Mrs. Oswald previously furnished Commission a group of letters which she received from Lee Harvey Oswald during period he resided in Russia. Commission made copies of such letters but quality was poor and Commission requested FBI contact Mrs. Oswald and photograph such letters. Mrs. Oswald indicated upon contact by Dallas Office that she felt Commission had lost the original items of evidence in this matter and stated she would not make letters available to FBI for photographing unless she received an appropriate explanation from the Commission. We relayed this information to the Commission and Mr. Liebeler was instructed by the Commission to contact Mrs. Oswald to solicit her cooperation. Desirable we ascertain current status of this inquiry in Dallas.

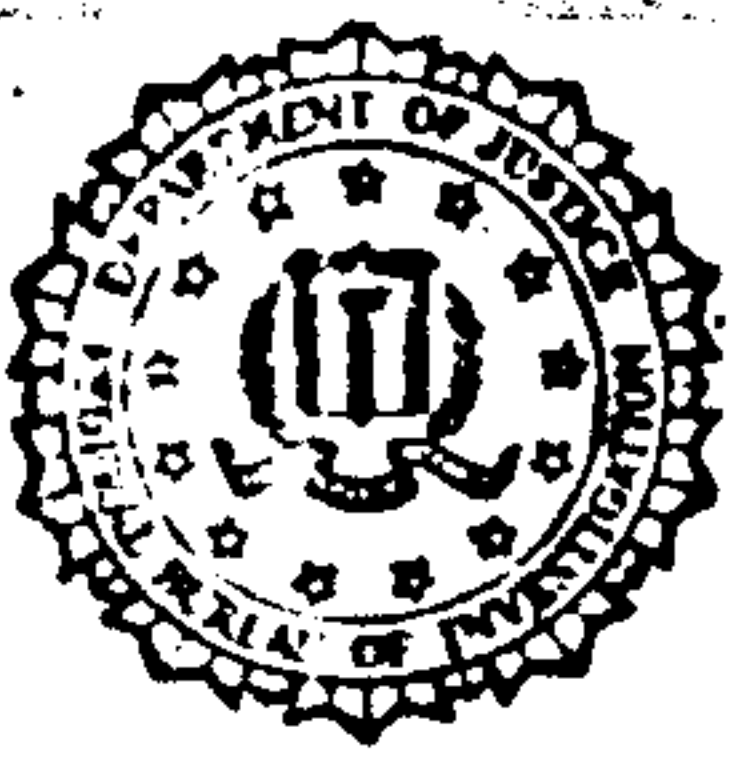

BASIS FOR INQUIRY

As has been previously reported, investigation disclosed that one H. O. LEE, believed to be identical with OSWALD, departed Mexico City at 8:30 AM on October 2, 1963, on bus No. 332 of a bus line called "Autobuses Transportes del Norte" (hereinafter referred to as Transportes del Norte). A total of sixteen passengers, including LEE, boarded the bus in Mexico City with destinations of Monterrey, Nuevo Leon, Mexico; Nuevo Laredo, Tamaulipas, Mexico; Laredo, Texas; and points beyond. Ten additional passengers boarded the same bus in San Luis Potosi, State of San Luis Potosi, Mexico.

Among the passengers who boarded the bus at San Luis Potosi were MAXIMINO ESQUIVEL, CECILIO CARDENAZ, PEDRO GONZALEZ, and JOSE CRUZ.

INTERVIEW OF PEDRO GONZALEZ YERENA

On July 10, 1964, PEDRO GONZALEZ YERENA, Carrizo Oil Camp, Municipal District of Cardenas, Tabasco, Mexico, furnished the following information to a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past.

PEDRO GONZALEZ YERENA advised that his permanent residence is located at Porfirio Diaz No. 716 Sur, Monterrey,

Nuevo Leon, Mexico. The headquarters of the firm which employs him, the Compania Constructora de Gaseoductos y Oleoductos, is located on the Monterrey-Saltillo Highway at a place known as Santa Catarina.

GONZALEZ stated he, MAXIMINO ESQUIVEL, CECILIO CARDENAS, and JOSE CRUZ CUELLAR had been looking for work in Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico, in early October, 1963. They had also sought work in the State of Michoacan, Mexico, but had been unsuccessful and had decided to return to Monterrey, Nuevo Leon, Mexico.

On October 2, 1963, they boarded a bus of the company called "Camiones Azules" (Blue Buses) at Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico, and arrived at San Luis Potosi, State of San Luis Potosi, Mexico, at about 2:00 or 3:00 PM.

They immediately boarded a Transportes del Norte bus bound for Monterrey, Nuevo Leon, Mexico. This bus had come from Mexico, D. F., Mexico, and was destined for Monterrey and Nuevo Laredo, Tamaulipas, Mexico.

CECILIO CARDENAS and GONZALEZ occupied seats which were numbered somewhere between 20 and 24 on the same side of the bus occupied by the driver. An American occupied a seat almost opposite them. This American was wearing a blue coat and a sport shirt. GONZALEZ stated he is certain this American is the same individual whose photographs have appeared in the newspapers as being the alleged assassin of President KENNEDY. GONZALEZ claimed that when he saw the photographs of LEE HARVEY OSWALD in the newspapers he knew he had seen OSWALD before, but had been unable to recall exactly where.

GONZALEZ claimed to be certain that he now recalled very clearly that the American on the bus between San Luis Potosi and Monterrey was LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

GONZALEZ pointed out that he and his friends had purchased a wooden container of tequila in Guadalajara and had been steadily drinking tequila from the time they left Guadalajara. JOSE CRUZ CUELLAR invited the American, on several occasions, to have some tequila, but the American always refused by shaking his head. GONZALEZ recalled that the bus driver had finally requested GONZALEZ and his friends

to stop drinking and to stop bothering the other passengers.

GONZALEZ stated that he had descended from the bus a few blocks before it reached the bus terminal at a location near his home. Therefore, GONZALEZ stated, he had no further information concerning the activities of OSWALD.





Synopsis:

THOMAS SGOVIO, on 7/31/64, stated LEV or LEO SETYAEV and all names of ANNETTE SETYAEV and her photograph not known to him. Names and photographs of NICOLAI SERGEYEV and LUCY PRAVDINA unknown to him. Recognized photograph of JOE ADAMOV whom he met in Moscow 1954 when ADAMOV employed by Radio Moscow and Mos-Film. SGOVIO unable to recognize photograph of ANNABELLE BUCAR, but knew name and had seen her in Moscow. SGOVIO's sister, GRACE, had heard BUCAR disillusioned because husband, LAPSHIN, drunkard and mistreated her. Name SERGEI RUDIN unknown SGOVIO, but recognized his photograph as being EDDIE RUDERMAN, an American from New York City. RUDERMAN was studying Chemistry in Moscow, 1935-38 and 1954-60, worked Moscow Radio and Mos-Film. SGOVIO stated Moscow Radio and Mos-Film closely related. SGOVIO's sister, GRACE DEITCH-BOOGAY, worked Mos-Film, 1953-55, and knew radio and film people. GRACE presently residing Via Montello 28, Modugno Bari, Italy.

Details:

AT BUFFALO, NEW YORK

On July 31, 1964, THOMAS SGOVIO, 11 Garden Street, Buffalo, New York, stated that he was born in Buffalo, New York, on October 17, 1916, that in 1935 he traveled to Moscow, Russia, with his mother and his sister, GRACE. He stated the purpose of their travel was to join his father, an Italian citizen, who upon being deported from the United States in 1932 for Communist activities had chosen to be deported to Russia.

THOMAS SGOVIO stated he resided in Moscow, Russia, from 1935 to March, 1938, was arrested in March, 1938, after seeking assistance from the United States Embassy for return to the United States, and spent the period from March, 1938, to 1946 in concentration camps. He resided from 1945 to 1948 outside of Moscow, but periodically visited there. He was re-arrested and was in concentration camps from December, 1948, to 1954, and then resided in Moscow again from 1954 to January, 1960. In January, 1960, he was permitted to leave Russia with his mother and traveled with her to Italy. His sister, whose name is now GRACE-DEITCH-BOOGAY, was permitted to leave Russia in November, 1962, and traveled to Italy. THOMAS SGOVIO re-entered the United States from Italy in April, 1963. His mother and sister are presently residing at Via Montello 28, Modugno Bari, Italy, awaiting permission from United States Authorities for his mother, who never became a United States citizen, to re-enter the United States.

THOMAS SGOVIO stated that the name LEV or LEO SETYAEV is completely unknown to him.

He stated that the names ANNETTE or ANITA MAY ZUGOFF, ANNETTE HENKIN or HENKINA, ANNETTE SETYAEV, and "MOSCOW MOLLY" are completely unknown to him. He added he does recognize the last name HENKIN as being that of a famous actor and variety show star in Moscow, Russia, as of 1935 when he himself arrived there. This HENKIN, first name unrecalled, was already quite an old man in 1935, and has probably been dead for many years.

A group photograph containing pictures of NIKOLAI SERGEYEV, ANNETTE HENKINA (now SETYAEV, also known as "MOSCOW MOLLY, "), JOE ADAMOV, ANNABELLE BUCAR, SERGEI RUDIN, and LUCY PRAVDINA were displayed to THOMAS SGOVIO.

SGOVIO stated the photograph of and the name NIKOLAI SERGEYEV are unknown to him.

He stated the photograph of ANNETTE HENKINA is unknown to him.

He recognized the photograph of JOE ADAMOV as being that of someone he had known in Moscow, but could not recall this person's name. When the name JOE ADAMOV was mentioned, SGOVIO immediately knew the name and stated he feels sure the photograph is that of JOE ADAMOV. SGOVIO's knowledge of JOE ADAMOV will be set forth below.

SGOVIO was unable to recognize the photograph of ANNABELLE BUCAR, and when this name was mentioned to him, he stated that although he had seen ANNABELLE BUCAR in Moscow on possibly three or four occasions during the 1954-1955 period, he never knew her personally, and still could not state definitely that the photograph is that of BUCAR. SGOVIO's knowledge of BUCAR will be set forth below.

SGOVIO stated the photograph of SERGEI RUDIN is definitely that of an individual he had known in Moscow named EDDIE RUDERMAN, but that he had never known him to use the name SERGEI RUDIN. SGOVIO's knowledge of RUDERMAN will be set forth below.

SGOVIO stated that the photograph of and the name LUCY PRAVDINA are unknown to him.

SGOVIO stated that he first met JOE ADAMOV in Moscow, Russia, in 1954, shortly after he himself returned to Moscow after his second imprisonment. SGOVIO's sister, GRACE, was then working for Mos-Film (an apparent contraction for Moscow Film, although this full name was never used), was acquainted with JOE ADAMOV, and took SGOVIO to meet ADAMOV in an attempt to get SGOVIO a job with Mos-Film, but the job never materialized. ADAMOV was at that time the head of the American Section of Radio Moscow, was connected with Mos-Film, served as a translator and guide for American delegations and entertainers visiting Moscow, and seemed to have his fingers in just about everything connected with the radio and public relations field. He was regarded generally as being very well off financially and was continuously referred to by those who knew him as the "American Millionaire" or the

"Moscow Millionaire." Most of SGOVIO's knowledge concerning ADAMOV came to him from his sister, GRACE. GRACE had stated that she herself was not sure of ADAMOV's origin, but that he either was born in the United States or had spent several years in the United States as a youngster. She had said that during the early 1930's ADAMOV had attended the Anglo-American School in Moscow with JOSEPH ~~DEITCH-BOOGAY~~, the latter subsequently becoming GRACE's husband. GRACE had also heard ADAMOV's father was an American. SGOVIO stated that ADAMOV was quite an important person in Moscow during the 1954-1960 period, and that his name and picture frequently appeared in the newspapers. It was the opinion of SGOVIO and of others who knew ADAMOV that the latter was connected with the Russian Secret Police because of the jobs held by ADAMOV and his general air of self-confidence.

THOMAS SGOVIO stated he never had personally known ANNABELLE ~~BUCAR~~, but that she was generally known in Moscow in the middle 1950's as an American who had defected to Russia while working for the American Embassy there, and who subsequently wrote a book in Russia defaming American Embassy personnel. SGOVIO himself read the book. SGOVIO's sister knew who BUCAR was because BUCAR resided in the same apartment building as an American named GOLDIE PORTNOI, and GRACE on one occasion in 1954 or 1955 pointed BUCAR out to SGOVIO. SGOVIO recalls knowing that BUCAR was married to a Russian opera singer named KONSTANTIN LAPSHIN. GRACE had heard through some artist friend who knew ANNABELLE BUCAR that BUCAR's husband was a drunkard and frequently beat her up as a result of which BUCAR was very unhappy with life in general. SGOVIO believed BUCAR worked for Radio Moscow.

SGOVIO stated that EDDIE RUDERMAN was already in Moscow in 1935 when SGOVIO arrived there. SGOVIO met him in 1935 through their mutual attendance at the Foreign Workers Club in Moscow. RUDERMAN was then about 23 years old, stated he was originally from the New York City area, had attended either New York University or Columbia University, and was studying Chemistry in Moscow. RUDERMAN was also a violinist and had played with some orchestra in New York City. When SGOVIO returned to Moscow in 1954, he again met RUDERMAN, and RUDERMAN was then working as an announcer for Radio Moscow and also for Mos-Film. RUDERMAN had by then married a Russian woman, and mentioned having either one or two daughters, who as of 1954 were around eighteen years of age. One of these daughters played the violin. SGOVIO periodically saw RUDERMAN during the period 1954-1960, and RUDERMAN

worked all this time for Radio Moscow. They never became friendly after 1954, RUDERMAN avoiding contact with SGOVIO, apparently because SGOVIO had spent so many years in concentration camps. SGOVIO periodically saw RUDERMAN in the company of ANNABELLE BUCAR. SGOVIO believed RUDERMAN had good Communist Party connections because of his employment by Radio Moscow for so many years.

SGOVIO went to state that his sister, GRACE DEITCH-BOOGAY (whose husband, JOSEPH DEITCH-BOOGAY, was killed while fighting with the Russian Army during World War II), worked for Mos-Film during 1953, 1954, and 1955. Mos-Film was generally engaged in dubbing in American dialogue on Russian made films for foreign distribution. SGOVIO stated that the American Section of Moscow Radio and Mos-Film were closely related, and that several American speaking Moscow Radio employees worked full or part-time for Mos-Film. He stated that through going to see his sister, GRACE, while she worked at Mos-Film in 1954 and 1955, he knew that among former Americans who worked there were EDDIE RUDERMAN, BERNIE COOPER, GOLDIE PORTNAI, BERTHA BELL, NICK KORNIKOFF, and LUCY FLAXMAN, all of whom as far as he knows are still in Russia. He stated he recalled seeing one or two other girls who were probably Americans working in the Mos-Film offices during 1954 and 1955, but he did not know them personally and cannot describe them. SGOVIO stated that his sister, GRACE, through her employment at Mos-Film during the 1953-1955 period, probably knew all the American Section Moscow Radio and Mos-Film employees.

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

BASIS FOR INQUIRY

As has been previously reported, on September 27, 1963, OSWALD registered at the Hotel del Comercio, Calle Bernardino de Sahagun No. 19, Mexico City, under the name of LEE, HARVEY OSWALD. His name was contained in the guest records of the hotel through October 1, 1963. He occupied room No. 18.

According to the guest records of the hotel, FERNANDO VALENZUELA, Chihuahua, State of Chihuahua, Mexico, occupied room No. 6 from September 26 through October 1, 1963.

INTERVIEW OF FERNANDO VALENZUELA

On July 10, 1964, FERNANDO VALENZUELA, Calle 33 No. 2213, Chihuahua, State of Chihuahua, Mexico, furnished the following information to a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past.

VALENZUELA stated he resided at the Hotel del Comercio during the last week of September, 1963, and the first part of October, 1963, but could not recall the exact dates.

VALENZUELA viewed a series of photographs of LEE HARVEY OSWALD and stated he knew who this individual was as a result of the publicity concerning him following the

assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY. VALENZUELA said he did not recall ever having seen the subject.

VALENZUELA said he did recall that there were a few Americans, or at least persons who spoke English, at the hotel during the period of time he was there. VALENZUELA also recalled that a Cuban family and possibly one or two young Cuban men were also there, but he could not recall the names or descriptions of these individuals, other than the Cuban family.

VALENZUELA recalled that a political dispute arose between a tie salesman of unknown origin and the Cuban, who was awaiting passage for Miami, Florida, with his family. VALENZUELA recalled that this discussion led to some comments concerning communism and vaguely recalled that the tie salesman was trying to convince the Cuban concerning a point about communism. VALENZUELA did not recall any of the details of the discussion, but it was his impression that the Cuban who was planning to travel to Miami, Florida, apparently opposed any communist ideas.

VALENZUELA stated he could not furnish any additional identifying information regarding any of the other guests at the hotel or any of the activities at the hotel which may have concerned OSWALD, during the period of time that VALENZUELA was a guest at the hotel.

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

The President's Commission, by letter dated July 24, 1964, requested photographs be taken from inside the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository southeast corner window, from which the assassination shots were fired, showing "by visual demonstration" the distance between the floor and window sill as well as the height of the opening in the window when the window is half open as it was on the day of the assassination.

The letter from the President's Commission also requested a photograph of a person about 5'9" tall, showing the relative position of the window ledge and the window to a person about Oswald's height.

On July 29, 1964, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation took the following described photographs with a Bureau-owned Speedgraphic camera of the sixth floor window located in the southeast corner of the Texas School Book Depository Building located at 411 Elm Street, Dallas, Texas. This is the window from which the shots were fired on November 22, 1963.

Photographs 1, 2, and 3 were taken from a spot north of the window looking south with a surveyor's measuring rod located near the window.

Photograph 4 depicts V. Ray Baggett, employee of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Dallas, Texas, sitting on a box near the window with the surveyor's measuring rod nearby. This photograph was also taken from a spot north of the window looking south.

Photograph 5 depicts V. Ray Baggett, who stands 5'8½" tall, standing next to the window with the surveyor's measuring rod nearby. This photograph was also taken from a spot north of the window looking south.

It is noted that the surveyor's measuring rod is marked in feet and tenths of a foot.

It is also noted that since November 22, 1963, a 5/8" plywood floor has been added to the regular flooring of the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building.

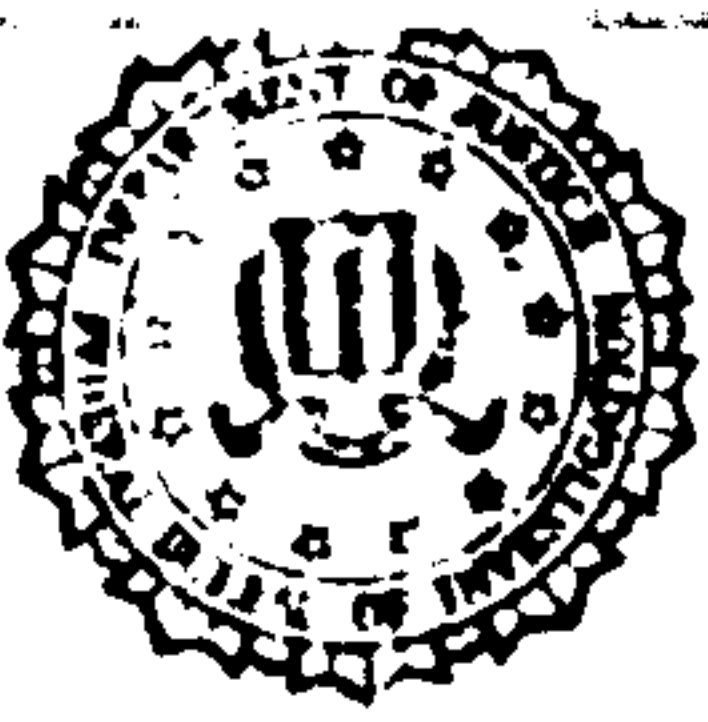

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

The President's Commission advised during a recent appearance on the Barry Gray program, which is broadcast nightly over Station WMCA, New York City, Mark Lane alleged that several months before he had advised the Federal Bureau of Investigation of a witness to the Tippit shooting. This alleged witness, who is a woman, was reported to have been interviewed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation but she was never called as a witness by the President's Commission. She is alleged to have stated she saw two people involved in the Tippit shooting, one on each side of the street, conversing with each other. After the shooting of Tippit, these two men were alleged to have run in opposite directions. In the broadcast, which was taped, Lane refers to the woman as "another witness to the Tippit killing" and "this other eyewitness to the murder of Patrolman Tippit."

The President's Commission, by undated letter received at Federal Bureau of Investigation headquarters, Washington, D. C., July 29, 1964, requested it be advised whether Mr. Lane or anyone associated with him furnished information to the Federal Bureau of Investigation about a witness meeting the above description, and whether or not such a woman was interviewed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The President's Commission also requested to be advised whether the name of this witness was furnished to it if such a witness exists.

A review of all references to Mark Lane contained in the files of the Dallas Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was made and no information was located indicating

Mr. Lane, or an associate, furnished information regarding a woman witness to the shooting of Tippit as described previously. It is noted in this connection, that as late as April 30, 1964, Lane, in his speeches, stated there was only one eyewitness to the Tippit shooting, namely, Helen Louise Markham.

✓ A review of the investigation relating to the shooting of J. D. Tippit was made, and there is only one known **(FEMALE)** eyewitness to the shooting. This one eyewitness is Helen Louise Markham, who has testified before the President's Commission.

It was noted during a review of the results of investigation relating to the Tippit shooting, the report of Special Agent Robert P. Gemberling, Dallas, Texas, dated March 10, 1964, on pages 262-264, sets forth the interview of Ted Callaway. Mr. Callaway, who, on November 22, 1963, was employed at Harris Brothers Auto Sales, 501 East Jefferson, Dallas, Texas, stated at about 1:00 P.M. that date he heard about five shots, which apparently came from the back of the car sales lot on 10th Street. He stated he ran out on the Patton Street side of the sales lot toward 10th Street, looking in the direction of 10th Street, when he observed a person running in a sort of trot on the east side of Patton toward Jefferson Avenue. This man had a pistol in his right hand in a "raised pistol" position. He said the man was across the street from him and he hollered at the man, "Hey, man, what the hell is going on!" He said the man slowed his pace, shrugged his shoulders and made an unintelligible reply and continued toward Jefferson.

Mr. Callaway said he called to salesman B. D. Searcy and told him, "Keep your eye on that man and follow him." Callaway then went to the place on 10th Street east of Patton where Patrolman Tippit was lying in the street, apparently dead.

The report of Special Agent Gemberling dated February 11, 1964, on page 93 sets forth an interview with Mrs. Mary Brock, who, on November 22, 1963, was employed at the Balley Texaco Service Station located in the 600 block of East

Jefferson Street' in Dallas. Mrs. Brock advised that at about 1:30 P.M. on November 22, 1963, a man came past her walking at a fast pace. About five minutes later two individuals from Johnny Reynolds Used Car Lot came to the station and inquired if she had seen a young white man come by the station. She advised them she had and the person was last observed in the parking lot directly behind Ballew's Texaco Service Station. Mrs. Brock identified a photograph of Lee Harvey Oswald as being a picture of the individual she had seen. Mrs. Brock is not known to have appeared before the President's Commission, nor is it known whether she was interviewed by any member of the President's Commission.

On August 3, 1964, Mrs. Mary Brock, who now resides at 3519 30th Street, telephone Swift 9-5545, Lubbock, Texas, advised a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that she has not been contacted by Mark Lane, attorney, or anyone representing Lane, concerning the Lee Harvey Oswald matter. She has not furnished a signed statement to anyone concerning the Oswald matter, and, to her knowledge, no one has taped an interview with her.

She advised the first week of July 1964, she received a telephone call from a man who identified himself as George Nash, a law student at Columbia University, who claimed he was calling from Dallas, Texas, and was doing research on the assassination of President Kennedy. Nash asked her if she was the one who observed Lee Harvey Oswald walk, or run, through a service station, in Dallas, on November 22, 1963, and she informed she had seen Oswald. He asked her some questions concerning Oswald's actions and terminated the interview. He did not ask her if she had seen Oswald shoot Officer Tippit of the Dallas Police Department, and she certainly did not tell him she had witnessed the slaying of Officer Tippit.

She advised the only interviews she has had concerning Oswald were with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the telephone conversation had with George Nash the first week of July 1964.

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

The report of Special Agent Gemberling dated November 30, 1963, on pages 74-76, sets forth interviews with W. W. Scoggins, who on November 22, 1963, was employed as a cab driver for the Oak Cliff Cab Company, Dallas, Texas.

Scoggins advised that at approximately 1:25 p.m. on November 22, 1963, he was sitting in his cab preparing to eat his lunch. His cab at that time was parked on the east side of Patton Street facing north at 10th Street at a point where a stop sign had been, but which had been removed.

He observed a policeman in a squad car going east on 10th Street at a slow rate of speed. This officer stopped on 10th Street just east of Patton, got out of his car, and apparently said something to a man walking west on the south side of 10th Street. When the officer spoke to him, the man stopped.

The next thing that attracted Scoggins' attention was a gun firing and he heard three or four shots, saw smoke near the squad car, and saw the officer fall beside the car on the driver's side. The man, whom the officer had stopped, started running, proceeding west on 10th Street to Patton Street and then south on Patton Street onto Jefferson Avenue. As this man passed Scoggins' cab, he muttered either "Poor dumb cop" or "Poor damn cop", and he was observed to have a pistol in his left hand.

On November 23, 1963, Scoggins identified Lee Harvey Oswald as being the same individual whom he had seen shoot a uniformed police officer of the Dallas Police Department in the 400 block of East 10th Street on the early afternoon of November 22, 1963.

The report of Special Agent Gemberling dated April 15, 1964, on pages 232 and 233, records an interview with Barbara Jeannette Davis, who on November 22, 1963, was residing in an apartment at 400 East 10th Street, Dallas, Texas, the apartment building being located at the southeast corner of East 10th Street and Patton Street.

She advised that shortly after 12 noon, November 22, 1963, she had put her two children to bed for a nap and she had lain down with them. Her sister-in-law, Virginia Davis, was lying on a couch in Barbara's apartment at this time.

Approximately 15 to 30 minutes later she heard two loud reports, which she thought were gunshots. She and her sister-in-law ran to the front door of the house and looked out. She observed a young white man walking across her front yard in a southwesterly direction, who had a pistol in his hand and who appeared to be trying to unload it. The chamber of the pistol was open and he was shaking it as he walked. She and this individual looked at each other and he then disappeared around the corner of the house on Patton Street.

At this point she heard a woman, who was standing on the northwest corner of the intersection of East 10th Street and Patton Street, scream "He shot him, he shot him, he killed him", and saw her point toward a police car parked on East 10th Street, a short distance east of her residence. After seeing the police car approximately a house and a half from her residence, she went into her residence and called the police. She later went to the police car where she observed a uniformed police officer lying on the ground bleeding.

Later that same evening she identified a man in a line-up at the Dallas Police Department as being the same man whom she observed walking across the front of her yard carrying a pistol and trying to empty it. She later learned the individual, whom she identified, was Lee Harvey Oswald.

The report of Special Agent Gemberling dated April 15, 1964, on pages 234 and 235, records an interview with Virginia Davis, who on November 22, 1963, was also residing in an apartment at 400 East 10th Street, Dallas, Texas.

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

Virginia Davis stated sometime between 1 and 2 p.m. on November 22, 1963, she was lying on a couch in the apartment of her sister-in-law, Barbara Jeannette Davis, when she heard a loud noise like a blowout of a tire. After hearing a second loud noise, similar to the first one, she and her sister-in-law ran to the front door of the house and looked out. She observed a white man crossing the lawn in front of her residence, who was carrying a pistol and shaking it as if he were attempting to empty out some shells. He was walking in a southwesterly direction and disappeared around the corner of the house on Patton Street.

At this point she heard a woman, later identified as Mrs. Markham, who was standing on the northwest corner of the intersection of East 10th Street and Patton Street, scream "He's dead, he's dead, he shot him, call the police." She and her sister-in-law then went back inside the house and Barbara called the police. Shortly thereafter she and Barbara went to the vicinity of a police car, which was about 50 feet east of her home, and she observed an officer lying on the ground near the police car, who had blood on his face and chest.

Later that same evening she identified a man in a line-up at the Dallas Police Department as being the same man she observed walking across the lawn in front of her residence emptying a pistol. The man she identified was Lee Harvey Oswald.

It should be noted neither Barbara Jeannette Davis nor Virginia Davis actually saw the shooting of Dallas Police Officer J. D. Tippit, but they did observe Lee Harvey Oswald leaving the scene.

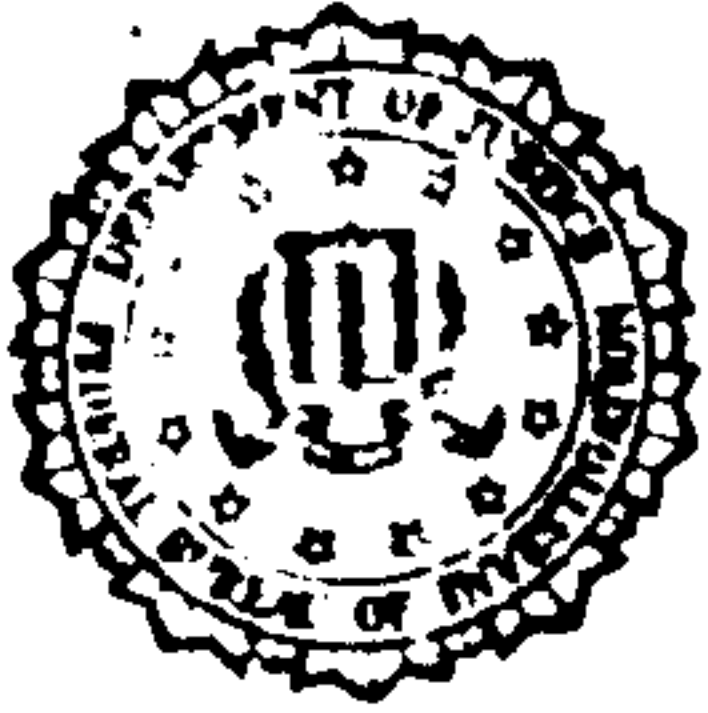

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

The President's Commission, by letter dated July 24, 1964, requested investigation concerning the following allegations:

- X. Dallas Police Officer J. D. TIPPIT violated radio procedures in failing to notify his headquarters that he was stopping to question a suspect ~~(LEE HARVEY OSWALD)~~.
- X. Prior to the assassination, Dallas Police Officers searched other buildings in the vicinity of the Texas School Book Depository but not the Texas School Book Depository itself.
- X. Precautions taken by the Dallas Police Department on November 22, 1963, prior to the assassination included surveillance of many people, including some who did no more than speak in favor of school integration.

On July 28, 1964, JESSE E. CURRY, Chief of Police, Dallas Police Department, Dallas, Texas, advised there is no requirement or regulation of the Dallas Police Department requiring any police officer ~~to~~ notify headquarters when such officer is stopping to question a suspect. He stated that if the officer is going to be away from his radio, he is required to check out with the radio dispatcher at the Dallas Police Department. He also stated that if an officer is alone and is stopping an automobile to question the occupant or occupants, the officer is required to contact the radio dispatcher at the

Dallas Police Department and give the model, the license number and the location of the automobile stopped. He stated Officer J. D. TIPPIT did not violate radio procedure in not notifying the radio dispatcher at the Dallas Police Department that he was stopping the then suspect LEE HARVEY OSWALD to question him.

Chief CURRY advised that prior to the assassination of President KENNEDY, the Dallas Police Department did not search any buildings in the vicinity of the Texas School Book Depository Building, the Texas School Book Depository Building itself, or any other buildings.

Chief CURRY advised that prior to President KENNEDY's visit to Dallas on November 22, 1963, he was advised of this proposed visit by Secret Service. Chief CURRY stated the Criminal Intelligence Division of the Dallas Police Department conducted a diligent investigation of organizations comprised of members whose political views are considered extreme, both right and left. He said the Dallas Police Department had infiltrated these organizations and had informant coverage regarding their activities. He said this investigation disclosed that only two of these organizations planned demonstrations during President KENNEDY's visit to Dallas. Chief CURRY advised that Chief of Police ANDY ANDERSON, Denton, Texas, notified the Dallas Police Department that the Young People's Republican Club at North Texas State University, Denton, Texas, planned to meet with General EDWIN WALKER's group and organize a demonstration somewhere along the route of President KENNEDY's motorcade in Dallas. Chief CURRY stated a representative of the Criminal Intelligence Division of the Dallas Police Department contacted the Young People's Republican Club at North Texas State University regarding the proposed demonstration and, as a result, the demonstration did not materialize. Further, CURRY stated, the Criminal Intelligence Division of the Dallas Police Department learned that General WALKER departed Dallas on November 21, 1963, en route to another state for a speaking engagement and his group did not make an appearance.

In addition, Chief CURRY stated, he was informed by Chief of Police ANDERSON, Denton, Texas, several weeks prior to President KENNEDY's visit of November 22, 1963, that NORMAN LEE ELKINS, 1115 West Crawford Street, Denison, Texas had made comments that he intended to do something to embarrass President KENNEDY. He stated Detective H. M. HART and Lieutenant JACK REVILL of the Dallas Police Department, and JOE HOWLETT of Secret Service, contacted ELKINS and he advised he was not going to be in Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963.

Chief CURRY advised the Criminal Intelligence Division of the Dallas Police Department learned that the Indignant White Citizens Council had prepared some signs and placards which were designed to embarrass President KENNEDY. He stated the Indignant White Citizens Council planned to picket the Dallas Trade Mart and were the only demonstrators observed at the Dallas Trade Mart. CURRY advised that shortly after the assassination of President KENNEDY, six of these individuals were taken into custody by the Dallas Police Department to prevent their assault by spectators at the scene.

Chief CURRY stated the Dallas Police Department had no one under surveillance on November 22, 1963, as a precaution taken during President KENNEDY's visit to Dallas.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

During the week of July 20 Mr. Wesley J. Lieleler of our staff took the testimony of certain witnesses concerning the possibility that Lee Harvey Oswald had a telescopic sight mounted on a rifle and sighted at the Irving Sport Shop, 221 East Irving Boulevard, Irving, Texas. That testimony has raised questions concerning which we would like you to conduct the following investigation:

1. Mrs. Gertrude Hunter, 141 South Hastings, Irving, Texas, testified that she remembered the automobile in which she claimed the Oswalds drove to the Furniture Mart at 149 East Irving Boulevard early in November 1963 because it was similar to an automobile owned by some friends of hers in Houston, a Mr. and Mrs. Dominick. Mrs. Hunter claims the automobile is a two-tone blue and white 1957 Ford. While we do not have the full name and address of the Dominicks, we would appreciate it very much if you would interview them to determine whether or not they owned such an automobile on or reasonably prior to November 15, 1963, and whether or not they had indicated to Mrs. Hunter any intention of visiting her in early November 1963.

2. Both Mrs. Hunter and Mrs. Edith Whitworth, 315 South Jefferson, Irving, Texas, the owner of the Furniture Mart, claimed that the Oswalds came to the Furniture Mart on a Wednesday or Thursday preceding the weekend on which the Irving High School football game was held.

team played the football team of Richland Hills High School of Fort Worth. Those ladies think that the Oswalds were in the Furniture Mart either on November 6 or 7, or on November 13 or 14, 1963. The dates on which the Oswalds were allegedly in that store could be narrowed to two possible days if you would determine the date on which the above football game was actually played.

After you determine the precise Wednesday or Thursday on which Mrs. Whitworth and Mrs. Hunter claim the Oswalds were in the Furniture Mart, would you please interview Mr. Roy Truly of the Texas School Book Depository and determine if he can ascertain from any records in his possession whether or not Oswald was away from the premises of that Depository during the afternoon hours of either of the days in question. It has occurred to us that the orders which Oswald filled may be noted to indicate the time at which they were filled, or that Mr. Truly could possibly tell whether or not Oswald was away from his work at any time during those days by examining the number or volume of orders which Oswald filled.

3. Would you please determine the whereabouts of Mr. Charles Woodrow Greener, 2015 Rosebud, Irving, Texas, owner of the Irving Sport Shop, during the period from Friday evening November 22, 1963 to November 28, 1963, and whether or not he had any conversations with his employee, Mr. Dial D. Ryder, during that period. In that connection we note that Messrs. Greener and Ryder discussed, apparently prior to the afternoon of November 23, 1963, when Ryder "discovered" the work ticket bearing Oswald's name, the possibility that Lee Harvey Oswald may have been in the Irving Sport Shop at one time or another. In spite of that, however, Ryder claims that he did not tell Greener about the ticket that he allegedly discovered on Saturday afternoon until some time after November 25, 1963, when he told an agent of your Bureau that the work covered by the ticket must have been done during the period November 1-14, 1963. Ryder later based that determination on the fact that Greener did not remember that the work covered by the ticket had ever been in the shop. It is apparent that Ryder could not have made that determination on November 25, 1963 unless he had previously discussed the matter with Mr. Greener, which, of course, he claims that he did not. While it actually appears from Mr. Greener's testimony before this Commission that he was not aware of the existence of the ticket until the entire

subject was discussed in the Dallas Times-Herald on November 28, 1963, we would appreciate advice concerning his whereabouts during the above-mentioned period, as to whether or not he ever discussed the ticket with Ryder prior to November 28, 1963, and as to when and how he first learned about the existence of the "Oswald" repair tag.

Your continued cooperation is appreciated.

Enclosed for Dallas is one copy of the same two self-explanatory letters and a copy of the Bureau's acknowledgment of her first letter.

No information identifiable with Miss Miller could be located in Bureau files.

Louisville is instructed to promptly contact Miss Miller, acknowledge receipt of her most recent letter to the Director and interview her thoroughly concerning the allegations contained in both letters. Specifically question her concerning her alleged meeting with one Harvey Lee or Lee Harvey during September, 1963, at Louisville, who she feels looks like Oswald. She should also be questioned about her male acquaintance who is alleged to have used a name similar to an alias used by Oswald (O. H. Lee, A. J. Hidell). If necessary, consideration should be given to locating and interviewing her male companion and question him specifically about alleged knowledge and his introduction of Harvey Lee to Miss Miller.

You should be alert to the possibility Miss Miller may be reacting to a rejected love affair and might be furnishing misleading information in an effort to create problems for her former boy friend. Consequently, Miss Miller should be discreetly made aware of the possible penalties

for furnishing false information to a Federal officer.

The results of all necessary investigation should be incorporated in one letterhead memorandum without property stamp, suitable for immediate dissemination to the President's Commission without need for correction and/or revision. The letterhead memorandum should also include true copies of Miss Miller's letters and a paraphrased paragraph on the Bureau's reply to her initial letter. This information should be set out in a logical sequence for intelligent evaluation and understanding. While a copy of this letterhead memorandum must be furnished to Dallas, no inserts will be necessary for Dallas.

Expedite, as Commission is endeavoring to wind up its inquiry at an early date.

NOTE: Miss Miller's first letter 12-4-63, posed several questions to the FBI concerning the assassin and made substantially the same allegation as her most recent letter. Her 12-4-63, letter was acknowledged advising her we were thoroughly investigating the assassination and the results would be furnished to the Commission, and because of this we were unable to furnish her answers to her questions. (105-82555-367)

Miss Miller's most recent letter indicates she may have been victimized by a [redacted]. Nevertheless her allegations are of such a nature to require appropriate investigation since we do not specifically know of Oswald's whereabouts during September, 1963, as he was unemployed and we believe he was in New Orleans at the time. When the results of this investigation are received, the Commission will be advised accordingly.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

I have been debating for the past several months whether or not I should write and explain why I wrote you the letter of December 4, 1963. And have come to the conclusion that I should. If nothing else it will at least free my own mind. However I realize and have read in the papers that your organization has made the report, that President Kennedy's assassination was the act of one person alone, but then again I read that The Bureau of Investigation would check out all leads in the future.

I mentioned in my letter of December 4, 1963 that I thought possibly I saw a person in Louisville, Kentucky who looked like Lee Harvey Oswald, and asked you certain questions concerning the accused assassin of our late President, in which you were not at ease to disclose developments in connection with the investigation. As per your letter of December 9, 1963.

Referring to my letter of December 4, 1963-- After my party and I had left these three boys there on the street and went walking up the street toward the Sheraton Seelbach hotel, this fellow I was walking with suddenly started bumping people with his shoulder (hitting their side or shoulder) and I ask him what he was doing and he said Quote- "This is how the president is guarded--I use to do a little of that duty by self." I said, "you are fixing to get your self into a fight--" And he bumped at least two more people. Now that I think back about it, he seemed up-set and very emotional or maybe I should say he acted for a few short minutes very strange.

I had met this person in Prestonsburg, Kentucky around July 1963, and for approximately two months had a very close association with him. I collaborated with him in reference to writing and poetry etc. Being a very good conversationalist I thought him to a certain extent very interesting, and the fact that he was educated I found our relationship interesting in this field. While our relationship grew and our conversation became closer in these two months, he talked more to me than any one else.

He spoke of the Bay of Pigs in Cuba and that he was in that invasion. And had gotten scars from this invasion. One evening he fell asleep, and had a night-mare and spoke Cuban names. When he half way awakened he told me with tears in his eyes, about his buddies getting killed in that invasion. And ask me to never mention the incident.

Then before he left Prestonsburg, Kentucky and went to Louisville, Ky. he said he was with the C.I.A. and the money he earned from this organization was being sent to his children, somewhere in Colorado. He talked more of his family affairs, divorce etc. Living in Jacksonville, Fla. when all his marital problems came up, but I will not go into detail here about this.

One evening I remember I stopped by his room in Prestonsburg, Kentucky to pick up some papers, and a strange looking character was there. He introduced

November or the rest of the year. However occasionally he called me. He did have a school there in the city system.

I had an occasion to be in Louisville, Kentucky from September 6th. 1963 to September 10th. 1963 with a friend who is in our state government, and his wife. This friend of mine was working for our incoming governor who was elected that fall. And this was why I was at the Sieration Seelbach hotel with he and his wife. And of course I met again this gentleman associate with whom I was walking with as per my letter of December 1, 1963.

Approximately two months ago he called me from Louisville, Kentucky and more than once, he would keep me on the phone for an hour or over. He never seemed to want to hang up. This was strange as he was always liking with funds. Most of the time he would play a transistor radio over the telephone, for as long as our personal conversation should last. I thought this very strange, since it was costing money on long distance and knowing he was not financially able to do this. When he called one night I made up a tale to see how he would react. I told him that some men had been asking me questions about him, and he went all to pieces talking on the telephone. He said "Don't tell any one any thing about me!" I said, "Well I know nothing to tell, all I know is that you said you were in Floyd County on a Depe investigation, and the bootlegging situation. He said the following- Quote "Well Jo, certain things could be linked that would or could get me into serious trouble.

So this is one of the reasons that I am writing you this second letter because of this saying. And of course thinking that possibly I saw Oswald last September 7th. 1963 in Louisville, Kentucky. All the times I have talked to this party after seeing him in Louisville, Kentucky last September, he has never mentioned this fellow with the musical instrument on the streets in Louisville, Ky., with whom he conversed with and that I remembered and was told that these three boys were "Pick Pockets". But he has said many words to me on the telephone in a way to see if I would mention these past recollections.

I have received three or four letters from him in the past two months. Having ask him when he would make a visit back to the mountains, he always said his face was too familiar to ever return, and wrote the following in one of the paragraphs of his letters. ("AS to my being able to make a visit to you, you about all people should know the impossibility of that as I have tried repeatedly to explain to you. It just cant be done. If I did it would tear up some damn good work done by myself and some others. I cannot and will not do that, it nothing is a primary thing involving my code of ethics but it is also extremely hazardous. Need I say more along these lines?" UNQUOTE. This kind of writing sounds strange to me for any type of investigator. I don't believe they talk like this.

This fellow also has a name similar to that used to ship the gun from Chicago, Ill. to Dallas Texas. All this may not mean any thing, but I believe that I am in the right by writing you this information, and that it is my duty to do so. And I realize that this can be very dangerous talk.

Therefore Mr. Hoover, it is not my wish to get any person or persons in trouble or be involved my self, but I can assure you whether these words be worthy or un-worthy, that I do have a knack of remembering faces. And this has worried me, because I truly believe with all my heart, that the person I saw in Louisville, Kentucky last September 6th, or 7th. 1963 was Lee Harvey Oswald. Of course I also realize that its possible that I could be mistaken. But all these other strange occurrences linked together make me believe it this much stronger.

I trust that you will have confidence and a consideration for my recollections.

With much respect for you and your organization, and your great endurance with time. I beg to remain.

ReBuairtel requested that Dallas furnish the Bureau with one copy each of the three newspaper articles identified on page 461 of the report in this case of Special Agent (SA) WARREN C. DeBRUEYS dated 12/8/63 at Dallas. One copy each of these three newspaper articles is enclosed for the Bureau.

ReBuairtel referred to pages 291 and 304 of the report of SA ROBERT P. GEMBERLING dated 2/11/64 at Dallas. Page 291 deals with MARINA OSWALD's comments concerning ANITA ZIEGER and her boy friends. It is recorded on that page that MARINA identified ANITA ZIEGER as the person in the middle between "FREDERICK" and OSWALD in photograph No. 2 in Inventory Item No. 37. On page 304, the female in photograph No. 2, Item No. 37, is said to be ELEANOR ZIEGER.

On 7/30/64, MARINA OSWALD was interviewed in the office of her attorney WILLIAM A. MCKENZIE, Fidelity Union Life Building, Dallas, Texas. She was exhibited photograph No. 2 in Inventory Item No. 37 and she stated the female in this photograph is ELEANOR ZIEGER.
