

2) That, independent of the suggestions and wishes of the crowds, that it would be right and not wrong for anyone to kill Oswald; viz that he, Ruby, was independently of such sound cool mind as to distinguish between whether it was right or wrong for him to shoot Oswald.

JURY DISREGARDED RULES OF "INNOCENCE" AND REASONABLE DOUBT.

It was the duty of the jury while determining the questions involved, to give Ruby the benefit of any reasonable doubt as to his sanity, premeditation or malice.

It may also have been the duty of the jury to give Ruby the benefit of the presumption of innocence because of insanity. (Texas law should be examined in this respect).

JURY ACTED WITH MALICE AND WITHOUT COOL MEDITATION.

It was at least the duty of the jury to free themselves of malice and prejudice, and presume Ruby to be free of the malice and premeditation he was charged with.

In view of Ruby's long-standing history of mental and emotional disturbances it would appear that the jury did not give Ruby the benefit of any such "reasonable doubts" or "presumptions of innocence."

Ruby did not understand that he was not called upon to personally right all the world's wrongs. He did not appreciate that this was the job of organizations established for such purposes

There are police and fire departments properly equipped to deal with certain problems. Volunteer firemen or policemen who jump into a situation without such training and equipment not only do harm to themselves but frequently interfere. It was for this interference that the jury punished him. Ruby's interference was of such a nature. But it was not with the malice or vicious motives that were attributed to him by the jury.

He did not have a sufficiently sound mind to know how to evaluate his concerns about Anti-Semitism or the suffering of Jews, or the assassination of President Kennedy and the grief of the Kennedy family. He did not know how to reconcile with public sentiment against Oswald and control his feelings and still stand at a safe distance in order to be of real and greater help to Texas and the causes he was seeking to serve.

Ruby felt the need to right a wrong, and suffer privation not only of his opportunities but of his very life in order to prove others wrong, and himself right in his obsessions, which to him seem normal. This may account for Ruby's present desire to commit suicide.

After finding Ruby guilty of 1st degree murder, he now believes that he brought disgrace and shame upon all the Jewish people for all time instead of the good will public demands led his deranged mind to believe he would accomplish.

He is now warning members of his family to guard and

**TRIAL AND JURY'S VERDICT BROUGHT SHAME AND DISGRACE TO
STATE OF TEXAS.**

When one recalls all of the facts involved herein and all the pictures, especially the one showing the shooting of Oswald, one wonders whether the jury were in their right minds when they returned the death verdict.

WAS RUBY TEMPORARILY SANE?

If the jury knew Ruby's history, and all that led up to his shooting of Oswald, they would have had to believe that Ruby miraculously and suddenly became temporarily sane at the instant of shooting, despite his previous insanity, before returning their death verdict.

The Jury, not unlike Ruby, felt the need to "right a wrong" and respond with a verdict of death for Ruby, in keeping with "public sentiment" as expressed by the prosecutor who represented Texas justice.

But what Anti-Semitism in the jury's personal lives made them vulnerable to such needs and pleas?

What hateful obsessions led them to "act on impulse" and make their hasty death verdict?

These questions will remain a dark secret unless investigated and exposed, just as will what led Ruby to shoot Oswald, unless the jury's shameful verdict is vacated, and a new trial ordered to remove, what could remain, an indelible blot on
ations will be unable to eras

JURORS' QUALIFICATIONS SHOULD BE INVESTIGATED.

Any juror who had personal prejudices or whose family had connections with organized Anti-Semitic groups, was not impartial, and did not qualify as a juror.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Since it is the aim of all concerned to protect the rights of Jack Ruby, efforts should be made to organize and coordinate the thinking and efforts of everyone concerned with "justice" so that appropriate steps will be promptly taken, in the right direction, to avoid any future conflicts, pitfalls or regrettable omissions.

The following is suggested merely by way of an attempt to complete the record, and correct some of the past and present omissions and mistakes in the record so that the real issues involved in this case are solidly in the record for proper review by the Supreme Court of Texas.

1) Thorough and complete psychiatric examination of Jack Ruby's life should be made with the help of such information as can be supplied by members of his family, friends, record of the Army or any other records or sources of information.

2) A motion for reconsideration of the Order denying the motion for a new trial should be filed before Judge Brown outlining and pinpointing the foregoing as 'newly discovered evidence'

The psychiatrists chosen to presently examine and treat Ruby should be outstanding forensic psychiatrists like Dr. Tanay.

Even though such a motion for reconsideration may be summarily rejected by Judge Brown, it nevertheless should be made so that a proper foundation will be in the record for arguments concerning this before the Supreme Court of Texas.

The inability of a client suffering a mental condition to communicate such evidence to his attorney by reason of his mental condition is grounds for labelling such evidence "newly discovered".

It would be helpful if the petition for re-consideration could also have attached to it the affidavits of those psychiatrists who previously limited their examination and testimony to the organic psychomotor epileptic condition.

3) Although there is an indication that Ruby may be given medical attention in order to prevent his mental condition from becoming worse or incurably insane or to prevent him from committing suicide;

Nevertheless a formal petition should be filed and made part of the record showing this mental condition and requesting such treatment so that this, too, will be in the record for use before the Supreme Court of Texas.

4) Despite the recent indication that Jack Ruby will receive a sanity hearing,

5) Attempts should be made to interest the American Psychiatric Society in this case, for the purpose of having them appoint a special panel of psychiatrists to impartially examine Ruby and submit their report. (Vis a vis the actions and effect formerly of the Epilepsy Society that may have been planned by those seeking Ruby's conviction).

6) Attempts should be made to interest the American Bar Assn. and Texas Bar in this case, for them to possibly appear amicus curiae or via "of counsel" and file briefs concerning the legal issues involved.

This historic case deserves to be fully prepared and presented, at least to the Supreme Court, to prevent any future regrets or criticisms for not having covered all possible areas.

By following the procedures outlined, and by way of verified petitions with full disclosure and spelling out the facts upon which they are based, they will not only show that Ruby was unable to assist his counsel before and during the trial, but such petitions will have a tendency to establish that Ruby did not receive a fair trial, and that he was insane for a long time prior to, as well as at the time of the shooting of Oswald. It will at least show that the verdict was even contrary to the limited evidence, in view of the doctrine of presumed innocence and reasonable doubt.

Such petitions would also establish that the shooting of Oswald was at least an unpremeditated act of Ruby's deranged mind, and that he is at least entitled to a new trial.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

The Commission would appreciate your investigating the following two matters for us.

(1) Re-interview Robert L. Norton, 3414 Manana St., Dallas, Texas, to determine whether Mr. Norton gave Jack Ruby \$25 on Saturday evening, November 23. Both Ruby and Norton testified that Ruby was present at Norton's Pago Club, 2822 McKinney St, Dallas, Texas on that date. Ruby has testified that he received \$25 in cash from Norton upon leaving the club shortly after midnight. If Mr. Norton did give Ruby this money, please ascertain the reason why he did so.

(2) Interview Rosemary Helmick, residing in Baltimore, formerly at 4116 Dartford Street. Wanda Helmick, a waitress who formerly worked for Ralph Paul, states that she wrote a letter to Rosemary Helmick, apparently not too long after the killing of Oswald, in which she told Rosemary Helmick that she had overheard a telephone conversation between Paul and Ruby the evening of November 23, in which Paul made an exclamation about a gun and Ruby's being "crazy". Mrs. Helmick has testified that she also overheard Paul discussing this conversation after the shooting took place. Please determine whether Rosemary Helmick received such a letter and, if so, the date and contents of the letter. If this letter is still in existence, please attempt to obtain the original or a copy of the letter.

No information identifiable with John Paracelsus could be located in Bureau files. His address not furnished.

Philadelphia is instructed to immediately comply with the Commission's request insuring that no action is taken to contact the prominent personalities referred to by Mr. Paracelsus.

The results of all investigation should be incorporated in an appropriate letterhead memorandum without property stamp and submitted to the Bureau and Dallas without need for revision or correction. Subsequent reporting of Philadelphia results by Dallas not desired.

Philadelphia should insure a true copy of Mr. Paracelsus's letter to Senator Russell is incorporated in your letterhead memorandum as well as an appropriately worded paragraph concerning the Commission's referral of this matter to the Bureau for investigation. Philadelphia should be alert to the development of any information indicating Mr. Paracelsus may be suffering from a mental illness and include same in your letterhead memorandum. This matter must receive expeditious attention as Commission is endeavoring to wind up its inquiries at an early date.

Paracelsus in his letter to Senator Russell (D-Ga.) alleges that TV actor Wilbur Post, lecturer and writer Clifton Fadiman, orchestra leader Mitch Miller, actor Arthur Stang possess information concerning the "truth" about the Ruby case. Paracelsus also states "true Americans" have lost confidence in the Commission because of the membership of Norman Redlich (staff member of the Commission), who is "too radical and ultra left." The Commission requested we interview Paracelsus to determine the "nature and extent" of his information regarding Oswald and Ruby, particularly what information he believes the above four prominent figures possess. The Commission has not requested we contact the prominent individuals. When the results of this investigation are received, the Commission will be appropriately notified.

This matter must continue to receive close attention so that the Commission's request can be complied with at the earliest practicable time.

NOTE: Commission by letter 8-3-64, makes reference to the testimony of Mark Lane before the President's Commission, in which he alleged there was a meeting at Jack Ruby's Carousel Club on 11-14-63, in Dallas between Bernard Weissman, Officer J. D. Tippit and Jack Ruby. Lane is the New York attorney who has engaged in [redacted] and is closely associated with communist dominated organizations. He has been endeavoring to prove that Oswald is innocent. Weissman is the individual who placed the controversial full page ad in a Dallas newspaper prior to President Kennedy's visit. Tippit, of course, was shot and killed by Oswald. We have investigated this allegation in the past and proven that no such meeting took place. However, based on the specific request in the above Commission letter, it appears the Commission is endeavoring to check out every possible facet of this matter to preclude possible criticism in the future. The Commission request requires the obtaining of photographs of Weissman and Tippit and displaying same to various individuals associated with the Carousel Club to insure that neither were seen in the club at any time.

The Commission also requested authenticated photographs of Officer Tippit and Weissman to be furnished then as soon as possible and prior to completion of our inquiries. This matter will be closely followed and when the results are received, the Commission will be notified.

RAY LUNDAY, Deputy Chief of Police, Dallas Police Department, advised that Captain GLEN KING of the Dallas Police Department never consulted him for permission for television cameramen or other news media to enter the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963.

Deputy Chief LUNDAY stated that the administrative offices in which LUNDAY's office is situated are located at the end of the third floor corridor. On the afternoon of November 22, 1963, LUNDAY related that Captain GLEN KING came to him and asked if it would be all right for the television cameramen to run cables from their truck to their large cameras in the corridor bringing such cables through the window of his office running them across out through his door to his office and into the hallway. LUNDAY stated this was the only conversation he had with KING and this was not for permission to permit the television and news media on the third floor corridor, but merely for the purpose of running the cables through his office. LUNDAY stated as far as he knew KING did not have to have the permission of anyone to permit news media representatives on the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building. He stated that as far as he knew KING acted on his own in permitting the news media representatives on the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building.

Deputy Chief LUNDAY stated he was not aware of any loose press cards or badges that might have been found lying in the basement of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 24, 1963.

Deputy Chief of Police GEORGE L. LUMPKIN, Dallas Police Department, Dallas, Texas, advised he was never consulted by Captain GLEN KING concerning television cameramen at the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963. He stated that KING asked him no questions concerning whether the television or press men could enter the third floor corridor of this building. LUMPKIN related that as a matter of fact KING, as far as he knew, was operating on his own and was directly responsible to Chief of Police JESSE E. CURRY since KING more or less handled the press relations for the Chief of Police. LUMPKIN stated that as far as he knew Captain KING dealt solely with the television and press people and he never heard of KING soliciting permission for these people to enter the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building.

Deputy Chief LUMPKIN stated he was not aware of any loose press cards or badges that might have been found lying in the basement of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 24, 1963.

Lieutenant T. L. BAKER, Homicide Bureau, Dallas Police Department, stated he was one of the detectives in Captain WILL FRITZ' office on the third floor of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas Police Department, on November 24, 1963. Lieutenant BAKER stated that at approximately 11:15 a.m., November 24, 1963, he telephoned to the basement jail office and talked with Lieutenant WOODROW WIGGINS in the basement jail office to make sure that all security measures were in effect. He stated he asked WIGGINS if everything was all set and WIGGINS replied that it was and he relayed this information to Captain WILL FRITZ. 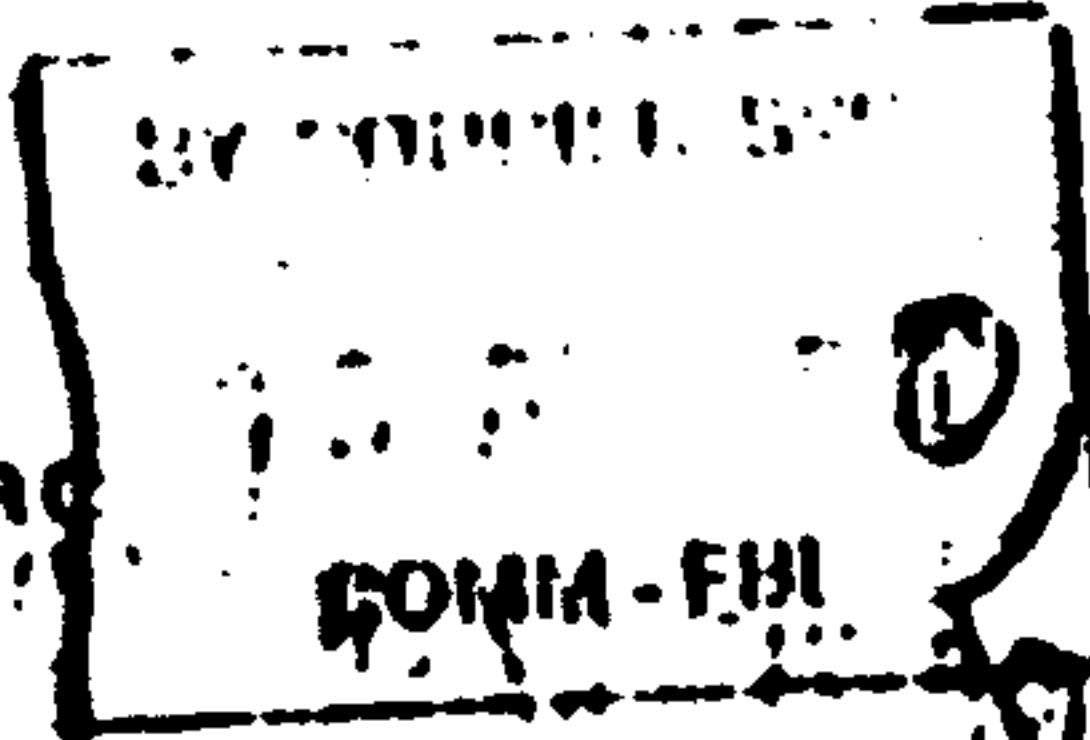
