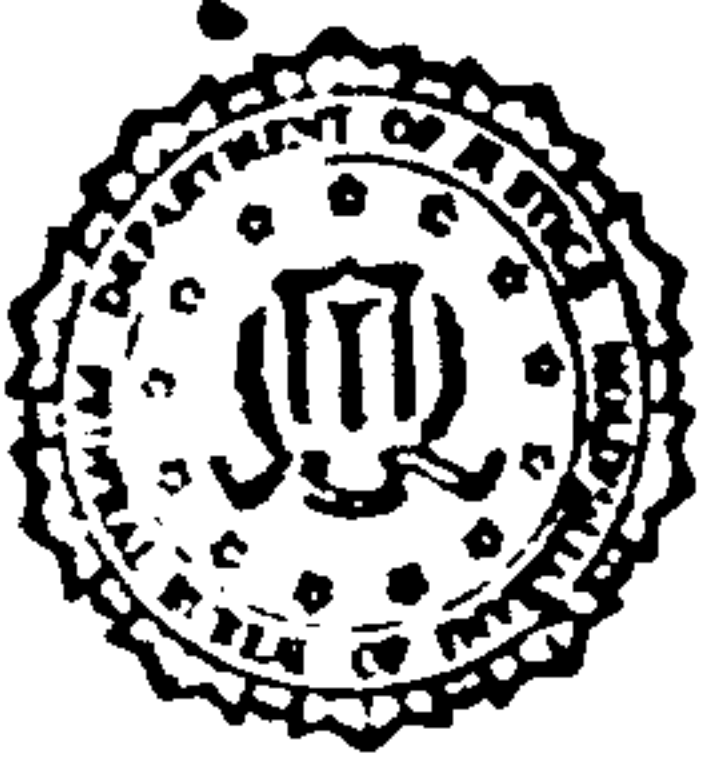

On September 10, 1964. GUILLERMO FIALLO, 2003 Laurel Street, an employee of A-Z Paper Company, 630 South Front Street, New Orleans, advised as follows:

FIALLO, it is to be noted, is the source of the original allegation on which this investigation was based, namely, that subject had some time ago planned to travel to Europe and Moscow. FIALLO advised on September 10, 1964, that since he was last interviewed by an Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on July 6, 1964 he has endeavored to determine subject's sympathies regarding FIDEL CASTRO. Source advised that he has had close contact with the subject in the past and has seen him several times since July 6, 1964, however, he did state that he has not had too close a contact with the subject during the last 30 days. FIALLO stated that he has endeavored in his contacts with the subject and with other persons who are known to the subject to ascertain whether the subject could possibly be pro-CASTRO or perform any activity on behalf of CASTRO. FIALLO stated that after all of his efforts he still retains his original firm belief that the subject is definitely anti-CASTRO and added that he has learned nothing that would cause him to believe that subject was anything but anti-CASTRO.

The information in report of SA J. WILLIAM LOVE, dated 11/30/62, at NY, captioned "CUBAN SABOTAGE EFFORTS IN THE UNITED STATES," (NYfile 105-58712 and Bufile 105-115667) on page 33, sets forth the name ORESTE ALFONSO as a person known to MANUEL BETANCOURT SANCHEZ back in Cuba.

has been interviewed on several occasions by SAs of the NYO, wherein he has expressed a cooperative attitude and voiced opposition to the present Cuban regime. SA JOHN D. HURLEY, Jr., contacted BETANCOURT on 9/22/64, at which time he advised that the only ORESTE ALFONSO known to him is still residing in Cuba and would be approximately 34 or 35 years of age at this date. He stated that ALFONSO was this individual's family name, not his matronymic name; consequently, the ALFONSO known to him cannot be identical with ORESTES FARRICIC PEÑA ALFONSO, wherein ALFONSO is used as a matronymic name.

Information copies are being furnished the offices as designated since they have received prior correspondence in this matter.

The Indices of the NYO contain no identifiable information pertaining to PAULA PEÑA.

The Indices of the NYO contain no references to subject other than prior correspondence from the OO.

Contact with the Credit Bureau of Greater New York was made by IC JOHN M. DUNAY, and contact with BCI, NYCPD, was made by SA AUGUST J. HICEK concerning the subject, with negative results.

NEW YORK RESIDENCES:

On September 1, 1964, [REDACTED] 530 West 123rd Street, New York City, advised that he had no record of the subject ever having resided at instant address. He further advised that there was no tenant presently living in the house who had resided at this address prior to 1950.

On September 9, 1964, [REDACTED] 49-06 66th Street, Woodside, New York City, owner of the house at this address, advised that he has resided at this address for the past five years, and that he is unaware of the present whereabouts of the previous owner. Consequently, [REDACTED] advised that he would have no knowledge regarding the subject's ever having resided at this address during the period 1952-1953.

On September 1, 1964, [REDACTED] 49-06 66th Street, Queens, advised that she vaguely recalls the subject as having resided at this address. She advised that his wife's name was PAULA, and that he resided in an apartment at this address for about one year approximately 12 years ago. She advised that she could furnish no information regarding the political beliefs of either the subject or his wife.

[REDACTED] owner, 135 West 69th Street, New York City, advised that the subject never resided at this address. She further advised that she has owned this residence for at least the last five years.

[REDACTED] Superintendent, 130 West 71st Street, advised after a review of subject's photograph, that the subject looked familiar, but that he does not know whether the subject ever resided at that address. He stated that the individuals residing at this address were mostly transients and that no one presently residing here has lived here for more than a year.

[REDACTED] 304 West 77th Street, New York City, who is acquainted with many individuals in the vicinity of 130 West 71st Street, New York City, advised that the subject is unknown to her.

On August 19, 1964, [redacted] owner, Belnord Residence Hotel, 209 West 87th Street, New York City, advised that he has no records of tenants dating back more than five years ago. (It is noted that this residence was completely renovated during the last two years).

On September 1, 1964, [redacted] Superintendent, 223 West 105th Street, New York City, advised he has no records of tenants residing at this address prior to 1959. He further advised that there are no tenants presently residing at instant address for more than two years.

EMPLOYMENTS:

Pan American Laundry

The City Directory for the City of New York reflects no such address as 38 LaSalle Street, New York City. It is to be noted that the numbers in this particular street begin with #55.

Special Agent (SA) JOHN D. HURLEY, Jr., reviewed the area of LaSalle Street and noted that it has been torn down and renovated within the last five years.

Tri Vet Belts

[redacted] Tri Vet Belts, advised on August 20, 1964, that his payroll records only go back six years, and that he has no knowledge as to whether subject was ever employed at instant firm. He further advised that he employs a large number of Puerto Rican and Cuban individuals at instant firm and that there is quite a turnover in employees each year.

Starlite Belts Corporation

On August 18, 1964, [REDACTED] former manager of the property at 545 Eighth Avenue, New York City advised that he managed instant property from 1947 through December, 1963. He stated that the Starlite Belts Corporation had been a tenant in instant building sometime during that period, but that this firm had gone out of business. He further advised that he does not know the present whereabouts or the name of the owner of the defunct Starlite Belts Corporation.

On August 13, 1964, [REDACTED] Credit Bureau of Greater New York, advised that she could locate no record of the subject in her files.

On August 27, 1964, the Bureau of Criminal Identification, New York City Police Department, advised that they could locate no record of the subject or his wife, PAULA PENA, in their files.

Cuban sources in the New York area who are cognizant of pro and anti-CASTRO activities and individuals were contacted during September 1964 regarding the subject, with negative results.

BOTH COMMUNISM, CAPITALISM CONDEMNED *Oswald Manifesto Outlined New U.S. Movement*

Lee Harvey Oswald, who presumably will be named the assassin of President John F. Kennedy when the Warren Commission report becomes public Sunday, thought the U.S. Marine Corps might one day take over this nation in a Latin American-style military coup.

And, expecting that occurrence, he had a plan for what he termed an "Activist" or "Futurist" to "safeguard an independent course of action after the debacle."

His "outline for the future" did not advocate the overthrow of the U.S. Government. He wrote:

"Why should we manifest opposition, when there are far greater forces at work to bring about the fall of the United States government than we could ever possibly muster."

Oswald's writings apparently were penned in late 1962 and early 1963. Presumably they are included in the Warren Commission report, soon to be handed to President Johnson.

HIS DOCTRINE, which he considered "a truly democratic system," would combine the best qualities of both capitalism and communism, but would be composed to both world systems as they now operate.

Oswald wrote that the American Communist party had outlived its usefulness and no longer could be considered a haven for futuristic thinkers.

He said that party had "betrayed itself," and added:

"It has turned itself into the traditional lever of a foreign power to overthrow the government of the United States, not in the name of freedom or high ideals, but in servile conformity to the wishes of the Soviet Union and in anticipation of Soviet Russia's complete domination of the American continent.

"The Forsters and the Flynns of the subsidized Communist party of the United States have shown themselves to be willing, gullible messengers of the Kremlin's internationalist propaganda.

"HERE CAN BE no international solidarity with the arm-betrayers of that most sublime ideal."

Oswald went on: "There can be no sympathy for those who have turned the idea of communism into a vile curse to Western man."

"The Soviets have committed crimes unsurpassed even by their early-day capitalist counterparts, the imprisonment of their own peoples, with the mass extermination so typical of Stalin, and the individual suppression and regimentation under Khrushchev."

Oswald, the 24-year-old who presumably saw the Communists at their best and worst in his 2½ years behind the Iron Curtain, wrote despicably of what he called "the murder of history" and the "prostitution of art and culture" in Russia.

Why, he asked, does the American Communist party condone such actions by the Soviet Union as nuclear testing, the situation in Hungary and Eastern Germany, the spy Sobel and the "Warsaw Pact maneuvers" when they "bring pious protest" toward the United States for similar actions?

OSWALD LISTED "atom bomb test, Cuba, NATO maneuvers, U2 and Congo" as some of the "similar actions."

His movement, he wrote, would not only declare itself as independent to Soviet domination, but would oppose it. Only by this strong stand against the Russians can "dormant and disillusioned persons hope to unite to free the radical movement from its inertia," he wrote.

Because the American Communist party had refused to condemn the Russian Communists, Oswald wrote, "Progressives have been weakened into a stable class of fifth columnists of the Russians."

Oswald, printing most of his "doctrine" on 2-ring notebook paper as used by schoolboys, said members of his organization would have to "free themselves" from the yoke of the American Communist party.

"It is readily foreseeable that a coming economical, political or military crisis, internal or external, will bring about the final destruction of the capitalist system."

"ASSUMING THIS, we can see how preparation in a special party could safeguard an independent course of action after the debacle."

He termed this "course of action" as "an American course, steadfastly opposed to intervention by outsiders, relatively stable foreign powers, no matter from where they come."

"But in particular," he emphasized, "and if necessary," his group would be "violently opposed to Soviet intervention."

Oswald knew he would have trouble recruiting people of his own ilk. He wrote:

"No party of this type can attract into its ranks more than a nominal number of fundamental radicals."

He didn't think his party would grow as large as the Republican party, probably the understatement of all his known writings.

"IT IS NOT the nature of such an organization to attract such a membership as, let's say, the Republicans or even the Socialist party, but it is possible to enlist the aid of disenchanted members of the Socialist party and even some from more 'respectable' (from a capitalist viewpoint) parties," he penned.

Then he warned:

"But whereas our political enemies talk loudly now, they have no concept of what total crisis means."

"The faction which has the greater basis in spirit and the most far-sighted and ready membership of the radical futurist, will be the decisive factor."

"We do not have any interest in directly assuming the head of government in the event of such an all-finishing crisis. As dissident Americans we are merely interested in opposing foreign intervention which is an easily drawn conclusion if one believes in the theory of crisis."

THE UTOPIA-MINDED youth then put all his marbles in one sack and shook them thusly: "The emplacement of a separate, democratic, pure Communist society is our goal."

He wrote that his "doctrine" included "democratic socializing of production, union communes" and "without regard to the twisting apart of Marxist communism by other powers."

Oswald said religious tolerance, the right to own and accumulate private property and freedom of travel must be retained by his group. All have been violated by the Russians, he wrote in parentheses.

His next words are hypocritical, coming from a man who would a few months later kill the U.S. president:

"Resourcefulness and patient working toward the aforesaid goals are preferred rather than loud and useless manifestations of protest."

"Silent observance of our principles is of primary importance."

RESTRAINT was the watchword, Oswald wrote.

He said these efforts would likely appear "too limited" in the near future but said they "should not be confused with slowness, indecision or fear."

"Only the intellectless could even be attracted to our doctrine, and yet this doctrine requires the utmost restraint, a state of being in itself majestic in power.

"This is stoicism," he added, "and yet stoicism has not been effected for many years, and never for such a purpose."

Oswald considered the Minutemen unfit to associate with his group. "Organizations such as the Minutemen are the opposite of a stoical organization," he printed, his usual misspellings perhaps stealing a bit from his elated feelings of stoicism.

The Minutemen, he went on, "are simply preparing to defend in their own back yards a system which they take for granted will be defeated militarily elsewhere—a strange thing to hear from 'patriots.'"

"THESE ARMED groups represent hard-core American capitalist supporters.

"There will also be small armed Communist and probably fascist groups. There will also be anarchist and religious groups at work."

Oswald apparently believed that in case of such a crisis the bulk of the American people would not back any of aforementioned groups, but would jump at the chance of joining his movement.

He wrote:

"The bulk of the population will not adhere to any of these groups, because they will not be inclined to join any of the old factions with which we all are so familiar. But the people will never accept a new order presented by politicians or opportunists. Logically, they will deem it necessary to oppose those systems against whom they have been educated, but they will be against anything resembling their former capitalist masters also."

Enter Oswald's Futurists or Activists, or so he figured:

"STEADFASTLY opposed to the revival of the old forces, they will seek a new face. This

will be the sentiment of the masses."

Oswald thought certain safeguards should be built in his organization, for he said, "Any organization cleverly manipulating words may sway the masses."

A safety valve, he called it, is needed to "shut off opportunist forces from within and foreign powers from without."

Procurement of members and slow, deliberate organization was necessary for his group to be strong enough to meet the challenge, he thought.

"There can be no substitute for organization and procurement work toward the aforementioned ideals and goals," he wrote.

His group must be an armed group he felt.

"Work is the key to the future door, but failure to apply that key because of possible armed opposition in our hypothetical, but very probable crisis, is as useless as trying to use force now to knock down the door.

"ARMED DEFENSES of our ideals must be an accepted doctrine after the crisis, just as refraining from any demonstrations of force must be our doctrine after the crisis, just as scratched on the notebook paper.

Oswald showed his hatred for both the United States and Russia. He wrote:

"No man, having known, having lived under the Russian Communist and American capitalist system, could possibly make a choice between them. There is no choice. One offers oppression, the other poverty.

"Both offer imperialistic injustice, tinted with two brands of slavery.

Oswald saw his doctrine and partly as the ultimate social system, much, much better than either capitalism or communism.

"No rational man," he wrote,

"can take the attitude of 'A curse on both your houses.'"

There ARE two world systems, one twisted beyond recognition by its misuse, the other decadent and dying in its final evolution.

Y Democratic system would combine the better qualities of the two upon an American foundation, opposed to both world systems as they are now. "This then is our ideal," he closed.

Membership in his group, Oswald wrote, would require adherence to the doctrine, the distribution of information about the movement and "acceptance of the idea of stoical readiness in regards to practical measures once instituted in the crisis."

Oswald's belief that the U.S. Marines would one day overthrow the government was apparent in a speech he wrote for delivery to a New Orleans audience less than four months before he killed the president. It is not known whether or not the speech was actually made, since Oswald's arrest in that city in a clash with the anti-Castro exiles somewhat curtailed his Marxist activities, at least outwardly.

"AMERICANS ARE apt to scoff at the idea that a military coup in the United States, as so often happens in Latin-American countries, could ever replace our government," he wrote.

"But that is an idea that has grounds for consideration," he added. Then he launched into why he thought the Marines were the likely force in such an uprising.

"Which military organization has the potentialities of executing such action? Is it the Army with its many (word illegable), its unwieldly size, its scores of bases scattered across the world?

"The case of Gen. Walker shows that the Army, at least, is not fertile enough ground for a far right regime to go a very long way.

"For the same reasons of size and disposition, the Navy and Air Force are to be more or less disregarded.

"Which service, then, can qualify to launch a coup in the United States?

"Small size, a permanent hard core of officers and few bases is necessary."

"ONLY ONE outfit fits that description and the USMC is a right-wing-infiltrated organization of dire potential consequences to the freedoms of the United States."

Oswald, who shot himself in the arm with a .22 once in Japan when he felt his Marine officers were mistreating him, bared his hatred for the service as he said, "I agree with former President Truman when he said that The Marine Corps should be abolished."

He then touched on racial troubles in the United States. He called segregation "that under-ocratic, country-wide institution." Oswald said "the action of the active segregationist minority

and the great body of indifferent people in the South" do more harm to this nation than all the Communists combined.

"Segregationist tendencies can be unlearned," Oswald wrote. "I was born in New Orleans and I know."

LATER ON, he took a pot-shot at right-wingers, with:

"Nowadays most of us read enough about certain right-wing groups to know how to recognize and guard against their corrosive effects."

Although he obviously despised the right-wingers, Oswald said he knew what prompted them. "There are probably no other American-born persons who have as many personal reasons to know and therefore hate and mistrust communism," he said.

Oswald didn't want any part of their movement, he said.

"I would never become a pseudo-professional anti-communist like Herbert Philbrick or McCarthy. I would never jump on any of the many right-wing bandwagons because our two countries have too much to offer each other to be tearing at each others' throats in an endless Cold War."

This obviously doesn't sound like the same man who in the "doctrine" stated so hotly that his organization would be dead set against anything the Russians had to offer.

"BOTH OUR countries," Oswald went on, "have major shortcomings and advantages, but

only in ours is the voice of dissent allowed.

"In returning to the United States, I hope I have awakened a few who were sleeping and others who are indifferent.

"I have done a lot of criticizing of our system, I hope you will take it in the spirit it was given.

"In going to Russia, I followed the old principle 'Thou shalt seek the truth, and the truth shall make you free.'

"In returning to the United States I have done nothing more or less than select the lesser of two evils."

(Editor's note: The quote is "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." from St. John 8:32.)

Other notes, which apparently were "dos" and "don'ts" for Oswald's planned movement, showed the youth had little idea how things worked either in Russia or his homeland.

THE "FORS" included freedom of information, speech, religion and elections. He was "against" disarmament, income taxes, all forms of international communism, facists and nationalism, segregation and unemployment.

Oswald thought medical care should be free, but no taxes should be levied against individuals. He thought taxes should be used "solely for the building or improvement of public projects," but didn't say where other monies would be gotten for his medical plans.

Pensions should be higher, too, he wrote. And it should be a movement without any extremist tendencies toward race or religion.

Perhaps most blatant of all was this note: "Against . . . sale of arms. Pistols should not be sold in any case, rifles only with police permission; shotguns free."

Though this man professed he didn't want anything to do with the American Communist party, he was a regular subscriber to *The Worker*, its newspaper.

A WORKER blasting Bobby Kennedy (Oct. 20, 1963) was found in Oswald's personal effects. A copy of the leftist paper, *The Militant*, the Oct. 7, 1963, edition, was there too.

The Dallas News was unable to learn whether the speech quoted from above might also have been the one given last July 27 at the Jesuit House of Studies at Mobile, Ala.

Oswald was invited to speak to that group on July 6 by Eugene J. Murret, of New Orleans, a student at the institution. The writer told Oswald about 90 men were studying philosophy there and they would like to know more about communism in Russia.

Oswald appeared that Saturday night at 7 p.m.

From letters to the assassin from Murret and a Mr. Paul Piazza, SJ, it can be assumed that Oswald discussed the good and bad points of both systems, with emphasis on the woes of

speculation and exploitation in the United States.

MURRET WROTE him and told him one of his professors had thought Oswald had made "a number of good points." But, said Murret, the professor felt Oswald was vague and didn't make sufficient application to back up his beliefs (definitely a pattern through all his writings).

Piazza wrote Oswald a thank-you note a few days later, Aug. 1.

"I feel that I came away from your talk with an understanding of the Russian people as a people, with ideals, goals, problems—normal, everyday human beings, something that is quite easy to forget with all the threats of war hanging in the air."

He added, "I find your talk has helped to make me a broader and deeper person, more universal and sympathetic in my thinking. I hope in the future both America and Russia can draw closer to one another and thereby increase in friendship and understanding."

The Dallas News asked Mr. Piazza details about Oswald's speech, but received only a curt reply:

"IN ANSWER to your letter requesting information concerning Lee Oswald's talk, I reply that I have nothing to add above what I have already written in my thank-you note to Mr. Oswald himself.

"I thank you for your letter, and I hope that your 'private in-

vestigation of Lee Harvey Oswald's background' is most successful. Cordially yours, Paul Piazza, SJ."

During much of this time Oswald was not working and apparently his wife, Marina, was getting tired of it.

She has told reporters that Oswald wanted to send her back to Russia, but that she didn't want to go. She must have wanted to go a little bit, for on Aug. 8, 1963, the Russian embassy wrote her a 2-paragraph letter (to 407 Magazine St., New Orleans) acknowledging a letter she had written stating her desire to return to Moscow, but asking for more particulars.

Oswald, it seemed at that time, planned to move to Baltimore. He said so in an Aug. 26 letter to Elizabeth G. Flynn, who was at that time chairman of the American communist party. (Mrs. Flynn died earlier this month while on a visit to Moscow—Ed. Note.)

THREE WEEKS later, another Communist party official, Arnold Johnson, replied to Oswald and instructed him to let the New York office know when he arrived in Baltimore and "We will find some way of getting in touch with you in that city."

Johnson told Oswald he thought he could best be utilized by "remaining in the background, not underground.

"I assume," he closed, "this is pretty much of an academic question now, and we can discuss it later."

An examination of the handwriting appearing on this registration card was established as not having been written by OSWALD.

On 9/29/64, Mr. CECIL SITZ, owner of the "Half-Circle J" Motel, 9600 West Highway 80, Fort Worth, Texas, telephonically inquired of the Fort Worth Resident Agency as to when he could obtain the return of his registration card and indicated that he considered it to be a valuable item, (apparently believing same was actually a registration card containing the handwriting of OSWALD). Dallas records reflect this registration card still in possession of FBI Laboratory.

Bureau is requested to advise when such registration card may be returned, and consider the advisability of making it known to Mr. SITZ at the time of such return that the writing on this card is not that of LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

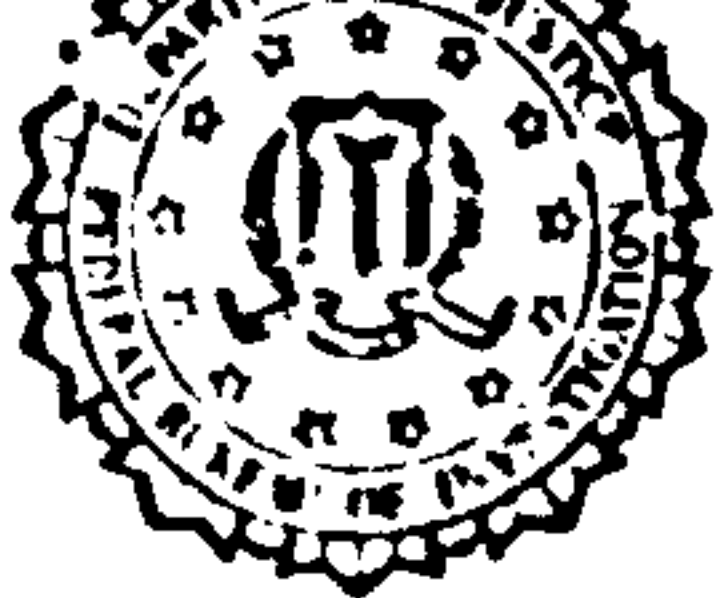

Ray Fernald Shurtleff, born January 14, 1943, a student at Northeastern University, Boston, Massachusetts, residing in Apartment #16 at 111 Jersey Street, Boston, Massachusetts, furnished the following information on September 22, 1964:

In connection with the Northeastern University Cooperative Plan, he was employed in the File Section of the National Archives, Washington, D. C., from November 18, 1963 - January 25, 1964, when he returned to Northeastern University. On April 6, 1964, he was again employed at the National Archives, Washington, D. C., working in the Office of Presidential Libraries. On or about April 29, 1964, he was detailed by National Archives to work at the Warren Commission offices and was employed there in the File Section until July 31, 1964, when he left voluntarily to return to college in Boston.

His supervisor at the Warren Commission was Josephine Farrar. His duties were filing, placing documents in chronological order, indexing and in some cases source checking footnotes of various testimony.

Shurtleff recalled that at one time the File Section contained one copy of a document containing the Oswald Diary. Under normal procedure the original document would have been placed in the Commission's Exhibit File and one copy of this routed to the File Section, which copy may have been only one of possibly ten or more copies of the same document. He stated that as there was no control system for number of copies made or distributed, he could not say how many copies of this document may have been prepared.

After the Oswald Diary appeared in the press, Shurtleff recalls checking the File Section for its copy of the diary. He did this out of general curiosity and for no other purpose. At this time there was no copy in file and no type of charge out to indicate where it might be. Shurtleff did not consider it unusual that the file copy of the diary was out of file and he made no attempt to locate it.

Shurtleff stated that at no time did he ever make or cause to be made any copies of the Oswald Diary; he never received any request for a copy of the diary and he has no knowledge of how the diary reached the press. He stated that it would have been possible for any staff member or employee to have made copies of this document as everyone had access to Xerox machines in the basement. He has no knowledge that any copy of the Oswald Diary was ever distributed to unauthorized individuals.

Shurtleff further advised that during this period he rented a room from Mrs. Eunice Mercer at 2010 Pierce Mill Road, Washington, D. C., and that nobody else from the National Archives or the Warren Commission resided there.

Shurtleff advised that he had no other information on this matter.
