JACK LEON RUBY, aka Jack Rubenstein; LEE HARVEY OSWALD - Victim CIVIL RIGHTS

Relative to the notification of the police, Sheriff's office and Secret Service by the Dallas Office after receipt of the anonymous telephone call indicating that Oswald would be killed while being moved to the county jail, SAC Shanklin furnished the following details:

The call was received at 2:30 a.m. on November 24. It was received by the Security Patrol Clerk in the Dallas Office. A memorandum was immediately prepared reflecting this call and at 3:00 a.m. the Sheriff's Office was telephonically advised of the receipt of the call and its contents. At that time the Sheriff's Office advised that they had received a similar call and that security precautions would be taken.

At 3:20 a. m. Captain W. B. Frazer, who was in charge of the Dallas Police Department at that time, was telephonically advised of the receipt of the anonymous call and its contents. He at that time stated he would see to it that this information was immediately given to Chief Curry and he felt certain that in view of this information there would be a change of plans relative to the transfer of the prisoner Oswald.

At 8:15 a.m. SAC Shanklin personally called Chief Curry and repeated the information relative to receipt of the anonymous call and its contents. Chief Curry advised he had already been advised of this by Captain Frazer and that they were taking all necessary precautions. He told Shanklin he had two armored cars which would be brought into the basement of the jail and that no one would know which car Oswald would be placed in.

SAC Shanklin advised that the Dallas Office and he personally had made several attempts to notify the Secret Service Agent in Dallas but were unable to reach him either at his home or at his office, 1977 (1977) 3
