

Brussels, March 11, 1977

I, George de Mollenhildt bought 45 one hundred dollar American Express Travelers checks with a check on my account 034-7194 at Oak Cliff Bank and Trust Company. The numbers of the checks were AB 43-328-304 to 349. This was done on ~~March~~ March 24, 1977 and I have the receipt. Then Willem Oltmans drove my car from Dallas to Houston. The ticket from Houston to Holland was paid by Willem Oltmans or Carl Engelaers (?) supposedly of the Dutch television. The purpose of the trip was to discuss eventual TV appearances, a book on Lee Harvey Oswald and my friendship with him.

David Russell, friend of W. Oltmans with domicile in Houston, 2020 Muldy Street No 8, tel. 703-522-7434 promised to take care of my car and signed a receipt which I have. I gave him the insurance card.

Arrived in Holland with Oltmans and stayed with him at Aberbos 205, Amsterdam. Noticed that the house was registered in the name of his boy-friend Van de Kout. Oltmans also has a residence in New York, New Gardens and his car has a New York licence.

Immediately, we had a meeting with Gerald Croiset ^{at} his home. He is supposed to be a clairvoyant who had connected my name with Oswald. Present also was Karl Engelaer of Dutch TV (?). He also had a meeting next day with Mr. H. Janssen of Stranghold publications. This publishing company wanted to give me a contract for a sensational book re. Oswald and my influence on him. How sensational? We could not come to an agreement. We were supposed to meet again on Monday.

While staying at Oltmans I had the impression that I was drugged and later I thought that my travelers checks were exchanged. But my signature seemed OK and the numbers on the checks were correct. So I could not be sure they were exchanged. During my stay with Oltmans he was constantly worried about noise and probably, he did not want the neighbours know that I was staying there. Oltmans or his associates imitated my handwriting to such perfection that I can hardly see the difference. See "Polczynski" and "Janta" in my address-book. "Janta" is in my handwriting the other is not.

Willem Oltmans brought me by car to Brussels Saturday March 5th to see Belgium. He was supposed also to meet his friend of the Soviet Embassy (Denisov). The drive Amsterdam - Brussels was pure hell. Oltmans unre-

trained homosexuality and demands on me re. look and TV appearances were too much for me. He wanted to bully me into admitting things I did not do. While Olmans was with the Soviet man, I called my old friend and associate from Antwerp, Mr. T. Janta-Polczynski. I was in despair and asked him to contact the U.S. Embassy re. my whereabouts if more pressure was put on me. Kindly Mr. Janta asked me to stay with him for a few days and to relax.

Olmans now has all my belongings but I was too disgusted to talk to him. Mr. Janta spoke instead and Olmans refused to return my clothes. Three people (Olmans, Engelaer, Croisette) are instrumental, I believe, in stealing my travelers checks and replacing them when I was drugged. The imitation of my signature was so perfect I could not believe it. To be on the safe side however I cashed the checks 335-206 to 335-249 on March 10 and bought new ones at the Main Office of the Krediet Bank in Brussels.


I have a meeting with Reader's Digest people on March 15th in New York City. The date was arranged from Houston. The meeting is with Edward Jay Epstein, editorial writer, and the ~~time~~^{time} was agreed upon with the Editor in Chief, Mr. Fulton Oursler, Jr.

As I can see it now, the whole purpose of my meeting in Holland was to ruin me financially and completely. I am afraid that my wife's lawyer, Pat Russell, Jr. of Dallas colluded with Olmans.

In the way of clarification, my relationship with Olmans dates from about 10 years ago. Croisette supposedly told Olmans that I knew Oswald, hence Olmans came to Dallas to have an interview with Jeanne and I for the Dutch TV. The actual interview was done by CBS Dallas. Later my wife and I made a lengthy interview on tape. This interview is in Olmans possession. It is the property of ours as indicated several times on tapes. Neither Dutch TV nor Olmans are supposed to use this taped interview without Jeanne's and my permission.

Dear Chico:

I just returned from Washington in splendid spirits, which have been dampened by just learning this morning that Oppenheimer's daughter, aged 30, hung herself in the Virgin Islands. Gosh, what a tragedy has engulfed that family.

Ed Epstein tracked me down in Washington and there are some observations worth passing onto you. He has secured (which I presume anyone can maybe do under the Freedom of Information Act) the voluminous reports of the CIA and FBI on you. Epstein reports that this new prosecutor of the Congressional investigation is a ruthless killer of the Garrison strike and there is a danger that he could find you a pleasant plaything. This is also true of other journalists who would jump into the act. For instance, one of the reports classifies you as a pre-war Nazi sympathizer. Epstein's book is about finished and the Reader's Digest will run three serials this summer. Epstein is willing to pay you \$3,000 for an interview. I suggest you give serious consideration to accommodating his wish. It would be better for you to get your story out under competent auspices than for the matter to be leaked in ways which can inflict harm on anyone. Also, Epstein is smart and decent and if I were in your shoes, I would consent to an interview.

I saw Natasha while in Washington and she now looks excellent although she still speaks defensively of her recent illness. She spoke very warmly of having chatted with you in the hospital and that was good news. I learned through her that Zavoico had died.

Priscilla McMillan's book is finished and it will be curious to see under what constraints and through what perspectives she labored.

This idea of p.r. for La Fonda does not seem to make much sense



Dear George,

The arrangement which I think would be mutually profitable for us would be a fee of \$3,000 as a sort of retainer for your services plus an additional \$100 a day for any research time you put in on this project.

Specifically, I would like your help in the following areas: 1) your assistance in clarifying Oswald's movements, associates, and chronology between the time you met him in the summer of 1962 and April 1963; 2) your insights into Oswald's motive, intelligence, and personality; 3) a frank appraisal of various people with whom Oswald had some association; 4) a clarification of your own relationship with Oswald and some areas of your life which have been questioned by various people in the past, or more specifically, your trips to Yugoslavia, contacts with J. Walter Moore, etc., which have led to allegations that you have had some contact with intelligence agencies at some point in your life. I think that this needs to be fully explained and developed, and I see no reason why this should be in any way damaging to you.

I would also like your assistance in obtaining under Freedom of Information Act certain FBI, ONI, and CIA files which you can request. I think that these files will be helpful to you as well as to us because they will allow you to see the areas of your life which the FBI, etc. have been interested in. We would want you to clarify and fill in any missing data. Of course, we will assume responsibility for drafting the legal documents that would be necessary as well as paying all legal expenses.

If all this seems satisfactory to you, I will arrange our relationship so that you will be working as a research associate on this project and the documents that you help us obtain will be part of the journalistic work product.

As for logistics, I propose that we meet at Sam Ballen's hotel in Santa Fe the first week in March for two or three days to clarify Oswald's chronology, motives, etc., and to decide on our strategy for obtaining documents. The \$3,000 fee could be paid to you at that time as well as your expenses. Think about all this and if you like, we could get together and discuss these matters in greater detail. I'm glad to hear that you are all right.

De Mohrenschildt, Oswald confidant, told

House Assassinations Committee Monday quizzed a Dutch journalist and longtime De Mohrenschildt confidant, who said he viewed De Mohrenschildt last week at Bishop College. Oltmans did not say whether he had known of De Mohrenschildt's previous mental problems.

Oltmans quoted De Mohrenschildt as saying he does not know in advance what Oswald is going to do before the assassination. He said he was in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963.

Oltmans said, "How do you think Oswald would react if I came out and said I felt responsible for Oswald's assassination?" Oltmans said.

Oltmans interview developed from a national news story and sent Oltmans scurrying to Dallas in search of De Mohrenschildt and his address. As of Friday, however, the newspaper had not inquired about his

records with the Dallas County Mental Health Department.

In response to a request from The Dallas News, which asked that court records regarding De Mohrenschildt's mental illness proceedings be made accessible because such action is "in the public interest," Probate Judge Joseph E. Ashmore Jr. did so.

Congressional committee investigators have been working on the De Mohrenschildt case under the impression he disappeared after he left Bishop College March 1. Oltmans told the probe he accompanied De Mohrenschildt to Europe after he left the college on a leave of absence of several days, and then lost contact with him.

Bishop College officials said while De Mohrenschildt had not been heard from, they still expect him to return after the school's spring vacation ends Monday.

De Mohrenschildt, who was born in

Russia, was questioned at length before the Warren Commission in April, 1964, because of his friendship with Oswald months before the assassination. Then a petroleum engineer, he had befriended Oswald and his wife when they arrived in the Dallas-Fort Worth area in 1962 from Russia.

Mr. and Mrs. De Mohrenschildt had left for Haiti in connection with the oil business seven months before the assassination and were living there when it happened.

One of the fascinating aspects of De Mohrenschildt to the Warren Commission was his personal acquaintance with both Oswald and the mother of President Kennedy's widow, Jacqueline. During his 10 hours of testimony, he acknowledged he had written a letter to Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss, Dec. 12, 1961, expressing his sympathies after the assassination.

De Mohrenschildt told the commis-

sion he had met and become friendly with Mrs. Auchincloss at Belpport, Long Island, in 1939, within a year after he arrived in this country from Russia. He said he also met Jacqueline at the same time when she was a little girl.

In his letter to Mrs. Auchincloss, De Mohrenschildt stated he still had "a lingering doubt, notwithstanding all the evidence, of Oswald's guilt."

De Mohrenschildt told the commission he "will have the lingering doubt for the rest of my life . . . mainly because he (Oswald) did not have any permanent animosity for President Kennedy."

Mrs. Auchincloss later wrote back to De Mohrenschildt saying, "It seems extraordinary to me that you know Oswald and that you know Jackie as a child. It is certainly a very strange world." She added, "I hope, too, that Mrs. Oswald will not suffer."

Dear Mr. Dursler:

Your letter of February 23rd was received with a delay and I tried to call you last Friday but you were out of your office and out of town, I think. Excuse my delay in answering.

First of all nothing is mentioned of the expenses of my trip to Santa Fe. Tickets were supposed to be sent here and since I live very far from the airport, additional expenses should be settled. And now it develops that it would be much better to meet sooner here in Dallas. We could meet either here in our college or in Mr. Epstein's hotel.

Will Mr. Epstein make available to me the transcript of our conversation? How shall I know what he will say and how he will interpret my statements?

In the meantime, I shall try to keep in touch with Mr. Epstein on the phone and I will try to call you this afternoon to accelerate the matters.



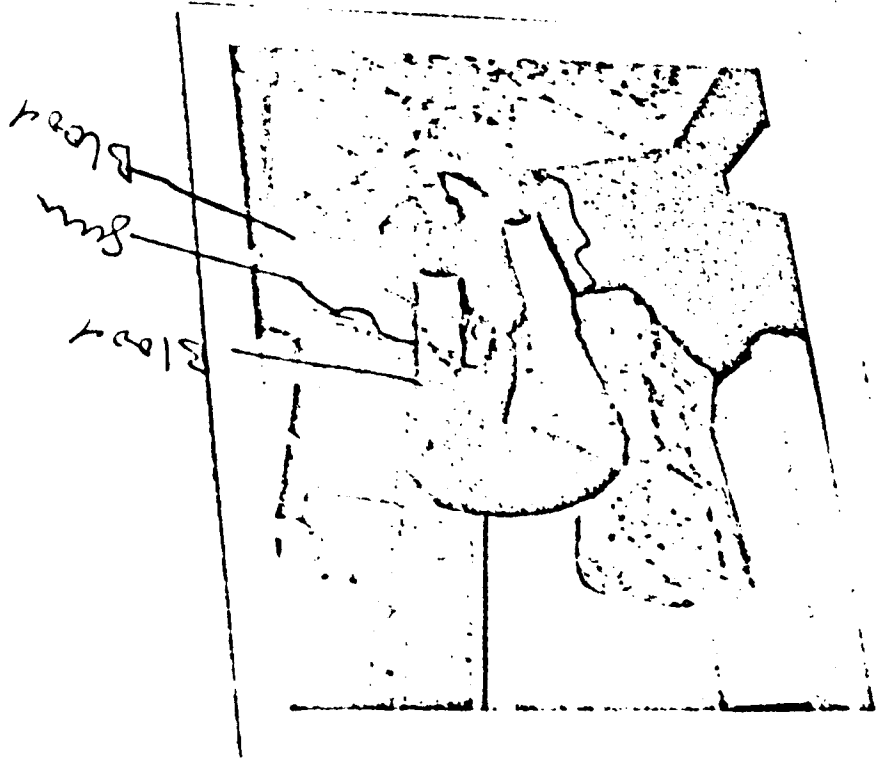

POLICY STATEMENT ON RESPONSIBLE ACADEMIC FREEDOM AND TENURE and on FACULTY CONTRACTS

This instrument is designed to serve three basic purposes: (1) To acquaint the candidate for a faculty position with the atmosphere for instruction at Bishop College as set forth in the section on the "Philosophy and Rationale Underlying Academic Freedom," in the "Statement of Expectations and Limitations" and as explained in the "Pre-employment Interview" (Parts I, II, III following); (2) To give the faculty member assurance and professional confidence stemming from clear policy statements on academic freedom and tenure (Parts IV, V, VI); and (3) To record details of the contract, both in the files of the faculty member and of the College (Part VII).

It is organized into seven parts:

- Part I — Philosophy and Rationale Underlying Academic Freedom
- Part II — Faculty Employment Expectations and Limitations
- Part III — Pre-Employment Interview
- Part IV — The 1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure developed by the American Association of University Professors
- Part V — Procedural Standards in Faculty Dismissal Proceedings
- Part VI — Recruitment and Resignation of Faculty Members
- Part VII — Bishop College Faculty Contract

PART I

PHILOSOPHY and RATIONALE UNDERLYING ACADEMIC FREEDOM

Responsible Academic Freedom — Academic freedom is designed to permit a rigorous search for truth in all disciplines of learning. It insists on freedom for the teacher to seek truth and to develop in his students a yearning for truth. Such freedom covers discovery, examination, constructive evaluation, and acceptance or rejection of ideas.

In a Christian college, especially, academic freedom in teaching and in research is to be exercised as a responsibility as much, if not more than, a right. Exercised in a Christian framework, such freedom is subjected to neither arbitrarily imposed conformity nor unrestrained license. A responsible exercise of academic freedom in the Christian college, especially, does require, however, that clear differentiation be made between theory and established fact in the classroom, laboratory, and published research.

Those who defend academic freedom most vigorously declare that if we already possess the truth we have nothing to fear from scholarly research, and that if we do not possess the truth we should be desperately trying to discover it.

Establishment of the best possible climate for teaching is essential on all campuses. For each faculty member, the essence of said climate entails the following:

- (a) the freedom to discuss and develop new ideas;
- (b) the imperative that the aforesaid freedom be responsibly exercised;
- (c) an assurance from the Administration and Board of Trustees that the specifications of *academic due process* in termination of teaching appointment will be adhered to; and
- (d) a reciprocal assurance on the part of the faculty member to the Administration and Board of Trustees that stipulates regarding *notice of intention to resign or to decline re-appointment* will not be violated (see Part VI).

PART II

FACULTY EMPLOYMENT EXPECTATIONS AND LIMITATIONS

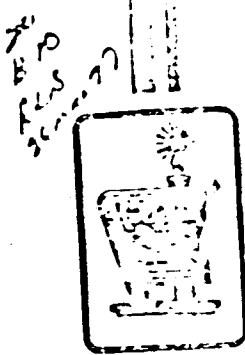
A. The policy of Bishop College on *expectations*, which applies to all faculty and staff appointments, includes:

1. A faculty member will be in sympathy with the college's primary objective — to educate its students within the framework of a Christian culture and to make its educational program not only Christian, but also cultural, comprehensive and contemporary.
2. The rights and privileges of a faculty member will be exercised by him with discretion and an effective sense of responsibility.
3. In his teaching and in his campus and community relations a faculty member will be guided by a sense of loyalty to Bishop College and the teaching profession.
4. He will recognize that inherent in true academic freedom are responsibilities as well as privileges.
5. He will maintain an acceptable credit rating in his business dealings with the College and in the community.

B. The Policy of Bishop College on *limitations*, which applies to all faculty and staff appointments, includes:

1. A teacher will be at liberty to present all known theories pertaining to the subject matter of his own and related fields but will be
