О С Н О В Н Ы Е П Р А В И Л А

1. Охотничий билет предъявляется по периоду требованию должностных лиц местных органов Управления охотничьего хозяйства органов милиции МВД СССР государственной лесной охраны, охраны охотничьих хозяйств, заказников, а также лиц, имеющих на это соответствующие полномочия управления и отделов охотничьего хозяйства.
2. Охота без билета, а также с просроченным охотничьим билетом или не оплаченным государственной пошлиной признается незаконной охотой (браконьерством).
3. Охотник имеет право охотиться на всей территории СССР, за исключением заповедников, заказников, а также охотничьих хозяйств, охота в которых может производиться только с разрешения администрации хозяйства.

ОХОТНИК ОБЯЗАН:

1. Выполнять и требовать от других охотников выполнения законов, установлений правил и сроков охоты.
 2. Хранить оружие и боеприпасы в условиях, исключающих несчастные случаи.
 3. Осторожно обращаться с огнем в лесу и не употреблять легко воспламеняющиеся пижмы.
 4. Вести борьбу со всеми видами браконьерства.
 5. Уничтожать вредных зверей и птиц.
 6. Всю добычу пушнину сдавать государству.
 7. При перечислении места жительства с учетом в организации, выданной билет, и в течение 6-дневного срока встать на учет по месту нового жительства.
 8. По окончании срока действия охотничьего билета предъявить его в организацию, выдавшую охотничьи билеты для продления, обмена или аннулирования в случае прекращения занятия охотой.
- Правила, сроки охоты и порядок пользования охотничьим огнестрельным оружием мне известны.

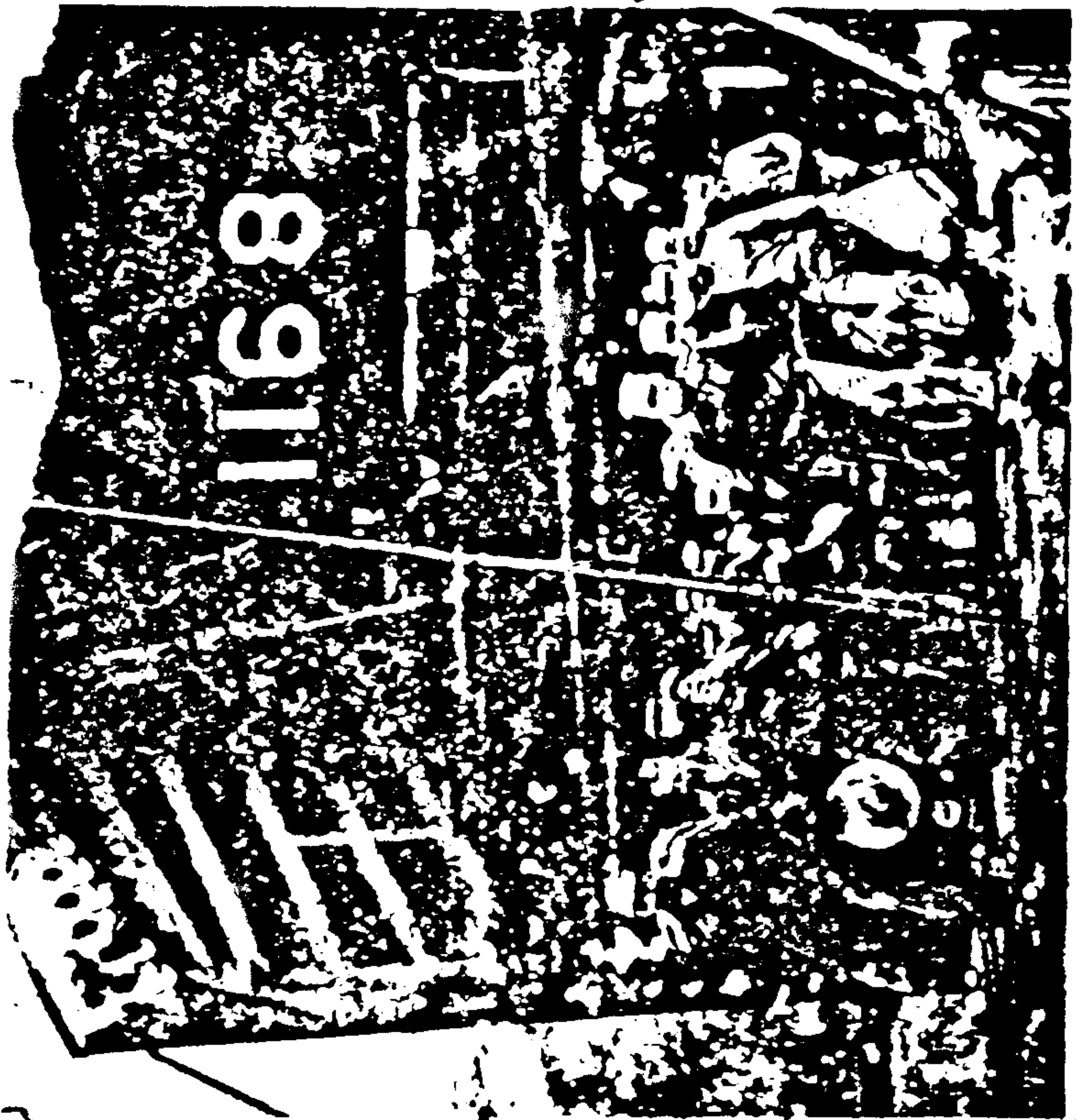

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Part 1

The basis of Russian workers is general, first and foremost, by the "collective", the smallest unit of authority in any given factory, plant, or enterprise. The national and shop cells form a highly organized and well supported political organization. These shop committees are in turn governed by the shop and section party chiefs who are selected by the factory or plant party secretary. This part committee officially has the same amount of authority as the production director, or president of the plant, but in reality it is the controlling organ of all activities at any industrial enterprise whether political industrial or otherwise personal relations. The party secretary is responsible for political indoctrination of the workers, the discipline of members of the communist party working at the plant and the general conduct and appearance of all members.

The most Radio and Television plant is known throughout the Union as the major producer of electronic parts and sets. In this plant enterprise created in the early 50's the party secretary is a 30 year man in his early 20's has a long history of service to the party. He controls the activities of the firm, communist party members here and elsewhere engineers, the activities of the other 5000 people employed at the major enterprise in which the capital of the Soviet working Republics Belgrade.

This factory manufactures 10,000 large and powerful radio and 60,000 television sets, various sizes and ranges including what includes which are not made mass produced elsewhere in the world. It is this plant which manufactured the radio model combination radio-phonograph television sets which were shown as mass produced items of commerce at the World Exhibition in New York in 1957. After the exhibition these sets were duly shipped back to Russia and were shown in a special storage room on the floor of the factory for the gift of international capital. I worked for a short time at this plant, a fair amount of average and some of the time. The management during the time the plant was in operation was not very strict and with the aid of the workers the plant was able to produce a large amount of goods. The plant has 5,000 full time and 300 part time workers 80% men and 20% women and girls.

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The factory employs 2000 workers in three of the
four main shops mostly these shops are fitted with
conveyor belts in long rows, on either side of which
sit the long lines of working women.

500 people during the day shift are employed on
the huge stamp and pressing machines here sheet
metal is turned into metal frames and cabinets for
televisions and radios.

another 500 people are employed in an adjoining
building for the cutting and finishing of rough
wood into fine polished cabinets. A labourer
moves mostly done by hand, the cutting turning
all the processes right up to hand polishing are
carried out here at the same plant. The plant
also has its own stamp making plant employing
150 people at or assisting at 80 heavy machine
lathes and drillers. The noise in this shop is
almost deafening as metal binds against metal and
cutted saws cut through iron ingots at the rate
of an inch a minute. The floor is covered with
oil used to drain the heat of metal being worked
so one has to watch one footing, here the workers
hands are as black as the floor, they seem to be
sterilized. The foreman here is the Russian
version of "John Henry" tall and as strong as
an ox he isn't fully but he gets the work out.

The plant has its electric shop where those
who have finished long courses in electronics work
over generations television tubes, testing equipment
of all sorts the green work tables are piled high
here. Electric gazets are not to be had here.
Mostly due to the poor quality of wires which
keep burning out under the current of the
usual 220 V. home voltage. in the US it's 110 V.

The plastic department is next, here 47
women and three physically disabled persons keep
the red hot liquid plastic flowing into a store
of odd pieces starting out their quota of knobs
handles - non-conducting tube bases, and so forth.
These workers suffer the worst condition of work
in the plant, in outward model factory for the
Soviet Union. She to had frames and the houses

a year, the maximum for workers.

Automation is now employed at a fairly large number of factories, especially in the industry. However, for certain use that resembles to still small at this plant at least one worker is employed in the after some task of turning out finished acceptable items open one worker, must finish the task of striking the edge of metal of plastic and stamping them on a foot driven table; there is only one small potentiality in precision stamps, no matter what their size.

The lack of unemployment in the lowest union may be explained by one of two things; lack of automation and a democratic corps of 1-5 workers in any given factory that people are occupied with its tons of paperwork which flows in and out of any factory. Also the number of direct foremen is not small to the ratio of workers in some cases 1-10 in other places 1-5 depending on the importance of the work.

These people are also backed by a small army of engineers, committees and supply checkers, and the quarterly control board. These people numbers (without foremen) about 100 people, total working force 5000 = 1.50 without foremen.

To delimit steps into the line of the workers we shall visit most of the shops we after on this and get to know the people. The largest shop employs 500 people. 85% women and girls, female make up 60% of the work force at this plant.

Here girls solder and screw the wires to the from attaching transistor tubes and so forth. They each have quotas depending upon what kind of work they are engaged in. One girl may solder 5 transistors in four minutes while the next girl solder 15 will leads in 13 minutes the pay scale here very but slightly with a rough pay at 8.50 rubles minus without deductions deductions include 7 rubles general tax 250 rubles for health and unmarried girls and my deductions for poor or careless work the inspectors may wish to make further down the line these stands teams of two, mostly boys of 11-18 turning the televisions on the conveyor will right rise up from which they has been working to a position where they place picture tubes onto the supports. These boys receive for a 39 hour week 65-70 rubles accounting deductions. Now the telegrams are carried around the country to go back down the line where other it to complete the process, the smoke from the coalful rolling doesn't keep it girls from chattering away and that coupled with the boys at the end of the line taking the loudspeaker makes for a noisy but lively place, with the laughter of girls mixing with music and occasional jazz program which the testers favor for purely personal reasons until the noise makes his way.

As we go out we see crates of the finished product with the well known, "made in Belarussia" stamp. One of the most interesting things in observing Russian life and conversation, is the personal relationship to each other. There exists a implied comradeship springing from the knowledge that in Soviet society the fundamental group is the "collective" or intershop group. These groups with the shop or section party chiefs and foremen are the worlds in which the Russian workers live. All interests and conduct of members is dependent upon the will of the "collective".

In the shop where I worked, the experimental shop, of the Miner Radio and Television factory, there were 58 workers including the party shop secretary, who is a communist worker assigned to the experimental shop by the factory. The main person, assigned by the shop production and tests is assigned by the director of the factory and is superior foreman.

The key person in the shop is an anonymous appreciable man that after serving his military term in the VCL before the war he came a member in good standing of the VCL. During the war he was given short time as a tank crew member and served to have been to yard for it. He was made a military policeman after the war, looking at this newly built factory, he was appointed as the factory communist party shop secretary responsible for shop discipline, and the distribution of propaganda and shop. In a good cross section of the Russian working class I found we observe the lack of some of the 55 years and of working in the experimental shop of the main plant. This place is located in the west of the great factory which produces some of the best known vehicles in the Soviet Union.

The shop itself is located in a two story building with no particular visible mark on its red brick face.

On days, all the workers have arrived and at the sound of a bell sounded by the duty order who is a worker whose duty it is to see to it that the workers do not slip out for too many smokes, they sit by their desks except for 10 turners of lathe operations whose machines are located on the first floor, and these are given out in the form of blueprints and drawings by the foreman ~~2000~~ and 10 foremen ~~2000~~ and whose various reliability and skill calls for them since each worker has with time acquired differing skill and knowledge work is given strictly according to so called "pay levels" the level being numbered 1-5 and the highest level "master" for level one a worker receives approximately 68 rubles for work level two a worker receives 72.50 for three 80 rubles, for four 100 rubles for five 120 rubles and for master about 150, these levels of pay very slightly because workers receive a base pay of 45 rubles and bonuses depending on the total to 68 rubles including reductions for tops the base pay of a master is 90 rubles. Except in instances for poor quality work bonuses are all ways the same going up to a more or less definite pay scale, a worker only demand to be tested for a higher pay level at any time, only skill is a barrier to higher pay. The foreman and shop head all receive about 120 rubles base pay but much higher bonuses awards to the best shops in the factory community for good production standards.

Our shop head Stephen Tarasovich VC 1-1-1 is a stout open faced and well skilled metal worker who although he hasn't got a higher education which is now a main requirement for a foreman or foreman job now, managed to finish a 4 year night school speciality course and through the help of the director of the factory he became shop head in an important segment of a large plant employing 5000 people. Stephen has on all most both legs except for a patch of scar on the left side of his head which he is forever combing across his shiny top. eyes he is married with five children aged 8 and 10 it may be explained that Russian men to marry much older than their own women counterparts, perhaps that can be explained

by the fact that in order to recruit an equal number of

most black workers are men of the older aged groups, do
not always members of the communist party, they carry the
load and most of the responsibility of the work, left of the
"Kolkhoz".

The remaining 41 workers are divided about half into
20-22 year olds, new metal workers, trying to fulfill their
obligatory two year stint at a factory, before going on to full
time day studies at the local university, or one of the
specialized institutes, and older workers who have been
working at the plant for 4-6 years and occupy the
middle numbers work, levels 3, 4, these workers are aged
about 24-30 and form the mass of labor at the factory
about 70%. have family, apartments are few most workers

20 rubles a month although rent in the coal district is paid

Headquarters of the central committee of the CPSU is in Moscow, at the address: 10, Bolshaya Kozlovskaya Street. It is a rectangular shaped with straight steps leading to almost none of the gables decorations found on most buildings in the city. The first secretary of the central committee of the CPSU is the imposing title, carried on short, stocky man in his late 50s, N.S. Khrushchev. He is seen on the streets. His family occupies a large 8-room apt. on the top floor of a government apartment house on prospect Stalin. Entrance to this apartment building is guarded night and day by one uniformed policeman who checks papers and keeps unauthorized persons out. Here is also the residence of several ministers, such as, Minister of Education, M.S. Doroshin and Minister of Construction, E. Zhukovskiy. Majoroff controls and directs all activities in his republic with authority no United States government has ever enjoyed, until this authority is cannot be contacted or challenged by court order or injunction, as it often is in the United States. Majoroff is responsible directly to the Moscow and the party presidium directed by Khrushchev. He appears in the reviewing box at in the center of his ceremonies, on May 1st and November 7th holidays, however, when he wears a congenial hand, occasionally without the stress of a smile. He will elect to his post, in a general election, more than 100,000 is elected to the post of premier, but rather appointed from the members of the Supreme Soviet who are elected on the one candidate ballot, which is prepared and authorized in the first place, by the central committee of the Communist party of the Russian Republic. Therefore, the members of the Supreme Soviet from the republics, replacements for vacated seats in the union committee may be required in the case of a higher appointment to the union committee from the party, under the same procedure in the central committee.

But out of the very bureaucratic spirituality in the past, it will
 still stand 10 apart, most persons occupying part of the housing
 and passport and visa offices expect remuneration for the life
 and death services which all Russians seek namely - to receive
 for an apartment and official visa to live in such an apartment
 compulsory laws in the Soviet Union without a city "visa" stamp
 a person cannot work in that city, once a position or work
 is decided or taken it is very difficult process to acquire
 to receive an apartment in another city therefore to live in another
 city. In such instances the administrator of apartment house
 may expect 60-100 rubles for his stamp of approval on a
 request blank for an apartment or into an apartment already
 occupied by a family who are expecting to leave the city
 for another the usual method of getting a room or
 apartment without having to wait on the so called housing
 line which may take 5-6 years to receive a one room
 "apartment." In my bureaucratic society - class of death
 administrators is always down who expect their palaces
 and who expect their positions for self-purposes
 in the USSR such practice falls on a particularly poor
 nature since it is not simply a matter of receiving
 services or conveniences but a matter of getting the further
 things of life, a simple room, a work stamp, permission
 to see relatives in a restricted city inside a restricted
 zone such as border zones, or military base and such
 base zones. In order to receive permission to leave a one
 city and live in another to individual choice a person
 must receive permission from the local passport agency
 in the city from which he is leaving and from the city to
 which he is going, then he must show that he has
 received a place of work in any one that city to which
 he is going as well as permission to move from the military
 authorities, if he is militarily obligated from the police and
 security agency in case he has government or secret work. He must
 show that his speciality or profession will be used in the to the
 he gets paid - this creates pile of paper work and

photos, references, documents and not only that but
the main obstacle to moving in the USSR is getting
to live since it would be years if one simply applied
for a place in the housing line. Even if one can find
with friends or relatives for the time being they
could rent a room from somebody, they could not
work because without a living visa stamped on
one's "passport" it is against the law for any director
or administrator of any enterprise, store, or office to
give work to that person, since without a living
visa one cannot get a "work stamp" even renting a
room to a person who cannot get a living visa to
that room is against the law (speculating). So although
moving from one city to another is quite legal now (after
the war it wasn't) it is a long process of red tape, many
petitions and stamping against bureaucratic procedure, that
is why few people actually do change cities or exercise people's
rights. The structure and procedure of Soviet society controls
the flow of people and their occupations and hence voluntary
to state, any person will tell you he can change jobs
or move to another city any time he wants to, this is true
however, he must meet certain requirements in order to
receive new work and although he may indeed quite any
job he likes up till 1950 a person could not quite
a job without police and state security agency permission.
It was simply compulsory to work at the job one had been
assigned to. Now days it is rare that foremen enforce
Soviet law making permissible the holding of any worker who
cannot be replaced. In the event a worker does not choose
to remain at his place of work or chooses to refuse a certain
job he can be tried by a people's court and sent to
a work camp or prison for terms ranging up to 3 years.
