Houston Post" of 1/1/64 which indicated

that Oswald was an informant for either the FBI or CIA. The source for these false allegations appears to have been Assistant District Attorney William Alexander of Dallas County, Texas. U

As to Oswald's alleged relationship with CIA, the article claims that Marguerite Oswald, Oswald's mother, has been touring the country in defense of her son and stating everywhere that he had been "working for the CIA." U

Another inaccuracy contained in the article involves the document Oswald obtained to visit Mexico in the Fall of 1963. The article claims that the United States Department of State gave Oswald a "15-day pass" to visit Mexico on 9/17/63. It is noted that, in actuality, Oswald obtained a United States passport in 6/63 and that it was the Mexican Consulate General in New Orleans, Louisiana, who issued Oswald his Mexican tourist card which he used on his September through October, 1963, visit to Mexico. U

"The Worker" article refers to the Warren Commission as a group "that includes Allen Dulles, a congressman who speaks for the FBI, two Southern racists, two Republican 'moderates,' and Warren." U

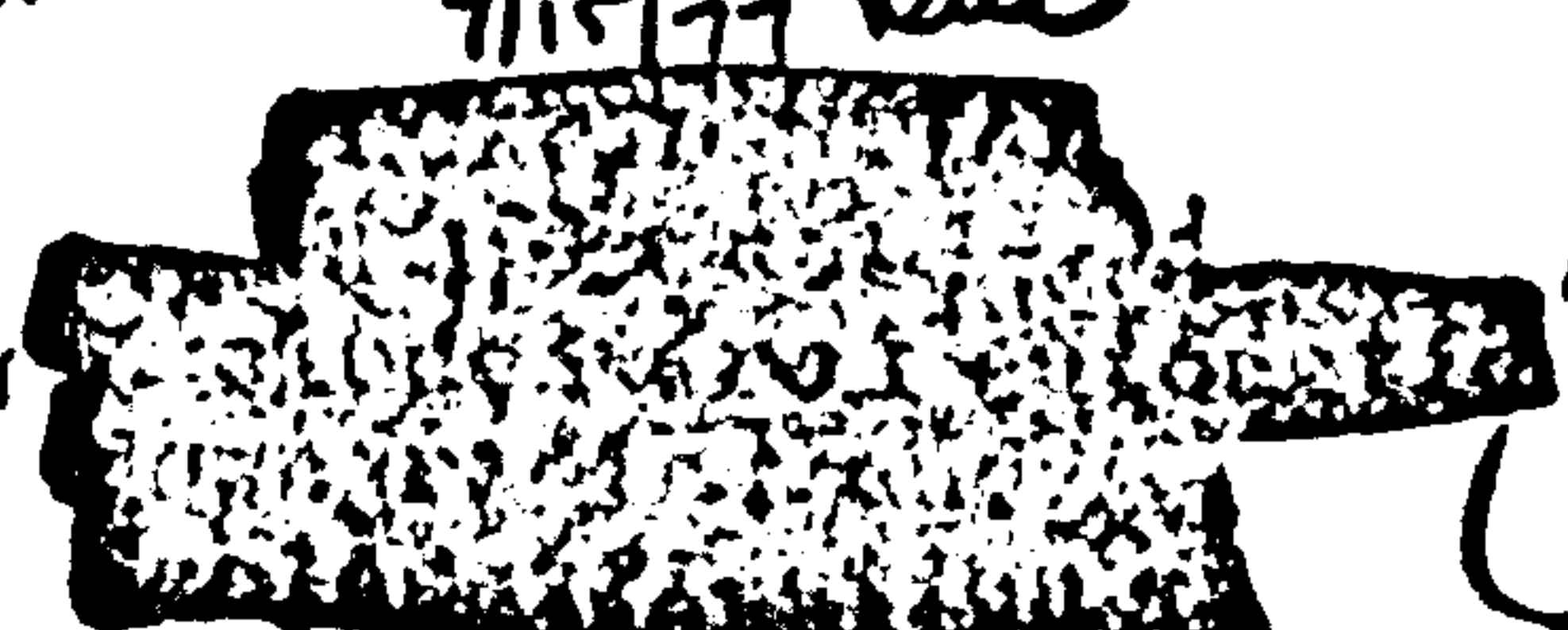

There are enclosed two copies of a memorandum in the Lee Harvey Oswald case dated July 10, 1964, pertaining to the revelations of Ernesto Lima Juarez. Our letter dated July 1, 1964, set forth the results of initial contact of Lima Juarez by a confidential source abroad.

On July 10, 1964, Lima Juarez was interviewed by an Agent of this Bureau. He advised that he and Francisco Morales checked into the Hotel del Comercio, Mexico City, Mexico, about September 18, 1963. He said that Morales checked out about October 12, 1963, and that he left the hotel about November 18, 1963.

Lima Juarez said that three Cubans who became acquainted with Morales and later with him were registered at the hotel when he and Morales arrived. He said the Cubans occupied rooms on the second floor of the hotel and that they were apparently unemployed. He said two of the Cubans were male Negroes whom he described as young, tall and slender. He said one of the Cuban Negroes was living with a Cuban Negress who was supporting him. He described the third Cuban as a white male, aged 44 - 46, five feet ten inches in height with a heavy build, dark hair, eyes and complexion. He related that the fourth Cuban was a white male, aged 54 - 58, five feet eight inches in height with brown graying hair, a gray mustache and medium complexion.

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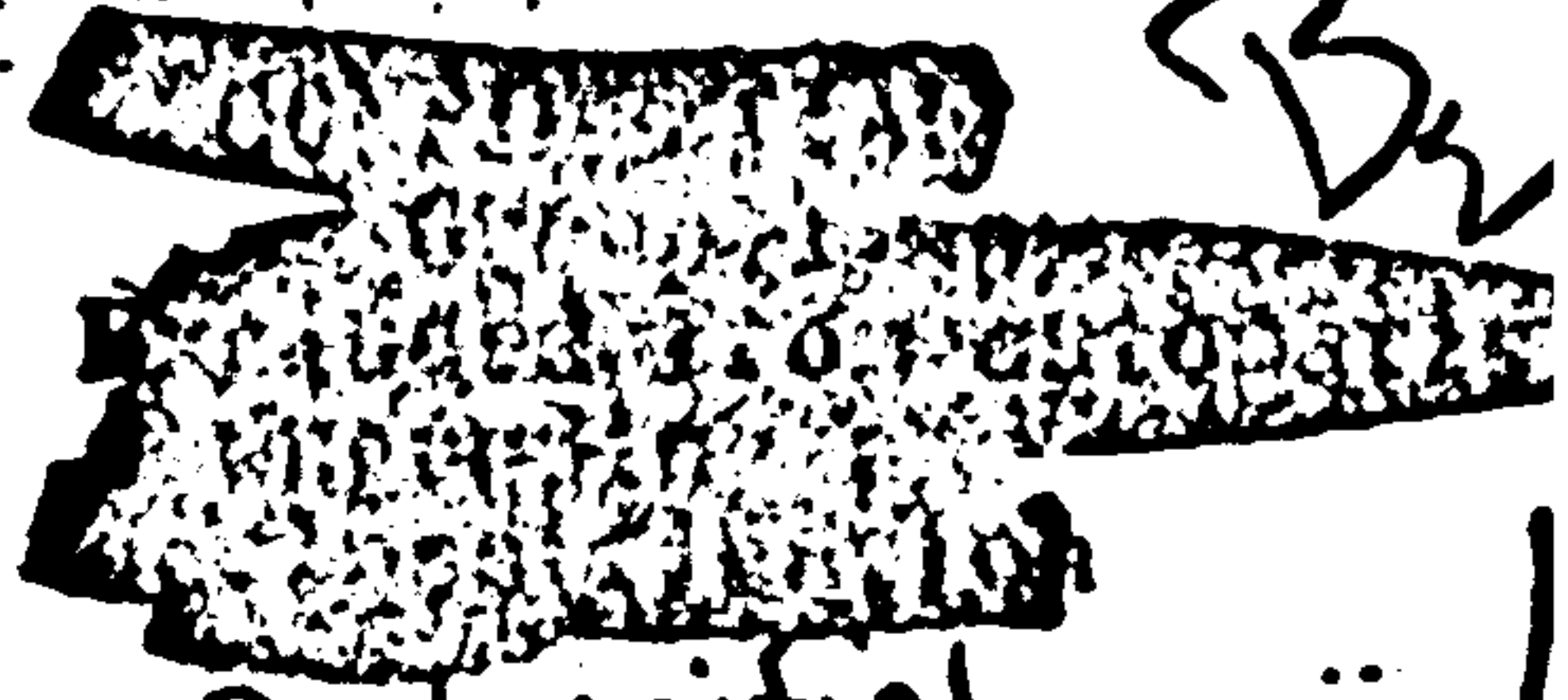
