He gave no indications of the nature of the State Department report but it was assumed that it would cover the State Department's dealings with Oswald; a Soviet consular file on Oswald and an investigation conducted by the Mexican government.

Oswald lived in Russia from October, 1959 until June, 1962.

The Mexican government investigated Oswald's visit to Mexico from September 26 to October 3, 1963.

The State Department's own activities in connection with Oswald relate to granting him documents to return to this country from Russia and lending him the money for the trip.

Setting Up Headquarters

The commission spent most of its meeting yesterday approving arrangements dealing with a permanent headquarters and staff. Chief Justice Warren announced that the headquarters for the commission will be on the fourth floor of the Veterans of Foreign Wars building at 200 Maryland avenue N.E., directly across from the Supreme Court building.

Former Solicitor General J. Lee Rankin, the commission's general counsel, will have his office there.

Chief Justice Warren said the commission has acquired an office manager from the General Services Administration and a files expert assigned by Wayne C. Grover, national archivist.
