Re: Interview of Mr. J. H. Curry
Concerning the killing of Lee Harvey Oswald

Sir:

I, J. H. Curry, was interviewed by Mr. George W. Ballou and J. C. Tamm at 9:00 a.m. on November 29, 1963. I determined to concur in substantially the same conclusions as the original report dated November 27, 1963. Mr. Tamm had this to add:

I would like to give in more detail a report of the shooting of Lee Harvey Oswald.

On Friday, November 29, 1963, around 10:30 a.m., I left the basement of the jail, having just come up from the elevator, accompanied by Captain Martin, Captain Jones, and Captain Martin's副官, Mr. Gandy.

Approximately 11:00 a.m., November 29, in this same elevator to the top floor, Captain Jones, Captain Gandy, Mr. Gandy, Mr. Catchshaw, with his副官, Captain Martin, Captain Martin's副官, and myself, we went with Captain Martin, Captain Harrison, Captain Miller, and myself, to the elevator and went to the basement.

As we approached the intersection of my office with that of the jail, I noticed Captain Gandy was to be asked for identification from concierge. There were other officers on the scene in uniform, possibly sergeants and I don't recall the names. In addition, a group of men in one of the jail's elevators, Captain Jones and Captain Gandy, and Captain Martin, Captain Harrison, Captain Miller, and myself, were at the top of the stairs leading to the first floor. Captain Jones, Captain Harrison, Captain Miller, and myself, were in uniform at the top of the stairs.

As I approached Captain Gandy, he called for me, when I did so, he said "Get the men in position in the corridor" and I repeated the instruction. In the middle of the corridor, the positions in the corridor were as follows. I positioned both of those who were to take their positions in the corridor. I stepped into the corridor and I took up a position at the bottom of the corridor, facing the steps.

At this time several other officers took their positions on both sides of corridor from jail door to rear armo.

I believe Captain Jones repeated his instructions to everyone, that he would like officers to form line on both sides of corridor, and also instructed each personnel where they should be. He told new people to get in back of our drivers. His position, however, he was of the opinion to get in back of our drivers. His position, however, he was of the opinion that he could not clearly see the position of all the other officers. effective conduct you in the relative left.

After taking my position, I looked to my left and saw W.C. Channel 5
TV camera mounted on tripod with rollers, it appeared that there were
two cameras operating the cameras. One was later identified as John Alexander,
1/1/39. I could not see the faces of these two men because they were
stooped over with heads down as they rolled past me, down a slight de-
cline, the camera acted as if it wanted to tip over, and I steadied
the camera with my left hand. They stopped at the bottom of the south
ramp and I heard one of the men say "We can't get up here." They then
walked through the line of reporters on the east side of the ramp.

Two or three minutes later, I heard someone shout "Jail office say, Here
he comes." I looked to my left, toward the jail of ice door, and ob-
served Lt. Swain appear through jail of ice door. When approximately
10 to 12 feet behind Lt. Swain, Captain Fritz appeared. Then approxi-
mately 5 ft. behind Captain Fritz, I observed Detective Oswald,
with Oswald handcuffed to Leavelle's left arm, I also noticed a detec-
tive on Oswald's left holding Oswald's arm, but didn't notice who the
detective was at that time.

Leavelle and his partner along with Oswald, stepped through the
jail of ice door, the men remained bare to the waist forward, taking
pictures and making questions. "Did he give the orders," etc.

As Captain Fritz passed me and as Leavelle, his partner, and Oswald
approached my position, I saw a man lunge from the crowd of men
opposite my position. He took several forward extending his right arm
and firing about six shots rapidly.

Oswald fell to the floor and Leavelle, Leavelle fell down on the floor.
At the exact instant the first shot was fired, I turned around, I know
what happened next. Oswald fell to the floor first, and took
the gun from him.

I recognized the man that fired the shot as Jack Ruby. I had not
noticed Jack Ruby before he fired the shot. I do know Jack Ruby by
sight as have never seen him in the City Hall.

I assisted several other officers take Jack Ruby into jail office,
I assisted in handcuffing. Didn't help take him upstairs, but remained
in room, it was the 3rd floor.

Jack Ruby, told you, I am not responsible for the incident in
connection with the Leavelle.
