Ruby at the bus station in Lincoln, Nebraska, on November 16, 1963. Also included in the enclosed letterhead memorandum is available information from the files of our Omaha Office relating to Meyer and this same allegation.

A copy of the letterhead memorandum has also been furnished to the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice. No additional investigation will be conducted concerning this matter unless specifically requested by the President's Commission.

NOTE:

Department furnished a letter dated 2/17/64 to the Attorney General from August Meyer which had no return address and the envelope was not furnished. In addition to the above Meyer relates that during week of 11/26/63 he saw a person in a bar in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, whom he was told was in a state of shock because his brother was in deep trouble in Dallas, Texas. Ruby's three brothers, Earl, who resides in Detroit, Sam, who resides in Dallas, Texas, and Hyman, who resides in Chicago, Illinois, were each interviewed during the week of 11/26/63 at their residences and no indication was given that they had been to or were connected with the Cedar Rapids, Iowa, area in any way. Omaha advised that Meyer contacted the Lincoln, Nebraska, RA on 12/3/63 and furnished the identical story about a foreign student at the bus station in Lincoln with a rifle who was en route to Dallas, Texas. He furnished a description of the student which bore no resemblance to Ruby's description and did not at that time state that he resembled Ruby which is contrary to his allegation in the letter to the Attorney General. The bus station was checked but no tickets were sold to Dallas between 11/15 and 18/63.
