On 10/7/64, GERALD JHANSEN. 2736 North Downer Avenue, Milwaukee. Wisconsin, who said he worked in a factory of the American Motors! Corp., Milwaukee, employed there since April, 1959, gave the following information to SA GEORGE V. HUEBSCH. HANSEN personally appeared in the Milwaukee Office. HANSEN brought with him the "New York Times," of 9/23/64, which published the "Warren Commission's Report" which appeared to be a : verbatim copy, though unannotated, of the first 806 pages of the report of the President's Commission on the Assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

HANSEN made specific reference to the last of the four -columns appearing on the newspaper's page 39A, the three last full paragraphs there, beginning, "On September 14," Oswald sailed with his unit for the South China Sea area ..." The three specific paragraphs appeared on pages 684 and 685 of the report.

HANSEN explained that he was an ex-Marine and had been interested in OSWALD ever since the assassination, though he never previously approached any local, state, or federal official about his concern. He pointed out that the three paragraphs seemed imprecise about OSW.ID's whereabouts after OSWALD arrived in San Francisco on the US NS Barrett 13 days subsequent to 11/2/58. The report specifically said that OSWALD "on November 19took 30 days leave" and did not speak as though OSWALD's activities were not known until the subsequent December 22, when, according to the report, he was at the Marine Corps air station in El Toro.

HANSEN said that it was certainly about that time, probably in December, 1958, that he himself served as a Marine at the Lake Meade Base, Las Vegas, Nevada. He said he went on leave that month, probably the day after Christmas, and that shortly before he did so, the following incident occurred involving a man who might have been OSWALD - if OSWALD was ever stationed at the Lake Meade Base.

One of the supply clerks at the Lake Meade Base during that month was a man whose description closely fit OSWALD, and HANSEN's curiosity about him was aroused when he heard the supply clerk addressed by a surname other than the surname "BENJAMIN," which appeared on the man's utility shirt. HANSEN asked what the man's real name was. He directed his inquiry to one R. G. ACKERMAN, another Marine on the base, whose first name might have been RONALD.

ACKERMAN told him that the man's last name was not "BENJAMIN" but "HARVEY"; but, ACKERMAN added that though the man was using the surname of "HARVEY," his real surname was "OSWALD."

HANSEN said he subsequently verified the fact that the man was using the surname of "HARVEY" when he heard the company commander, Captain VERNON S. MUNSELL, address the man as "Corporal HARVEY." In addition, HANSEN later saw the man wearing a utility shirt with the surname "HARVEY" stamped on it.

HANSEN added that somebody mentioned that the man in question, the supply clerk, was from Texas; and he recalled that "HARVEY" came to him shortly before he went on leave, asking HANSEN to sign a delivery receipt for some GI garbage cans. HANSEN had refused to sign the receipt because he was no longer acting, he said, as property sergeant, inasmuch as a replacement had been designated for him in view of his coming leave.

The most significant fact about the man at the Lake Meade Base, who HANSEN thought might be LEE HARVEY OSWALD, was the fact that HANSEN associated that man with a reported incident of homosexuality about the same time.

HANSEN said he knew almost nothing about the homosexual incident. He believed he had been told of it by a Sgt. HATFIELD, whose home state was Oklahoma, or one Corporal TIPKE, who came from the State of Washington. Sgt. HATFIELD had served in Headquarters Supply at the Marine base.

In any case, the story, or rumor, as HANSEN remembered it, was generally to the effect that one Marine had reported to his Sergeant that another Marine owed him \$20. The debt was incurred, the man told his Sergeant, in a homosexual affair. The Sergeant thereafter reported it to his own superiors and not long afterward the three men who were supposed to have been involved in the matter all left the base, transferred or discharged. One of them was the man who might have been LEE HARVEY OSWALD. Another was a battalion clerk, whose name HANSEN did not know; and the third HANSEN thought could have been the Marine with the surname "BENJAMIN."

HANSEN also claimed that the supply clerk who served with the clerk who might have been LEE HARVEY OSWALD, was R. R. ACKERMAN. HANSEN said he himself had served in the Marines from October, 1957 to March, 1959, under Marine service number 166-48-19.

HANSEN added that R. G. ACKERMAN, who originally identified "BENJAMIN" to him as a man with the surname "HARVEY" or "OSWALD" was a Milwaukeean who formerly worked for Square D in Milwaukee, attended Spencerian Business College in Milwaukee, and had joined the Marines in Milwaukee.

Milwaukee is taking no action in this matter, other than forwarding the information herewith to the Bureau and Dallas. Milwaukee is unable to assess the accuracy or pertinance of HANSEN's story.

At 11:35 a.m. today, II. Bartlett Wells of the Department of State called and referred to Bureau's letter to State of 9/23/64 in the Oswald Case in which we asked for the views of State concerning the advisability of the FBI's declassifying the report dated 5/18/64 prepared by the Legat, Nexico City, on Oswald. (This was a result of a Warren Commission request of the Bureau). Wells wanted to know whether we desired his answer today or whether State should wait and send it over Monday. He was advised that if he had the answer at hand we would accept it telephonically and he could confirm his remarks by letter.

Nells advised that State's reply would be, "The Department of State considers that the declassification of the 5/18/64 report so that it might be included in that portion of the Warren Commission Report which will be released to the public would not be likely to occasion harmful repercussions between the Government of Mexico and the United States, consequent upon public disclosure of the material in question. Thus, if the FBI sees fit to accede to the Commission's request of 9/22/64, the State Department will have no objection."

If the intelligence contained in the above message is to be disseminated outside the Bureau, it is suggested that it be sultably paraphrased in order to protect the Bureau's cryptographic systems.



She will put you on a plane, directly (going*) here, Camden, in the State of New Jersey. You can also write to me. You may telephone me at my expense. Leave soon, so that the children would not catch cold, (because*) afterwards the weather will be cold. Take care of the little one. Do not worry about your things - you will acquire new ones here. People here are not like those over there. I understand your situation; that you do not even know whom you can trust. I also went through an experience like this a long time ago and I understand your situation. Now, about myself. I am from the USSR, from the city of Voronezh, Voronezh Region. I worked (or "work"*) in a foreign department (sic*) as a technician and interpreter. My son and daughter, too, are now in the USSR. My son is employed as a chief engineer in the Urals, in the city of Fenza (or "near Penza"*). I came from the USSR after (?*) 1958 and have been living here ever since. I shall be waiting for a reply from you by letter and telephone. I am home from work at 5 p.m. I am sending you my card with my address and telephone number. I wish all of the best to you and the children; hurry up and come here. You can come to us at any time. Only let us know, when you are ready to go; when you will arrive in Camden and I will meet you. Do not tell journalists and other people. You know, they only write sneeringly. Our people in the U. S. are not like that; am I right? I will conclude on this for the time being. My wife and daughter say, "let her come soon." Your children will be provided for; they will not starve. Think it over well. If you wish to know more, write and I will write about it to you. But better come; then you will see it will be good for you here, as I have already told you. I will be truly like a father to you. I am waiting for a reply from you.

In my memo dated September 21, 1964, you were \ advised of the erroneous press releases attributed to Dr. Vincent P. Guinn, Technical Director of the Activation Analysis Program of General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation, Ean Diego, California. These press releases inferred that Dr. Guinn was knowledgeable of the results of the neutron activation analysis conducted on the Oswald casts and implied that he worked with the FBI on the analysis.

Since Dr. Vincent P. Guinn is an Atomic Energy Commission, (AEC), contractor, Dr. Spoiford G. English, Assistant General Manager for Research and Development. Special Agent John F. Gallagher of the Laboratory, who AEC, was contacted on September 13, 1934, by expressed the Bureau's concern for the erroneous statements attributed to Guinn. Dr. English advised that AEC was also concerned and he agreed to contact Guinn as soon as practical and advise him of both the Burcau's and AEC's concern of the erroneous releases relating to the neutron activation analysis conducted on Oswald's casts.

Attached hereto is a copy of a letter from Dr. Vincent P. Guinn dated September 25, 1934, sent to the editors of the New York World Telegram and Sun, New York City, New York, in which he vigorously denounces their erroneous reporting. "It is the worst job of reporting I have ever seen..." "Your version was shot full of atrocious misstatements. Worse yet, the writer had the gall to make up his own statements, then put them into alleged direct quotations attributed to me."

From a reading of Dr. Guinn's letter, it appears that Guinn has the firm conviction that he was misquoted and is taking action to set the record straight.

I am writing to you in regard to an article that appeared in the August 28, 1964 isour of your newspaper, which has just been brought to my attention. It is entitled, "Radioactivity Aids Cswald Frobe", is labeled as a United Fress International report, dat line. Glasgow, August 26, and is apparently based on a paper I presented in Glasgow, Scotland on that date at the Jugust 27-. 8 International Conference on Recent advances in Activation Analysis.

In my opinion, the person who is responsible for the version that you published should be thoroughly bawled out — it is the worst job of reporting I have ever seen. It y paper was reported quite accurately in several European newspapers; your version is shot full of atrocious a isstatements. Morse yet, the writer had the gall to make up his own statements, then put them into alleged direct quotations attributed to me. This is reporting of the worst kind. The person responsible for that article must be, in my opinion, eith r grossly incompetent or highly unscrupilous, or -- nor likely -- both. He apparently was much more interested in making a spectacular report than in making an accurate report. I have cited some specific erroneous statements contained in his article helow.

Your writer either garbled the facts presented, or chose to ignore them to make a "better" story. His false use of quotation marks is especially reprehensible.
- (3) The statement, "Then we took the casts of Oswald's check and....", is totally manufactured by your writer. As I made completely clear in my Glasgow presentation, we never did anything whatsoever with the Oswald casts. The statement, "We found no barium but we found antimony...." is an almost accurate statement of what I said about the results we obtained from test firings of a similar Italian rifle (not the one used in the assassination) following NAA measurements on hand and check paraffin casts after they had first been processed by the usual chemical test. Again -- extremely sloppy reporting.

statements contained in the August 28 article you published. It is also full of other inexcusable inaccuracies of lesser import. All in all, I think your newspaper should hang its face in shame for publication of such garbled and erroneous nonsense. A brief statement of correction published by you in the near future would be most welcome.

Pool-Yows Probe of Breakdown

Congressman-at-Large Joe Pool promised Thursday that Congress will investigate the lack of liaison between the FBI and other law enforcement agencies prior to the assassination of President Kennedy.

Speaking before the Law Enforcement Intelligence Unit's central zone regional conference at Holiday Inn Central, Pool said the House Un-American Activities Committee—of which it is a member—"has always offered complete cooperation to the FBI in releasing information from our files."

"It is unfortunate that this has not always been a 2-way street." he said.

Earlier in the day, Gov. John Connally and Col. Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety also scored "the lack of liaison between federal agencies" in speeches before some 120 law enforcement officers representing 10 states and the District of Columbia.

Gov. Connally said he was reluctant to cite the assassination as an example.

"But the need for more liaison and cooperation between federal" agencies in that case is apparation." he said.

Connally also urged officers to continue to foster exchanges of information between intelligence agencies on the state and local level.

Col. Garrison told the group:
"I firmly believe that if the information on subversives in this area, had flowed down through proper agencies to the Dallas police department, the terribic assassination would not have occurred."

Marina Oswald belatedly in late 8/64 furnished Dallas a letter to her shortly after the assassination from Ruth Paine by which Paine forwarded to her a letter in Russian from a Walter Neunson, a Security Index subject of Newark. Neunson, who has a Russian wife and three children in Russia, offered to take Marina and her children in his home and he stated that his son, Edward, met Marina in Russia. When questioned about the Neunson correspondence, Marina said that she received hundreds of letters Ocimmediately subsequent to the assassination which she has not read and which she still has at her home in Richardson. She said that her advisor, Declan Ford, also has some of these letters. Dallas was previously instructed to ask Marina to produce copies tof all communications received by her subsequent to the assassination from Russia. It is possible that allong the letters in question there may be other letters of interest to us; hence, it is advisable for Dallas to look at them.

On 9-10-64 Mr. J. Lee Rankin of the President's Commission advised that a letter had been received from Congressman John R. Pillion, Republican from New York. Mr. Rankin stated that while many of the items in the letter were of no interest to the Commission, there were certain items concerning which he desired the Bureau to interview the Congressman. He also stated that he had talked to the Congressman concerning the letter and the Congressman was willing to be interviewed by the FBI.

A review of the letter sent to the Commission by Congressman Pillion discloses that the Congressman was of the belief that Oswald was definitely a tool of the communist conspiracy and that Oswald was greatly influenced and motivated by his communist ideology, training, associations and objectives. In his letter, Congressman Pillion stated that if the Warren Commission excludes communism as the prime motivating factor, then their report would, in effect, provide a "cover up" and a "white wash."

A review of Bufiles discloses that we have had limited though friendly relations with Congressman Pillion who is serving on the Appropriations Committee.

On 9-16-64 Congressman Pillion was interviewed by Agents of the Washington Field Office in the presence of his Administrative Assistant, Russell A. Rourke. The results of this interview were incorporated in a memorandum dated 9-17-64. During the interview Congressman Pillion stated that all of his statements in his letter to the President's Commission were based on public source data, including magazine articles, newspaper articles and the "Washington Report," which is a publication of the American Security Council, Washington, D. C. Congressman Pillion said that he has no confidential sources and that his conclusions were arrived at from reading the aforementioned publications.

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MEMORANDUM FOR MR. BELMONT RE: LEE HARVEY OSWALD 105-82555

During the interview, Congressman Pillion stated that he did not like the thought of the Commission possibly trying to place any blame for President Kennedy's death on the FBI, the Secret Service or the Dallas Police Department. Instead, he felt the blame for the assassination should be placed on the communist conspiracy. Congressman Pillion had no direct evidence of any association of Oswald with communism or the KGB (Committee of State Security).

The memorandum containing the results of the interview was furnished to the Commission by letter 9-18-64.



LEE HARVEY OSWALD INTERNAL SECURITY - R - CUBA

It will be recalled that the Honorable John R. Pillion, Member, United States House of Representatives, directed a letter to the President's Commission dated September 10, 1964. The President's Commission requested that Congressman Pillion be interviewed concerning certain data in his letter. The specific items about which the Congressman was to be questioned were underlined with the request to determine from him the basis or proof of each of the underlined items.

On September 16, 1964, Congressman Pillion was interviewed in his office in the House Office Building, Washington, D.C., in the prosence of his Administrative Assistant, Russell A. Rourke, by representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

When the purpose of the interview was explained to the Congressman, he stated that he had talked to Mr. Rankin of the President's Commission who had indicated that the Congressman's letter would be placed in the "Archives" and not in the Commission's record. Mr. Pillion also stated that he could not see any point to the interview, that since it had been reported that the investigation had been completed, the interview would serve no useful purpose. However, since he wished to cooperate in such an important matter, he said he would answer any questions raised by the Commission as to his letter.

As an explanation for his letter, he stated that from what he had read in newspapers and periodicals he thought that about eighty per cent or more of the Commission's investigation would deal with events subsequent to the assassination; for example, with such items as the determination of blame on various government or local agencies. That meant to him that not enough of the investigation would deal with the motivation of Oswald, which motivation he thought was communist inspired as indicated in his letter to the Commission. He also stated that he did not like the thought of the Commission possibly trying to place any blame for President Kennedy's death on the FEI, the Secret Service or the Dallas Police Department. Instead, he felt the blame for the assassination should be placed on the communist conspiracy.

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In his letter Congressman Pillion stated that the anticipated conclusions of the Commission as related in news reports would absolve internal and international communism from complicity in and guilt for the assassination; that these anticipated conclusions were contrary to the known facts. By known facts he said that he meant the background data of Oswald which has appeared in various publications and public source material, which to him painted a picture of a dedicated communist thoroughly trained and indoctrinated by the communists and Soviet Secret Police or KGB; that the assassination by Cswald would be one result of such training. He thought the blame for the assassination should be placed on the communist conspiracy and the Soviet Secret Police whose doctrines and teachings were directed toward world domination through assassination, sabotage, and all other means short of armed conflict.

In his letter the Congressman stated that American official and private investigative agencies have been silenced during this nine month period and, further, that the Commission's inquiries have suppressed the free flow of available information and prevented the American public from rendering a true and balanced judgment as to the communist role and involvement. The Congressman stated that by these statements he meant that the American people had been promised by the President the results of the FBI's investigation; that the results have not been published to date; that the FBI was not permitted to divulge any information from its reports; that independent investigations by Congress, the State of Texas, by county and city authorities, and even private individuals, had also been stalemated by the priority of the Commission. As a result of this, in his opinion, the Commission had, in effect while not intentional, suppressed any other source of information to the American public in this regard. He reasoned that the communists were using this delay to direct blame for the assassination on the rightist groups, rather than the leftist groups. In this respect, he cited Oswald's reported . contribution of two dollars to the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), which to him meant Oswald was a member of that group. He thought that Oswald's connections with the ACLU had not been fully explored; that such exploration would tend to prove his leftist leanings and would fit in with his

reported communistic background. He emplained that his office had telephonically contacted the ACLU some time ago and was informed that the two dellars forwarded by Oswald was a contribution; that normally for such contribution he would have in time been mailed a membership card. He added that he had not seen published any elaboration on possible connection of Oswald and the ACLU, and it was his understanding at the time of his contact in the past with the ACLU that no investigative inquiry had been made at the ACLU concerning Oswald.

With regard to his statement that Oswald voluntarily became associated with the Soviet Secret Police, known as the KGB, he indicated that his source for this statement was a publication of the American Security Council, possibly unrecalled magazine articles, and published material in general on the case.

The Congressman also stated in his letter that following Oswald's arrival in Moscow the KGB arranged press conferences to publicize Oswald's defection. He also stated that the KGB provided Oswald with a job in a sheet metal shop of a radio factory in Minsk, which job was a sham "cover" job. The Congressman stated that the source for these statements was the "Washington Report" of the American Security Council dated March 16, 1964, entitled, "Background for Assassination." This report is the same as the publication of the American Security Council to which reference has been previously made.

With regard to his statement that Marina Cawald was "planted" by the KGB and induced to marry Oswald as part of a KGB operation, he stated that he indicated in his letter that this was a probability, hence conjecture on his part. He added that from his public source research of KGB methods of operation, this would seem to be a distinct possibility in his opinion. The Congressman also stated in his letter that the grant of an exit visa to Cawald and to his wife, . Marina, was a most extraordinary Soviet act. He also stated that there could be no question but that Oswald and Marina were considered by the KGB to be potential agents for either specific or future assignments. To said that he based these

statements on the fast service that the Oswalds reportedly received on their exit visas, and on comments reported in the proviously described the "Washington Report" of the American Security Council.

Concorning the statement that the KGB had allowed Oswald to engage in target practice and shooting during his more than two years stay in Minsk, he stated that any KGB direction would be conjecture on his part consistent with his previously outlined thoughts regarding his understanding of KGB'operations; that Mrs. Michael Paine of Irving, Texas, told his office about Oswald engaging in target practice with a rifle while in the Soviet Union. Mrs. Paine in turn received that information from conversations with Marina Oswald and the subject. The Congressman believed that the Reference Section . of the Library of Congress, upon inquiry, was the source of his statement that the use of a rifle and practice privileges tere absolutely forbidden by foreigners in the Soviet Union. He also mentioned that Ers. Paine had advised hearing from oither Marina or Oswald that Oswald had practiced "dry sightiag" with a rifle in New Orleans. The Congressman explained that . his office had telephonically contacted lirs. Paine about three times last June or July.

The Congressman stated in his letter that a KGB directed school in terrorism, sabotago and assassination is located in the Minsk area. He said that the source of this statement was research at the Library of Congress which indicated that there was such a school at Minsk. Since Oswald was at Minsk and such a school was in the same vicinity, it seemed logical to Mr. Pillion to assume that Oswald received training there at such a school. He added that he had indicated in his letter that this receipt of specialized training and indoctrination from the KGB by Oswald during his extended assignment L. Minsk was an assumption.

"Cswald's mind and body was only an instrument for death, manipulated by simister sources and vicious men," he meant no specific individuals but rather meant communists in general, or the EGB, since he assumed the EGB was involved in the direction of Oswald's activities.

Regarding the statement that Oswald became a cold, calculating, professional, paranoid killer who was intimately associated with the communist apparatus, this was a conclusion of the Congressman. Dased on his experience in the past of observing communist techniques as a judge and practicing attorney, augmented by his interest and knowledge in and of communist conspiracies from youth, Oswald, in his opinion, fitted the classic pattern of the antisocial dedicated communist. The Congressman said he had no direct evidence or knowledge of any actual association of Oswald with any communist apparatus.

The Congressman indicated in his letter that Oswald made a number of trips to Mexico, where he consorted with communists. He also indicated in part that Oswald gravitated precisely to Mexico, not once, but on several occasions. In regard to these statements, the Congressman stated that he had no information indicating that Oswald had made more than one trip to Mexico. With regard to Oswald consorting with communists, it was his opinion that the fact Oswald visited the Soviet Embassy in Mexico would tend to substantiate such a statement. He pointed out also that there had been efforts made by some unrecalled individuals and organizations to seek out information concerning communist groups in Mexico but such efforts to his knowledge had been thwarted although it was commonly conceded that such groups did exist in that country and that Mexico was conceded as a hotbed for communist activities.

Oswald was trained to hill for an attainment of a political objective. The Congressman related that this would appear to be self-evident because Mennedy was the President; Nimon was a former Vice President; Walker was a member of a rightist group; and Connally was a Governor. He stated that Oswald's action would fall into what he feels is a communist pattern of political assassinations. Since he previously empressed his opinion that Oswald fitted the classic pattern of a communist, the Congressman was of the opinion that Oswald's actions would have been communist-motivated, hence the reason for the statement in his letter that the sole and whole incitation and motivation of Oswald in all these killings and attempted killings were the communist ideology and the Communist Party world apparatus.

The Congressman also indicated in his letter that there was an abundance of direct evidence linking Oswald to the Soviet Secret Police and further that evidence already available establishes Oswald's close association with the Soviet Secret Police and other communist agencies and terroristic groups. The Congressmen said that he had no direct evidence of any such connection between Cawald and the groups described. He stated that he believed there was a great deal of circumstantial evidence to warrant such a statement such as Oswald's background, his residence in Russia, his probable association with the KGD, the statements in the published portion of his diary, the information set forth in previously described reports of the American Security Council, his participation in such organizations as the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, and his contribution to the ACLU. He said that while this evidence described would not satisfy legal requirements, he felt it was sufficient to be logically correct and in that sense, evidentiary for all other purposes except legal purposes.

Among the conclusions in his letter the Congressman indicated that Oswald's assassination of President Kennedy Was part of a pattern of political assassinations and criminal anarchy; that in this homicide, Cswald was wholly influenced and motivated by his communist ideology, training, associations and objectives. He further concluded that the circumstantial evidence was sufficient to exclude to a moral cortainty, any other hypothesis, except that Oswald assassinated President Kennedy to advance the world communist plan designed to . ultimately destroy the United States and the free world. The Congressman also concluded that the lack of available direct evidence does not exclude the reasonable presumption that the MGB indoctrinated, trained and prepared Oswald as a professional specialist for future use as an assassin or terrorist. With reference to these conclusions, the Congressman stated that these would logically follow from his answers to the questions posed to him and which are set forth previously.

The again reiterated that he had no direct evidence of any association of Cavald with communism or the MGE.

At the conclusion of the interview Congressman Pillion requested that his letter of September 10, 1964, to

the Commission be included in the record of the Commission. He also mentioned that he might produce a paper similar to his letter of September 10, 1964, but dealing mainly with his thoughts on the connection of the subject and the American Civil Liberties Union.
