Dear Dr. Nichols:

Your letter of March 25th has been received and I want to thank you for your offer to demonstrate certain of your findings relating to your study of the assassination of President Kennedy when you are in Washington, D. C., in the near future.

As has been indicated in our earlier correspondence to Zyou, the medical aspects of the inquiry by the Warren Commission were not handled by this Bureau. The report of the Commission sets forth that the autopsy examination was conducted by a medical team at the National Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, Maryland, and simulation studies of wound ballistics and related bullet distortion were performed by personnel of the Department of the Army at Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland: Accordingly, it is desired that any of your findings which you wish to furnish to the FBI and which relate to the medical or wound ballistics aspects befurnished in documentary form suitable for referral to the I above ageficies. Alternatively, since you have indicated that you plan to be in the Washington area, it is suggested you might prefer to furnish your medical and wound ballistics findings directly to those agencies.

REC-D BISHUP It previously has been suggested that you contact Assistant Director Ivan W. Conrad and you should feel free to contact him directly here at FBI Headquarters to make suitable arrangements for the delivery of any documentary material which you may wish to personally furnish to



### Dr. John Nichols

NOTE: Dr. Nichols has previously corresponded with the Bureau in this case. By letter 6-27-66 he made inquiry concerning difficulty in obtaining a certified copy of a death certificate of former President Kennedy from Dallas authorites. By letter 7-1-66 we advised him we had not issued instructions that certified copies could not be furnished. By letter 7-1-36 he advised he subsequently learned that Dallas Commission of Health had issued the instructions. By letter 7-6-67 he requested an appointment to come to Washington and explain his studies to the Director and by Bureau letter 7-12-67 the Director declined to make an appointment and suggested he contact Assistant Director Conrad regarding any information he might wish to furnish. By letter 12-5-67 Nichols advised he planned an informal seminar in Kansas City regarding his findings and invited us to send a representative. Bulet 12-8-67 declined. We previously pointed out to Dr. Nichols-on two separate occasions that we had nothing to do with the medical aspects of the Warren Commission inquiry. We should not become involved in any oral discussion of his medical findings and should insist that any material relating to the medical aspects he furnished be in documentary for so there will be no question as to what was furnished. The Bureau is not in a position to evaluate the medical findings and such medical information should be referred to those agencies which handled the medical aspects of the inquiry. This letter coordinated with the Laboratory Division.

On March 27; 1968, Mr. Harry Q. Maynor, Security Director, General Telephone and Electronics Service Corporation, 730 Third Avenue, New York, New York, advised that he is a former Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) who in the past served as the Special Agent in Charge of the New-Orleans FBI Office. He advised that he acted in this capacity in November, 1963, when President Kennedy was murdered in Dallas, Texas.

as a clerical employee of the New Orleans FBI Office in 160 November, 1963. His actual position was that of Security Patrol Clerk whose duties included the sending and receiving of teletype messages to and from other FBI field offices and FBI Headquarters in Washington, D.C.

Regarding allegations made by William S. Walter that a communication from FBI Headquarters in Washington, D.C. was received at the New Orleans FBI Office on November 17, 1963, stating in effect there would be an assassination attempt on the President's life during his forthcoming trip to Texas, Mr. Maynor stated he has no recollection whatever of receiving or seeing any such teletype or other communication containing this message. He remarked that had such a message been received by him he most certainly would have some recollection of it. He also stated he has no recollection of receiving a message .by.telephone or by any other means from William S. Walter during the morning of November 17, 1963, following receipt of this alleged communication informing him of its content. Further Mr. Maynor stated he did not instruct any of his Special Agent personnel during the morning of November 17, 1963,

Criminal Judge Edward A. Haggerty said today, after bearing oral arguments, that he will rule Friday on a bid to have the Kennedy assassination conspiracy trial of Clay L. Shaw-moved at least 100 miles from New Orleans.

The 55-year-old Shaw is charged with conspiracy to murder the late President John F. Kennedy. His lawyers say he cannot get a fair trial here because of the publicity surrounding the Shaw case and other facets of District Attorney Jim Garrison's assassination probe.

MEANWHILE, ASSISTANT DA James L. Alcock said today that a motion picture film of the Kennedy assassination taken by Abraham Zapruder will be turned over to the Orleans Parish-Grand, Jury. (A): Yelloon

The film was sold by Zapruder to Life magazine. Garrison previously asked that it be subpensed from Time Inc. in New York for viewing by the grand jury.

Alcock said today that he has been notified by Time that the film will be sent here for delivery to the jury Thursday.

THE ORIGINAL film never was shown to the Warren Commission, which used copies in its investigation of the president's death.

Garrison contends the original film will show that the president was shot from the front; the commission said be was shot from the back.

On another front of the probe, in Irving, Tex., Mrs.
Ruth Paine said she is "not terribly keen"—about coming to New Orleans to testify before the grand jury.

Mrs. Paine, a friend of Lee Harvey Oswald and his wife, Marina, was subpensed yesterday to appear before the jury April 18 and 19 in the assassination probe.



Monday 36 of 40 prospective jurous testified they could give Shaw a fair hearing. They agree by more than five to one they could "treat Shaw's trial the same as any other case."

SHAW ATTORNEYS contend the 55-year-old New Orleans businessman cannot get a fair trial in New Orleans because of adverse publicity launched by Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison.

However, Monday only two of · 36 jurous testified they had read articles or publications which defense attorneys said could have prejudiced their minds against Shaw.
