And there is a columnist by the name of Tony Zoppl-and prior to that. I wrote out a full page copy of 4 is bulld-I have the coples-as an MC, and I brought a picture and brochure, and Tony sald, "I will write a story." This was done two days prior to thls Thureday night.

So then I went down, so we discussed it and were very much disgusted with Tony because he only geve us a bulld of one or two lines. Well, I retired that night afler cloants the Club. Then I knew I wanted to g 0 back to the Mornins News building to get the brochure I left, and elso thls come plete page of longhand witing describing the vartous talenta of thls Bill DeMarr.

I pleked up the brochure that Frdday morning, and 1 : aiso had business at the News building on Friday becturet that is the start of the weekend, which is very luerative. tha weekend. I have ways of making my ads of where they haw a way of selling the product I sm producing or putting on tho thow. So I went down there Friday morning to Tony Zoppi's office, and they sald he went to New Orlesns for a couple al days.

I picked up the brochure. I belleve I got downtown thero at 10:30 or 11:00 o'clock that morning. And I took tha brochure and then went info the maln room whare we com. pose our ads. That is the seles room where we placed ouv. ads. And I remalned there for a while. I started to write tha copy of my ad.

Now I go back to the same fellow that wanted me to come over to the Club when we were having our dinner on Mockingbird at the Egyptian Lounge. I came to the desk and I wanted to apologlze and explain why I didn't accept him invitation last night. I wanted to explain, and that tool about twenty or twenty-five minutes. All this is pertaininal to everything prior to the terrible tragedy that happened.

I started to explain to him why I didn't want to so there because this rellow mentioned-Tony, I think-I can't thinil of his last name-of me having his band so many rears, and I felt at the moment I didn't want to so over to the Chalt because I didn't care to meet this fellow.

And he started to apolosize. "Jack, I am sorry, I ate work for the fellow and we have been advertising him fol that Club, and I am putting out a night crub book." I remained with him for twenty or twenty-five minutes tainding thers. 1 don't know whether my ad was completed or not. It was an ed on the Vegas and the Carousel. My ads were completanh I belleve, and after finishis my conversation with himio he left.

Suddenly the man that completes my idd for me, that helps me with it on occasion-but I usually make it up my-self-but the person that takes the money for the ads-thla is the reason it is so hard for me to meet a deadine when I get downtown to the News bullding. And as a rule. I have to piy cash for my ads. When jou are in debt, it is necossary. and they will not put it in unjess you pay caich.

And consequenily, the weekend, I had been to town oa that particular day. All this adds up later on, 15 I will catate why I didn't go to the parade. In the first place. I doa't want to to where there is bis crowds. I can't expialn tit to you. jit I was interested, I would have seen it on televiaion, our beloved President and all the parade that tranapired. 2ut all that adds up why it is important for me thete finge - Newi bufting.

I owe the government gutte a bit of money. and it is dotrg Dusinessout of your pocket, supposedily in the siang expresislof. Well. John Newman comes In, and evidentiy he took it for granted I Inished my ad. and 1 don't recall if he pald for his ad. and suddenly there is some milling asound.

I think it was 12:00 o'clock or iffteen minutes cifter 19:00. I don't recall what, but John Newman sald comeane had been shot. And I am sorry. I got carried away because I had been under pressure. And someone else came running over and he sald a Secret Service man was shot, or something to that effect. And I am there in the middle fith John Newman, because Newman isn't paring any attention to anyone elso, and there is a lot going back and forth.

In a State of Hysteria
So someone must have made a statement that Governor Connally was ahot. I don't recall what was sald. And I was in a state of hysteria. I mean. You say. "Oh my God. it can't happen." You carry on crazy sayings.

There was a little television set in one office not far away from where I had been silting at the desk. I ran over there and noticed a little boy and a ilttie alster cay. IT was - btanding right there when it happoned." I mean, dilfereat - mines you hear on the televislon. Then the phone started
ringing off the desk and I heard John Fewman asy people were complaining about the ad, why they accepted-init en

CHIEP JUSTICE WARREN: You are doing very well. I can understand why you have to reflect upon a story of that. jength.

RUBY: The phones were ringing off the desk calling varhous ads, and thes were having a turmoil in that New bullding because of a person by the name of Bernard Weliman piacing that particular ad. full page ad. I am sure you aro familiar with the ad.

CHIEP JUSTICE WARREN: YES, I am.
RUBY: Criticizing a lot of things about our beloved President. Then John Newman and I and another gentieman walked over to another part of the room, and I heard John Newman say, "I tol him not to take that ad." Bopethins to that affect. Then be sald, "Well, you have seen him pas part cash and come back and pay the balance." Now everything is very vague to the as to when this transpired; after they heard the Presdent had been shol, or prior to that. You know it's been a jons time, and I am under a very bad mental atraln here.

RUBY: From the time we were told that the President was shot, thirty-flve minutes later they ald he had passed away. In the meantime, I became very emotional. I called my dister at home. She was carried away terribis bad. And John

## 'I Was Crying Pretty Bad'

I left the bullding and I went down and I sot my car and I couldn't stop erying; becsuse maturally when I palled up to a "stop" light and other peoplo would be adjacent to me. I wouldn't want them to see me crying. because it looked Find of artifictal. And I went to the Club and I came up. and I may have made a couple of calls from there. I could have called my colored boy. Andy. down at the Club. I could have-I don't know who else I would have chiled, but I could have. because it is so long now since my mind is very much warped now. You think that llterally?

I went up to the Club and I told Andy, I sald, "Call everyone and tell them we are not opening." We have a Utthe girl in Fort Worth I wanted to make sure be called her. and a fellow by the name of Bell called and wanted to know If we were open. And Kathy Kay called, and I sald, "Definitely mot." And I called Ralph Paul, that owns the Bull Pen. He sald. "Jack. beins as everyone else is open"-because ha knowa I was pressed for money-and I cald, "No. Relph. I can't open." He sald, "Okay, if that is why, that is the way it's sot to be."

Bo in the meantime. I had zone with Alice Nichols for sometime, and I called her on the phone but she wasn't there, but I left the number on the pay phone for her to return the call, because I didn't want to keep tho bosiness phone tied up. And I hadn't spoken to her in maybe nine months or a gear. I don't know what I sald to her, yot many words, but just what happened.

I still remalned around the Club there. I am oure I was cring pretty bad. I think I made a loing distanco call to Calufornla. This fellow had just fisited me. and I had known. him in the days back to Chicago when we were very youms, in the real tough part of Chicago. Hir name is Al Oruber.

He was a bad kid in those days, but he is quite reformed. He is married and has a family, and I am sure he makes a very ledtimate luvelihood at this time. He happened to come through a couple of niehts prior to that to try to interent me, or four or ilve days prior to that. to interest me in at mew blad-you follow the story as I tell it?
