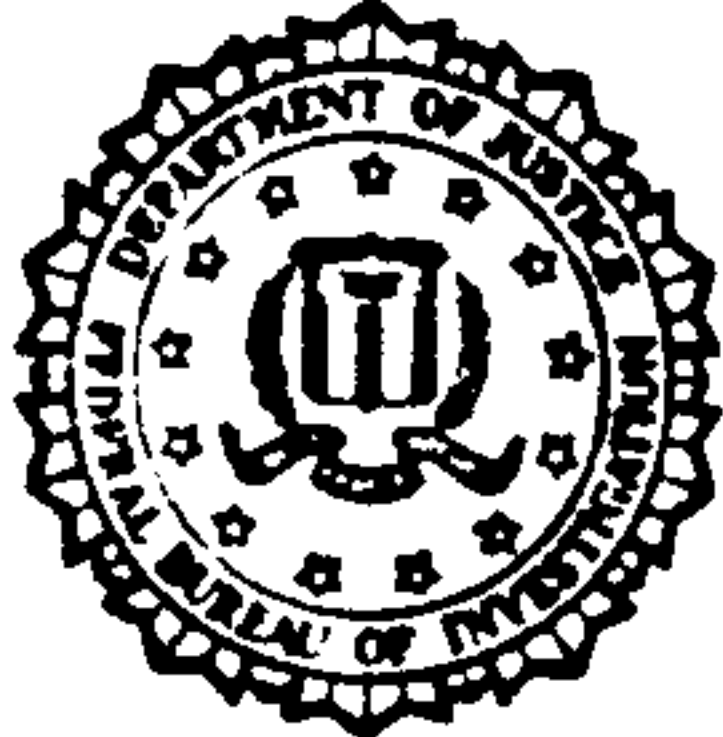

NEW YORK--A NEW INDEPENDENT STUDY OF THE ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY MADE PUBLIC TODAY CLAIMS THE SLAYING WAS A CONSPIRACY AND THREE GUNMEN WERE INVOLVED, ALL OF WHOM MAY STILL BE AT LARGE. THE MAJOR CONCLUSIONS OF A TWO-YEAR INVESTIGATION OF THE 1963 TRAGEDY BY DR. JOSIAH THOMPSON OF HAVERFORD COLLEGE, PA., ARE CONTAINED IN AN ARTICLE IN THE SATURDAY EVENING POST WHICH WILL REACH THE NEWSSTANDS NEXT TUESDAY. THE POST, IN AN EDITORIAL, CONTENDS THAT THOMPSON "DEMOLISHES THE WARREN REPORT" AND DEMANDS THE ASSASSINATION CASE BE REOPENED BY THE GOVERNMENT.

THOMPSON, 32-YEAR-OLD YALE PHI BETA KAPPA SCHOLAR WHO TEACHES PHILOSOPHY, CHARGES THAT ALTHOUGH THE DETAILS REMAIN UNCLEAR, "THE ESSENTIAL OUTLINE OF THE ASSASSINATION IS NOW APPARENT--THE 'ONE ASSASSIN' FINDING OF THE WARREN COMMISSION IS PATENTLY WRONG; THERE WERE FOUR SHOTS FROM THREE GUNS IN SIX SECONDS."

SOME OF THOMPSON'S CONCLUSIONS ARE BASED ON ORIGINAL RESEARCH IN THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES, DOCUMENTS AND PHOTOS NOT SEEN BY THE WARREN COMMISSION, AND INTERVIEWS WITH EYEWITNESSES. OTHERS ARE GROUNDED IN FURTHER ANALYSES OF MATERIAL IN THE WARREN REPORT. AN ANALYSIS OF THIS PRINT, OWNED BY LIFE MAGAZINE, BY A NEW TECHNIQUE INVOLVING SUPERIMPOSITION OF SEQUENTIAL PICTURES AND BY A DISSECTING MICROSCOPE PROVIDED THOMPSON WITH DATA HE SAYS INDICATES;

--FOUR BULLETS WEPE FIRED IN DALLAS' DEALEY PLAZA AND ALL HIT THEIR MARK (THE WARREN COMMISSION REPORTED THREE SHOTS, TWO HITS). THE FIRST, A CARTRIDGE WHOSE EXPLOSIVE POWER WAS SUBSTANDARD, MADE A SHALLOW WOUND IN THE PRESIDENT'S BACK. THE SECOND WOUNDED GOV. JOHN B. CONNALLY. THE THIRD HIT KENNEDY IN THE NECK FROM BEHIND. THE FOURTH HIT KENNEDY'S HEAD FROM THE FRONT AND WAS FATAL.

A MONTHS-LONG INDEPENDENT STUDY OF THE FILM BY THE ITEK CORPORATION OF LEXINGTON, MASS., ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP PHOTOGRAPHIC LABORATORIES, DETERMINED, HOWEVER, THAT THE "MAN WITH THE RIFLE" WAS SIMPLY A BLENDING OF SHADOWS OF TREE BRANCHES. SUBJECT: ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN FITZGERALD KENNEDY NOVEMBER 22, 1963, DALLAS, TEXAS MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING

United Press International (UPI) release 11/15/67 refers to a new and independent study of the assassination of President Kennedy which was made by Dr. Josiah Thompson of Haverford College, Haverford, Pennsylvania.

This independent study based on his book entitled "Six Seconds in Dallas" to be published November 27, 1967, appears in a condensed form in "The Saturday Evening Post" December 2, 1967, Issue, bearing the caption, "The Cross Fire that Killed President Kennedy."

This article was reviewed to analyse any allegations made against the FBI. Primarily, Thompson has come up with a theory that there were four shots fired from three guns in six seconds, and the "one assassin" finding of the Warren Commission is patently wrong. The Commission concluded three shots were fired.

In reviewing the article, only two items were noted which concern the FBI. Thompson has stated the FBI used an inferior copy of the Abraham Zapruder film for photo analysis whereas he examined a better copy of the film and four inch by five inch transparencies when he was a consultant to Life Magazine. He alleged this enabled him to make more valid determinations.

While the Zapruder film (showing the assassination) initially furnished to us and used for much of the initial study is a copy, the FBI and the Commission later had the opportunity to examine the original film when brought to Washington by a representative of Life Magazine. Our detailed studies were made using a set of excellent quality 35 millimeter slides made directly from the original film by Life Magazine for us. Therefore, our findings and the Commission's findings were not based on examination of an inferior copy of the Zapruder film as alleged by Thompson, but upon an over-all analysis of all the

films, original and copies and the slides made by Life Magazine. Therefore, Thompson definitely is in error.

Thompson quotes results of our findings in regard to the minimum time required to operate the assassination rifle. In this respect, Thompson made a statement, FBI Laboratory Examiner, Robert Frazier, testified 4.6 seconds was a minimum firing time for three shots from Oswald's rifle - a figure that includes no time for aiming the rifle. The fact is, SA Frazier testified 4.6 seconds was minimum time required by him to fire three aimed shots which again denotes Thompson was in error.

Thompson has used testimony and data which was furnished to the Warren Commission and is available in the Archives. He also used comments made by Governor Connally and physicians who conducted the autopsy to establish his theory that four shots were fired from three different positions, namely the Texas School Book Depository Building (TSBDB), a building adjacent to the TSBDB on Houston Street, and the fence behind the grassy knoll in Dealey Plaza in Dallas. The sequence of these shots according to Thompson were, the first shot was fired from the TSBDB which hit the president in the back, the second from a building on Houston Street which wounded Governor Connally, the third shot from the TSBDB that hit the president in the rear of the head, and an almost instantaneous shot (the fourth) coming from the grassy knoll which struck the president in the right front of the head. (Sequence of shots based on Thompson's interpretation)

Thompson's theory would appear plausible to anyone unfamiliar with the actual facts developed by the Warren Commission. He said the purpose of his study was to perform a task of archaeology to lay bare a whole level of contradictory evidence beneath the conclusions of the Warren Report. He said it does not prove the assassination was a conspiracy, nor does it prove Oswald's innocence.

ACTION:

Our New York Office has determined that Thompson's book has as yet not been bound, and a copy of the manuscript is being obtained and will be reviewed upon receipt.

It is noted allegations made by Harold Weisberg as contained in the UPI release of 11/15/67 is not mentioned in connection with Thompson's book, and this matter is being handled by a separate memorandum.

Reference is made to memorandum A. Rosen to Mr. DeLoach dated 11/17/67 concerning an analysis of a condensed version of the book "Six Seconds in Dallas" which appeared in "The Saturday Evening Post" December 2, 1967.

This book was written by Dr. Josiah Donald Thompson of Haverford College, Haverford, Pennsylvania, and the condensed version appearing in the Post was written by Dr. Josiah Thompson.

SAC Ponder, New York Office, obtained an advance copy of Thompson's book which is to be placed on public sale on or about 11/27/67. This book was received at the Bureau today.

The book is 315 pages in length, not including the preface, acknowledgments, note from the publisher, and the index. It has ten chapters and seven appendices identified by letters A through G. It deals extensively with technical matters, number of shots fired, photographs, Commission exhibits, and other aspects taken from the Warren Commission's report.

Only one copy of this book has been received, and to have a complete analysis of the book, it will have to be handled by the Laboratory Division, the General Investigative Division, and possibly the Domestic Intelligence Division.

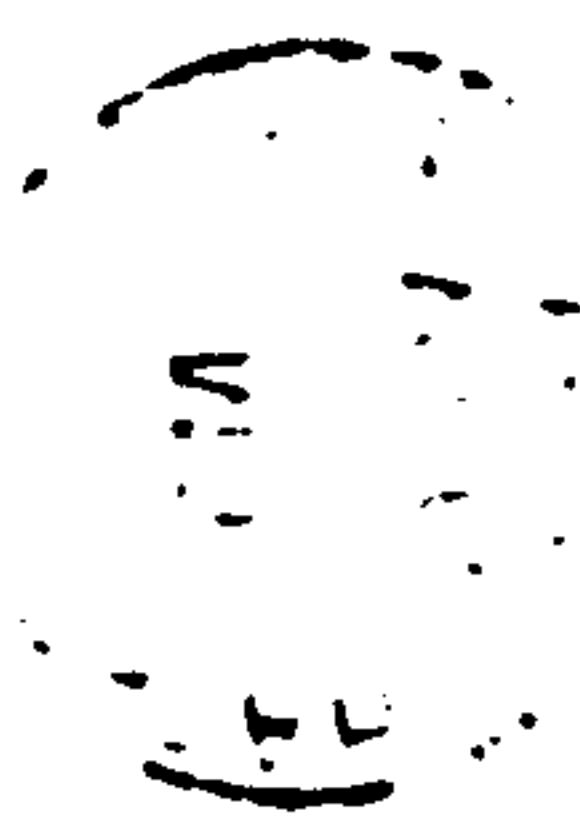

On October 30, 1967, King and Porter instituted actions against the United States under Public Law 89-318 which vested title to the Warren Commission exhibits in the United States and permitted claims for just compensation to be filed against the United States. A copy of each complaint is attached hereto.

In preparing for the defense, it may be important to know, with respect to each of the claimed exhibits:

1. the time at which each exhibit was originally taken into custody;
2. the persons who obtained original custody;
3. the time at which custody was initially obtained by federal officers.
4. the location at the time of original custody.

We presently have in our possession a 48-page list of the exhibits, which indicates that the Bureau received custody of many of the exhibits from the Dallas Police Department. Kindly advise whether the above information is easily ascertainable from existing records of either the Bureau or the Dallas Police Department. We would appreciate copies of any such existing records.

Plaintiff does not by this action waive his contentions in the pending action against the Attorney General but files this Complaint only to cover the possibility of an adverse decision on his right to possession of the property in controversy.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff prays that a judgment be entered herein in favor of Plaintiff and against Defendant for \$5,000,000 and costs, and for such other and further relief as to the Court may seem proper.





 PERTAINING TO THE ASSASSINATION
 OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY

Under the authority vested in me by the Act of November 2, 1965 (Public Law 89-318; 79 Stat. 1165), I have determined that the national interest requires the entire body of evidence considered by the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy and now in the possession of the United States to be preserved intact.

Accordingly, pursuant to section 2(a) of the Act, I hereby determine that all of the items of evidence not owned by the United States which were considered by the Commission, and were not returned by the Commission to the person who furnished them, should be acquired by the United States and be preserved together with all of the items of evidence already owned by the United States.

The items acquired hereunder are more particularly described in the appendix annexed to and made a part of this notice. This notice and appendix shall be published in the FEDERAL REGISTER, and title to the items acquired pursuant to the foregoing determinations shall thereupon vest in the United States pursuant to section 2(b) of the Act.

By letter dated 12/1/67, the Department furnished a Civil Complaint Number 67-C-518 filed by John J. King for just compensation in the amount of \$5,000,000 for the 6.5 millimeter Mannlicher - Carcano Rifle (assassination rifle) and the .38 Smith and Wesson Revolver used by Lee Harvey Oswald to kill Dallas Police Officer J. D. Tippit. Also furnished was Civil Complaint Number CA-3-2282 filed by Marina M. Oswald Porter for just compensation in the amount of \$500,000 for property listed in the Federal Register whose ownership was invested in the Government under Public Law 89-318. All of this material relates to evidence obtained during the investigation of the assassination of President Kennedy. The Department is preparing a defense in this matter, and desires to know when the exhibits were taken into custody, persons who obtained original custody, time at which custody was initially obtained by Federal officers, and the location at the time of the original custody. Dallas being instructed to furnish this data for transmittal to the Department.
