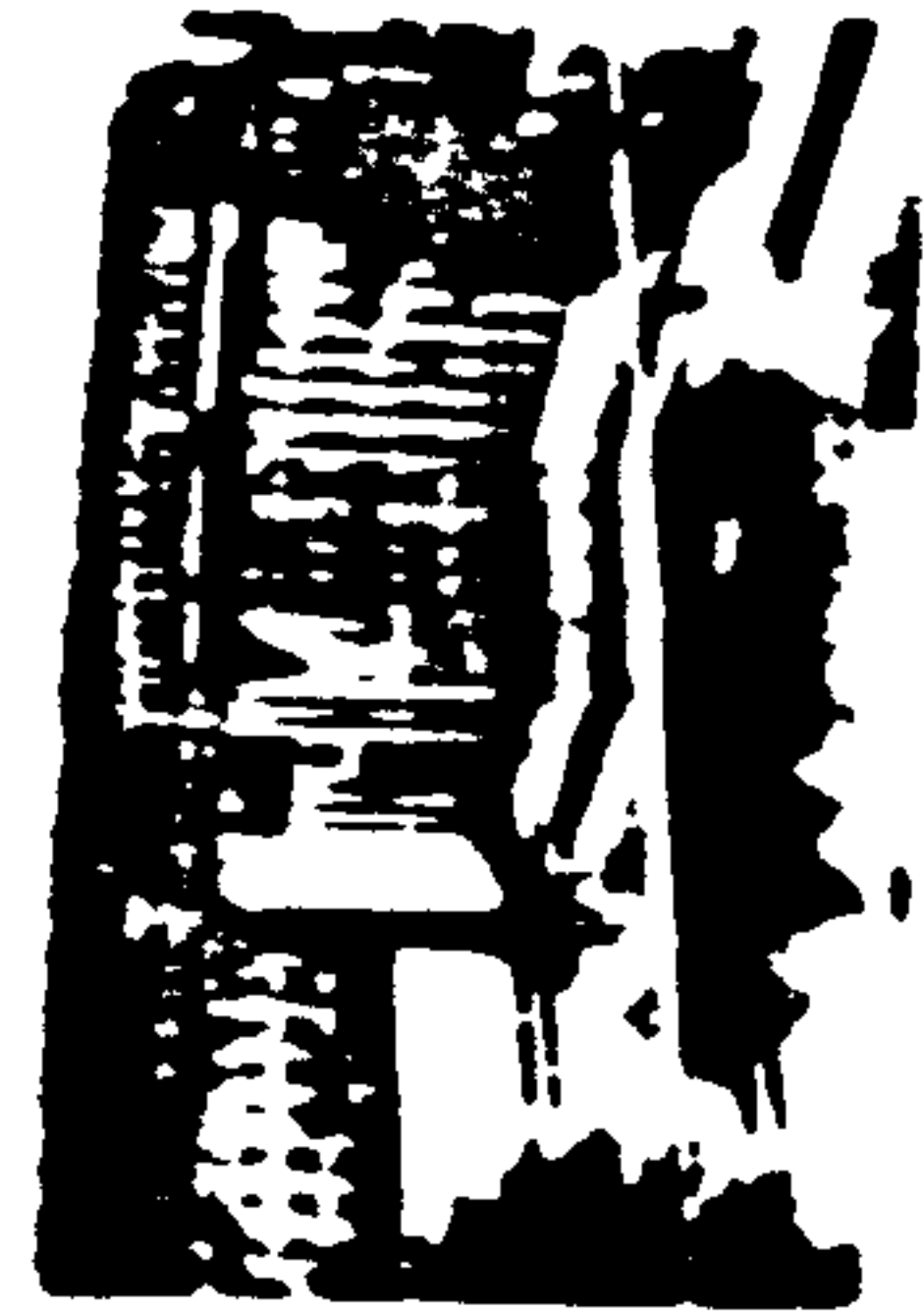
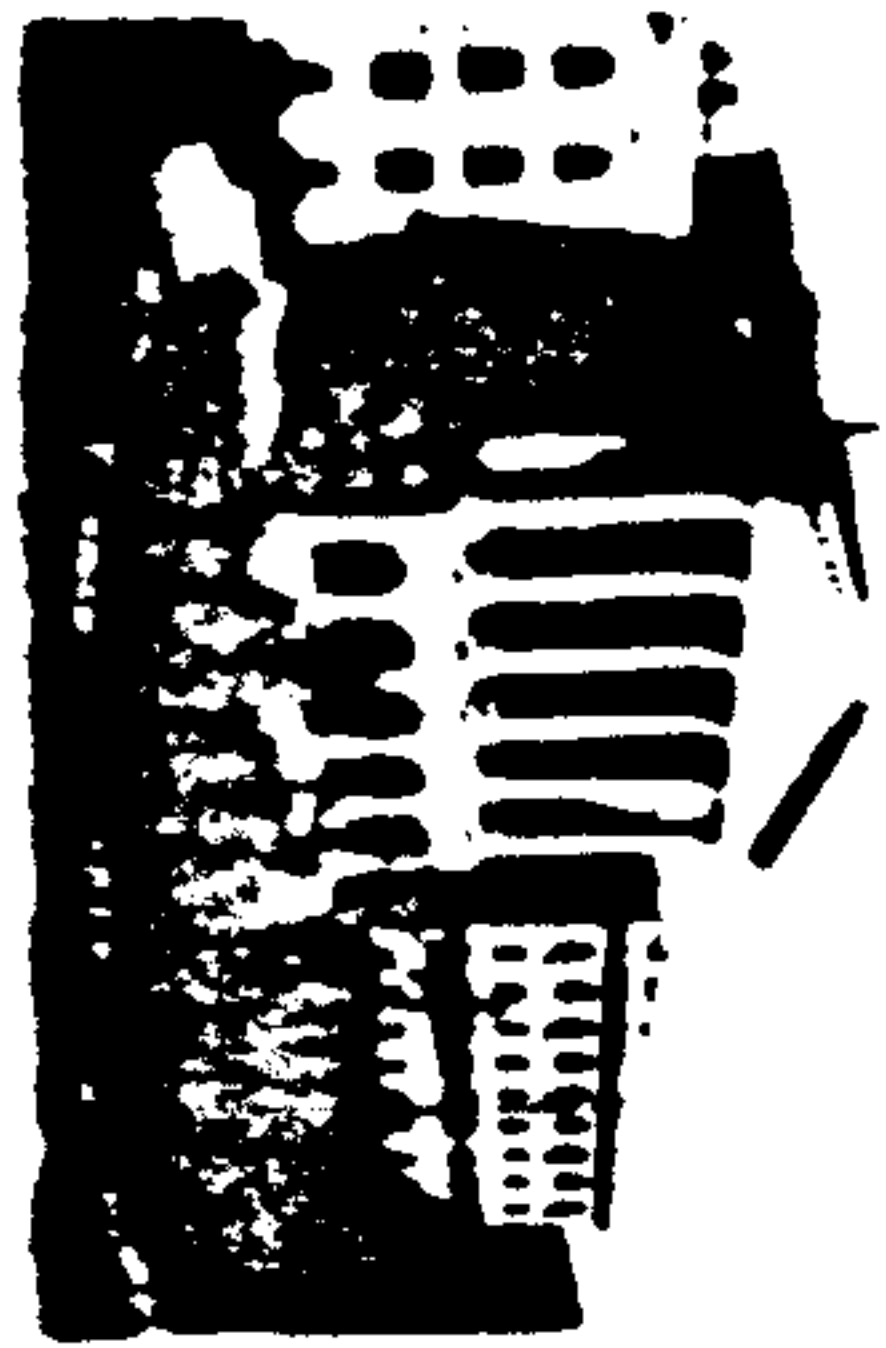
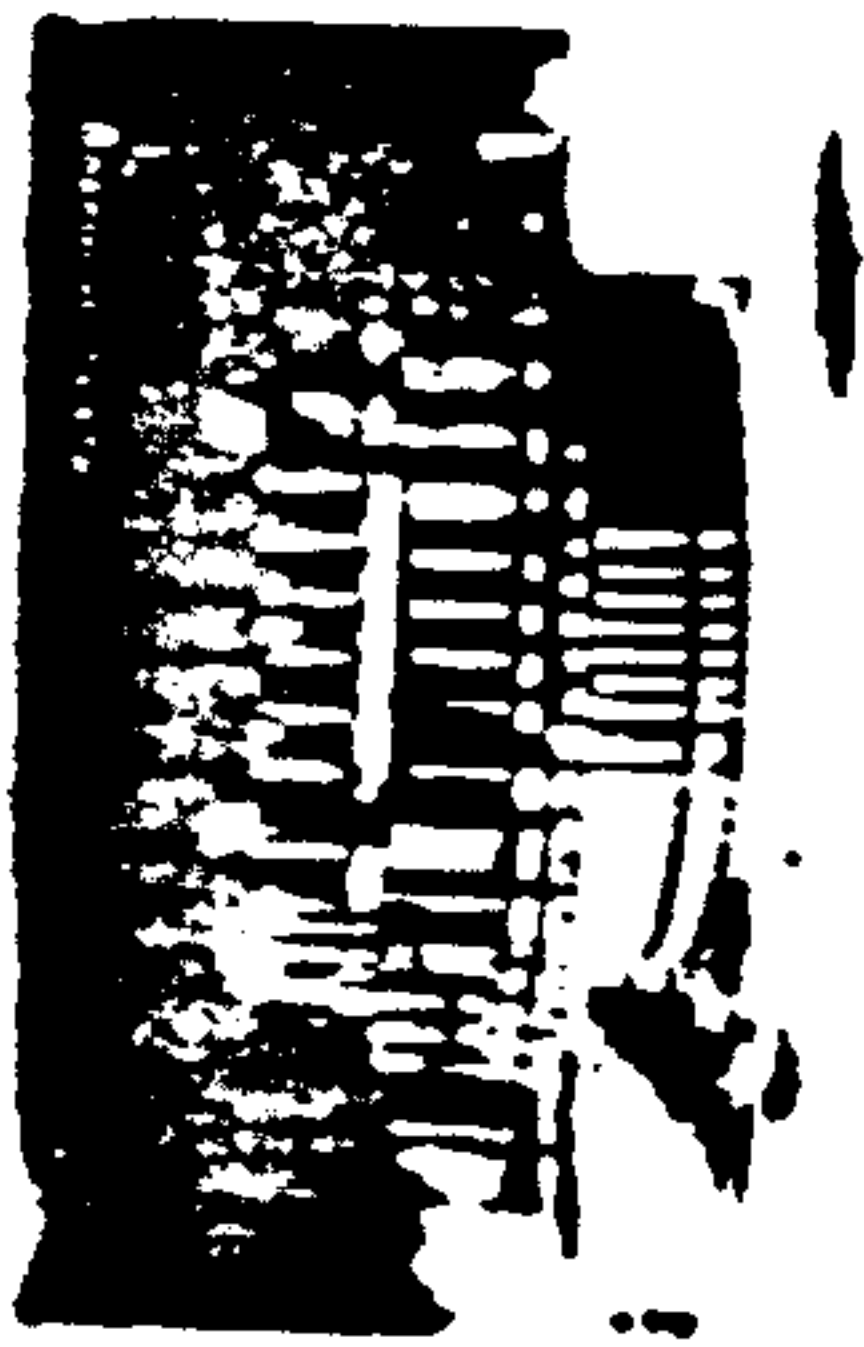

Clothing issues are scarce in the beginning and all winter camp cloths cleaned and steamed and brought back in a brown pile with the result that a soldier covers with the same jackets and trousers twice. Barracks are usually bare and damp, over in winter, where they are located in the extreme parts of town behind high bulk passes are given except on holidays and sometimes Sundays after maneuvers leave of 30 days. However the armed forces in their contracts are unknown. However the greatest difference is after winter. In chief of the Soviet armed forces in the early 1930's pay was generally cut for common soldiers (privates) from 3,300 rubles old money to 3 rubles new money - 1st of 25.7 rubles (new) 2 rubles are enough to buy 22 cigarettes of cigarettes, 20 cigarettes to a private's increase 30 rubles was enough for a soldier to save up for his diet. such drab-lives on the outside that there is no conflict of color
between civilian and military life. When I told about the basic
features of American military life in the U.S. Marine Corps, the
ex-soldiers I knew usually laughed and said we have no discipline

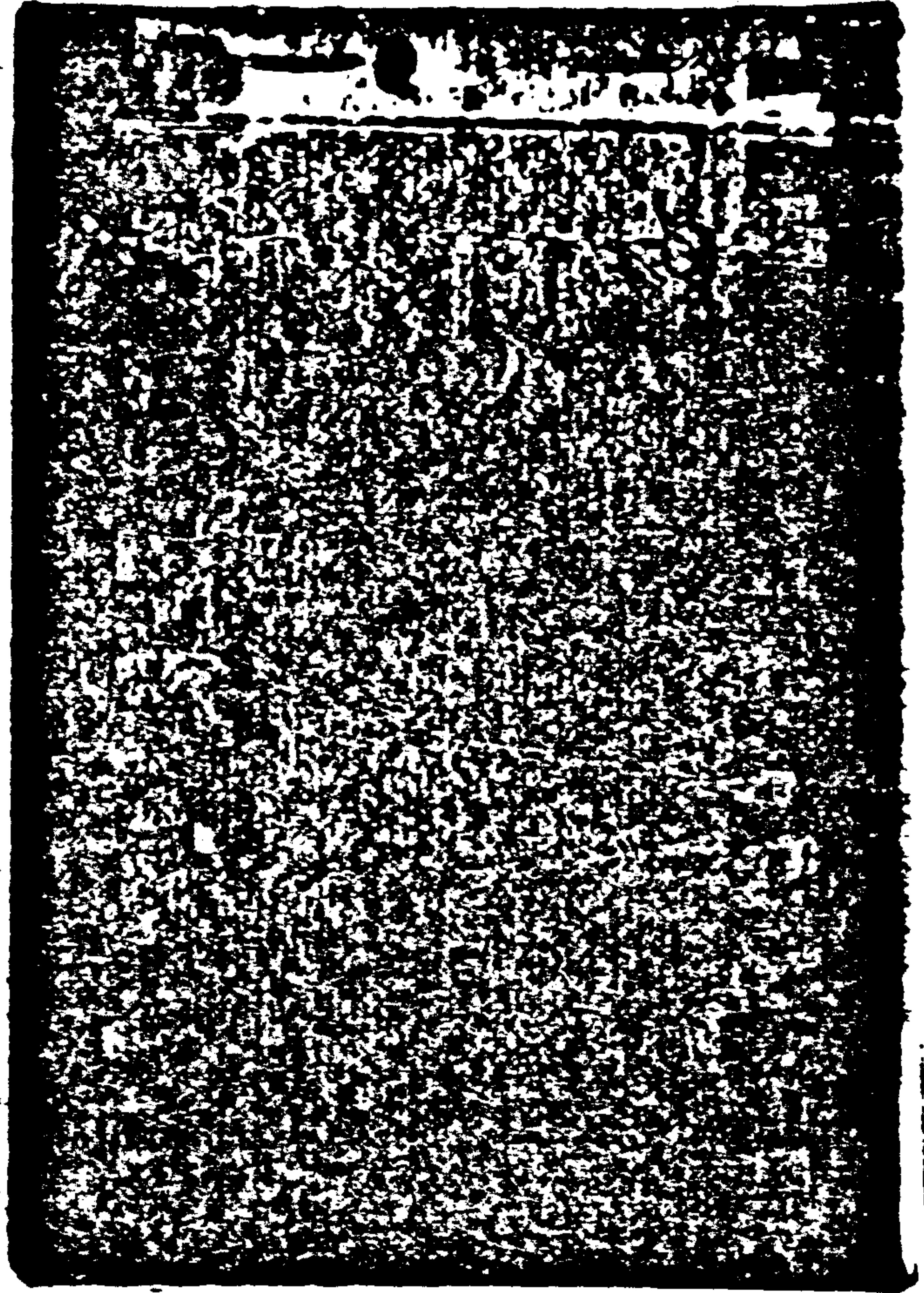
