



I received your letter today. I am certainly glad that you were able to reply to an earlier letter I wrote you. Please don't feel obligated to answer this letter. I know that you are now busy preparing your defense. However, I do have some free time and I just wanted you to know that I am still with you. Just put my name and address away and someday when you have time and want to write you will know that I will be glad to hear from you.

I feel that your defense is going to rest on the ability of your lawyer to recreate the scene from the time that President Kennedy entered Texas until the time of the death of Oswald. I would borrow every inch of tape from one of the networks and run them for the jury. The scene has got to recreated to in someway make the jury feel what you felt. The most skillful orator in the world can't do it as well as film.

I feel that the prosecutor will try to show:

- 1. that no man under any circustances may take the law into his own hands.
- 2. That to free you would create a bad image for the U.S. in other countries. ...

You have a valid plea and I understand that your lawyer from San Francisco is a brilliant man. I don't know about Texas law but if the jury is allowed to bring in only one of two verdicts—guilty or not guilty, there seems to be a good chance for you. But if the jury is allowed to bring in a wide choice of verdicts there seems a chance that you may get several years in prison. I base of this on conversations with other people. They all agree that you won't stay in prison long, if at all. I haven't seen one person who thinks you are going to be found guilty of first degree murder.

I was surprised to learn that you were in service at Elementhal Air Base during the war. The name has been changed to New Hanover County Airport now and is used by Piedmont Airlines. Hampstead is only about 15 miles from the airport and I have a Piper Tripacer there. Since you were stationed here, I wonder if you know anyone in Wilmington. I know most of the people in Wilmington. If you were stationed here during the summer you might have gone over to Wrightsville Beach. At that time the most popular place on Wrightsville Beach was the Lumina. I manage the Lumina during the summer months.

Do you have every thing you need? If you read, I have thousands of paperback books on every subject from science fiction, westerns, detectives to history and biography. I would be happy to send you anything you want.



St. John's, Chanute





Football Ratings Announced


