With reference to Burad 7/31/64 and report by [REDACTED] with respect to the 1/29/64 contact between subject and her daughter and the mention of negatives, this undoubtedly refers to photographs taken while subject was in Moscow in the summer of 1963 and her desire to have copies of these photographs. It appears the negatives have been either lost or insufficient supplies were available to print them. The alternative is that the photographs contained something which is not mailable from Moscow and hence the long stalling action in furnishing them by ANITA to subject, her mother. This is somewhat bolstered by the references to ANITA's own darkroom and the taking of additional photographs of Radio Moscow personnel, which would indicate capacity to print photographs.

Should the Bureau desire further contact with subject, a ready opportunity will be available when the photographs and letters currently borrowed from her are returned.

Bureau is requested to advise Anchorage whether copies of the attached memorandum should be disseminated to local intelligence agencies. Copies are being retained by Anchorage pending Bureau advice.

Lillie May Rahm, residence 1738 First Avenue, Ketchikan, Alaska, telephone CA 5-3007, was interviewed by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Ketchikan on August 4, 1964.

She advised that her daughter, Anita May Zugoff, was born on November 18, 1919 at Lake Stevens, Washington, and in 1934 was taken to Russia by her father, William K. Zugoff, a Russian National. She also had two sons who were very young when taken to Russia in 1934 and they were killed during World War II.

She said that her daughter, Anita, is now Arita May Setyaeva, wife of Leo Setyaev, residing at Kotelnicheskaya 1/15, Sect V, Apartment 78, Moscow, U.S.S.R. She said that her daughter and son-in-law are both employed in the North American Section of Radio Moscow and in this employment her daughter uses the name Annette Setyaeva. She added that the daughter's married name is Setyaev, but that when referring to the female gender, an "a" is added; thus Setyaeva.

She advised that she lost all track of her daughter when she journeyed to Russia, but on an unrecalled date William K. Zugoff wrote to his uncle, Matt Zugoff, in Seattle, Washington, and mentioned that he was visiting Anita, giving her address. She added that Matt died in 1957.

She stated that she wrote to Anita and was pleased to get a reply from her, enabling her to thus establish correspondence with her daughter. She lost contact again with the daughter during World War II and cited this reason for being unable to furnish any information concerning the daughter during this period of time.

She said that she knows that her daughter was married sometime in 1939 or 1940 to one Boris (last name unknown). A daughter, Marina, was born of this marriage on June 25, 1941, probably in Moscow. She recalled that Marina was about one week old when they evacuated Moscow to the South in World War II. She said that she never did know the last name of Boris, so has never known her granddaughter Marina's last name.

She stated that she has never been sure what happened to Boris (last name unknown), but believes that her daughter divorced him, marrying Kirill Henkin, becoming Anita May Henkina, and at Radio Moscow was known as Annette Henkina. A son, Kostia, called "Bunny", was born to this marriage, about June 1, 1955. The daughter divorced Henkin and on August 24, 1962, married Leo Setyaev. Marina was married on January 26, 1962, at Moscow to Vasya (last name unknown). She said that Vasya is a ne'er-do-well, and predicted the marriage would not last. Kostia continues to live with his mother.

She advised that she visited in Moscow with her family, including Anita, Leo, Marina, and Kostia, from April 25, 1963, to September 28, 1963, on a visitor's visa.

She stated that while in Moscow she met many of the employees at Radio Moscow and she identified and furnished photographs of the following:

Lucy Pravdina, also known as Olga (Olga, she said, is the American translation of Lucy)

Sergie Rudin, also known as Eddie Rudin

Joe Adamov

Nikolai Sergeyev, also known as Nick Sergeyev

Annabelle Bucar, whom she said was an American who came from the Philadelphia area. She said Annabelle had married a Russian and had stayed in Russia, apparently while employed there by the United States. She mentioned that Annabelle is a particular friend of her daughter and that while she, Mrs. Rahm, was visiting in Russia, she saw a lot of Annabelle. She said that she called Annabelle "my little girl" and that Annabelle was very homesick and had cried not a little, muttering, "will I ever see my folks again?" She said that Annabelle very much desired to return to the United States.

She said that her daughter has applied on at least one occasion to her knowledge for a visa to visit America, but that the visa was turned down by the U.S.S.R. officials. She mentioned that her daughter would very much like to visit her in America and would come in a minute if she could get a visa and raise the money for the trip.

She said that she was unable to remember the names of many of the people she met.

She recalled that her daughter visits frequently in the country with Claudia and Nick (last name unknown) and that Nick is not the same Nick as Nikolai Sergeyev, the latter of whom works at Radio Moscow.

She recalled meeting Sashya and Anna (last name unknown), whom she identified as cousins of Kirill Henin, former husband of her daughter.

She stated that while she was in Russia, she was free to go almost anyplace with her daughter, although she recalled that there were places in and around Moscow where no one was permitted to go. The only specific place that she could recall was the reservoir, as she had on one day wandered up toward it and was stopped and turned back by a guard.

She said that she and her daughter correspond freely.

Lillie May Rahm is married to John Emanuel Fahm, a Ketchikan longshoreman.

Mrs. Rahm made available 22 envelopes containing 23 letters from her daughter, Anita May (Annette) Setyaeva (Setyaev), pertinent parts of which are quoted:

1. Letter dated April 25, 1963:

"I saw my boys off to Saratov, Leo's hometown.."

"Leo went to visit his father's grave, the 26th was his birthday, put some flowers on it and see his grandmother again.."

"...I couldn't get off at all. Annabelle is sick and Joe has taken a month's vacation."

"Bunny was so excited he was goggle-eyed. I think they will have a fine time, the two of them."

"I am so glad I could make John happy on his birthday, it was about all I could send.....I had it all planned to send him a crystal glass for tea with the Russian glass-holder. You know that's an old Russian custom to drink tea in glasses.I decided I'd better call the Custom's to make sure. So nothing doing - the glass-holder is silver and that's not allowed".

"We were so stricken about the earthquake..... The destruction you describe is certainly heartbreaking..... We had a quake here in Central Asia in a city called Ashkabad in 1949 or 1950, a very bad one - God, half the country was rushed there to work, doctors, nurses, and every kind of building worker. I think it's been entirely rebuilt now..."

"...don't you bother about sending me anything at all. When I wrote you about the Pant-hose and deodorant I had no idea...(you) were in the hospital....I won't refuse the books.....be sure and declare them just to make sure I get them.....I haven't read 'The Northwest Passage'.....and I'll be waiting for 'Mandingo'...."

"Zina and Michael came over for a short visit..."

"...there's a faint hope that we may be able to get another apartment. It means leaving this one to K. but I don't care anymore, let him rot in it! It's time we were in a place of our own..."

"You mentioned 'I hope' in your letter. That reminds me of what Marina told me. She went out to see Natasha several times and she came back simply floored. We always thought Natasha read so much as was so well educated and intelligent. It seems the besides studying English she doesn't do much other reading at all. Marina could hardly believe her ears. She says it must be her grandmother's influence but Natasha is so old-fashioned and backward and such a prude.....she never goes anywhere and never sees anything.....she has mentioned many times that you

helped her (Natasha) immensely with her English, she so enjoyed talking to you..."

1. Letter dated October 8, 1963:

"....Annabelle, Zina, Semyor, Anna and Tanya - - just about everybody has been asking about you..."

"...Sunday we went out to Claudia and Nick's..."

"K's daughter Annich arrived on the second of October. Leo and I had to help Kirill get his room ready, you know K. Sometimes it's comical. Leo says we've got a second baby on our hands, and he's hit the nail on the head I think. Annich brought me a big bottle of perfume....She will be leaving next Sunday, Oct. 12. I have accorded her what hospitality I could (I leave every morning at 10:30) and they have been just about as friendly as anyone could be without slobbering all over me. (K. would be only too happy to do that but I keep a nice big distance between)..."

"...she brought him some clothes, the only thing that affects me are 3 sweaters, bulky-knit, thick warm ones. Damn it, I can just see Leo in them. (K looks like hell in anything right now! Once again I must tell you what a difference there is in those two..."

3. Letter dated October 11, 1963:

"It was nearly a month since I had any news of you except the magazine (which Annabelle and I read from cover to cover)..."

"..Yes, Honey, the silver plate and pictures poses quite a problem doesn't it? Well, I guess it can't be helped."

Letter continues under date October 12.

"I got your ...parcel slips. Now I've quite a story to tell you, Honey. At the International Post (at the railway station where we used to go to

the country) I was asked who sent the parcels. I told them and it seems that on the parcels it was stated that the sender was Nordiska Kompaniet. According to our regulations Soviet citizens cannot receive anything from any foreign firm. I explained the circumstances and showed them your letter where you mentioned shopping at N.K. That cinched it and I got your two parcels."

"Bunny and Leo were at home . . .so we opened everything ...Leo in his lovely Chester sweater, and I in my beautiful Cashmere coat, the only one I've ever had..."

"K and his daughter were admiring it and fingering the cloth..."

"Oh yes, darling, before I forget. In the future please always address things to me. Leo isn't registered at my place and so cannot get parcels addressed to our apt. I got his parcel by taking a power of authority (or what ever it's called). So you see how many new things I learned yesterday. I asked also about the scales. There's only one way I can get them and that is if you send to one of the 4 firms dealing with the Soviet Union for what they call a 'license' here, I'm translating from Russian, Honey, so if it sounds crazy don't mind it. These firms send parcels to Soviet citizens (they have agreements with our Parcel Service to send anything to Russia) I was told you could order anything through them except canned food. But there's a catch in it, sweetheart. I get the parcel duty free but you pay extra. And I have a hunch that they might charge something awful.Here are the addresses:

"These agencies have offices in various cities. I imagine if there isn't one in Seattle, there must be one in San Francisco. . . .The customs inspector could not explain why I got the elec. frying pan. Luck, I guess."

...."The painting is over, Leo & I threw out loads of junk, there's only one trunk and desk in the hall now and they will go soon. I want to put the T.V. in the hall and have some armchairs there (if I ever get the money) I did want to put shelves in the dark room but I don't know whether it's worth it. If we can exchange the place I want to live alone naturally..... At least K doesn't bother us one bit . . . K. obviously seems to be willing to do everything to keep relations warm & friendly....he's working nearly all the time to get out of debt..."

"Zina came to see me yesterday..."

"I came to work in my coat today and Annabelle thinks it's gorgeous..."

"..Leo...been promoted again. I think when you were here he was to go to another section, or he was already there. Well now he's been made boss over his boss, he's one of three assistant heads of the whole radio news department...He so wanted to stay just a news commentator. I told him it wouldn't last long and I don't think he was there a week when they put him in a higher job."

"....excuse a very disjointed letter but I write in the studio between readings..."

A note from Leo was included in the letter.

"...we are in different shifts with Nita so in a day time I'm absolutely alone..."

4. Letter dated October 25, 1963:

"...I'm beginning to wonder when Maggie sent the 5 cartons of cigarettes she mentions in her letter. I haven't received any cigarettes since you left, and if they were sent in your name I doubt very much whether I'll ever get them..."

"..Did you try the Petrov vodka? Did you like it?..."

"Marina is back with her Grandmother. I see her about once a week. . .She's studying very hard right now and working every day. It's very tough on her but she keeps at it. . ."

"Zina's husband, Michael, came back from Berlin yesterday.Annabelle asks about you.."

5. Letter dated November 12, 1963:

"Your . . letter . . came . . . Bunny brought it to me in the kitchen where I was . . . making stewed cabbage with sausage. It's called soljanka, pronounce the j the way the Swedes do.."

"We have bought her (Maggie) a big album of L.P. records (10 in all) of popular Soviet Songs... There's a little book with (unfortunately in Russian) the scores. None of the songs are jazz . . . There are lots of songs by the Soviet Army Chorus which are considered very good..."

"...no cigarettes yet anywhere. Could you let me know when they were sent. . .Could Maggie ask the p.o. to send a tracer? . . . I can hardly believe that anything would be taken from a parcel. The seeds I can understand, they are not allowed anywhere....."

"When I saw the 75 cents in stamps on my letter & card last night I was ready to drop. My goodness, this letterwriting sure is an expensive pleasure for you..."

". . On the 9th Zina and Michael came over and we had a pleasant evening together..."

"...Leo finally bought his tape-recorder..."

6. Letter dated November 18, 1963:

". . my birthday. I got calls from Zina, Mariam, and Marina..."

"K. got up before I was even awake and came in with some lovely roses, a little black jewel box and a bouquet of chrysanthemums!! . . ."

"...I asked K. to stay with Bunny (the first time since his mother's death). He agreed, altho he didn't exactly seem crazy about the idea. Seems he was going to the movies at 6...."

7. Letter dated November 28, 1963:

"I'm just a little late in answering your letter . . . came in 9 days...because I received them on Friday, the day Pres. Kennedy was killed. I can't begin to describe the reaction here in the Soviet Union. We got the news late in the evening and you can't imagine the consternation it caused. People were calling each other up at midnight to report the horrible tragedy. I don't know how to describe to you what an effect it has had on everybody I know here. We have been talking of nothing else ever since it happened. People ask me: do things like that actually taken place in the 20th century in a country that assumes to be leading the rest of the world. What the Press calls the 'free world'? If that's their idea of freedom they can keep it. I still can hardly believe it. It is so shocking, so disgraceful. We were waiting for the news that Ruby was shot, too and were surprised that it didn't taken place. It's very strange but people here took it to heart so strongly, everyone was so deeply grieved especially for the Kennedy family. I don't think there was a dry eye among the millions who watched the T.V. program of the funeral. When I heard the taps I thought I'd break down entirely

8. Letter dated December 7, 1963:

"...I received two letters from you (Nov 6 and Nov 12.) on the day Kennedy was assassinated. Everybody was so stunned, shocked, and horrified here. We spent a great deal more time at work and of course we could talk about nothing else. It took a week

for it to wear off. I never dreamed that I could be so effected by such an event. I don't know how you feel about it, Honey, but American prestige has taken a blow from which I don't think it will ever recover. People here just couldn't believe it. I was asked: do such things really happen there? If it all weren't so tragic it would be like one of good old serial pictures. After Oswald was killed someone here, or maybe elsewhere, started the rumor that Ruby had been poisoned, and for at least half a day it persisted...."

"...Last Monday I went to a dentist because my teeth sure need some repairing. I had two pulled. . . the first one came out alright, the second one was a wisdom tooth. . . I was in that dental chair for nearly two hours with the dentist pounding with hammer & chisel trying to dislodge that root (or rather three roots). When it finally came out I was nearly unconscious. Anyway my dentist was soaking wet.... After I had the teeth out I had a fever for nearly a week and was in misery. I couldn't work because my mouth and face were all swollen up something awful..."

"Bunny and Olga went to the circus today..."

"Zina and Michael celebrated their 5th wedding anniversary on Dec. 5...."

"...Zina bought me some very nice leotards . . . my legs are so long that they were short in the crotch and I must give them to Marina now..."

"Honey, don't worry about Marina. . . she is trying to finish a letter to you which she started some weeks ago. She has so very little time. She's doing very well in her studies. I think I told you she once had a very pleasant boy friend in Riga. He's a big tall handsome fellow. They have started corresponding again and she hopes they will see each other sometime in the future. She met him when she was there with me. He's going to be a doctor. Then she has gone out several times with Vasya's best friend, but she says they are only friends. She doesn't lack company at all. What she does lack is time. Oh, Honeybunch, I must tell you a funny thing that happened about a week ago. Marina was here and she happened to pick up the receiver the same time as

Kirill, but she didn't know it. She was just going to answer when a woman's voice asked 'did you call me?' K said 'Yes, Fluffy I called you ten minutes ago.' Marina nearly fell over. She said, You know, Mother, somehow I never realised how sickening that whole affair was although I knew about it. When I heard that 'Fluffy' I felt like vomiting. Since that day Marina can't stand the sight of him. Before that she had always felt so sorry for him. She says that one word made her see how false, insincere, and dishonest he was. Because Fluffy is not the only one by a long shot, and a very long shot at that!...

"I see Annabelle every day at work now. . . She had an awful accident about a month ago, rather her husband did. He was having his car repaired and some men were doing a soldering job and didn't want to remove the gas tank from the car. To make a long story short: - the car and the garage bursted down in something like 8 minutes. They were heart-broken at first but now they're feeling better. The garage has been rebuilt and the car can be and is being fixed. But it took all the money they had on an insurance bond. They borrowed on it and now will have to pinch like everything to pay it back. It's very difficult to live like that. . "

9. Undated letter and card saying Happy New Year:

"This is the nearest I could find to a Xmas card but you will understand that I wanted to wish you a very happy Christmas and a wonderful New Year..."

"...I have tried to buy (Leo) a nice necktie but I guess the colors in style here just don't appeal to me. I wanted something red and all I could find was a deep cherry color which I'm just about positive Leo wouldn't wear, at least not with white specks!"

"...I've just returned from the dentist.. I've had nearly all my teeth in the upper left jaw removed. . . The X-ray showed the roots to be decaying. . . it's going to cost a tidy sum. So I guess it's teeth first, after all my job depends on that, and that means no coat right now. I just can't manage both at once, unless I borrow more and I'd hate to do that..."

10. Letter dated December 19, 1963:

"..Leo bought tickets to the New Years party for radio & T.V. workers at the T.V. Theater. . . . guess I'll have to pack Bunny off to Marina's grandmother..."

"...I'm very sorry to say that not a single cigarette has arrived let alone any clothes hangers or girdles..."

"..I don't think I can send your yellow cup with the lid. I'll try, but I was told that only new articles can be sent."

"Some fellow from Fairbanks got married to a Russian girl in Moscow today..."

11. Letter dated January 29, 1964:

"...Your magazine and the Borden's Condensed Milk Cook book arrived on New Year's eve, so that was very nice. The only thing is I don't have any condensed milk at present, and when I do have I use it with my coffee. Well, I can use the cook book when the canned milk will be plentiful again, which I hope won't be too far away..."

"We had a fairly nice time at the New Year's Party but along towards 3.A.M. we both wanted to go home very much and the theater was miles away from home. There wasn't a taxi to be had for love nor money so we had to wait until 5:45 for the subway to open. We got into bed at around 7:00 a.m...."

"...Anna and Semyor were at our house for dinner just after New Year. He told me he had found the negatives of those pictures and would print them for sure..."

Letter continues under date of January 31:

"There was a meeting or conference at work yesterday and I was feted on my 20th anniversary at Radio Moscow. I was awarded a pin with the inscription 'Honored Radio-Worker' on it and was cited in an order for good work. The section (or department) made me a present of some lovely silver spoons. Nick and Joe made a tape recording where

they said all kinds of nice things about me. In February (the next sitting of our Announcers Council) I have been put up for the highest category..."

"...my teeth ... all fixed. It cost a small fortune, but every cloud has a silver lining, I guess. I had been wracking my brain about the money when all of sudden K. tells me he put 500 roubles on my bank account, he was paid for some book...so my teeth are paid for and my debts too..."

"...I wonder if you could send Bunny and Leo something just alike for the summer I think if you could send them jeans just alike Bunny would be the happiest little guy alive. They both need them. I can find something in Leo's size but nothing for Bunny..."

"....would you send me some cake mixes, you told me some of them are so nice. You know we had a bad harvest failure this year and are buying wheat abroad. So there's no flour. . . so if you can...do send the kind you buy and some frosting..."

12. Letter dated February 6, 1964:

".... you asked me if I have used the Buffet Server for pancakes. No, I haven't darling, for the simple reason that I got nothing to make pancakes out of. I have no flour. I wrote about that in my last letter; because of the crop failure last year we're very short of grain, cereals, and flour products."

13. Letter dated February 17, 1964:

"...I didn't have a darn thing for dinner today and I found a recipe in the little booklet which came with my buffet server called tuna rice casserole. In place of tuna fish I used a can of crabs and instead of sweet cream I used sour and omitted the Worcestershire sauce (because I don't have it) and the catchup (because it doesn't agree with me)...I put the crabs on top the rice when it was ready, added some more cream and sprinkled some cheese on top for good measure. . .we had some ice cream for dessert, so it was a regular feast..."

14. Letter dated February 29, 1964, letter continues under date of March 1st:

"I started my letter yesterday . . . in the studio while I was waiting for some stuff but didn't manage to write much because only Joe and I were on, and on Saturday we record two full programs. We are off on Sunday, except for the news. One comes in to read it at 11 p.m. Out of six announcers only Joe, Nick, and I are working. Annabelle, Eddie, and Olga are ill... We work daily and every third night on the night shift..."

"...Marina's boyfriend, Alexei, has no mother...his father is the same as Michael, he heads a theater..."

"Since you left. . . we didn't receive one single cigarette, none that Maggie sent, none that Nellie sent, just nothing.."

15. Letter dated March 18, 1964, letter continues under date of March 20th:

"...and also...please send me some deodorant, I'm down to my last bottle. K's got a whole shelf full but I'd rot before I'd ask him for any. He gets an awful lot from his daughter through travellers from Paris..."

"I had a chance of sending you something through a friend of a friend. . . but this person lives in Montreal and was afraid they couldn't be sent in the mail over the border so now I have to wait for this summer when somebody will be going to the States. . . .since they (silver spoons) are silver I can't send them in a parcel....so...you have a half dozen hand-designed Vietnamese tea spoons, even though you haven't got them yet...."

"...March 8th here is Women's day, and, believe you me, our stores resemble the pre-Xmas rush sales during a fire..."

16. Letter dated March 26, 1964, letter continues under date April 2nd:

"...I am so glad you got the cup & saucer. . . the little set is Saxe, the German firm whose trademark you will find on each piece - 2 crossed battleaxes. I don't know whether their

chinaware is sold in the U.S. but it's very famous and very expensive in Europe. That's why I'm so glad you didn't pay anything on it - I was so afraid you might be soaked something awful. I've seen beautiful dinner and tea sets, the average price is somewhere around \$200. . . ."

"...in my last letter. . I told you about some spoons I bought for you. They are on their way but you won't get them for a long time yet, so be patient, they will be slow but sure."

17. Letter dated April 6, 1964:

"....I haven't talked in my sleep . . for ages, ever since I divorced K...."

18. Letter dated April 15, 1964:

"..you wrote me that you received the addresses . . . the only reason I sent you those addresses was that at the Custom's they told me I could have anything sent through those firms. What I wanted you to do was to inquire about scales, would it be reasonable more or less, or would they charge a fortune to send a bathroom scales..."

"... what happened to those stockings. Did you send them long ago. If I knew the date I could inquire maybe. If for some reason they are not allowed now, surely they would come back. Although the cigarettes certainly didn't come back..."

"..We are trying to get accomodations at a resort hotel through our trade union because otherwise I'm very much afraid that we'll spend all our time trying to get our meals along with about a million other vacationers. But I very much doubt whether we'll get anything...."

"..It's very tireing to work every day after 19 years of night work.."

19. Letter dated May 21, 1964:

"...Leo and I received accomodations to the same resort in Yalta where I was in 1961 and '62 - from the 9th of June.... they don't usually allow

children there but if I can't pay for Bunny's meals at the resort there we'll feed him some place else..."

"... I want to tell you about . . . the apartment . . . Cooperative building is experiencing a terrific boom right now. Up till now, as I told you when you were here, all housing was built at the expense of the State and turned over to tenants at very low rents. The state-financed or rather gov't-financed building is still going on full blast, but now anybody who wants to (mostly the higher-paid workers) can join a cooperative development and buy their own apartment. You make one cash payment (40% of the cost) and the rest is in installments (monthly) for 10 or 15 years. So now we are terribly excited about the prospect of finding a cooperative building in a location favorable to us and joining. It's taking me one hell of a time to collect the necessary papers. Leo's already got his, but mine are in an awful mess because the apt. is still in K's mother's name. We've been chasing around for three weeks looking at various places - most of what we saw are too far from the subway. One place we did like, right next to the subway, not far from our house. It's a 3-room apartment, kitchen, bath, a big closet in the bedroom, balcony in the living-room. Now all we have to do is get in, but my papers are holding us up and I'm scared stiff everything will be taken by the time we can join. . . .K. has promised to pay a part so we should manage without any skimping. Leo's mother gave us all her savings for the first down payment and we've figured that we'll pay her back in a year, maybe even less, depending on K..."

"...There are a great many cooperatives and we've got to ferret out something suitable. We missed joining our radio cooperative development because at that time we couldn't have a 3-room apt. - now we can. There's another building going up but there will only be 1 and 2-room apts. They are too small for us. Joe was the one who got us started. He's also looking for a suitable 3-room apartment. Nick just moved into his 2-room apt. out on the road to the airport where you arrived. It's a lovely location, right next to a big reservoir. The new housing projects are so bright and gay . . . the ceilings are much lower than ours and windows low & wide. ."

". . Nick's apartment is lovely. The whole development is white and the houses are all trimmed in different colors red, green, yellow and so on. They look so bright and clean. By the way, Nick took some new pictures of the announcers yesterday so I'll have something new for you soon. I have reminded Senya so many times about those pictures that it's embarassing. . ."

". . the cake mixes and frosting arrived the other day and I paid very little duty on the parcel. Leo appreciated the cigarettes immensely.."

". . was Red flower the name of the candy you liked so much? We have so many candies Red Moscow, Red candy, Red Flower and so on. . ."

". . I think it would be marvelous if you could go to Sweden . . I don't know about myself . . . I'd rather visit you in Ketchikan. We might be able to come all three of us. Could you stand that? Of course, it would only be for a month . . because Leo's vacation is 28 days. So when I apply for a visa I'd rather apply for one to Alaska than Stockholm.

20. Letter dated May 30, 1964:

". . we got the accomodations . . leaving on Friday, 5th of June. . . The Crimean beaches are steep and stony but to me it'll be pure heaven to sit and do nothing. ."

"About the apartment . . I've found just the thing we want, but I can't get my documents from our house management. I hope to God they hurry up. The Moscow University is building an immense cooperative apartment house at the end of one of the subway lines called Southwest. . . The three-room apts. have any number of built-in cupboards, a big balcony (the Italian loggio) a nice entry-hall, bath & lavatory separate, and a nice kitchen. . . The building will be completed at the end of next year. . . Now all we've got to do is join the cooperative, but I can't do that without a lot of papers from our house management. Leo has his long ago. . . The location is on the edge of Moscow but we have decided it's about time we began thinking about our health and

and the air out there is lovely....Right now it's just an open field with the Metro station in the middle . . . I'm sick of living in the heart of Moscow. It's so noisy I can't sleep in the morning at all. ."

Letter continues under date May 31:

". . . I made the chocolate cake and used the creamy white frosting. Maybe I was supposed to use the French vanilla I didn't know. . . those cake mixes are gorgeous. It took me half an hour to make it. . When I'd finished I just couldn't believe I'd made a cake . . . let whoever wants have the real cakes. I'll take the mix any day. . ."

21. Letter dated June 19, 1964 at Yalta:

". . . I got accommodations for Bunny too when we came here. . . We have a nice clean little room with twin beds with a big tree in front of the porch. . ."

22. Letter dated July 3, 1964:

". . . We flew in (to Moscow) very late . . . Leo thought it would be better to fly at night . . . The trip from Yalta to Simferopol where the airport is located is 2 hours, from there to Moscow it's nearly 2 hours, and from the Unukovo airport to the city is 1 hour. . ."

". . . if you have what they call foot-savers or is it stocking-savers please send me a couple. It's simply impossible to wear stockings in this heat. ."

Letter continues under date of June 5th, (actually July):

". . . my plan to send Bunny to camp fell through . . . Finally Marina managed to get her vacation in July instead of August and she will take Bunny to Estonia where I was in 1960 . . . Marina needs a rest. . . Since January Anna kept telling me that there was nothing to worry about. Then at the very last minute they refused to take Bunny because he is her nephew and not her son. If it weren't for Marina I don't know what I would have done. . . . I

shall have to borrow some money. . . things are rather expensive in the Baltic area - rent is much more. . . "

". . . We have cabbage again. . . "

". . . I should get my papers this week I think. It took two months just to have the apt. put in K's name. Now I should get all my documents signed. . . I think I wrote you before leaving that we were there with Leo and his papers were taken and we signed up for a 3-room apt with kitchen, bath, toilet and a big balcony - loggia (built-in). . . They called up from the university yesterday to ask about my papers. It's an awful long way out there - it will take us nearly an hour to get to work. . . Moscow seems to be getting hotter and dirtier with every year. . . "

". . . Nick is crazy about his new apartment and he's also a 40 minute ride from the radio, but he's on the same subway line. . . "

". . . We went out on the subway and at present the station 'Southwestern' is in the middle of an open field, behind the university building. . . "

". . . About the cakes. . . they were simply heavenly. . . Leo went to town on the yellow cake. . . I like the frosting where you add 1 tbsp of butter, besides the eggs, it's nicer than the other ones and much easier to beat up without a mixer. . . planning on making a strawberry short cake. . . if strawberries get a bit cheaper. . . I brought some flour with me from Yalta so you can send me the can of baking powder you bought. . . I think it is good flour. It's not too white, but will do. . . "

". . . Leo has finally taken up photography. . . So you should be getting some pictures. He developed his first ones last night. . . He's using a simple little camera K. gave to Bunny for his birthday.

23. Letter dated July 12, 1964:

". . . Leo's mother is . . . having a rest at a mineral springs place in the Caucasus. . . "

" . . . tell Maggie . . . we were both tickled to know that the records came through. We thought they went the way of the cigarettes and other things. . ."

"P.S. . . I'm dying for something to read."

We have obtained another photograph that was made by Photographer John Mazziotta of The Dallas Times Herald who took the original photograph referred to above as Yarborough Exhibit A. This new photograph was taken a few seconds prior to the Yarborough Exhibit A photograph and shows the shirt being worn by Oswald with better detail. A copy of this photograph is attached for your information. There is also attached a print from the original negative of the Yarborough Exhibit A photograph.

As previously pointed out, the original color slide of Gerald L. Hill Exhibit B is not available but a duplicate color transparency was obtained and an eight-inch by ten-inch color print of that transparency is attached. There is also attached an eight-inch by ten-inch color print of Gerald L. Hill Exhibit A that has been furnished by Life magazine which has the original color transparency. In addition there is no way for the stenographer to record inflection in a speaker's voice which, in conversation, gives many shadings of meaning to the words spoken. It is felt the actual recording helps clarify this point.

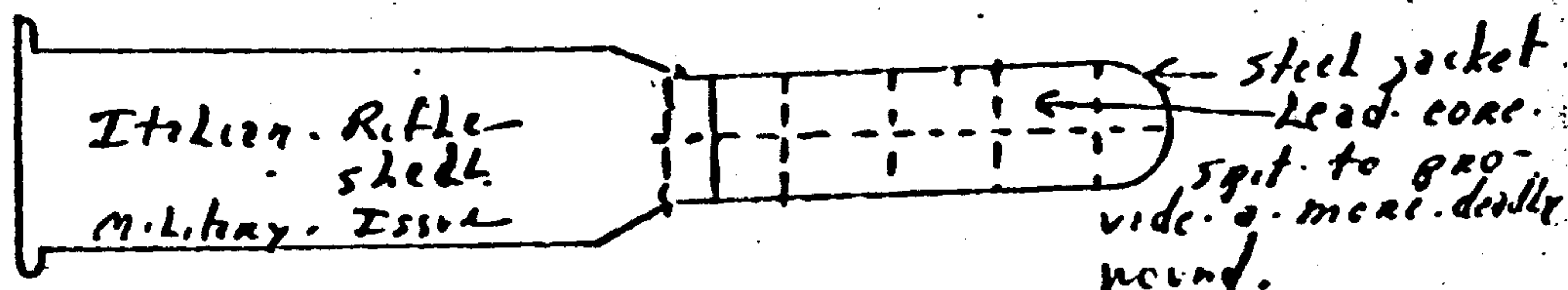

Mr. REEVES advised that a verification of HOY's
previous employment with General Motors in Dallas, Texas,
was requested on May 26, 1964, and the General Motors plant
in Dallas informed that HOY had been employed from June 4,
1963, to May 4, 1964, as a spot welder; had quit voluntarily,
and was not eligible for rehire. He had a very poor record.

employment at this plant and was not hired.

The following investigation was conducted by SA's ROBERT H. KARL and MERLE L. PARKER;

On August 18, 1964, Mr. I. KAWAMOTO, Manager, Post Hotel, 509 Banning, Los Angeles, California, produced his tenancy register which did not reveal any record of a MALCOLM J. HOY during the month of May, 1964. KAWAMOTO said HOY had never resided here.

On August 18, 1964, Mr. BOYD BROWN, Manager, Post Hotel and Apartments, 729 South Bonnie Brae, Los Angeles, California, advised that his records revealed that MALCOLM J. HOY and DAVID DARLING resided at this apartment-hotel from May 21, 1964, until May 29, 1964. They paid \$18.00 rent for their room, and they left no forwarding address when they left. BROWN could provide no further information concerning the two tenants.

MALCOLM J. HOY advised that he currently resides at 12020 Kessoch Avenue, Whittier, California. HOY was advised that he did not have to say anything, that anything he did say could be used against him in a court of law, and that he was entitled to consult an attorney before saying anything. HOY furnished the following voluntary information:

On November 22, 1963, HOY decided to drive downtown in Dallas, Texas, to purchase a radio and also to watch the motorcade in which President JOHN F. KENNEDY was being driven. HOY drove downtown sometime prior to 11 o'clock that morning in his 1960 four-door Star Chief Pontiac, metallic green color. He met no one en route and parked his car in a parking lot, which was in the vicinity of the Palace Theater in downtown Dallas. HOY did not recall the name of the parking lot.

HOY was dressed in dark colored pants, a sport shirt, and black shoes. He was carrying nothing in his hands and he walked down Main Street to the Gordon Jewelry Store where he purchased a radio on credit. The radio, which was approximately twelve inches long and four inches high, was placed in a paper bag and the bag had no string or cord around it.

After making the purchase, HOY returned to the parking lot where he placed the radio in his car. He then walked down to where the motorcade would pass, and he could observe the President. He did not recall the names of the streets nor the directions involved, but he was standing on the corner of the intersection facing the oncoming motorcade, and the automobile in which the President rode turned left and proceeded down toward a tunnel.

HOY heard what sounded to him like exploding firecrackers, and he believed he heard approximately four reports which sounded close together. HOY could just see the rear portion of the President's car and saw someone leap on the rear portion of the car. At that time, there seemed to be a lot of confusion and people running around.

HOY saw nothing that appeared to him to be unusual and since the President's car had now passed out of his sight, he turned away and walked down toward a group of theaters. He believed that the movie theater to which he went was the Palace Theater, but he was not certain, as there were about four theaters very close together. HOY recalled that the picture he went in to see was "Cleopatra."

He did not recall the specific part of the movie that was showing when he entered the theater, but approximately 35 minutes after he entered the theater he went to the lobby to get some candy. There, he heard some people say that the President had been shot. It was at that time that he first realized what had occurred, and that the noise that he thought was exploding firecrackers might well have been shots. HOY could not recall the specific number of shots that he had heard. HOY went back to his seat and a short time thereafter a man announced in the front of the theater that the President had been shot. Many people in the theater left at that point, but others stayed, and HOY stayed until he had seen the entire movie.

On leaving the theater, HOY bought a newspaper and thought that it was about 3 o'clock. He was not certain of the time. He returned to his car and drove back to his apartment. He talked to the apartment manager about the day's events and told the manager that he had heard a number of shots and saw the assassination. Actually, HOY said he had not seen any more than he had related above, and he did not recall whether or not he specified the number of shots he had heard.

HOY said he had no information pertaining to LEE HARVEY OSWALD, JACK RUBY, or the assassination of President KENNEDY except what he had spoken of above. He said he had never met OSWALD or RUBY personally and had never had any contact with them in any regard.

HOY said that outside of his time spent in the U.S. Army, he had only on one occasion ever actually owned

a gun. He said this gun to which he referred was an old single shot .22 caliber break open breech loading rifle which had been given to him by his landlady's son in the early part of 1963. He was then residing at 2222 Harlandale, Dallas, Texas. HOY bought some shells for the rifle and placed some pillows in his closet and a package of cigarettes on the pillows, after which he fired the rifle at the package of cigarettes. He said the bullets went through the pillows and into the woodwork and passed into another room where it chipped the porcelain off the bathtub. He said his landlady was greatly upset over his activity and called the police. HOY said he had no reason for shooting the rifle in his room except that it was something he felt like doing at the time and had no motive for doing it. HOY said he was subsequently approached by the police at his employment, but he was never arrested for it and was merely interviewed by them.
