RAY LUNDAY, Deputy Chief of Police, Dallas Police Department, advised that Captain GLEN KING of the Dallas Police Department never consulted him for permission for television cameramen or other news media to enter the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963.

Deputy Chief LUNDAY stated that the administrative offices in which LUNDAY's office is situated are located at the end of the third floor corridor. On the afternoon of November 22, 1963, LUNDAY related that Captain GLEN KING came to him and asked if it would be all right for the television cameramen to run cables from their truck to their large cameras in the corridor bringing such cables through the window of his office running them across out through his door to his office and into the hallway. LUNDAY stated this was the only conversation he had with KING and this was not for permission to permit the television and news media on the third floor corridor, but merely for the purpose of running the cables through his office. LUNDAY stated as far as he knew KING did not have to have the permission of anyone to permit news media representatives on the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building. He stated that as far as he knew KING acted on his own in permitting the news media representatives on the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building.

Deputy Chief LUNDAY stated he was not aware of any loose press cards or badges that might have been found lying in the basement of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 24, 1963.

Deputy Chief of Police GEORGE L. LUMPKIN, Dallas Police Department, Dallas, Texas, advised he was never consulted by Captain GLEN KING concerning television cameramen at the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963. He stated that KING asked him no questions concerning whether the television or press men could enter the third floor corridor of this building. LUMPKIN related that as a matter of fact KING, as far as he knew, was operating on his own and was directly responsible to Chief of Police JESSE E. CURRY since KING more or less handled the press relations for the Chief of Police. LUMPKIN stated that as far as he knew Captain KING dealt solely with the television and press people and he never heard of KING soliciting permission for these people to enter the third floor corridor of the Police and Courts Building.

Deputy Chief LUMPKIN stated he was not aware of any loose press cards or badges that might have been found lying in the basement of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas, Texas, on November 24, 1963.

Lieutenant T. I. BAKER, Homicide Bureau, Dallas Police Department, stated he was one of the detectives in Captain WILL FRITZ' office on the third floor of the Police and Courts Building, Dallas Police Department, on November 24, 1963. Lieutenant BAKER stated that at approximately 11:15 a.m., November 24, 1963, he telephoned to the basement jail office and talked with Lieutenant WOODROW WIGGINS in the basement jail office to make sure that all security measures were in effect. He stated he asked WIGGINS if everything was all set and WIGGINS replied that it was and he relayed this information to Captain WILL FRITZ. He stated this was as near to actually what was said as he could remember. He stated he reported to Captain FRITZ that "Everything is all set." He stated that his call to Lieutenant WIGGINS took approximately 30 seconds and that he immediately reported the results of this conversation with Lieutenant WIGGINS to Captain FRITZ. Lieutenant BAKER advised he was not aware of any similar telephone calls that were made to the basement immediately before the transfer party left FRITZ' office on Sunday morning, November 24, 1963.

Mr. JOSEPH A. GLOWACKI, 2811 Binkley Avenue, Apartment 210 (EM 3-6794), employed at The Old Warsaw Restaurant, 3914 Cedar Springs, Dallas, Texas, was reinterviewed and furnished the following information:

On November 22, 1963, he was in the downtown area of Dallas with Mr. KRISTIAN BARCZ, a Polish National, who was visiting the United States on a State Department study grant. They watched the Presidential parade from the corner of Main and Harwood Streets. The parade passed their station shortly after noon at which time they walked to Hoffman's Men's Wear, 1403 Commerce Street, where they learned from Mr. HOFFMAN that the President had been shot.

Mr. GLOWACKI advised he and Mr. BARCZ left Hoffman's shortly after 1:00 p.m. and went to a brokerage house located next to Hoffman's where they watched the news coming in concerning the assassination. They remained at this place for approximately 30 minutes then went back to Hoffman's where they again spoke with Mr. HOFFMAN for a few minutes.

He recalled BARCZ wanted to make a telephone call to his employer, a television station in Warsaw, Poland, to report the news of the assassination. They left Hoffman's and walked to the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company Building, 308 S. Akard, where BARCZ placed his call to Warsaw. GLOWACKI estimated they were in the telephone building for about 30 minutes. From the telephone building they walked to Television Station WFAA, Young and Houston Streets, where BARCZ asked to see the Station Manager, MIKE SHAPIRO. GLOWACKI related parenthetically that BARCZ was a guest of this station. SHAPIRO spoke briefly with them and they left the television station and walked to the Ritz Delicatessen, 205 Browder, for lunch. He estimated their arrival at the delicatessen at approximately 3:30 p.m. or possibly a little later. While at the delicatessen, he observed JACK RUBY standing near the front of the delicatessen listening to the broadcast coming in on the radio. He called RUBY over to his table and introduced him to BARCZ. GLOWACKI invited RUBY to sit at their table, but RUBY declined.

GLOWACKI advised that at that time RUBY did not appear to him to be any more agitated or upset than the average citizen. In fact, RUBY asked Mr. GLOWACKI, "Joe, what is this going to do to our business? We're going to loose all of the conventions." It appeared to GLOWACKI that RUBY was more concerned with the result on business than he was by the actual assassination of the President. GLOWACKI now recalls RUBY may have commented, "Do they have that son-of-a-bitch that did it?" and "Joe, whether you think they should do to the bastard -- they should shoot him right away!"

GLOWACKI indicated he and BARCZ continued with their lunch after the brief conversation with RUBY and estimated they left the delicatessen at approximately 4:00 p.m. RUBY was still at the delicatessen when they left.

GLOWACKI further advised his friend BARCZ has since returned to Poland.

GLADYS BEALL IVEY, nee CRADDOCK, Route 1, Gloster, Mississippi, advised that on November 22, 1964, she was employed in a clerical capacity in the Classified Advertising Department of "The Dallas Morning News" newspaper, Dallas, Texas. She advised that the Classified Advertising Department is located on the ground floor on the newspaper building.

Mrs. IVEY stated that to the best of her recollection it was about 11 A.M., on November 22, 1963, when she observed JACK RUBY in the Classified Advertising Department. She stated she affixes the time as approximately 11 A.M., because prior to this time she had temporarily left the building to conduct some personal business in the area and was hurrying to return to the building by 11 A.M., as her supervisor, Mrs. CLAIRE CONLON, had indicated that she wanted to go to lunch on time so that she, Mrs. CONLON, could return to the building to watch the Presidential Motorcade. Mrs. IVEY stated that it was Mrs. CONLON'S normal custom to go to lunch at 11 A.M.

Mrs. IVEY stated that upon returning to the newspaper building she walked through the lobby on the ground floor and walked around behind the counter to the area where she normally waits on the customers. As she was walking behind the counter she glanced toward the lobby and observed JACK RUBY walking across the lobby in the direction of the elevator. At approximately the same instant she observed RUBY, RUBY also observed her and at this instant turned towards her and raised his voice and said "Hi, the President is going to be here today." RUBY also during the conversation waved his hand in her direction. She stated that it was necessary for RUBY to raise his voice because he was quite a distance from her and that she then lost sight of RUBY and does not know whether he went to the elevator or left the building.

Mrs. IVEY stated that she had no other conversation with JACK RUBY and in these few moments that she observed RUBY on the morning of November 22, 1963, there was nothing in his conduct or actions which she considered unusual.

Mrs. IVEY stated that in her contacts with RUBY prior to November 22, 1963, it always seemed to her that RUBY was in a hurry to complete whatever he might be doing and that RUBY'S contacts with her were always friendly.

Mrs. VIRGINIA TOWERY, 122 N. Beckley Street, owner of Lorene's Beauty Shop, 205 N. Beckley Street, advised that a few days after President KENNEDY was assassinated in Dallas, Mrs. J. E. Ewing, made a comment at the beauty shop that she had received a call from an unidentified man inquiring as to whether she had a bedroom for rent. She told him no room was available. Mrs. HALL commented that it might possibly have been LEE HARVEY OSWALD since he was said to have rented a room in the Oak Cliff section.

Mrs. TOWERY stated she considered it to be "beauty shop talk," and placed no importance in the comment.

She became manager of the apartments in December, 1962, when they were new. One of her first renters was Mrs. KATHY KAY COLEMAN with her two young daughters, who occupied Apartment 111, 321 N. Ewing.

A few months later, Mrs. COLEMAN told her she had married HARRY OLSEN, and he moved in with her. They resided together in the same apartment until about January, 1964, when they moved out. They caused no trouble of any kind while living there, and were regarded as satisfactory tenants.

Mrs. HALL recalled that a few days before President KENNEDY was assassinated in Dallas she received a telephone call from an unidentified man asking if she had a sleeping room for rent. She replied that she did not, and there was no further contact with him.

A few days after the assassination, she recalled being at Lorene's Beauty Shop, 205 N. Beckley, and discussing the assassination with the owner, Mrs. VIRGINIA TOWERY, when it was mentioned that LEE HARVEY OSWALD was living in a room on North Beckley. Just to make conversation, and without any foundation, Mrs. HALL commented she had received a call from a man a few days earlier, inquiring about a sleeping room, and that it might possibly have been OSWALD. She meant it as a joke and just "beauty shop talk," since there was no reason to believe it was OSWALD.

Mr. BILLY DON WILLIAMS, 205 Ocean Spray Avenue, Satellite Beach, Florida, is currently employed as a salesman by Kirby Vacuum Cleaner Service, 406 Harbor City Boulevard, Eau Gallie, Florida. He previously resided at the Hidden Village Apartments in Dallas, Texas.

Mr. WILLIAMS reported that at this late date he will have to rely on his previous statement given to the FBI in Dallas, Texas a few days following the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY as to the exact time of his telephone conversation with JACK RUBY in that city.

He knows that he last saw RUBY in person a day or two before the assassination of President KENNEDY. It is his present recollection that on the date of the assassination, he and his wife, KAREN GREEN WILLIAMS, argued as to whether she would have to work at the Carousel Club that evening. Sometime about 3:00 or 4:00 p.m. on the day of the assassination, he telephoned the club and talked with a Negro (name not recalled) who was a part-time assistant manager or bartender. This Negro told him the club was closed and would remain closed the rest of the weekend. This man also told him during the conversation that Mr. RUBY was "pretty upset."

Mr. WILLIAMS has no recollection of talking with RUBY on that date (Friday, November 22, 1963) and is quite certain he was not in contact with him.

He did telephone RUBY on Saturday night, November 23, 1963, perhaps between 9:00 and 10:00 p.m. The above mentioned Negro had telephoned his wife earlier that evening and asked WILLIAMS and his wife to come to the club. Mr. WILLIAMS called back to inquire as to why they were wanted at the club and talked with JACK RUBY at that time. RUBY asked if he had four or five dollars and asked what they planned to do that evening. When WILLIAMS replied that he did have some money, and that he had planned to take his wife to dinner, RUBY requested him to have dinner at the Colony Club in Dallas, Texas and asked WILLIAMS to see how the Colony Club was operated and to obtain, if he could, the names of the

amateur strippers performing there. RUBY added that he might want to use WILLIAMS as a witness against the Colony Club. WILLIAMS agreed and RUBY said that he would reimburse him for the cost of the dinner.

Mr. WILLIAMS understood that RUBY was going to try to cause the closing of the Colony Club because of their use of amateur strippers.

During the above Saturday night conversation, he asked RUBY if the Carousel Club would remain closed until Monday. RUBY replied that it would and asked WILLIAMS if he did not agree that the assassination of President KENNEDY was a tragic enough affair to cause everything to be closed. Mr. WILLIAMS agreed.

Mr. WILLIAMS stated that to the best of his present knowledge and recollection, he learned that the Carousel Club was closed on November 22, 1963 from the above mentioned Negro, and that he had no contact with JACK RUBY following the assassination of President KENNEDY until Saturday night, November 23, 1963.

Lieutenant JAMES R. GILMORE, Platoon Supervisor, Vice Section, Dallas Police Department, Dallas, Texas, advised he first saw JACK L. RUBY on Friday night, November 22, 1963, after the assassination of President KENNEDY, inside the Police Department assembly room during the press conference held by District Attorney HENRY WADE at midnight.

GILMORE related that he recalls seeing RUBY at the press conference inasmuch as during this press conference District Attorney WADE was speaking about the organization OSWALD was a member of; however, he was not able to recall the name of this organization, and RUBY "spoke up and remarked, 'the Fair Play for Cuba.'"

GILMORE stated he did not converse with RUBY at this press conference; however, approximately one hour after the press conference he saw RUBY in one of the passageways of the Dallas Police Department, at which time he, GILMORE, asked RUBY what he was doing and RUBY related he was distributing sandwiches to the officers of the Homicide and Robbery Section. GILMORE stated RUBY also commented he was going to "check with KLIF to see if they wanted any sandwiches." Thereafter, he terminated their conversation, departed, and headed for the exit; however, GILMORE did not actually see RUBY leave the building.

FELIX R. MC KNIGHT, Executive Vice President and Editor of "The Dallas Times Herald" newspaper, advised on August 3, 1964, that information furnished to his newspaper concerning the questions and answers of a polygraph examination of JACK RUBY on July 18, 1964, was given to the newspaper in confidence and he could not, therefore, divulge the source.

Mr. MC KNIGHT stated he could say the information did not come from anyone in an official Federal or State agency. He said he would contact his source on August 4, 1964, in an effort to ascertain if the source would agree either to MC KNIGHT furnishing source's identity or else having the source contact the FBI and furnish the information.

On August 6, 1964, Mr. MC KNIGHT stated he had contacted the source who had furnished the information in question. He stated the source did not wish his identity divulged and he felt he could not, therefore, reveal the name of the source.

Mr. MC KNIGHT was asked again if what he had previously advised, that the source was not anyone in a Federal or State agency, was true. He stated he wished to correct this statement by saying that he could positively state the information did not come from anyone in the FBI or the President's Commission, but that he would not go further as to elimination of anyone else.

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Mr. CLAYTON FOWLER on interview at his office was asked whether or not he furnished information to any news facility, newspaper, or reported concerning information as to the questions propounded to JACK RUBY or the answers given by him when RUBY was questioned through the use of a polygraph machine.

Mr. FOWLER stated he did not furnish any information concerning the interview of RUBY with the polygraph machine to anyone or any organization that could have been responsible for the publication of such information.

Mr. FOWLER was then asked if he knew who had furnished such information. He replied that he did not know who furnished the information, however, he is certain in his mind that it was not anyone connected with either the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the President's Commission, or the Dallas Sheriff's Department. He further stated he is certain information was not furnished by Dr. BEAVERS or by the stenographer who recorded the interview. He stated he does not believe that Mr. TONAHILL furnished any such information although he cannot be positive of this.

It was called to Mr. FOWLER's attention at this time that he had excluded everyone except Mr. BILL ALEXANDER of the Dallas District Attorney's Office.

Mr. FOWLER stated he was aware of this and added that he does not know that Mr. ALEXANDER furnished the information but he feels that everyone else who had access to the information can be eliminated.

Mr. FOWLER stated it was agreed in advance of the interview that the information would not be disclosed and it was at the request of JACK RUBY that Mr. ALEXANDER and Mr. TONAHILL were requested not to be present during the polygraph examination. He added, however, that the questions to be propounded to RUBY were prepared in advance and it was agreed that these questions would be read to RUBY prior to the time that the polygraph machine was brought into use. RUBY was not to answer the questions at this time. However, when these questions were

It was, therefore, possible for Mr. ALEXANDER to have detailed notes as to the questions and as to the answers given by RUBY while the polygraph machine was not in operation.

Mr. JOE TONAHILL, Attorney, was interviewed and he advised he wanted to categorically state that he had nothing to do with releasing the text of a polygraph test given to JACK RUBY by the Federal Bureau of Investigation on July 18, 1964, at the request of the President's Commission. Mr. TONAHILL related that he was upset by the release of this test to the press because certain questions were asked of JACK RUBY which were inclined to reflect on the surface that there was premeditation involved in RUBY's shooting LEE HARVEY OSWALD. Mr. TONAHILL stated that prior to the time of the test and during the formulation of the questions which were to be asked of RUBY, Assistant District Attorney WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER of Dallas, Texas, was highly interested in questions being phrased that would be asked RUBY whereby premeditation would be shown. Mr. TONAHILL stated that Mr. WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER knows very well that there are many reversible errors in the record of the trial of JACK RUBY and that it is highly likely that RUBY will have to be tried over at a later date. He stated that it is his opinion that ALEXANDER caused the transcript of the test to be released to the press.

Mr. TONAHILL stated he did not take notes during the course of this test but that he personally observed ALEXANDER writing down the questions and then writing down the answers RUBY gave, which answers RUBY gave prior to being placed on the polygraph machine.

Mr. TONAHILL stated he would be willing to be questioned under oath or any other way relative to the leaks of the polygraph test to "The Dallas Times Herald."

TONAHILL stated that although it was his personal opinion that WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER may have caused the results of the polygraph test to be leaked he had no proof that ALEXANDER did this or caused this information to be leaked to "The Dallas Times Herald."

TONAHILL stated he did not know of his own knowledge nor had he heard how the results of this polygraph test were given to "The Dallas Times Herald."

Mr. WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER, Assistant District Attorney, Dallas County, Dallas, Texas, advised that he represented the District Attorney's office in Dallas County at the time the representative of the President's Commission came to Dallas, Texas, on July 18, 1964, for the purpose of giving a polygraph test to JACK RUBY. ALEXANDER related that this test was given by a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Prior to the actual test, the questions were formulated and were read to RUBY whereby, as best as ALEXANDER remembers, RUBY answered the questions. ALEXANDER stated he did not take down the questions verbatim nor did he take down the answers verbatim but summarized same.

Mr. ALEXANDER advised that when the tests were actually given to RUBY, defense counsel, JOE TONAHILL, and he, ALEXANDER, left the room and, as best as he could remember, the President's Commission representative, two Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents, a court reporter, Dr. WILLIAM ROBERT BEAVERS, and the Dallas County jailer, as well as CLAYTON FOWLER, counsel for RUBY, stayed in the room where these tests were being given. On Monday morning, July 20, 1964, he directed a memorandum to District Attorney HENRY M. WADE setting forth a summary of the events that transpired from his notes and his memory and discussed this with Mr. WADE.

Mr. ALEXANDER related that he compared his notes with the transcript of the questions and answers of "The Dallas Times Herald" which appeared to him to be the verbatim transcript of the questions asked of RUBY and the answers RUBY gave. In addition, in "The Dallas Times Herald," RUBY, in answering some of the questions, had attempted to explain his answers. ALEXANDER stated this was not done in his presence. ALEXANDER stated he could categorically state that he did not know how "The Dallas Times Herald" obtained the transcript of RUBY's polygraph test and that he did not give this to "The Dallas Times Herald" nor did he have any knowledge as to how "The Dallas Times Herald" obtained this transcript. ALEXANDER stated it was his personal opinion that the transcript came from someone who either had a recorder on his person or took shorthand notes. Mr. ERNEST L. HOLMAN, also known as E. L. HOLMAN, Chief Jailer, Dallas County Jail, advised he was instructed by Sheriff J. E. "BILL" DECKER to make JACK RUBY available on July 18, 1964, for a polygraph test in Judge FRANK WILSON's jury quarters, located on the seventh floor of the Dallas County Court House.

He stated that he brought RUBY to this jury room about 1:00 P.M. and remained with him at all times except during a recess of about thirty minutes at approximately 7:30 P.M. when he, HOLMAN, went to the jail kitchen to get ice water and coffee. He was gone for approximately ten minutes during this recess. JOE TONAHILL took RUBY into another room in the jury quarters for a conference and HOLMAN asked Deputy Sheriff SMITH, a patrolman for the Dallas County Sheriff's Office, to stand guard while he was gone.

Mr. HOLMAN stated that the first set of questions was presumed to have been written out by the Commission's attorney, ARLEN SPECTER, and the FBI polygraph operator prior to the time he arrived in the room with RUBY. The second set of questions was prepared during the recess at 7:30 P.M. by Mr. SPECTER and the polygraph operator.

HOLMAN stated present in the room on his arrival were Mr. SPECTER, FBI polygraph operator HERNDON, FBI Agent W. JAMES WOOD, Mr. CLAYTON FOWLER, Mr. JOE TONAHILL, Assistant District Attorney WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER, Dr. WILLIAM ROBERT BEAVERS, and Court Reporter ODELL OLIVER.

HOLMAN advised that these questions which had been prepared were agreed upon by Mr. ALEXANDER and Mr. CLAYTON FOWLER after FOWLER went on record as being opposed to the polygraph examination and after also advising JACK RUBY.

HOLMAN advised that during the time the questions were being asked RUBY prior to placing him on the polygraph, he, HOLMAN, observed the court reporter, ALEXANDER, FOWLER and Agent WOOD making notations.

Miss ODELL OLIVER, office in the U.S. Post Office and Courthouse, Dallas, Texas, who is a Court Reporter, was interviewed on August 22, 1964.

Miss OLIVER stated that she took notes on the polygraph test given to JACK L. RUBY on July 18, 1964, at the request of the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY. She related that the transcription was not completely typed up until Friday, July 24, 1964. This transcription was then mailed by registered mail to the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY, Washington, D. C., with a return receipt requested.

Miss OLIVER stated at no time did she divulge or discuss the contents of this transcription with anyone and does not know how such transcription got into "The Dallas Times Herald", which was printed July 22, 1964. She stated she read the article in "The Dallas Times Herald" allegedly reflecting the questions and answers in the polygraph test; however, she noted some discrepancies in the questions and answers, and it appeared to her that "The Dallas Times Herald" in reporting the questions and answers had paraphrased in some instances. Miss OLIVER stated that she has no idea as to how this transcription reached "The Dallas Times Herald", but definitely wants to state that she at no time divulged any information to anyone.

GRIFFITH did not know the name of this man, but heard someone (identity not now recalled) refer to this individual as "JACK".

GRIFFITH stated he was in "JACK's" presence about five or six minutes as he, GRIFFITH, was trying to get out of the building and go home as it had been a hectic night with many of the advertising merchants changing their regular advertisements to ones expressing condolences over the tragic death of President KENNEDY in Dallas on the previous day.

While in "JACK's" presence these few minutes, he recalls that "JACK" appeared to be in a very jovial mood and not at all remorseful, and laughingly had mentioned that he had been hanging around the Dallas City Hall that night although he was not supposed to be there. "JACK" said he

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had done favors in the past for unnamed individuals and had been allowed to enter City Hall that night.

"JACK" also mentioned that "we" (not further identified) are trying to find out who the man really is that placed the ad in "The Dallas Morning News" on November 22, 1963, prior to the President's death making strong accusations against the President. "JACK" by all outward indications acted as if he did not know who this advertiser was (BERNARD WEISSMAN). "JACK" said, "It is probably someone posing as a Jew".

GRIFFITH stated he then continued on his way and never thought anything more of "JACK" or his comments.

GRIFFITH stated that he was home on Sunday, November 24, 1963, watching television when the television showed JACK RUBY shooting OSWALD. Even at this time, GRIFFITH stated he had not connected RUBY with the "JACK" he had seen briefly early Saturday morning, November 23, 1963, in the newspaper building.

GRIFFITH stated that it was not until Thanksgiving morning, November 28, 1963, when someone unrecalled, a fellow newspaper employee, mentioned to him that RUBY was the same "JACK" that he, GRIFFITH, had met in "The Dallas Times Herald" Composing Room early Saturday morning, November 23, 1963, that he, GRIFFITH, realized that "JACK" was the same person who shot OSWALD. Up to this time GRIFFITH had not made the connection of "JACK" being the same person as JACK RUBY.

GRIFFITH added that he had never known RUBY previously and did not recall ever having seen RUBY in person prior to or after November 23, 1963.

ROY A. PRYOR, 8544 Foxwood Lane, advised that he is employed as a printer by "The Dallas Times Herald" and that he and a man named GRIFFIN or GRIFFITH, first name unknown, had both worked two hours overtime the morning of November 23, 1963. Both had made up time sheets and were about ready to leave "The Dallas Times Herald" composing room when JACK RUBY came in at approximately 4:10 a.m. PRYOR spoke to RUBY but does not recall if he introduced RUBY to "GRIF." If RUBY and "GRIF" spoke at all, it would have only been to say hello. PRYOR stated that "GRIF" would not have been in RUBY's presence more than five or ten seconds before "GRIF" left. PRYOR stated that "GRIF" is approximately 39 years of age.

Miss HELEN LAIDRICH, 7847 Northaven Road, Dallas, Texas, was interviewed on August 21, 1964.

Miss LAIDRICH stated that she was the court reporter who was employed to take the transcription of the interview of Chief Justice EARL WARREN with JACK L. RUBY on June 7, 1964. Miss LAIDRICH stated this interview started at approximately 11:45 a.m. and ended at approximately 2:50 p.m. She stated during the course of that period, she was very busy and did not have an opportunity to observe the activities of the other people present during that period. She stated she was instructed to type her transcription up and mail it to Mr. ARLEN SPECTER, Staff Counsel of the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY. Miss LAIDRICH stated that she typed up the contents of this interview and, thereafter, took them to the United States Attorney, H. BAREFOOT SANDERS, in the Federal Building, Dallas, Texas, and asked him to mail these to Mr. SPECTER, which he did.

Miss LAIDRICH stated she had no idea as to who may have divulged the contents of this transcript to unauthorized persons. She stated she definitely did not have the remotest idea as to who may have given this information to unauthorized persons and she wanted to state that she definitely did not furnish any information concerning this interview to any unauthorized persons.

Miss LAIDRICH stated that on June 30, 1964, while en route to the World's Fair, she stopped by the office of the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY in Washington, D. C., and visited with some of the personnel there whom she knew. She related that she went to the Veterans of Foreign Wars Building and inquired as to the

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location of the President's Commission. Miss LAIDRICH related that upon getting off the elevator, on what she believed was the fourth floor of this building, she asked the elevator operator if BURT GRIFFIN was available to talk with. She stated that she had known BURT GRIFFIN previously. Shortly thereafter, Mr. GRIFFIN greeted Miss LAIDRICH. Miss LAIDRICH stated they then went around the corner of the elevator to the first office on the right of the hallway and went into this office, where there was a secretary sitting at a desk. From there, they proceeded through this office into a back office where she observed a man sitting behind a desk, whom she assumed was another attorney.

Miss LAIDRICH stated she asked Mr. GRIFFIN what he thought of the interview of Chief Justice WARREN with JACK RUBY, and Mr. GRIFFIN stated he thought it was an excellent interview. She said one question Mr. GRIFFIN asked was, "Did Chief Justice WARREN actually hand JACK RUBY his glasses when RUBY was trying to read a note?" Miss LAIDRICH stated she was surprised to see some mimeographed copies of the transcript of the interview of JACK RUBY with Chief Justice WARREN, and she gained the impression that the mimeographed copies had been made up in order for the members of the staff to study them.

Miss LAIDRICH stated she wanted to reiterate she did not have any knowledge whatsoever or any idea as to who may have given the information of this interview to unauthorized people, but she wanted to explicitly state that she did not discuss this with any unauthorized persons.

Sheriff J. E. DECKER, Dallas County Sheriff's Office, Dallas, Texas, stated that at the time Chief Justice WARREN, Chairman of the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY, was questioning JACK L. RUBY on June 7, 1964, in the Dallas County Jail, DECKER was present only during part of the questioning. DECKER stated that he took no notes. DECKER stated he had no idea as to how any unauthorized persons came into possession of the contents of the interview of RUBY with Chief Justice WARREN. DECKER stated that he had not discussed what little he knew of the questions and answers between Chief Justice WARREN and JACK L. RUBY with anyone, and could categorically state that he had discussed with no one the contents of this interview.
