Sometime around 11:00 A. H. on November 24, 1365 Captain Frank Martin one into the Juvenile Bureau and asked that Detectives Lowery, Goolaby, Miller, Cutchshaw, Marrison and myself follow him to the City Mall basement. We did so. The breatent was crowded with officers, newspaper, radio and television people. We proceeded to the area just outside the basement door that adjoins the parking area. We reported to Captain O. A. Jones who assigned the Detectives where he wanted them.

Shortly after our arrivel an amored car backed partially on to the basement remp on the Commerce Street side. Chief Britcheler, Sergeant P. T. Dean and myself proceeded to carron the amored car. Bothing was found. I instructed officers on the Commerce Street out not to let anyone in or out of the basement until we advised them otherwise.

Sergeant Dean and Chief Batchelor then left me with the empored car. Sergeant Dean returned and said his bose told him to ride inside the truck with the prisoner.

Bortly oftenwords in untarked police car drove on to the ramp from the base ent area. This car parked near the fail deer entrance on the ramp. I was every from the excitencest of the growd that Lee Oswald was in night but scald not ere anything for the police car between us. Bext a shot was heard. I ren down, yelling to the officers not to let anyone out of the backment.

I was advised by someone that Jack Ruby had shot Coweld. In a very short time an embulance owns and removed Oswald.

Just prior to my taking my position on the armored car, I had looked over the crowd carefully that was gathered near the door. I have known Jack Buby for years but did not one him at that time. This observation and approximately ten minutes before the chacting.
